1957 ACP Practices For County Outlined

ANDERSON-PRICHARD YOAKUM EXTENDER IS DUALY COMPLETED

Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation No. 1 Stong, in the Southeast Yoakum County sector of the multipay Seagraves field, has been dually completed in the Strawn. The well previously had been completed from the Devonian for a daily potential of 459.67 barrels of oil, from perforations at 13,102-108 feet. On the completion test from the Strawn, the operation flowed 170.35 barrels of oil in 20 hours through a 3-4 choke. Shakedown was 4 1-2 per cent water.

The production was from perforated section at 11,460-485 feet. Flowing tubing pressure was 50 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 1,106-1. Gravity of the oil has not been reported.

The well is 330 feet from south and 990 feet from east lines of Gibson survey.

The Texas Company No. 1 Brownfield, project in Southeast Yoakum County, was bottomed on last report at 13,165 feet taking a drillstem test.

Test from 13,025 to 13,125 feet in the Devonian recovered 90 feet of slightly gas-cut mud. Test tool was open two hours and 15 minutes.

Location is 660 feet from south block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Bruner & Roden of Midland No. 1 McDonald, another Southeast Yoakum County wildcat, was making hole below 9,619 feet in lime.

Drillsite for the 11,100-foot operation is 600 feet from north and east lines of section 686, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Three miles southwest of Denver City in North Gaines County, Continental Oil Company No. 1-D, A. L. Wasson is to be drilled as a 7,700-foot operation in the Wasson 72 and Wasson 66 field.

Operator staked location 660 feet from south and east lines of section 53, block AK, psi survey.

The Prentice 6700 field of Northeast Yoakum County gained a new producer with completion of Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 1-LT Paul Cobb and others.

It is 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 381, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

On 24-hour pumping potential test, the well made 124 barrels of

30.2 gravity oil, through perforations from 6,497 to 6,675 feet. A pair of projects have been staked in the Wasson field north of Denver City.

Janss Oil Company of Midland No. 1 Waples-Platter is one of the projects. Site is 330 feet from north and west lines of southwest quarter of section 616, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

The other test is same operator's No. 2 Waples-Platter. Drillsite is 1,540 feet from south and 330 feet from west lines of same section.

Each of the projects will be drilled at 5,250 feet.

Light Plant Near End of Construction

Reports from the new city light plant are that service may be offered soon after the new year begins. Already flooring has been poured and motors set, and, according to Clyde Amonett, employe at the plant, as soon as the concrete is set generators will be moved into place.

Amonett believes it will not be long before the city can start servicing electric customers from the new plant.

Winners of the Lea County Electric Cooperative, Inc. Christmas lighting contest for the best use of outdoor lighting for holiday decorations was won by Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Hale. The prize offered by the electric cooperative was \$25 in cash.

Judges of the contest were Pete Sampson, Mrs. Don Powell and the Rev. R. H. Meixner. The panel of judges were selected by the Plains Lions Club, of which Leo White is president.

The electric company gave like prizes for the best decorations in both Lovington and Tatum, N.M.

The Yoakum County ASC Committee this week announced practices that are approved for the 1957 ACP program, according to a statement this week by W. M. Overton, ASC office manager.

They are:
Establishment of additional acreage of vegetative cover in crop rotation to retard erosion and to improve soil structure; field strip cropping to protect soil from wind or water erosion; controlling competitive shrubs necessary to permit regrowth of adequate desirable vegetative cover on range land.
Constructing wells for livestock water as a means of protecting established grass.

Constructing of permanent cross fences as a means of protecting grass; construction terraces; reorganizing irrigation systems; establishing winter legumes; establishing summer legumes; stubble mulching; deep plowing; application of cotton burs to cropland.

To be eligible for payment request must be made before any practice is started. Specifications may be obtained at the local ASC office, Overton stated.

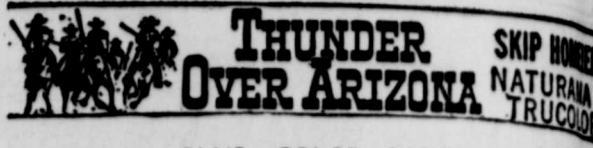
