Politics Predominate As Saturday Primary Looms

Politics have been the order of the day locally for the past week in anticipation of the Saturday Primary. The primary is for the Democratic Party. There will be no Republican Party primary in Crockett County, due partly to lack of organization and the fact that all local political races are on the Democratic Primary ballot. Several telephone calls to the Stockman office have prompted this information.

Absentee balloting closed Tuesday at 5 p.m. with 334 ballots cast and 25 still due in the mail. Of this number 214 voters in Precinct 1 signed their intent to be out of town on Saturday and cast absentee ballots. There were 11 ballots still in the mail. Precinct 2 had 41 absentee voters with 2 still out. Precinct 3 had 69 vote absentee and had 11 out. Precinct 4 had 10 voters cast absentee ballots with one

The large absentee turn-out in Precinct 1 is undoubtedly due to the hotly contested commissioners race in progress there. Incumbent Commissioner Jesse Marley and candidate Jerry Hayes are facing a strong challenge from Sostenes DeHoyos.

Only two other local races have developed. Sheriff Billy Mills is being challenged by Max Morris, retired federal law enforcement officer. Incumbent commissioner of precinct 3 Jack Williams is opposed on the ballot by Jim Marks,

local super market manager. Local interest in the primary is high since the winners, barring a run-off in Precinct 1, will actually secure the office, having no opposition in the general elections in November.

The election will apparently be held according to the rearranging of precinct lines by the Commissioners Court in 1974, and as amended in October of 1975. The redistricting has not been approved nor disapproved by the U. S. Attorney General's office, although it has been under consideration since January of this year. The situation has caused a great deal of confusion among county

officials and candidates. Something new on the ballot this year is the presidential preference election. Voters will be voting for slates of delegates for the nomination of a Democratic Presidential candidate. This election is at the top of the ballot. The three delegates for Lloyd Bentsen top the list. Although Senator Bentsen's national candidacy for

President was spoiled early by poor showings elsewhere, he still wants to lead the Texas delegation as favorite son and make use of

the status at the convention. Next on the list are three delegates for Jimmy Carter, former governor of Georgia, who is the front-runner so far in the presidential primaries nationwide. Next, comes the uncommitted slate of delegates. These deleto go to the convention ready to cast the Texas strength for a candidate yet to emerge. The final

slate of delegates are committed to Governor George Wallace. Although Wallace has a very slim chance, if any, of winning the nomination, most conservative democrats will vote for this delegation, in hopes of placing a conservative candidate in nomination at convention.

In counties where Republican Primaries are held, former California Governor Ronald Reagan is strongly challenging gates, mostly liberal, hope President Gerald Ford, and although both camps are predicting victory, it is the general concensus that Reagan has the edge.

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U.N. HYPOCRISY AND SOUTH AFRICA

South Africa's ambassador to the United States, Roelof F. Botha, earlier this month began a Washington press briefing sponsored by the American Security Council with these words: "Friends, critics and enemies.

That salutation says a lot about the country's isolation in the world community. To those who might otherwise accuse South Africa of being paranoid, however, this article is addressed.

First some facts: As Portugal's hold on its colony in Angola became increasingly tenuous during the last 10 years, several black liberationist groups within that African country emerged. Two of them, recently led by Holden Roberto and Jonas Savimbi, fought in the bush for years against Portugal and commanded the loyalty of about two-thirds of the six million citizens of Angola.

A third group, the MPLA, had the loyalty of a minority of Angolans but had something else going for it: the backing of Russia. When the Soviet Union poured its Cuban puppets, armed with Russian weapons, into southern Africa late last year - and when the U.S. Congress refused to back President Ford in meeting the blatant challenge - the war in Angola, for all intents and purposes, was over.

In the meantime, South Africa, in part at least to protect its investment in a hydro-electric and irrigation project near the border between South West Africa and Angola, poured its own troops into the country. Its action was encouraged by the pro-western forces fighting for control of the country - who remember,

represented a majority of Angolans. With the West, led notably by the United States, having given up the ghost and Angola falling to the Marxist forces, South Africa took the better part of valor and pulled all of its soldiers out of Angola by March 27. Still on Angolan soil, however, remained between 12,000 and 15,000 Cuban troops - some of whom have now been joined by their entire families.

On the evening of March 30 - three days after the last South African soldier had departed Angola - one of the most hypocritical acts of modern diplomacy was perpetrated by the United Nations Security Council. On a vote of 9-0 the would-be arbiter of world morals voted to brand South Africa alone as the aggressor in Angola, Furthermore, it ordered South Africa to pay compensation for all war damages:

For its part, the United States, along with four other Security Council members, meekly abstained. Hence, once again, the U.S. exhibits a mugwump approach to foreign affairs, that bogeyman South Africa gets its dues, and the United Nations adds to its considerable record of incompetence. And, we should add, some 12,000 Communist troops from another continent continue to sit on Angolan soil.

A NEW COVERUP?

The left-leaning Washington, D.C., press made much of what has come to be called "the Watergate coverup. " Now, it appears, there is a new "coverup"and this time by certain segments of the press itself.

The story revolves around one Daniel Schorr of CBS, who leaked a secret congressional report on the CIA to the radical-left Village Voice a new York

Alice Widener, Editor and Publisher of the "U.S.A." newsletter, has found a large number of inconsistencies and contradictions in the news stories which followed the Schorr escapade. But, she reports (in the March 30 issue of U.S.A.) that repeated attempts on her part to run down the stories and clear up the contradictions have been met with a strange refusal to talk.

For example, Daniel Schorr states, in a letter to the New York Times (February 16) that "I suggested (to Clay Felker, editor of the Village Voice) it would be appropriate for him to make a voluntary contribution to the Reporters' Committee, " in lieu of cash payment to Schorr for the secret report.

Jack C. Landau, a member of the Executive Committee of the Reporters' Committee told Editor & Publisher (Feb. 28) that "none of us on the committee are making anything...we simply accepted a check. What were we supposed to do, turn it down?"

However, several days later, on February 24, the Reporters' Committee issued a public statement which declared, "At no time before or after publication of the Pike Report in the Village Voice has any member of the Reporters' Committee had any contact with Clay Felker (Voice Publisher); nor has any money been

offered by him or received " Puzzled by the contradiction, Alice Widener reports that "to try to find out which statement is true, I telephoned the Reporters' Committee. It referred me to Mr. Fred Graham of CBS (a member of the Executive Committee) and gave me his Washington office phone number. Unable to reach him, I left a message of inquiry with his office and requested a reply. When it did not come, I phoned again and was again unable to reach Mr. Graham. I dictated my brief question to his secretary and again requested a reply. None was forthcoming. After a third try with no result, I telephoned Robert Brown, president and publisher of Editor and Publisher and asked him about the discrepancy...Mr. Brown (replied, "We're satisfied our

************ Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

************ Now that it is time to plant annuals I will name six basic kinds that are easiest grown and reliable in color. You may have other favorites that do well

Last fall almost proved that number one is the marigold. For several reasons the French dwarf are preferred over the taller, large flowered American varieties. They're earlier blooming, have a wider color range and they stay neat and compact. The rusty-reds are gorgeous. Carmen, Fiesta and Bolero are among the best of these.

A new group recently created from a cross between the French and American are called Triploid Hybrids. They combine the best qualities of each parent and are called the nugget and seven star series. Buy the plants or plant seed inside for protected handling until ready to plant outside.

Zinnias might be considered as first, by some. but since mildew is such a serious problem with them most everywhere, that should be considered. Their color range is unquestionably the most spectacular of annuals.

Petunias of course are a great favorite for bedding plants and baskets. Though the grandifloras like Glacier and White Cascade are beautiful with large flowers, WEDNESDAY the multifloras create a greater density of color and have better weather tolerance. "Sugar Plum" has the best rain resistance and the Joy series has an exceptional THURSDAY color range.

Geranium seeds are sometimes slow to germinate so you may profit by buying plants or by rooting from old plants. A new variety that is worth growing from seed is "Sprinter" which blooms reliably within 14 weeks of sowing seed. It is scarlet-red, has a plain leaf, is a neater. bushier plant and more generous with its flower

Inpatins (Sultana) is another favorite plant for budding, borders, pots and hanging baskets. They do best in partial shade, and a moisture retaining soil containing humus.

If you want to grow wax begonia displays such as you see in many homes and public gardens, try the new hybrid varieties. and mixtures "Organdy" and "Coctail". You can buy bedding plants from a garden center, but ask for the hybrids and don't accept substitutes. They will do well in full sun or part shade provided the

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



More pork "features" will appear in Texas grocery stores -- since the supply is larger with more attractive prices, Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt pre-

Good values are most likely on Boston butt roasts and quarter-loins cut into chops, she added.

Mrs. Clyatt is a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Beef is still a bargain. This may be a good time to put extra cuts into the freezer. For best buys watch the ads and purchase cuts when they're featured at 'special' prices, " she sent grave markers replaced advised.

"Fryer chickens also have attractive prices-with the whole bird offering the best value on a cost-per-pound basis. " Cemetery Service, Veterans At vegetable counters,

Administration, Washington, head and leaf lettuce show good quality and reasonable prices, as do the larger quantities of fresh asparagus, the specialist said.

"Economically priced National Cemetery estimate items in most stores include cooking greens, cabbage, carrots, potatoes, turnips and dry yellow onions. Melon supplies are increasing, but prices are still relatively high. "

At fruit counters, Mrs. Clyatt reported "reasonable" prices on Navel oranges. She said quality grapefruit is still available and described apples from "Controlled Atmosphere Storage" as being "good quality."

In 1903 he was married in Ozona to Clara Lee Holmesly Meadows and they made their home here until his death in

County Gains Oil Producer

Mr. Couch began his ranching career as a sheep herder. At his death he owned 44,000 acres of land, 10,000 sheep and 1500 cattle. He and James Mitchell brought the first sheep to Crockett County on January 3, 1888, according to his diary.

On October 31, 1892,

in District Court in Ozona, Mr. Couch became a citizen of the United States from Great Britain. He was a public-spirited, progressive citizen all of his life. He assisted in organizing the Ozona National Bank and served as president; helped to organize both the Ozona Telephone Company and the Ozona Improvement Company, and was a leading stockholder and president of the Hotel Ozona Corporation, and a stockholder in the Ozona Fair Association. He was a Director in the Wool Growers Storage Company, San Angelo, organizer of the Western Reserve Life Insurance Company, and a stockholder of the Central National Bank, also of San Angelo. He was a leader in organizing the Federal Land Bank of Sonora and served as it's first president.

Mr. Couch was the father of Masonry in Ozona and held high posts in the Grand Lodge of Texas. Indeed his was a guiding influence for solid progress in Crockett County.

Bert Couch married Josephine Broome on January 1, 1904, daughter of another pioneer Ozona family. She was active in many organizations, was a writer and historian as well as ranch wife and mother. To them were born: Mahlon Couch (Robertson), Lois Couch (Pyatt), Micky Couch (James) and Joseph B. Couch. An adopted daughter, Jacqueline, died in

San Antonio in 1968.

Clara Lee Helbing
(Benckenstein) told of the
Helbing family's years

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Advice For Weather Damaged Gardens

Violent spring thunder-storms are beginning to roam over Texas, and that means home vegetable gardeners can expect some damage to their crops.

"Home vegetable gar-dens are highly susceptible to high winds, heavy rains and hail that often accompany spring thunderstorms, " points out Sam Cotner, horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"If such weather causes heavy damage to vegetable crops, the gardener must decide whether to leave the damaged plants or to start over and replant."

Plants that often suffer the most from violent weather are squash, cucum- situation warrants. Also, bers and beans, notes the Texas A&M University System specialist.

Where garden space is available, Cotner suggests leaving the less damaged plants and replanting the remainder of the crop.

"Most vegetable seed will germinate rapidly once the soil has warmed, so replanting is often the best alternative. Of course if transplants can be obtained, you can gain several weeks of valuable growing time." In many areas of the

state, it is too late to replant cool season vegetables such as lettuce, carrots, cabbage and cauliflower. Cotner suggests replanting such crops to warm season vegetables if weather damage occurs.

"Whether damaged plants are left to recuperate or the crops are replanted, the overall delay in production will mean closer attention to care and maintenance of the crops in the months ahead, " points out the horticulturist. "Insects will become more active as the growing season progresses, so plants must be checked more closely and control measures taken as the watering will become more critical as hot weather approaches. "

Adversity such as that resulting from weather damage tests the "true grit" of home gardeners, believes Cotner. Hopefully, though, it will bring all gardeners, closer to nature and to living things and will instill in them the will to try again.

Although such assistance was administered through the individual states until January 1974 the program for the needy aged, blind and disabled was federalized at that time. The


average payment in Dec-ember 1973 was \$91.60, compared to the October 1975 average of \$116.25, he added.


