Hollywood screen writers, television soap opera script writers, and authors of fictitious romance-adventure stories will be hard put to concoct, however superior their creative imagination, anything to match the true-life story of Martha Mitchell.

The girl who made good. The most popular blonde in her school class and in the neighborhood. Born on the right side of the tracks. The small-town girl who made it to the very top in the Big City. Married to a member of the most exclusive club in the world. Living in a fabulous condominium complex where the cheapest quarters cost \$130,000 cash - and her apartment wasn't cheap. The woman who, when seated among many at the head-tables of Washington affairs, received more applause than any of the other dignitaries. The most popular with and most eagerly sought after by the Press. The wife who, by merely picking up the telephone, was assured front-page attention from coast to coast. The envy of women everywhere. How wonderful it would be to taste a small portion of the glory enjoyed by Martha Mitchell!

And then villains all about. And Martha, in possession of dangerous secrets. Secrets that must never be known to the public. Conspiracy. Wolves at the door. Evil machinations in high places. From winning, to losing. Deserted by family and friends. Husband lost, marriage destroyed, from riches to rags. And then - to make this rags. And then --to make this improbable true story even more fiction-like, the ultimate tragedy: struck down by a crushing disease for which there is no treatment, no cure, no hope. From the scenes of hundreds of enthusiastic admirers, to death at 57, totally alone except for an attending physician to note the official time, for the record, of her passing.

Martha, we hope that the verdict of history will be less cruel than the world in which you lived. R. I. P.

The Hidden Costs Of Big Government

It doesn't take much persuasion to convince most of us that the cost of big government is outlandishly excessive. We feel it, we see it, and we pay for it in our local state and federal government taxes.

Now, however, we are just beginning to learn that the true picture is worse than we thought. In addition to the direct costs of big government extracted from us in taxes, there is an additional "hidden tax" we are forced to pay, just as excessive and just as burdensome.

The bad news comes by way of a study which is even now in its initial stages, conducted by the National Association of Manufacturers. The purpose of the survey: to discover, if possible, what "hidden" costs are imposed by government regulation and bureaucratic red tape. Among the first reports to come in was one from the Dow Chemical Company. Last year, this firm decided to build a new petrochemical plant. To date, not a single board, nail, concrete block or any kind of construction is in place. But, already, it has cost Dow over \$1.8 million to fill out government forms to over 60 different government regulatory agencies.

General Motors reports that their NAM-requested survey reveals that no less than 23,000 - that's twenty-three thousand - people on their payroll are working full-time just to fill out hundreds of thousands of government forms. The cost to you? According to the initial figures, over \$200 for every automobile that you buy.

Senator Paul Fannin of Arizona, in a recent speech in the Senate, cited estimates all the way up to \$130 billion a year in direct and indirect costs to American consumers, brought about by "regulatory overkill." And every penny (and dollar) of it is added to the cost of things you buy.

So, the next time you pay your taxes, remember - that is only part of the cost to you for big government. You pay a lot more every time you buy a product or service.

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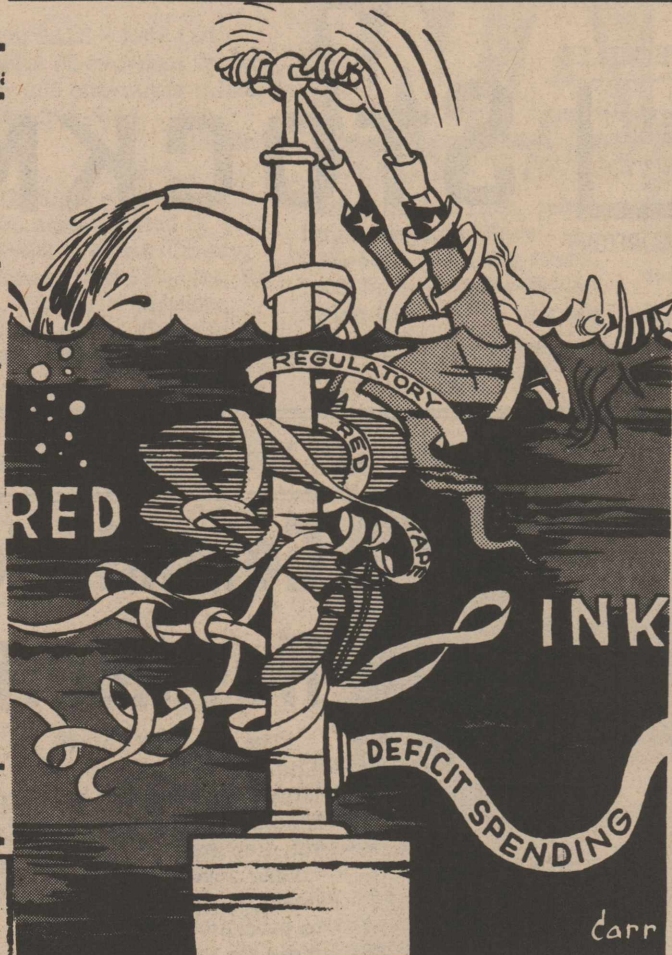

Texas Taxes

AUSTIN -- The Comptroller's Department has collected almost \$1 million in sales tax judgments since I assumed office in January, 1975. This amounts to 56.4 percent of all sales tax judgments more than was collected during the previous eight years combined.

These judgments were against hard-core delinquents who refused to pay to the state the sales taxes they collected from Texas consumers until we went to court against them.

Judgment accounts--those in which a court of law has ordered payment of back taxes--were previously considered uncollectable. But we in the Comptroller's Department refuse to accept that tax cheaters should be able to get away without paying their debts to the honest taxpayers of Texas, and we have tried harder to make sure no one evades paying taxes legitimately owed the state.

During this administration we have been far more aggressive and far more successful in collecting taxes owed. Obtaining court judgments against tax violators is only one of the more drastic ways in which we have done this.

We have collected \$993,000 in judgments in just 16 months of this administration compared to only \$763,000 in the previous eight years that the sales tax has been on the books.

On the basis of this experience, we anticipate being able to collect half a million dollars or more in delinquent sales tax judgments each year.

There are presently outstanding judgments of more than \$10 million, and the Comptroller's Office intends to do its best to collect every penny of those back taxes.

On a regular, weekly basis, the Comptroller's Department currently asks the Attorney General's Office, which acts as the lawyer for this and other state agencies, to seek judgments against businesses which have refused to pay their taxes. In the previous administration, cases of this sort were sent to the Attorney General only sporadically--none for months at a time and then perhaps thousands at once.

Obtaining a judgment is one of the final steps in the collection process. Because this administration has developed other, more aggressive and effective collection techniques, the Comptroller's Department has tremendously reduced the total number of cases certified to the Attorney General for court action, while increasing tax collections by this method.

In other words, we are collecting more on existing judgments, leveling out the work load for the state's lawyer, and learning better how to collect tax dollars owed to the state without having to go to court.

We also invite cities which have been denied local sales taxes to join in our suits against businesses which haven't been paying their taxes.

During the first 16 months of this administration we have improved the handling of cases like this by the Comptroller's Office. The result has been an increase in productivity of more than 1000 percent over the previous administration.

PRICE HIKE
PITTSBURGH--U.S. Steel Corp., the nation's largest producer, has announced a 6 per cent price increase on its major products that ranges from tools to iceboxes to automobiles.



Children and pets can be best friends, but only if the two friends are suited to each other. Watching pets and caring for them gives children a chance to learn more about animals, how they eat, how they sleep and even how they are reproduced. Children are curious beings and can observe and discuss many of the facts of life as they relate to animals and human beings alike.

Children are interested in most living things. They enjoy watching growth and changes, in fact, this is the means by which children learn about biology and is the beginning of science study. They also learn that animals and pets have many of the characteristics that they have.

What kind of pets are suitable for children? Most preschoolers enjoy watching fish, playing with small warm animals and feeding those that live in water, in a cage or free to run. Children learn from watching birds fly; they learn about swimming by watching ducks and other water fowl; or they learn about slow moving objects such as the turtle. They learn about change and the changes growth brings by studying tadpoles and watching their growth and development. A baby chick, too, makes very rapid changes and teaches a child how to handle small pets that can be held in the palm of the hand.

Why do children want pets? Many parents are puzzled about the constant requests of most children for a dog, cat or small animal. By having a pet or being a pet owner, he enjoys the companionship. Children learn to care for the health needs of an animal, such as feeding or changing the environment to a clean environment.

When children have a pet, parents should be aware of the necessities that must be provided for caring properly for small animals. A proper shelter, pens that can be cleaned easily and thoroughly, and animals that are sized to fit the needs of the child's age are to be considered. Very young children should observe a small animal from a distance, because they are not mature enough to handle it properly. Children who are four and five years old can better manage a small animal properly.

Parents should be alert to the tameness of the animal before giving it to a small child or preschooler. Pets that scratch, bite or claw are harmful to children and may instill a fear of animals in the child. Also, forcing a pet on a child does little for either the child or the pet. Children should have help selecting their pet and be given the responsibility for caring for the pet. Pets are a positive experience when parents use discretion in selecting them.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Again the summer showers have passed us by several times, but we have been spared the high winds damage and hail in other places.

During this hot, dry weather, the watering problem is the most difficult to cope with. Don't give up, and we should be grateful to have plenty city water to keep our yards and gardens growing and beautiful for the summer. Pay particular attention to the moisture needs of shallow rooted ornamentals such as azaleas, camellias, hydrangeas, coleus, chrysanthemums and caladiums.

You should hurry with those late plantings of gladiolas, cannas, dahlias, caladiums and tuberose.

If you are interested in gathering plant material for dried arrangements and the District VIII Garden Club meeting here in November, now is the time to begin collecting seed pods of all kinds, grasses, and dock, which may be gathered in the green, light brown, and the matured brown stages of its growth. Hang the dock grasses upside down to dry naturally. Also zinnias may be done the same way and retain their color.

To clean clay pots of the white stain caused by fertilizer salts, you can scrub the pots thoroughly and rinse with a solution of household bleach and water. Use 9 parts water to 1 part bleach. This should keep the problem in check, and prevent any harm to your plants. This may give

only temporary help after the pot has been used a while.

For summer color and flowers for cutting, plant zinnias and marigolds now. Select a sunny location and work the soil well, adding peat moss or compost at the rate of 2 gallons per square yard and add a handful of 8-8-8 fertilizer.

Petunias are prolific bloomers, but they need a little help to increase branching and flower production. If you plant single-stemmed plants with one or two flowers on the stems, pinch back the growing tip to induce branches to develop. If the stems are tall and spindly, pinch them back several inches. Pinching off faded flowers also helps keep petunias in robust condition, and encourages blooming. Additional pinching by removing growing tips throughout the growing season keeps plants producing new branches on which blooms can develop. This will allow you to enjoy petunias colorful display all summer long.

Canned fruits and vegetables, followed closely by tuna fish and peanut butter, head the list of grocery specials at Texas stores this week, reports Mrs. Gwendolyn Ciyatt, consumer marketing information specialist.

"And at fresh vegetable counters, cabbage is an excellent choice, with good quality and moderate price. Fresh asparagus is still available but quality and supply are on the decline now," she noted.

Mrs. Ciyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "Other economical buys in fresh vegetables include carrots, green beans, tomatoes, corn, zucchini and yellow squash, green peppers and cucumbers."

Topping good fruit bargains are oranges, grapefruit, cantaloupe, honeydews and watermelons. Also, features can be found on bananas and pineapples, she added.

But supplies are limited and price levels relatively high on peaches, cherries, nectarines and grapes, Mrs. Ciyatt said.

"Good values on dairy products include milk, sour cream, yogurt and a variety of cheeses.

"Beef supplies are ade-

quate, with prices about the same as last week. Features, generally, are on chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, beef liver and a variety of steaks for broiling," she said.

The perennial outdoor cooking favorite--frankfurters--is being featured, too.

"Poultry counter specials feature whole bird and mixed parts.

"Pork specials are scarce, but consumers can find an occasional good buy in quarter-loins cut into chops, Boston butt roasts, bacon and liver.

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: Make a main-dish omelet, plain or filled, to relieve meal-time monotony and pressure on the food budget.

When the price of eggs is 79 cents per dozen, the price per pound is 53 cents, and the cost of a two-egg serving is only 13 cents--a real saving compared to other main-dish foods.

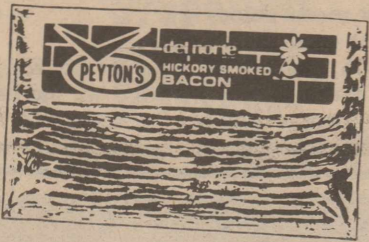

A primer is a paint coating designed to form a film on which a finish coat of paint is applied. If the painted surface of your home is in good condition, no prime coat is needed. However, in isolated places, you may need to spot prime.

Spare My Nest & Burn The Rest, Lark Sparrow

Spare my nest, and burn the rest. So says the lark sparrow.

Like most songbirds, this species nests in areas with a mixture of bare soil and fully grown tobosa grass, a coarse growth that grows on clay soils and has a high tolerance for wind and dry weather. Scientists at Texas Tech University have discovered that selective burning of semi-grown tobosa stems and mesquite brush increases the lark sparrow's nest density. The semi-grown tobosa is not suitable for nests, and, along with mesquite, is not used by cattle.

Research in the Texas Tech range and wildlife management department was aimed at developing a prescribed burning method that did not disturb the songbird's nesting habitat.

Resulting from the research were burned areas offering more open space to the lark sparrows who prefer to walk around and pick up small insects, leaves and seeds. The burning also makes ideal grazing grounds for cattle, which relish the young tobosa shoots that grow after the burning.

Mesquite, a thorny leguminous shrub common to the Southwestern United States, poses a problem to livestock operations because it obstructs the view of cowboys when rounding up cattle. Mesquite also is not palatable for cattle.

Tobosa usually grows up to ten inches high and accumulates dead plant material. The growth of the tobosa causes loss of open space.

The Texas Tech study was conducted by Dr. Henry Wright, professor of range and wildlife management, and his research assistant J. David Renwald. It was undertaken for the U. S. Forest Service.

The most recent selective burn was conducted in March 1975, prior to the nesting season. It resulted in an interspersed of burned and unburned areas.

Nests were found in tobosa cover averaging at least 33 percent density, but not more than 55 percent. After increasing fourfold, next density gradually declines until the fourth year after burning. Dr. Wright said that it usually takes that long for the tobosa grass to deposit litter over all bare soil. Cattle eat not more than 20 percent of the full grown tobosa.

Results of the study have been published in the "Noxious Brush and Weed Control Research Highlights—1975," an annual publication of the Texas Tech college of agricultural sciences in cooperation with the Texas Department of Agriculture.

A similar study was also conducted in 1974 and '75 to determine the importance of woody plants such as lotebushes for nesting by non-game birds, Cardinals, cactus wrens, mockingbirds, lark sparrows, brown towhees and road runners were found to nest in these.

After a "patchy" burn in 1975 nests were found in single-stem lotebushes. Of the 97 lotebushes in all study areas which contained nests, 60 percent were the single stem type. This according to the study, indicated a strong preference by non-game birds for the taller, denser growth form of this bush.

Based on the findings, the study recommended that, unless lotebushes posed a serious problem to livestock operations, these plants should be spared during burning because they afford ideal cover for nesting non-game birds. This study also conducted by Renwald and Dr. Wright, considered lotebushes as well as honey mesquite, acacia, saltbushes and acacia. These species, however, carried fewer nests.

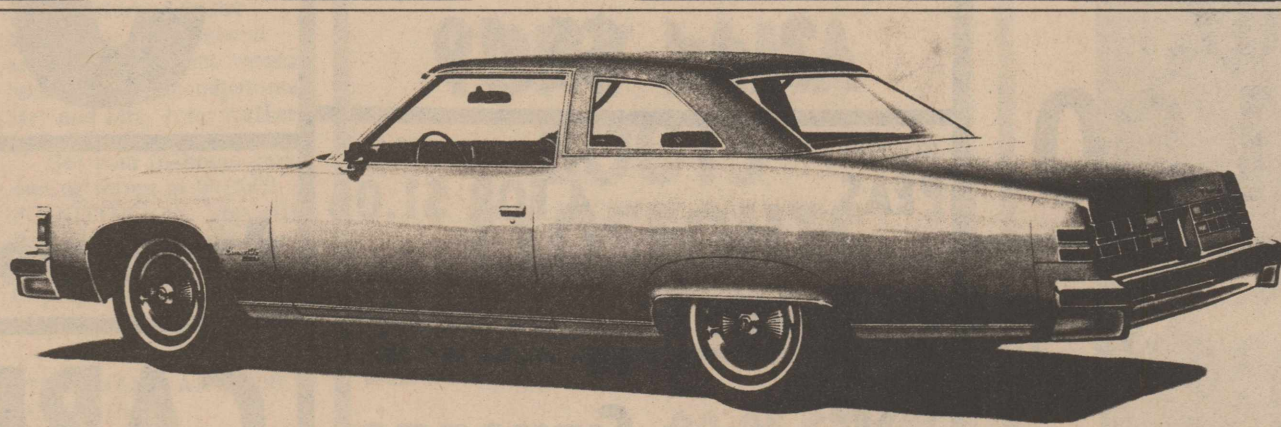

Each organized ICA county chapter will send four delegates, four alternates and a convention official to the state meeting, but Cunningham emphasized that all ICA members and guests are equally welcome and can benefit from participating in the convention.

In less than two years since its inception ICA has grown to more than 100,000 members in 138 organized county chapters, making it the largest non-affiliated livestock organization in the nation.

Change Scenes With Portable Gardens

In this age of mobility, even gardens can be portable so that they can provide for a changing landscape scene.

Everett Janne, a horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that shrubs, trees, vines and flowers can be grown in portable containers and moved from the service or growing area when at their prime to supplement the permanent landscape planting.

"There can be instant beauty with pots of geraniums, begonias or petu-

nias. Plants can be in the spotlight when they look their best and can be banished when they decline in beauty."

Janne suggests using sturdy containers such as tubs, barrel halves, clay pots or wooden boxes. Wooden containers should be made of moisture resistant wood such as redwood or cedar. All containers should provide adequate drainage.

Potting soil that is both porous and moisture retentive should be used.

"Plants in containers dry out much faster than those growing in the ground and will have to be watered more often," says the Texas A&M University System specialist. "During hot dry weather they may need watering every day."

Janne advises using a complete soluble plant food about once every three weeks after the plants are well established and growing.

He also offers a few tips to make moving plants easier.

"Plan moving a few days in advance. Plants will be much lighter and easier to move if the soil is dry. Use a dolly, wagon, piece of canvas or some other carrier to ease the moving task."

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Safety Features For Matchbooks

The simple matchbook has come under fire for causing serious injuries, and new safety features have resulted, Claudia Mitzel, a consumer information specialist, reports.

She said that matchbooks were responsible for an estimated 9,500 injuries serious enough to require emergency room treatment between July 1, 1974 and June 30, 1975.

Miss Mitzel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"The Consumer Product Safety Commission is now developing standards for matchbooks to protect consumers against unreasonable risk.

"The standard will apply to matchbooks made in the U. S. or imported-- but not to wooden matches packaged in boxes or 'strike anywhere' kitchen matches."

She explained that the new standard is aimed at reducing or eliminating these injuries,

--burns resulting from improper use of matchbooks by children and others.

--eye injuries from fragmenting matches.

--burns resulting from sparks or delayed ignition.

--burns resulting from unexpected ignition of entire matchbook.

"Some features required on future matchbooks include that the friction be located on the outside back cover to reduce the risk of a spark igniting the matches and that no part of the match would be outside the cover when the cover is closed," she noted.

Wildcat Slated For County Field

Dan J. Harrison Jr., Houston, will drill the No. 2 John W. Henderson III as a 9,700 foot wildcat and one mile southeast and 5/8 mile northeast of Strawn gas production in a west portion of the three-well Strawn area of the Ozona, Southwest multiply field of Crockett County, surrounded by Canyon gas production in the Ozona multiply field and 14 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 735 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 5-SL-T&StL.

The Strawn gas opener 4 3/8 miles to the east, Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum No. 1 Henderson, was finalized April 26, 1963 from the Strawn for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.4 million cubic feet of gas daily through perforations at 9,371-555 feet; and dually completed from the Canyon for a calculated, absolute open flow of 128,000 cubic feet daily, through perforations at 6,374-987 feet. Block M designation was requested for both pays.
