### Crockett Wildcat Finaled

Ken Dawson, Midland, No. 1 Joe Bean, in 35-UV-GC&SF, Crockett County wildcat. 12 miles northwest of Ozona, 1-3/8 miles northeast of the Donham (San Andres and Grayburg gas) field and 5/8 miles southeast of Ellenburger gas production in the Wyatt field, was making gas at the estimated rate of 400,000 cubic feet daily from the Grayburg and oil at the estimated rate of 36 barrels daily from the Queen.

Flow from both zones was from open hole section at 877 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 1, 196 feet. Operator was preparing to set packers.

Canyon 7520 gas production was extended 1-3/8 miles southwest in the Crockett County portion of the Ozona, Northeast multipay field with completion of Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1 J. R. Raile 10 miles northeast of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,950,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

Production was through perforations at 7,723-26 feet, 7,741-44 feet, and 7, 765-68 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 40,000 pounds of sand.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 467 feet from the west lines of 4-GH-GC&SF.

### County Has First Case Of Screwworm

Crockett County recorded it's first screwworm case for 1976 last week according to the Mission

The sample was collected from the navel of a calf on the Victor Pierce Ranch 25 miles southwest of Ozona.

Ranchmen are urged to spray livestock and check them regularly for possible screwworms. Upon finding a case, a sample must be taken and sent to the lab for confirmation before picked up at the Ranch Feed and Supply or Ozona Wool and Mohair Company.

According to officials Times at the Mission Lab, there will be no ground release of sterile flies. Instead, ranchmen with early confirmed cases will be asked to mark the area with lime

### Locals Retain Seats With One Run-Off In Flection

In Saturday's Democratic Primary election two local incumbents were returned to office and one was forced into a run-off. Sheriff Billy Mills won reelection, County Commissioner of Precinct 3 Jack Williams managed to hang on to his seat on the court and Commissioner of Precinct 1 Jesse Marley will face Sostenes DeHovos in the June 5 Primary.

The ballot was confusing, due to the first ever presidential preference primary in Texas and some were confused by the English-Spanish print. Even election officials were confused when they received a letter from the county judge on the morning of election, instructing them to let anyone vote in whatever precinct, as long as they would sign an affidavit, swearing

they lived in that particular precinct. This came about when around eighty Precinct 4 voters decided to cross lines and vote in Precinct 1, the precinct they lived in before the lines were changed. The letter was countermanded by the District Judge, who told officials to hold the election according to present precinct lines. Several voters were requested to vote in the precinct of their abode

at the polling places. Local races held the most interest in Crockett County voting. Billy Mills managed a win in the elec- votes, DeHoyos had 83 tion for sheriff over Max Morris by a vote of 912 to 564. The heaviest vote for Mills came in the absentee box which he carried total of 236, Marley was 248 to 97, and the heavy where it was 133 for Morris and 233 for Mills, put him

over the top. Precinct 2 went for Mills by only one vote, 118 to 119, and Morris carried Precinct 3, 138 to 129. Precinct 4 went for Mills by a vote of 167 to 74.

Precinct 1, where almost one-half of the local vote was cast, threw incumbent commissioner Jesse Marley into a run-off with Sostenes DeHoyos, the Mexican-American candidate, Jerry Hayes, the other candidate in the three-way race, polled enough votes to deny a clear cut victory to either candidate. Marley led in absentee voting with 92 and Hayes, 38. Election day returns in the precinct saw DeHoyos take the lead with 153 votes to talley a second with 123 for a total vote for Mills in Precinct 1, count of 215, Hayes polled 86 votes for a total of 124. Marley and DeHoyos will square off in the run-off

primary June 5. In the commissioners race in Precinct 3, incumbent Jack Williams would have lost his bid to Jim Marks if the absentee vote had not come through for him. Election day totals had 135 for Williams and 143 for Marks, but the absentee vote put Williams ahead. The count was 56 for Williams and 21 for Marks in the absentee box, giving Williams the win 191 to 164.

In the presidential preference primary, confusion again reigned. Each slate of delegates had three members and voting boxes were by all the names. Some voters picked a delegate from each slate, some picked from three different delegations and some crossed each name in each delegation, which was the purpose of the election. According to instructions from the office of The Attorney General, election officials took the highest count from each delegation. The Carter delegation won the most delegates in the state, but the count here was Bentsen delegation,

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A continuing dilemma that faces the United States as well as other industrial societies for that matter - is the choice between energy and pollution. Although some forms of energy are less damaging to the environment than others, the most productive types - including coal, oil and nuclear - all have environmental consequences that are far from ideal.

Lurking in the background for the U.S. is the fact that our mammoth energy needs are in good measure supplied from abroad - and our independence is compromised to that degree.

"When the Arab oil embargo was imposed two and a half years ago and it became apparent we had an energy crisis, " Utah's Senator Jake Garn said recently from his office, "we were 17 percent dependent on outside sources of oil. Now, because of government controls on domestically produced petroleum, we are 40 percent dependent. If the Arabs decided to impose another embargo, it would cause economic chaos in this country; they could ask most any price for their oil and we would be powerless to do anything about it."

Given this situation, logic dictates that the nation simply must bite the environmental bullet and get on with the task of producing new sources of energy. A worse environment is not a happy choice - yet it is a far better one than trusting our future to world conditions far beyond our power to control.

Standing between this reality and greater energy independence for America, however, are some environmentalist groups which have effectively tied the nation's hands on a variety of energy projects. Notably, the proposed \$3.5 billion Kaiparowits coal-burning power plant in southern Utah appears all but doomed because of objections over what it might do to the air in the region. Scratch 3, 000 megawatts of electricity.

The federal government, for its part, has done next to nothing to get this country on the road toward true energy independence. The lack of a comprehensive program to that end continues to astound most observers.

Unless this situation is altered soon, it appears that the country is indeed headed for the day when - in the recent words of House Republican John Rhodes of Arizona - we inhabit "a world in which the unemployed live in drafty caves."

### IMPROVING AMERICAN JUSTICE

During October, November and December of last year, 569 of those arrested in Washington, D. C. for serious crimes were on release pending trial on other charges when arrested. An additional 402 persons arrested in Washington during the same period were. at the time, free from prison on probation, parole or conditional release.

That alarming set of statistics - which all too easily could be virtually duplicated by other highcrime cities - is cited in a footnote to a speech delivered earlier this month by Warren E. Burger, Chief Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court.

Justice Burger suggested some ways American justice could be both speeded up and made more airtight to a national conference on American justice in

"The caseload of the United States Courts of Appeals has more than doubled since 1968 but no additional appellate judges have been provided, " he said. "Pending in Congress is a four-year-old request for 65 desperately needed district and circuit judges... The Senate has approved 52 new judgeships, but we will have no additional judges until the House acts, although there is a near crisis situation...."

"I do not...think it subversive to ask why England, the fountainhead of all our legal institutions, found it prudent and helpful 40 years ago to abandon trials for most civil cases, " said Justice Burger. He added that also worth consideration are Britain's "ideas of finality of judgments, short of three or four appeals

Regarding the bail system, the Chief Justice said, "It is not uncommon for an accused, when finally tried, to have other indictments pending. If the matter is disposed of by a guilty plea, after conviction on one charge, there is some evidence of a tendency to dismiss or defer other charges and to impose a

We believe Justice Burger has hit some leading judicial problems smack on the head. We now can only hope that government and legal authorities in decision-making roles will act on his words - and the mounting evidence of serious trouble in the nation's system of justice - to bring about the changes necessary to repair the system.

An industry spokesman last week said companies which write insurance on cars are in a "back to the wall" bind due to inflation and the soaring cost of re-

Rates were boosted on an average of 17 per cent effective January 1.

The State Board of Insurance annual auto insurance hearing has been slated for July 15.

Jerry Johns, president of Southwestern Insurance Information Service, claimed the worst inflation in a quarter century is gripping insurers.

'Unless the industry seeks additional rate increases, the state's insurance industry stands to lose hundreds of millions of dollars next year," said Johns.

The SIIS spokesman estimated company losses nationwide last year at \$4.5 billion.

Johns said car repair costs and medical expenses covered by auto policies have tripled during eight years.

Many companies, said Johns, are facing escalating costs which "seem to rise almost daily" and must have rate relief to survive.

### **Bell Rapped**

A State Senate subcommittee by a three-totwo vote adopted a staff report criticizing Southwestern Bell Telephone Company expenditures for entertainment.

The report claims Bell inflated figures going into its rate base by inclusion "questionable ex-

penses. Company spokesmen challenged the report and said it "reaches conclusions not supported by fact" and ignores testimony contradicting the

### **Funds Reallocated**

More than \$4.5 million in federal Hill-Burton construction funds have been reallocated to 14 facilities across the state by the Texas Department of Health Resources

About \$3.8 million worth in loan funds went to hospitals in Dallas, Beaumont, Lubbock, Clarksville and Mount Rehabilitation grant

funds went to Houston, Fort Worth and Lubbock institutions.

Modernization funds were reallocated to El Paso, Dallas, Denton, Liberty, Woodville and Coleman hospitals.

Rehabilitation grants totalled \$151,754 and modernization funds \$525,198.

### Challenge Suggested

Texas Water Quality Board Director Hugh Yantis suggested a state suit may be needed against the federal government if federal Voting Rights Act decisions hamper efforts to control water pollution.

Yantis said Justice Department orders wiping out city annexations could make some areas ineligible to issue waste water bonds. He cited a ruling challenging 13 San Antonio annexations on grounds they diluted minority votes.

### **Gas Prices Posted**

A new General Land Office publication will offer gas price information to consumers and producers. Land Commissioner

Bob Armstrong said three highest prices paid for natural gas in each Railroad Commission district will be compiled monthly from his office's records, the comptroller's office and from producers and purchasers.

The listing is not available from any other source, the commissioner said, and will be available for \$30 a month.

## **Setback for Reform**

WASHINGTON—The Senate has dealt the cause of

food stamp reform a severe setback. The federal food stamp program, which began ten years ago as a modest effort to help the genuinely needy, has degenerated into a gigantic boondoggle.

In 1965, one out of every 439 Americans received food stamps, at a cost to the taxpayers of only \$40 million. Today, one of every 13 Americans receives food stamps, at a cost to taxpayers of more than \$5 billion. There is every indication that the food stamp problem

will grow worse in the future. Under present regulations, one of every four Americans is eligible for food stamps, and the number could grow easily to one of every three Public outcry against abuses of the food stamp program

also has been growing apace, and this month the Senate approved and sent to the House a bill entitled the National Food Stamp Reform Act. But the bill is not the answer. It not only will not correct most of the blatant abuses of food stamps, it will

add more than \$1.1 billion to the overall cost of the food stamp program. Virtually the only "reform" the National Food Stamp Reform Act makes pertains to a ceiling on the incomes of

those eligible for food stamps. Under present regulations, families making as much as \$16,000 a year can qualify for food stamps. The bill ostensibly would limit eligibility to persons with net incomes at or below the poverty level, currently \$5,500 for a

family of four. But even this reform is cosmetic. So many loopholes have been added so that a family making as much as \$7,818 could conceivably be eligible for food stamps.

Except for that one reform, the National Food Stamp Reform liberalizes, rather than tightens, food stamp rules. The bill reduces the purchase price of food stamps from 27.5 percent to 25 percent, with a provision that could lead to elimination of the purchase requirement altogether.

Though rain in our area has been mostly on the minus side, our city has been aglow with a beautiful array of roses, iris, peonies and amaryllis. Too, the native yellow dailies have been in full bloom as though there had been ample moisture.

May is the month you can see spring-to-summer transition in your garden. Early bulbs and shrubs have bloomed and later varieties

are coming into flower. It is not too late to plant gladiola bulbs for late blooming. Support those that are about to

bloom with a strong stake. If climbing roses that bloom only in the spring have finished blooming, cut out all dead limbs and old canes, and prune back for new growth to form for next year's bloom.

Reset iris now if crowded and need dividing. This will give them time to form new growth and roots before the weather gets too hot.

Potted plants may be taken outside now to become hardened. Place in a shaded place out of the wind for several days to avoid burning the foliage by the hot sun.

Other specialized sewing tips for sheer fabrics include:

-- Use a fine new needle size 9 or 11. Dull or burred needles will snag or ruin the fabric.

-- To prevent the fabric from being drawn into the bobbin area, place the needle in the far left or right hand position, lower the needle into the fabric and hold both top and bottom threads before beginning to sew.

-- Sandwiching delicate sheers between strips of tissue paper helps fabric feed smoothly without marring, slipping or jamming.

-- Select lightweight closures. Synthetic coil zippers with knitted tapes are especially compatible.



pessimist isn't so sure. Right now a pessimistic attitude by cattle producers could help speed up recovery in the cattle indus-

That's the contention of Dr. Ed Uvacek, a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural

Extension Service. "An optimistic feeling among cattlemen that everything is now all right in the cattle industry could be disastrous for the industry as a whole, " he believes.

> Uvacek fears that cattlemen who think the industry is recovering rapidly will delay calf marketing, cull only a small number of cows, and hold heifers for

"The fact is that there are still large numbers of cattle on hand, and any delay in the liquidation of breeding herds could result in a herd buildup and set the industry's recovery back a year or more.

"Only by heavy culling of cows, reduction of breeding herds, and early calf marketings will the large cattle numbers be cut down and recovery speeded up. Producers who reduce their herds now would benefit from higher salvage values for cows and increased income from the sale of calves, " says

Producers should try to sell cows as soon as possible rather than waiting until this fall, adds the Texas A&M University System specialist, Also. they should be cautious of prices paid if purchasing new cows.

"If all cattlemen take actions to cut down herd size, the industry will probably recover by 1977, " predicts Uvacek.

### **Credit Policy** History To Change May14

May 14 will be a turning point in credit policy history, Lynn Bourland, a family resource management specialist, says.

"The holder-in-duecourse doctrine will no longer automatically require credit users to continue payments when they were defrauded by the seller, " she explained.

Miss Bourland is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Leaning toward helping the consumers, this new Federal Trade Commission ruling keeps lenders and finance companies holding a contract from repossessing merchandise or demanding payments when the consumer cannot get the seller to stand behind his product, she explained.

Under certain conditions consumers can stop payments and get back money already paid on installment contracts when their complaint is stalled by the seller, the specialist con-

To be protected by the new ruling:

-- Your claim must be valid, and you must document with evidence that you have been defrauded or deceived.

-- Your credit contract must have been arranged or recommended by the seller involved, or he may have sold it to another creditor. If you finance the purchase on your own, you may not be protected.

"Credit card purchases are not covered by this rule. But similar protection



### HomeCanning Jars Wool Incentive ducers sold approximately 1,820,000 pounds of wool and 89,897 hundredweight Can Last 10 Years

Home canning jars can last 10 years or more if used and stored properly, Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist,

says.
"It's a good practice always to use standard home canning jars which facturer on the side of the jar. These are mechanically shock-resistant to withstand minor bumps against other jars and the pressure required to process low acid fruits, vegetables and meats, " she explained. Miss Haggard is with

the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

She cautioned against using packers jars, such as empty mayonnaise and

pickle jars. These should not be put in the pressure canner because they are designed for one-time packing and for foods which are not pressure processed.

"In packing jars, be careful not to let objects such as knives and spatulas have the name of the manu- strike the bottom or scratch the sides of the jar. This weakens the jars and may cause breakage when the iars are under pressure.

"Remove jars from the water bath or pressure canner using jar lifters. This prevents burns and reduces the danger of breakage. Cool jars away from drafts to prevent breakage from cool air drafts, " she said.

"Remove the lid by sticking an ice pick in the center of the jar lid and lifting up. This releases the pressure for easy removal and also prevents nicking the lip of the jar.

"Nicks on the lip of the jar can prevent the 1id from sealing. Once used, the jars should be stored undisturbed for next year's canning, " she said.

## Payment Rate

An incentive payment rate of 61.1 percent on 1975 marketings of shorn wool was announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). The announced payment rate is based on the difference between the National average price of 44.7 cents a pound received by producers during 1975 and the previously announced incentive price of 72 cents a pound. Incentive payments to wool growers are required under the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended.

A payment rate of \$1.09 per hundredweight on unshorn lambs sold or slaughtered in 1975 was also announced by USDA. This payment is designed to compensate growers for the wool they market on live lambs rather than as shorn wool. The payment is based on the shorn wool payment rate, average weight of wool per hundredweight of lambs, and value of lamb's wool relative to the National average value of shorn wool.

Deductions of 1½ cents a pound from 1975 shorn wool payments and 71 cents per hundred pounds of liveweight from 1975 unshorn lamb payments will be made to finance advertising, sales promotion and related market development activities. These deductions, provided for in the National Wool Act, were approved by an 85.5 percent favorable vote by sheepmen voting in a November 1974 Refer-

Crockett County proof unshorn lambs. The county average for 1975 shorn wool sales was 67 cents per pound. Unshorn lambs sold weighed an average of 76 pounds per





### Tornado Season Is Here Again

weather can be a dangerous Service issues a "tornado signal for Texas during the spring months.

Because these weather conditions breed tornadoes. and Texas is the most tornado-prone state in the nation, says Dr. Gary Nelson, agricultural safety engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Texas has an average of 103 tornadoes a year, with most of them occurring in April and May when there are violent winds, severe thunderstorms, and masses of cool and warm air colliding with each other.

Eight out of 10 tornadoes occur between noon and midnight, with more than 20 per cent in the two-hour vation or reinforced conspan from 4 to 6 p.m.

Tornadoes, which take an average annual toll of 184 human lives in the U.S., usually travel southwest to northeast and stay on the ground about 10 minutes. Their forward speed is about 30 miles per hour, but wind speeds in the funnel of a tornado can get up to 300 miles per hour, explains Nelson.

"If you hear of a tornado watch, stay tuned to a radio or television for weather reports, " says the Texas A&M University System engineer. "If a tornado warning is issued, take cover in a basement. cellar or civil defense shelter and keep a batterypowered radio handy in case power lines are down. "

The safest refuge, says Nelson, is a tornado shelter, underground excacrete structure.

"If you don't have a basement, stay in the central part of the lowest level of the house or get in a closet or bathroom or under heavy furniture. Open a few windows but stay away from them, " the engineer warns,

"If you're in an office or factory, stay in an inside hallway on the lowest doing it.'

When cleaning up debris from a tornado, wear gloves and thick soled shoes and watch for downed electrical wires and broken gas pipes. "Don't light matches or smoke in or near a building that has been hit by a tornado until you're sure there are no gas leaks, " Nelson cautions



Over one million tax refund checks averaging \$367.42 have been mailed out to North Texans this year, but IRS district director A. W. McCanless reminded taxpayers today that the receipt of a refund check is no guarentee that the IRS won't audit the tax return at a later date.

"A refund check only means the initial processing of the returns has been completed, " McCanless said. "Checking the returns is time consuming, and an audit may not take place until several months after the refund check arrives. "

A federal tax return can be audited at any time before the statute of limitations expires. The statute of limitations is generally three years from the date

taxpayers keep their financial records for at least as long as the statute of limitations is running. Complete and orderly records can help to substantiate income and expense items and itemized deductions if the return is eventually audited.

Some records, such as those concerning the sale or purchase of real estate, should be kept indefinitely. For more information

On the other hand, others will reply that issues change, that many issues, not only a few. are important, and that citizens can make their best political choices by assessing the total person

It probably does not make a great deal of difference what the various political figures and political commentators say, because the people, wisely, will find their own basis for making political choices And the strength of a demofree to choose their representatives by the criteria that they wish and that are important to them, not to someone else,

I believe that the people are always entitled to know where a political figure who asks for support stands on an issue, and that evasion by a political figure of either difficult choices or of discussion of difficult issues is clearly contrary to the best interests of democracy. At the same time, no special wisdom is bestowed upon a political figure once he or she seeks or attains office, and it is sometimes poor public policy to expect political figures either to have answers to all problems or

to have fully thought out responses to every possible political problem. In that regard, the people are best served by knowing and understanding the values of a person who seeks to serve them, by assessing the capacity of that person for the hard work and hard choices that serious responsibility requires, and by cracy is that the people are making their best judgment of the overall qualities of

### Cattlemen's Assn. Makes **Protest**

Austin - The Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas Thursday protested supplements being paid European beef producers sending meat to the United States and called on the federal government to retaliate with offsetting duties on those imports.

The U.S. Treasury Department, which has authority to levy such protective countervailing duties has confirmed that supplemental "bounties" are being paid to exporters of frozen boneless beef by the European Economic Community.

Frozen boneless beef worth \$3.6 million came into the United States from EEC countries in

Cattlemen's Association president T. A. Cunningham of Goliad said the EEC action is "disruptive of all fair trade practices and treaties" and that the American livestock industry "has a right to expect the fullest protection of countervailing duties. "

"The American livestock industry has been in a state of disaster for three years, " he said in a telegram to Assistant Treasury Secretary David McDonald. "We sadly need every ounce of help our govern-

Fortunately, most Americans want their elected officials to act in what they believe to be the best interests of the country, and the willingness of the people to make their political decisions in that fashion has sustained our democracy for two centuries. We are a young nation, but the oldest democracy, and we have been able to continue because the majority of the people and the majority

The difference between 1975 crude oil production and the peak year of 1972 was more than 79.3-million barrels.

Statistics compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association also show that despite the continuing decline in Texas crude oil production last year, the state once again set the pace among U.S. oil producing states, accounting for 40-percent of total U.S. production.

"This continued decline in the production of Texas key natural resource begs an end to federal price controls and other bureaucratic restraints, " said the Association's president, Jack S. Blanton, an independent oil company executive in Houston.

"Texas oil producers need a free market and every possible economic incentive to both generate and attract the capital necessary to continue to explore for oil, to drill wildcat and developmental wells, and to initiate costly

sing, " she added. Mix three tablespoons frozen orange juice concentrate with three tablespoons water. Pour over fruit or slice fruit into dressing. Chill and serve.

"The orange juice gives a tart refreshing flavor and keeps the fruit from turning dark. Sugar can be added if a sweeter salad is preferred.

"Variations can include fresh pineapple, peach, pear or apple chunks. Garnish with fresh mint sprigs and serve in chilled dessert dishes, " she said.



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
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
