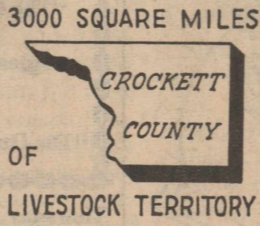

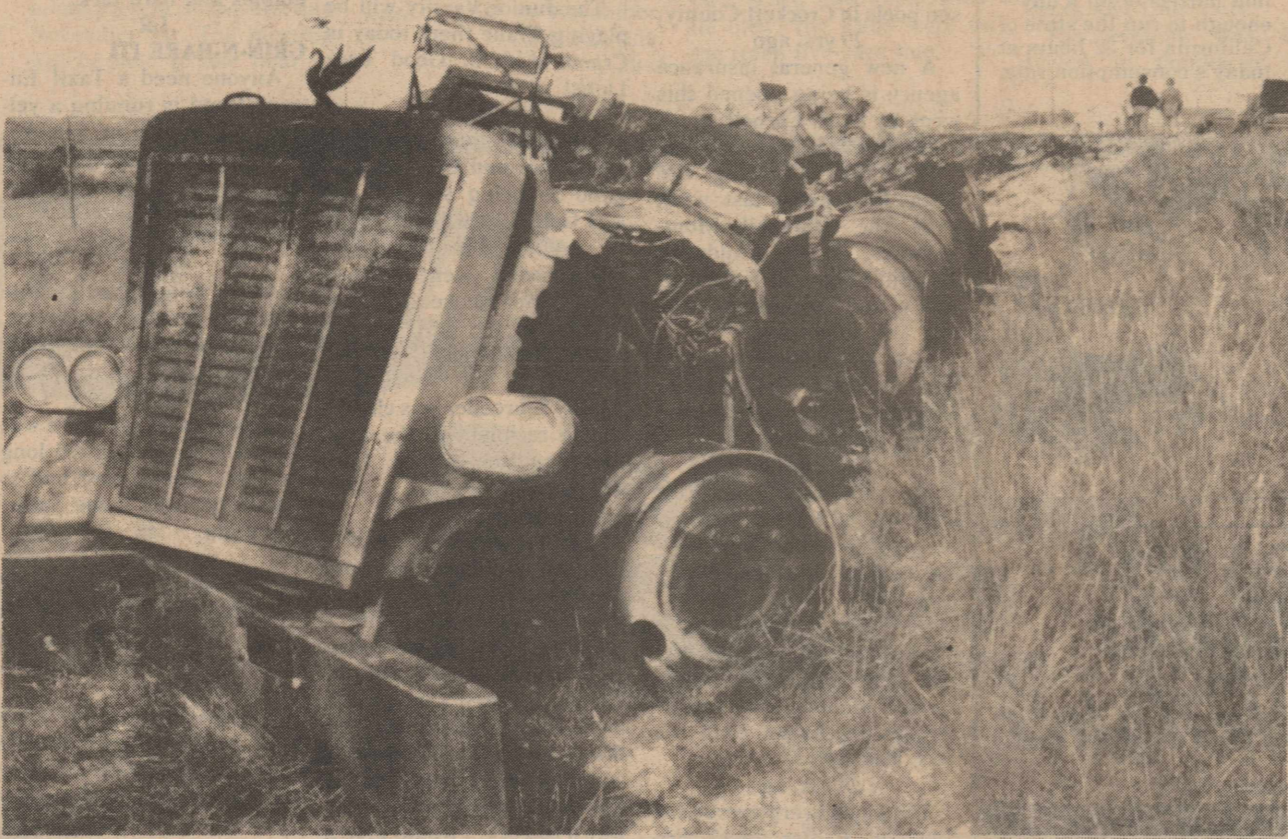

## Lion Club Pancake Supper Fri.

The annual Ozona Lions Club pancake supper will be held Friday, Oct. 29, from 5 to 7:30 p.m. at the Civic Center just prior to the Crane-Ozona football game. Tickets may be purchased from any Lions Club member or at the door. Adult tickets are \$1.75 and children, \$1.25.

Pancakes, sausage or bacon and drink will be served. Proceeds will be used to local Lions Club projects.

Dog tags are now on sale at the Tax Assessor's office. The tags are \$1 each and proof of rabies shot must be shown before tags can be purchased. Those having dogs running loose in town must buy dog tags.

Jesus Guerra has been hired as Crockett County Animal Controller. He works under the Sheriff's Department and Ozona Veterinary Clinic. He reported a total of seventeen dogs picked up and disposed of last month. Enforcement of the law was due to begin October 8, but tags were not received until this week.

Under the law, it will be unlawful for dogs to run at large at night unless they have a muzzle securely fastened, regardless of tags. So if your dog is loose at night, you may expect to find him in the dog pound if he is missing. Tags must be fastened to all dogs running loose in the daytime.

Dogs picked up by the dog catcher will be placed in the pound at Ozona Veterinary Clinic. Dogs unclaimed after 72 hours will be destroyed. Those claiming their dogs before the 72 hours will be destroyed. Those claiming their dogs before the 72 hour deadline will pay a fine of \$15, the \$1 registration fee, \$2 for dipping, \$5 for vaccination for rabies and \$7.50 for distemper, plus board at the rate of \$2 per day. Penalty for violation is \$100 and/or up to 30 days in jail.

## New Deputies Hired For Sheriff Dept.

Sheriff Billy Mills hired three new deputies this week after carefully considering numerous applications. The department has been short handed since the middle of September when all four deputies resigned.

Wayne Wahl was hired two weeks ago as chief deputy. He will be joined this week by three new men, Harvey Hill, 45, comes here from Eagle Pass, Gary Reeves, 27, of San Angelo and Aldo Gonzales, 23, who comes here from the Runnels County Sheriff's Department in Ballinger.

## Light Turn Out Forecast For General Election Tuesday

Absence of contests for local offices, as always, plus the predicted nationwide apathy on the part of voters, are factors which lead to predictions of comparatively light voting in the 1976 general election, next Tuesday, November 2.

But the fact that this is an extremely important presidential election year, with another week of intensive campaigning by President Gerald Ford and former Georgia governor Jimmie Carter, and their respective running mates, Senators Robert Dole of Kansas and Walter Mondale of Minnesota, may bring out a larger vote than most observers are predicting.

A respectable 95 absentee votes had been cast the first of the week in the office of County Clerk Leta Powell. Absentee voting will continue until 5 p.m. Friday.

Polls will open an hour earlier this general election under the new voting laws, opening at 7 a.m. and closing at 7 p.m., instead of from 8 to 7 as in the primaries. Crockett County voters will cast their ballots in six voting places. These are Prec. 1, county courthouse; Prec. 2, and 3 in the Civic

Center, separate rooms; Prec. 4, Ozona primary school, and voting Precincts 5 and 6 at Powell Field and the Power plant, respectively.

## Seven Fined In Gang Fight Incident

Receiving fines of \$200 and one year suspended sentence for their part in the gang fight which erupted in downtown Ozona Saturday night, October 2, were Johnny Hohertz, Stanley Flanagan, Richard Cardona, Mike Fay, Marino Maskill, Lalo Garza and Gene Castro.

The trials were held in J.P. court last week before the grand jury met for the second time to continue its investigation into the fight and other related matters.

Others involved but not tried were Bobby Large, who asked for a 10-day stay of trial to consult with his attorney; Armando Robledo, who is attending school at TSTI will be tried later, and Lecelle Hayes, who left Ozona and could not be summoned.

A local write-in campaign for the office of sheriff will feature former deputy Jim Goss attempting to unseat, via a write-in, Democratic nominee and incumbent Billy Mills for that office. A statewide write-in for the office of Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2, in which embattled Don Yarbrough is being contested by Sam Houston, a Denton lawyer, and Tom Lorange of Houston. The unknown Yarbrough cashed in on a well known name in Texas politics, to win the Demo nomination, but many legal problems have beset him since the primaries, leading to an effort to forestall his certain election through a write-in. Promoters chose Sam Houston, another familiar name in Texas annals, as the most likely to succeed.

## Lions Set To Begin District Play With 7 Wins, No Losses

The powerful Ozona Lions will open District 7-2A football play here Friday night with Crane. After an open date last Friday, and seven straight pre-district wins, the Lions will be picked to beat the Golden Cranes. Ozona is the only undefeated team in District 7-2A, has scored the most points and has allowed the fewest points.

Much of the credit for the superior performances by the Lions this year goes to the interior line. It has been an outstanding year for the Lions due to the outstanding job done by the line.

Statistics after seven games show left linebacker Clyde Bailey causing three fumbles, recovering a fumble and getting a total of 53 tackles. Eugene Hood, in the

center slot, has recovered a fumble and is credited with four tackles. Ricky DeHoyos, playing right guard, has five quarterback sacks to his credit, has scored a safety, recovered two fumbles and caused a fumble for his opponents, and has 43 tackles in seven games. Douglas Bean at the tackle spot, has recovered three fumbles, has a quarterback sack and 28 tackles. Mike Fay, at nose guard, has recovered two fumbles, scored a safety, and has 58 tackles to his credit. Javier Reyes at tackle has a quarterback sack, a fumble recovery and 34 tackles. John Galvan at end has a quarterback sack, caused a fumble and 41 tackles. Sterling Lay at right tackle has four quarterback sacks, a fumble recovery and 30 tackles. Of

fensive guard Sam Longoria has 7 tackles.

After seven games Lion Blake Moody was tied with John Elliott of Sonora for scoring the most touchdowns in the district rushing, at seven each. Ozona's Vaden Aldridge is second in district for throwing touchdown passes, and is also in the top 15 leading rushers. Lions Gary Warren and Orlando DeHoyos are named among the top ten rushers. Warren and Galvan are in the top ten receivers in district 7AA. Warren is the district's leading scorer, with 60 points to his credit, four passes caught for touchdowns and six touchdowns scored rushing. John Galvan has kicked five field goals to lead the district in that category.

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**KOREA, CUBA AND SENATOR MC GOVERN**

Richard Nixon can be faulted for many things during his presidency. But Americans can be grateful for one thing he did: He kept Senator George McGovern from becoming President by defeating the South Dakota Democrat in 1972.

Sanator McGovern consistently is in the forefront of American liberals, urging friendship toward this country's Communist enemies and enmity toward its friends. His latest "cause," judging from a lengthy speech he delivered on the Senate floor shortly before Congress adjourned recently, is the normalization of relations with North Korea.

This is the same North Korea, under the iron fist of Dictator Kim Il Sung, that brutally murdered two U.S. officers at the 38th parallel in August. In ordering the ax murders, North Korea might well have believed they would cause some soul-searching in the United States which would lead to a lessening of our resolve to resist further Communist expansion in Southeast Asia.

All such a strategy required was the "conversion" of a few key U.S. leaders who would rather switch and run than fight. They found one in George McGovern.

"The recent killing of two American officers at the 38th parallel in Korea," said McGovern, "should lead the Congress and the Executive Branch to reexamine the purpose and meaning of our commitment there." The Senator says that the August slayings should make Americans demand that "we shall make peace rather than continue toward war." If that sounds like Munich-style appeasement and surrender, you've got the picture.

It will be remembered that it was this same George McGovern, and his fellow Senate liberals, who last year at this time were screaming for normalization of relations with Communist Cuba. But then Fidel Castro failed to follow his part of the script and had the audacity to send his troops off to fight in Angola, where they remain to this day.

The George McGovern in America's government circles, for all their supposed learning, haven't yet learned the clear fact that no Communist dictator respects weakness. We can only hope that the wishful thinking of these individuals doesn't become the cutting edge of U.S. policy.

**TAX "REFORM"**

Taxes, and what to do about them, have become a foremost campaign issue as November 2 approaches. This is as it should be, since the new tax bill, recently signed by President Ford, is unsatisfactory on four major counts:

a) The bill further complicates an already horrendously complicated tax code. Anyone whose tax returns involve anything beyond the most basic computations must either hire an accountant at considerable additional expense or else resign himself to endless manhours and sleepless nights trying to figure out his tax bill for himself. The quality of our lives is degraded on this count alone.

b) Instead of supporting the shift of a certain part of GNP from consumption to investment - now more necessary than ever as our current production plants wear out - the bill does the opposite. Double taxation of dividends continues. The holding period to establish capital gains has been lengthened from the present six months to nine months in 1977 and 12 months in 1978. Special depreciation advantages for plant and equipment to be installed in areas with high unemployment were declined by the tax writers.

c) The pernicious effect of inflation on taxation continues. Nothing was done to offset the increased tax rates which result when income does no more than rise to keep pace with inflation. Real purchasing power in such a case declines.

d) The main objective of the tax bill still seems to be the further redistribution of income, while two major aspects of the tax problem are overlooked: 1) the change in the spending of tax receipts and 2) the change in the social structure which has shifted the main tax-paying burden from the shrinking upper income groups to the middle class.

Neither the tax bill, nor the presidential candidates, seem to realize the simple truth: if the majority of the people want more welfare services, they will have to pay for them in the form of higher taxes.

No mere "soak the rich" proposals will do more than hide this fact and, if carried out, create further disincentives to invest in the new industrial plant necessary to keep our economic system going.

Americans had thus better decide what they really want. Because if it is to be cradle-to-the-grave security, then it is the average American, not just the "other guy," who will have to pay the bill.

**AUSTIN** — Texas goat and sheep raisers cannot hunt golden eagles in Texas, the U.S. Interior Department has ruled.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe's request was rejected last week.

Briscoe stirred up something of a storm last month when he asked Interior Secretary Thomas E. Kleppe to grant blanket authorization for stockmen to hunt the eagles in 31 counties of West Texas.

Lynn Greenwalt, director of the Interior Fish and Wildlife Service replied to Briscoe. He said the request was turned down under a policy of former Secretary of Interior Walter J. Hickel which concluded in 1970 against blanket authorizations.

The golden eagle is protected under a special federal act.

The Interior policy referred to by Greenwalt permits consideration of requests from individual ranchers who can demonstrate that they need to hunt the protected birds.

Briscoe requested authority to shoot the eagles after ranchers complained about increasing numbers of the birds near the October 1 beginning of the lambing season.

Ranchers claimed the migratory birds would cause heavy losses in newborn lambs and kid goats.

An outcry was raised subsequently from groups seeking to protect the golden eagles from wholesale attack by outraged ranchers.

**"Scandal" Charged**  
Texas Railroad Commission routinely continued the November state oil production allowable at 100 per cent for the 56th consecutive month.

Meanwhile, Commissioner Mack Wallace termed increased dependence on foreign crude oil "the greatest scandal in the nation."

Wallace charged the U.S. is spending \$70,000 a minute importing oil from foreign producing countries.

Major buyers of Texas crude entered requests for more than 3.9 million barrels of oil a day in November.

**Employees Fired**  
House Speaker Bill Clayton fired four veteran House employees last week.

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

This should be a wonderful year for landscaping new homes or replacing and adding new plants for your plans. The best selection of plants will be available the next few months in nearby nurseries, or from reliable nurseries in other areas.

The Japanese hollies have been a long time favorite foundation plant, and seem to tolerate our hot, dry exposure better than the boxwood. They are usually classified as dwarf plants, but some varieties may grow to a height of 5 to 10 feet in 10 years. Two of the first to be grown in the south are Rotundifolia which has flat, dark green leaves, and produces no berries. Convexa has smaller leaves that cup downward and produces a profusion of black berries.

A newer variety that has a growth habit similar to convexa, but better leaf color. Hetzl, has slightly and longer leaves. Japanese holly selections with a spreading growth is the Rependens. Most of these require frequent pruning for best appearance. They may be pruned with hedge shears to give a formal shape. A more natural appearance may be obtained by removing large limbs down inside the plant with hand pruners. Hollies that have grown too large may be cut back to 6 to 12 inches above the ground in late February or early March.

Consult your nursery man for making proper selections for your landscape plan. There are other new varieties for group, specimen or border plants.

Don't forget to harvest dried material, seed pods and those already dried. Most of them need to be hung up-side down if gathered while fresh. For grasses and filler material, there are many beautiful varieties you may find - Johnson grass, artemesia, cocks comb thistles, broom weeds and others. You may need these for dried arrangements for next year's flower show.

Remember this week is clean-up week so be sure to have your trash where it can be picked up. We hope our city will look its best November 4th for the delegates have asked to be taken on a quick tour before leaving for their homes. Of course we had hoped not to have an early freeze to kill the fall flowers.

I hope everyone enjoyed the hamburgers, homemade desserts, and visiting at the 4-H Supper. I would like to say thank you to all of the hard-working committees that planned, prepared, cooked supper, and decorated for the special event.

Happy Halloween everyone! Pumpkins are symbols of harvest and sources of shivery fun. For holiday decorations, why not have each of the children carve his own small pumpkin? Then stack them into a totem pole. Use the top-most cutout as a lid, the remainder for ears and noses. Stems make good features, too. Choose pumpkins of varied shapes, and encourage the sculptors to vary their expressions.

Abroad, we find almost everywhere that a great diversity of puddings, soups, and vegetable dishes are prepared from these members of the squash family. Here in America we restrict their use mostly to pie.

To cook pumpkin, wash and cut it in half, crosswise. Remove seeds and strings. Place it in a pan, shell side up, and bake in a 325 degree oven for 1 hour or

more, depending on size, until it is tender and begins to fall apart. Scrape the pulp from the shell and put it through a ricer or strainer.

Pumpkins can also be peeled, cut into small chunks, and then boiled. Winter squash and pumpkin will keep in winter storage but a few packages prepared for freezing may be worth while. Cook and mash pumpkin but do not season. Cool and pack in containers. If the squash or pumpkin is to be used for pies, just enough for 1 pie should be wrapped separately in cellophane. Two or more wrapped portions can be put into a container or bag before freezing.

**PUMPKIN PIE**  
For a spicier filling, add 1/4 teaspoon clove or nutmeg. Set the oven at 450 degrees.

Use canned pumpkin or cooked pumpkin.

Mix:  
1 1/2 cups cooked or canned pumpkin, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs, slightly beaten, 1/2 cups milk and 1/2 cup cream or evaporated milk.

Pour filling into a 9-inch pastry shell. Bake 10 minutes, then lower the heat to 300 degrees and bake until firm (about 45 minutes).





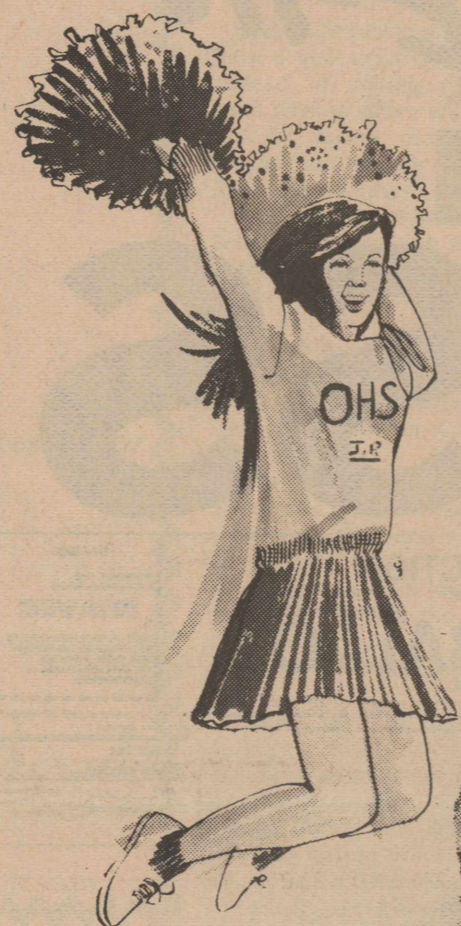

## Your Credit Record File

Your record of credit transactions is kept at the local credit bureau. It usually consists of factual data, rather than a rating on the order of a Dun and Bradstreet rating for corporations. Mrs. Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist, says.

She is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Information recorded on a personal file usually includes the following: opening or closing a retail account, making prompt payments or being consistently late, fulfilling a contract or defaulting, name, address, employer and former employer, social security number.

"Other information recorded comes from public records, such as a contract suit, a judgement, divorce notices, marriages, a tax lien or a bankruptcy, or reports of arrest, indictment or conviction of a crime."

She said that if you are interested in your credit file, you can examine it in person for a small fee or without charge, if you are challenging a credit, employment or insurance denial.

The Fair Credit Reporting Act gives each person the right to check their credit bureau record upon request and proper identification.

"To establish a good credit rating, be financially responsible. Pay bills on time. Do not overextend by borrowing or charging more than can be paid back. In order to take advantage of the credit market, the better a financial record, the better the chances to qualify for credit, charge accounts, and low cost loans when needed."

## Shooting Hwy. Signs Costs The Taxpayer

Crisp fall mornings, big yellow school buses loaded with football teams, bands, pep squads, and cheerleaders, along with the approaching advent of deer season, signal the time of year when guns come out of the closet, are cleaned, polished and "sighted in." Somewhere in this process, some otherwise honest men become criminals as they "squeeze-off" shots at some of the world's most expensive targets--highway safety and directional signs. At the moment a shooter's bullet impacts one of these signs, he has become a "vandal," and awaits only the witness of some observer or law enforcement officer to bring him this official classification and the penalty provided by State law.

Would you believe a \$344 "target" for a 1975 "marksman" near Breckenridge, who fired at the lens on a flashing signal? The district court judge fined the man \$150, added \$44 court costs, and ordered him to pay \$150 for costs of replacing the lens in the light. The seriousness of using these "world's most expensive" targets is illustrated by the experience of a woman who barely escaped death at an intersection north of Del Rio about the same time our Breckenridge marksman bought his "target."

Witnesses in the Del Rio incident saw two men shoot out the lens on all sides of this dangerous intersection warning signal. A short while later, the toll of Val Verde County's property damage and injuries rose as the woman motorist mentioned above was struck broadside by another vehicle. The men who shot out the lens must acknowledge their moral responsibility for causing this accident, and should ask themselves "What if it had been a school bus?" The thought of living under the burdened conscience caused by knowing their vandalism might have caused the death or injury of the innocent children of friends and nei-

ghors should cause all decent men to seek proper targets for their guns.

District Engineer D.R. Watson of San Angelo submitted the accompanying photographs to illustrate the extent of such vandalism in the Ozona area. Watson pointed out that even the smallest highway sign costs about \$10 to replace, not counting labor costs. Larger signs costing many hundreds of dollars are also the targets of "gun vandals." "Each year," he said, "such vandals do more than \$500,000 worth of damage to highway facilities in Texas. Road signs and rest areas are their special targets." Noting that the Department has recently been forced to eliminate many construction projects about the State, and cut back on maintenance operations because of a financial crisis, Watson urged every citizen to remember that "money spent on replacing vandalized highway signs, might instead have been spent to repair the surface on which you drive to work, shop, or the doctor."

## Texas Food Price Report For Sept.

The Texas grocery shopper spent an average of \$18.22 on a basket of 20 commonly-purchased items during the month of September. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported today.

The first monthly survey of grocery prices conducted by the Texas Department of Agriculture was based on reports made in 70 supermarkets in 12 cities. White said. The survey was taken on the fourth Tuesday of the month.

The cities surveyed and the average cost of a basket of groceries in each was: Houston, \$18.25; Austin, \$17.83; Abilene \$18.72; Laredo, \$18.20; Tyler, \$18.18; Corpus Christi, \$18.89; El Paso, \$18.07; San Antonio, \$16.78; Dallas, \$18.22; Fort Worth, \$18.20; McAllen/Edinburg, \$19.05, and Lubbock, \$18.25.

The statewide average price for each of the 20 items was: one gallon one half per cent low fat milk, \$1.32; one gallon whole homogenized milk, \$1.62; one dozen large Grade A eggs, \$.86; 12-ounce package of individually wrapped Kraft American cheese food singles, \$1.34, one pound of Parkay stick margarine, \$.53.

Also, 24-ounce loaf of white sandwich bread, \$.40; one pound of whole fryer chicken, \$.49; one pound of regular ground beef, \$.78; one pound of grain fed round steak with bone, \$1.42; one pound family pack of pork chops, \$1.32; six and one-half ounce can of Star Kist tuna, \$.63; one pound of bacon, \$1.38.

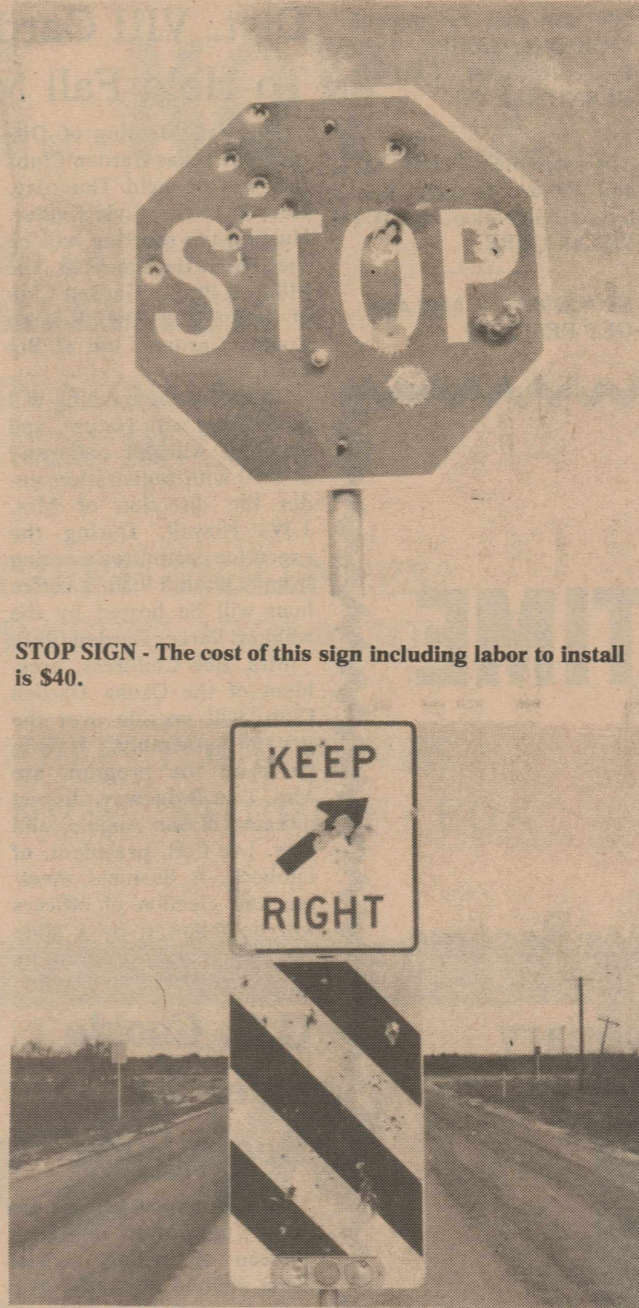
Also, one pound of red delicious apples, \$.47; 18-ounce box of Kellogg's Corn Flakes, \$.69; one head of lettuce, \$.58; one pound of bulk tomatoes, \$.51; one pound of dry pinto beans, \$.24; one pound of Folger's Electric Perk coffee, \$2.00; 49-ounce box of Tide detergent, \$1.37, and six-ounce can of frozen orange juice, \$.26.

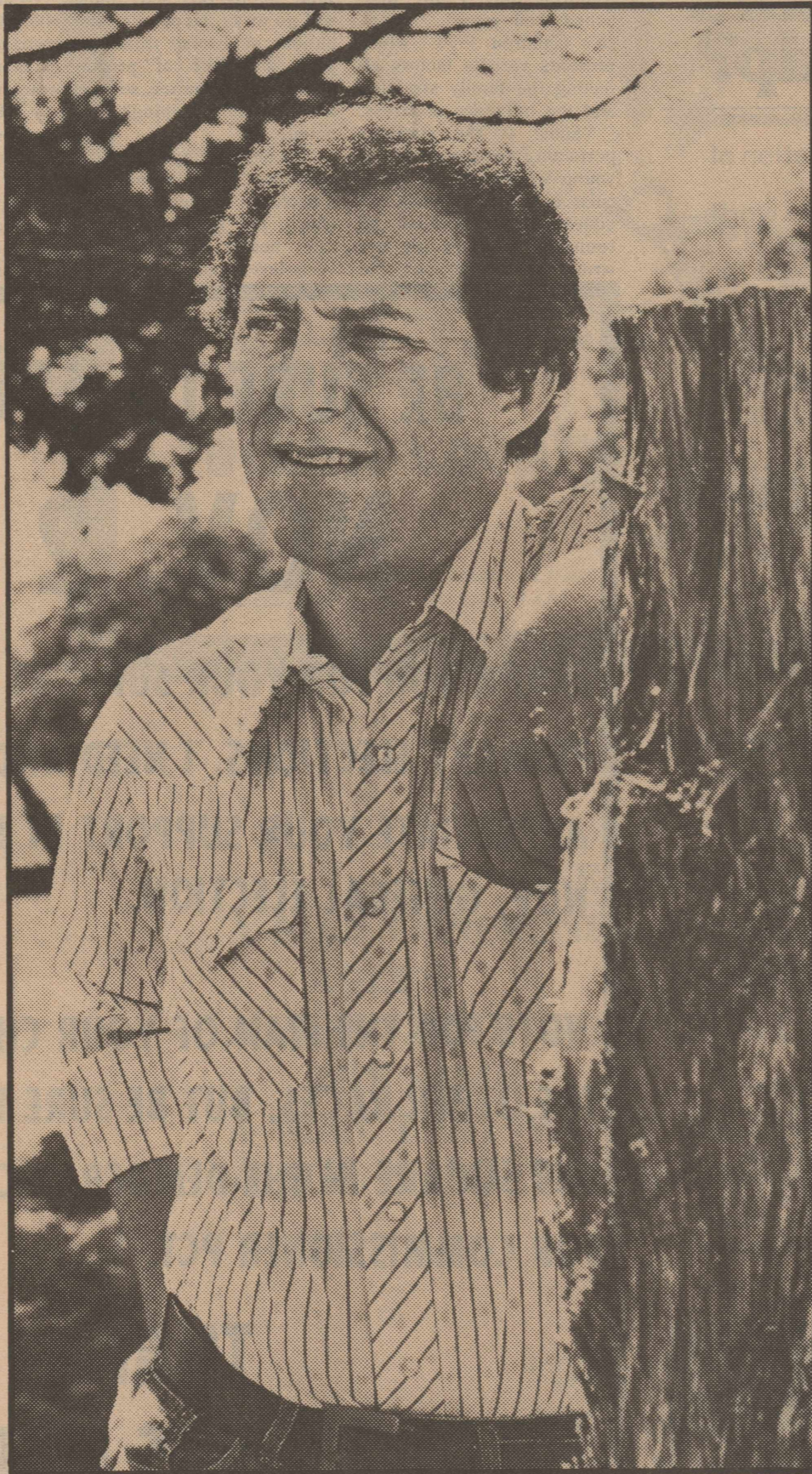

**Teenage Pregnancy Rate Denotes Need For Family Life Education**

"Vital statistics" may not be a phrase which catches the eye of readers, but when the implication of the trends is so awesome, a closer look at their meaning is important, Debby Johnson, a family life education specialist, says.

She is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University system.

"Recently, the National Council of Organization for Children and Youth published their report, 'America's Children 1976,' which presents various factors affecting the family structure and the influence of stress.

"Some of the statistics pertaining to pregnancy of young women are of particular concern to family life educators—not because all teenage pregnancies are urgent or undesirable, but

because the future of both mother and child looks so grim. What it adds up to is the urgent need for family life education," she said.

If we are to have so many young parents each year, the least we can do is prepare them both emotionally and physically for the task at hand, she added.

Unfortunately, many people today still buy stock in the old "ostrich" technique—burying ones head in the sand hoping that something will go away. Generally, situations get worse from neglect and lack of proper education, not better, so who are we really helping? she noted.

"By not offering family life education, are we witnessing a decrease in teenage pregnancy, the infant mortality rate, health problems, poverty-level parents? Trends

do not indicate this.

"Instead, they point to the need for teenage education for parenthood. A majority of Americans at some time in their life will find themselves in the parent role, and paradoxically, it is something many are the least trained to deal with adequately and confidently," she said.

Some of the findings are reported by the National Council of Organizations for Children and Youth.

--Each year, more than 600,000 children are born to teenage mothers; one-third of them are unmarried women.

--The number of births to unmarried women under age 15 increased by a whopping 10 per cent in 1973, mostly among white teenagers.

--The birth rates among married teenagers are the highest of any group of

wives, and are twice as high as married women from 20 to 24.

--Adolescents from 10 to 14 are the only group of women for whom the birth rate is rising.

--Children with health problems are more prevalent among young mothers. Infants born to teenage mothers are more subject to death, or to birth defects, such as low birth weight, mental retardation, blindness, deafness, and congenital abnormalities.

--Young families are poorer than other families, especially those headed by a woman. For example, 60 per cent of the female-headed families between the ages of 14 and 24 fall below the official poverty level.

--Teenage black women constitute the largest unemployed group.

--Young families move more often, causing potential economic and psychological problems.

--Teenage marriages are more likely to end in divorce than later marriages.

--Education for parenthood should be an integral part of the adolescent years, probably the fundamental reason why family life education is not more widespread is that parents and educators equate family life education with sex education.

"While sex is most definitely a part of parenthood, the family life educator's primary concern is to teach the basics of prenatal care and development, child care, parent-child relationships, family interaction and discipline.

### Veterans May Miss Annual Ins. Dividends

Many veterans retired from military service and paying premiums for U.S. Government Life Insurance (USGLI) or National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) from monthly retirement checks may be missing annual dividend checks, the Veterans Administration reported today.

The VA insurance center at Philadelphia reported there are several thousand military retirees who each month pay insurance premiums by allotment from their retired pay.

In some cases the monthly deduction becomes so routine the veterans fail to notify the VA when there is a change of address. This is particularly true, a spokesman said, when a retiree's check is sent to a banking institution.

Annual dividends paid on USGLI and NSLI policies often result in some checks being returned to the VA for lack of a current address, the Spokesman said.

Military retirees paying their GI insurance premiums by allotment should send changes of address, with policy number to the Veterans Administration Center, P.O. Box 8979, Philadelphia, Pa. 19101.

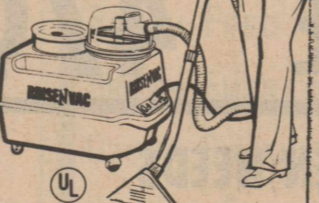

### Damage High In Four Auto Wrecks

Damage ran into thousands of dollars in four automobile accidents here over the past week, but there were no serious personal injuries.

The most spectacular of the accidents occurred last Wednesday at 9:30 p.m. when a truck trailer-tractor rig caught fire and literally burned to the ground twelve miles west of Ozona on Hwy. 290. The trailer was loaded with fresh lettuce. The driver escaped injury but the truck rig, owned by Jack Frost of El Paso, was a total loss including the cargo.

About noon Thursday, Jimmy Hughes of California, was driving west on 290 about 22 miles west of Ozona, when he lost control and the mobile home he was pulling crashed into his car. Damage was heavy to the car, but the mobile home was demolished.

A truck-auto crash on 14th Street early Wednesday morning left the driver of the car with only minor injuries. The truck was owned by Permian Corp. and driven by Robert King of Sonora. Billy Alexander was driving the automobile.

Later the same day a truck owned by Sonora Enterprises overturned on the Joe Couch Ranch Road and the driver, Clifton Merrill, of Sonora, was trapped in the cab for a brief time.

Trooper Manuel Hartnett, DPS, was the investigating officer in all accidents.

column, followed by columns for the Democratic Party, Republican Party, Raza Unida Party, American Party, Socialist Workers Party, the Independent and write-in columns.

Voters will register their choice by marking an X or other mark in a square in front of the names of candidates. The Democratic column leads off with the names of Jimmie Carter and Walter Mondale, for president and vice president; the Republican party column is headed with the names of Gerald R. Ford and Robert Dole for the highest offices. The Raza Unida party did not field a presidential slate, but the American party offers Thomas J. Anderson and Rufus Shackelford, the Socialists propose Peter Camajo and Willie Mae Reid and running alone in the independent column in Eugene J. McCarthy.

The two principal parties, the Democrats and Republicans, are contesting for the offices of U.S. Senator from Texas, U.S. Representative, 21st District, for the Texas Railroad Commission and for a place on the State Board of Education. Most interest, of course, is centered in the race between Lloyd Bentsen, and his GOP challenger, Alan Steelman of Dallas, and locally in the challenge of Robert A. Locke to unseat U.S. Representative Bob Krueger.

Voters should use care in assuring that their vote counts, by being sure their ballots are marked as they want their vote counted. At the top of each column is a square in front of the party named. If a voter marks this square his vote will be counted for every candidate in that column. Most voters, historically, prefer to mark their choice for each individual candidate. In which case, the voter should use care in seeing that he has marked the square in front of each candidate he favors. Otherwise, his vote will not be counted for candidates so marked, even though it may have been the voter's intent to favor the unopposed candidates.

Remember: The general election Tuesday, Nov. 2. You have twelve hours in which to cast your ballot in this crucial presidential election—remember to vote.

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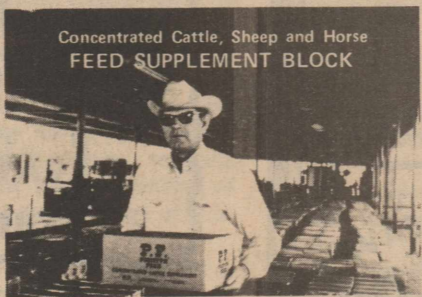
