**Dr. Blanton** Named To **Fellowship** 

Dr. David Blanton, of Ozona has been named a Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians.

The degree of Fellowship may be attained in either of two ways: successful completion of 600 or more hours of accredited continuing medical study, or achievement of diplomate status in the specialty of family practice as a result of passing a certifying examination administered by the American Board of Family Practice.

Fellowship entitles the conferee to use the title "Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians," or "FAAFP." The degree was conferred September 21 upon more than 800 members of the academy in conjunction with the AAFP's annual convention and scientific assembly in Boston. 



#### A PEEK AT THE NEW CONGRESS

It's too early, of course, to predict with accuracy what the philosophical makeup of the newly elected Congress will be. There were many turnovers among the 435 members of the House, and 17 of the 100 Senate seats will be held by newcomers when the 95th Congress convenes in January.


What is apparent, however, is that the political balance of Congress remains about the same. That is, Democrats enjoy a margin of 62 to 38 in the Senate, and a cool two-toone majority in the House. In the statehouses, meantime, call. Democrats likewise have overwhelming strength of about three governors for every one GOP governor.

Many observers regard the 94th Congress which ended last month as one of the sorriest on record. Remember, you can still bake a dish of stuffing alongside the roasting unstuffed turkey, the specialist said. Turkey will be the highlight of the holiday meal. Allow the turkey to stand 30 minutes before carving. This makes carving easier and the turkey tastier, she said.

"Most families have special foods they serve for Thanksgiving meals. Remember to include foods from the basic four food groups to insure good nutrition," she said.

"Take care in storing leftovers so they will be safe to eat and good for another meal. Leftover turkey may be stored in the refrigerator for a few days--or longer in the freezer," she added.

# Avoid **Mail Order** Fraud

If you read ads like "Make easy money at home, send \$3 for details," do you obey their command?

If so, you may be defrauded, says Claudia Mitzel. consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"This type of ad may be one of many that defrauds consumers seeking to supplement their incomes at home," she added.

Dishonest ads for business opportunities may promise payment for at-home work only to send the hapless Consumer a letter on how to start his own mail order business or inform him he must pass a test or pay a registration fee before qualifying, she explained.

"Frequently the victims are homemakers with young children at home, shut-ins, elderly persons and the unemployed.

"Unfortunately, many consumers who fall prey to these schemes never complain because of the small amount of money lost. But these small amounts add up when there are tens of thousands of responses," she said.

Before investing in a workat-home opportunity, be cautious if: the advertisement promises large profits for

names of other employees so that you can check on their experience or that you are required to buy and then resell a product at a profit; the item may be of poor quality and unsaleable.

"If you do plan to invest in a work-at-home plan, call your local Better Business Bureau or Retail Merchants Association to find out if the company has a good reputation. Always think twice before paying for the chance to work." she re-

der abuse far more unacceptable than men and thus often are far more emotionally disturbed by the time they cross the line into violence.

While it is not uncommon for both parents to abuse their child or children, more often it is only one adult. Why the other covers up for his mate is not fully understood. Some say it is out of fear: some that the mate worries about breaking up the home and particularly having to raise the children alone.

But a Washington emergency room physician said, 'I believe that the mate who doesn't report the other's violence has something in the situation going for them. Something like an alcoholic whose partner stands by not so much out of loyalty but because he enjoys dominating the situation and watching the degradation of his partner.

"Sick? You're damn right it is, especially when children's lives are at stake."

Closer to the heart of the problem is another pattern, thatof picking only on one child while the others enjoy mostly normal, even loving, home lives.

The abused child in this situation, experts say, usually represents something other than his real self to the abusing parent. He may remind the parent of a hated brother or father. Or the resemblance may be to a mate who is hated. Abuse develops quite frequently in homes about to break up.

Many researchers also report that once an abused child is removed from the family, often, but not inevitably, none of the other children is picked for abuse. But if, after years, the abused child is returned, the abuse pattern often quickly resumes. The only sure way to break the cycle is for the abuser to work with counselors to get at the root of the violence.

Some of the easier defined cases are illegitimate and deformed children and children born of an unwanted pregnancy.

The highest risk of unintentional death from abuse ranges from three months to three years. Serious abuse doesn't necessarily end at age three, but by this time children often learn how to avoid the worst anger storms by treading warily.

Statistics also suggest that abuse is disproportionately high in households with only one parent who must shoulder all the stress of child rearing, often on a budget made slim by divorce or desertion. Alcoholics and drugs addicts often turn up in the ranks of abusers.

Recognizing child abuse as an unacceptable social ill is relatively new in America, which once believed in the absolute parental right to discipline the young.

For some social historians, the fight against the abuser, as differentiated from the murderers of their children. began in earnest in New York City just a century ago. Then authorities, after considerable ducking of the issue, finally free Mary Ellen, a little girl kept chained to her bed and otherwise mistreated by her adoptive parents.

The fight to free Mary Ellen was won by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Barry Fredrickson, regional administrator in Abilene for the Texas Department of Public Welfare, said that such incidents of abuse and neglect can be investigated if individuals would report it to either their local welfare office or by calling a statewide hot line number.

"If you suspect child abuse and neglect, you can report it any hour of the day or night," he said. "You can call your local welfare office, or the statewide, toll-free hotline number at 112-800-292-5400."

The local and statewide numbers are maintained by the Texas DPW, the legally responsible agency for investigation of suspected child abuse and neglect.






