

\$20,000,000 GRAIN MILLING COMPLEX

Giant Industry Planned For Dimmitt

Following three years of planning, research and study, the ownership and management of Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., announced Tuesday morning at a called press conference that plans for the construction of a \$20,000,000 wet grain sorghum milling plant in Dimmitt have been finalized.

Plans for the construction of the giant industry were presented to the stockholders of the organization at a meeting in the high school auditorium Monday evening. Following detailed explanations of the various phases of the proposed project, by members of the board, the management, and guests speakers, searching questions were answered by the panel with the end result that the stockholders voted unanimously to recommend to the board that they proceed with the building program at the earliest possible date.

The wet grain sorghum milling plant, one of the largest industrial undertakings in the history of the Panhandle - Plains area, will be located on a 30-acre tract of land just east of the Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., elevators. Engineering plans call for two huge buildings to house the mill establishment, with railroad trackage between them. A total of 2,000,000 square feet will be encompassed by the two buildings that are to house the intricate equipment and machinery necessary to refine grain sorghum into its many component parts. The buildings will be connected by a weatherproof service bridge. According to Aaron Isaacs, manager, the plant will be the most modern automated grain processing plant in the world.

Union Starch and Refining Company, Inc., of Columbus, Indiana, will supervise, construct, oversee construction and manage operation of the plant and market the finished products. When completed and put into operation, it is estimated that the establishment will employ in excess of 100 people with an annual payroll in excess of \$1,000,000. The plant is designed to grind 20,000 bushels of grain per day, or approximately seven million bushels per year, operating 24 hours per day and 12 months each year. The plant will be constructed with expansion possibilities in mind. Isaacs further stated that the plant is 100 percent cooperative owned by Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., which is made up of over 700 farmers in the Dimmitt area, whose grain sorghum producing capacity exceeds the expected needs of the proposed mill. The farmer members of the cooperative operate farms in and around Castro County, which is acknowledged to be the grain sorghum capital of the world. Base products to be manufactured by the plant are starch, grain sorghum sugars, dextrose, glucose, grain sorghum oil, gluten feed, gluten meal and grain sorghum oil meal.

Construction time is estimated at eighteen months to two years. It is estimated that basic engineering will be completed within six months, however actual construction will begin before that time. Union Starch and Refining Company, Inc., with general offices at Columbus, Indiana, and plants at Granite City, Illinois, Mexico City, and in Columbia, Peru, and the Philippines, as well as a cyclamate plant at Edinburg, Indiana, is one of the largest wet grain millers in the industry.

The association of Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., and Union Starch and Refining Company, Inc., is an effort to secure the highest possible income for the grain producers of the area in the marketing of the finished product rather than the sale of the raw product. Planning for, and conceiving the idea of, the huge industrial complex has consumed much of the time of the Manager and Secretary-Treasurer, Aaron Isaacs, of the Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., under the directorship of the cooperative board of directors, headed by Houston Lust as president and Frank Wise as vice president and Calvin Petty, Phillip Haber and Leo Witkowski, members of the Senior Board, and Carl King, Morgan Dennis and Dale Winders, associate directors. Attorneys for the project are Burkett and Ross of Dimmitt, Bill F. Sims, certified public accountant, of Edwin E. Merriman and Company of Lubbock, financial advisor.

Sammy Hill Is Accident Victim

A thirteen year old Castro County youth was dead on arrival at Plains Memorial Hospital here about 5 p.m. Wednesday. Death was attributed to a wound in the neck apparently caused by a blast from a .20-gauge shotgun. The victim, Sammy Hill, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Martin Hill.

Sheriff Jack Cartwright indicated the shooting took place at their farm home about 16 miles northeast of Dimmitt. A 15-year-old brother of the youth was home at the time of the shooting, but the parents were reported to have been away.

Cartwright said Thursday an investigation into the death will be completed this week after the parents return from Tullahoma, Tenn., where the youth's body was taken for funeral services and burial. An inquest verdict is expected this week.

The body of the youth, a sixth grader at Dimmitt Elementary School, was taken to Dennis Funeral Home for transportation to Tullahoma.

Survivors include the parents, and a brother and sister, all of Dimmitt.

Dimmitt Young Farmers Schedule Barbecue

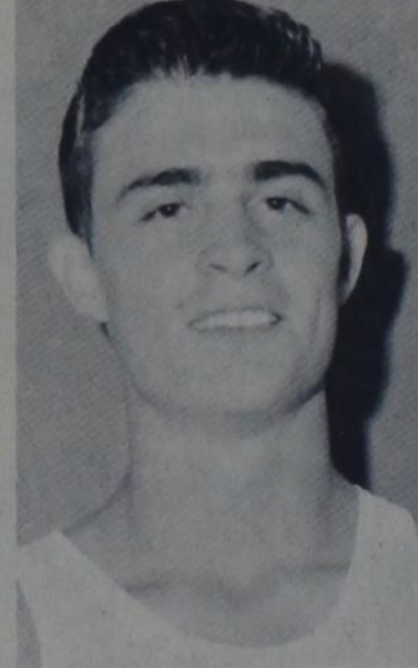

Dr. Harold W. Bischoff Will Be Panelist At Medical Conference in Copenhagen

The meeting at which Dr. Bischoff will participate in Copenhagen will be the yearly meeting of the International College of Chest Physicians.

The Fireside Conference in which Dr. Bischoff will participate as an expert on Medical Electronics will be on Biomedical Engineering and Nuclear Medicine. In the past year Dr. Bischoff became a member of the Committee on Biomedical Engineering and Nuclear Medicine of the American College of Chest Physicians. Prior to that he had served on the Committee on Pediatric Cardiology.

Dr. Bischoff has been a member of the American College of Chest Physicians since 1951 when he was elected to membership on the basis of researches on congenital heart disease that he had done while at the Children's Hospital in Washington, D. C.

The usual procedure at one of the Fireside Conferences is for a Consultant to give a short discussion on some subject of his own choosing. The meeting then open to questions from the floor. In this instance Dr. Bischoff will discuss "Chest Film Comparison by Electronic Means." This will give Dr. Bischoff an opportunity to discuss a new apparatus which he developed in conjunction with Mr. James Cannon. This apparatus has just entered the patent pending phase of its development. Mr. Cannon serves as laboratory and x-ray technician in Dr. Bischoff's office and is also on the staff of the company Medico-Electronic Research. This is a research and development company, which, as the name implies, is mainly interested in medical electronic instrumentation, however other types of problems have been undertaken.

Depositors Urged To Withdraw Their Postal Savings Accounts

Postmaster Davis today urged depositors with postal savings certificates to withdraw their accounts from Post Offices as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their certificates are reached.

The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966, with the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Postmaster Davis pointed out that as of April 28, 1966, no deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened. He said that interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate.

The Postmaster said that for convenience all certificates held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date.

The Postal Savings System was established January 1, 1911, to get money out of hiding and to attract

savings of a large number of immigrants who were accustomed to saving at Post Offices in their own country; also, it served as a safe depository for people who had lost confidence in private banks. Today, however, with the growth of banking facilities paying much higher interest rates than the 2 percent interest per annum paid on Postal Savings, the System has out-lived its usefulness for the American people.

The Postmaster noted that as of June 30, 1965, there were 997,029 depositors holding certificates in 3,130 post offices throughout the nation. The number of depositors has been declining, he said, at a rate of about 6,500 per month.

The Postmaster said that unpaid deposits remaining in the Post Office beyond June 30, 1966 would be transferred to the Treasury Department in a trust fund and would be available for payment without limitation whenever proper claims are received.

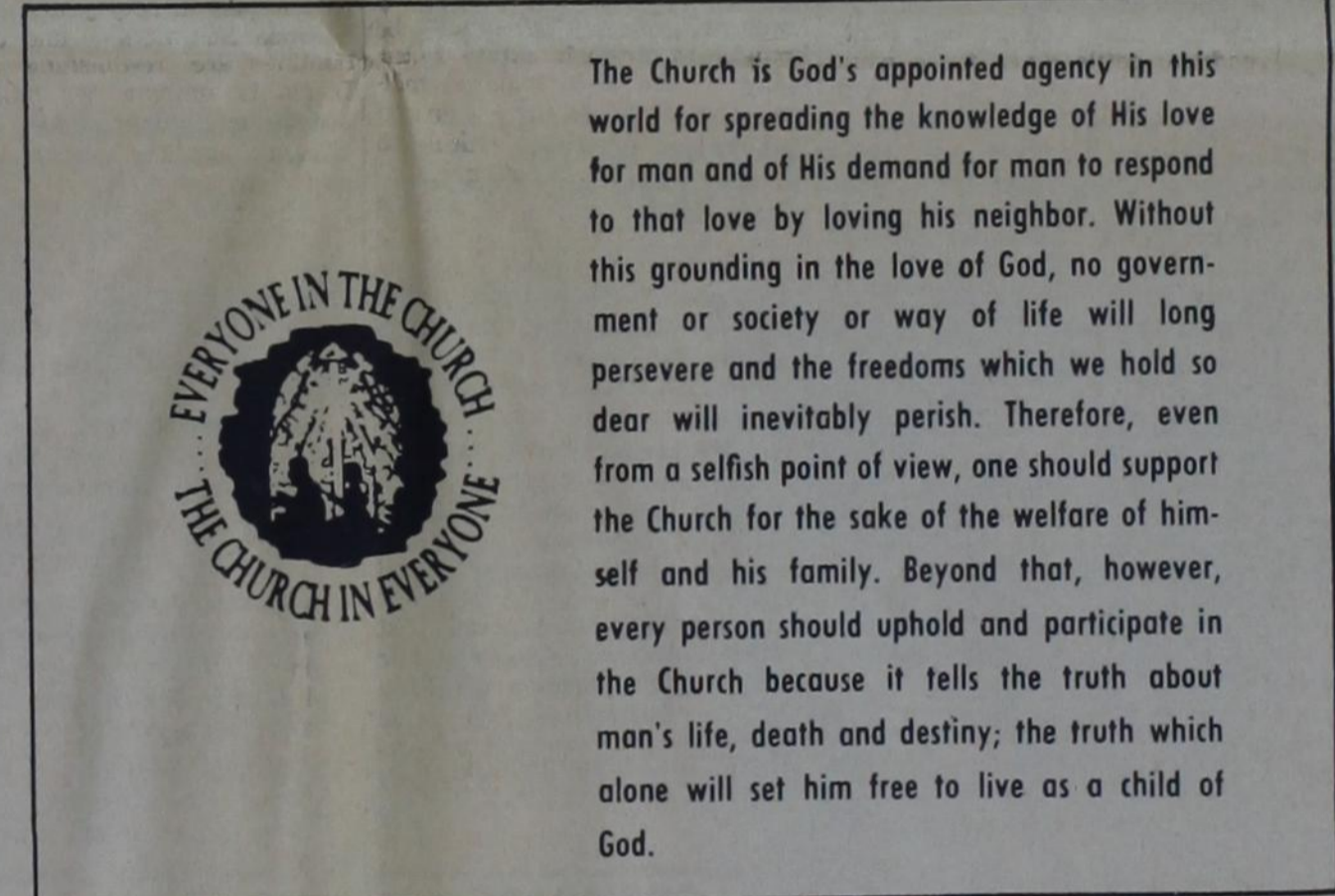

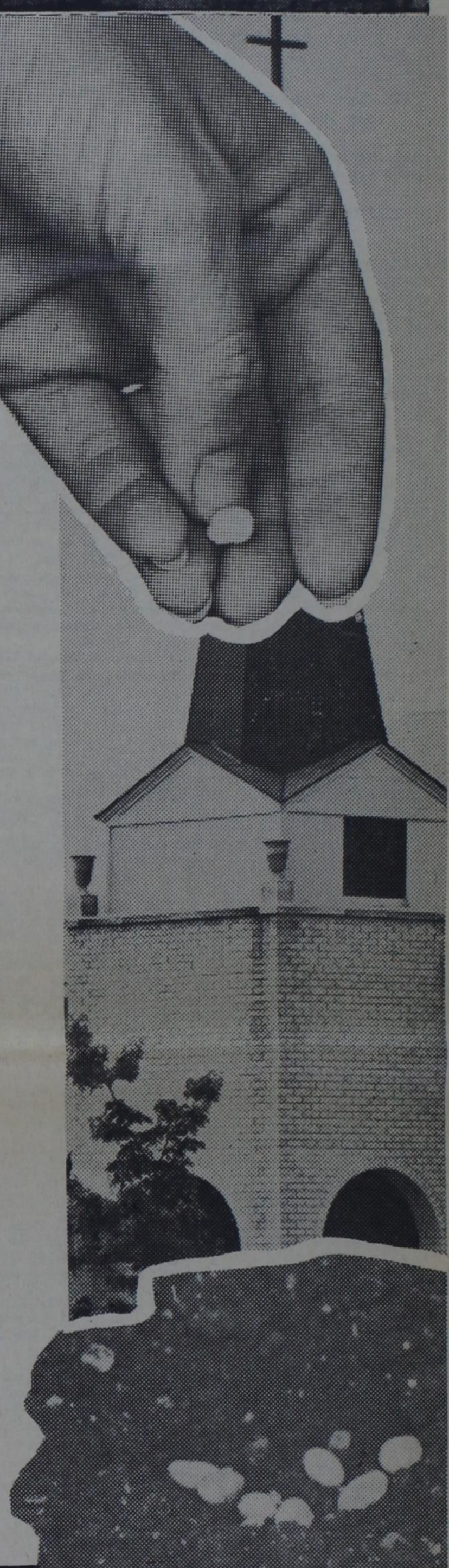

Sheffy's Chatter

The Washington trip Highlights. Our Capital City is among the most beautiful in the world. (I have not seen the others but am told by other folk.)

Guy Evans, our guide, who showed us about in a Cadillac tourist car, told us the interesting things. I wanted to go to church in Washington. Shirley Stephens said, 'Let's see the country.' We did, then Guy took us first to the magnificent structure, The Washington Cathedral, it is non-sectarian, it represents all the Protestant Churches. Nine or more altars, music all the time; it is made of Indiana limestone, one of the six largest churches. Then to St. Matthews, where John Kennedy's funeral services were held. We went there and at his tomb. One of the most interesting churches is the Moslem. The big lights are gifts from Egypt, rugs from Persia, fine woods and tiles, no chairs, no music to disturb the meditation of the worshippers. We removed our shoes. The man said the Moslems worship the one God.

They reverence Jesus. Abraham is the Father of the Church. The Shrine of Immaculate Conception is where Luci Johnson will be married in May. Guy told us to look for his car at the side entrance. We saw the fine steeple on the Catholic Church. This steeple was paid for by the Knights of Columbus, one of the tallest, cost one million dollars. The dome on this church is of blue tile, inside is white.

Our capitol, started in 1800 is so beautiful. I had a feeling of great pride. It was designed and planned by Pierre Charles L'Enfant, a Frenchman. This building is the focal point of the whole city. The Statue of Freedom atop this big white building faces the rising sun. The huge dome is lighted at night, no building can be higher. The White House is the next oldest building. President and Mrs. Johnson were hosts at a tea there for 3,700 women. The tables, one in each banquet room were 30 feet long, big silver bowls of punch, silver trays of cookies, served by dignified colored butlers. Well mannered guards showed us where to go. The flower arrangements were big as tubs, made of roses, lilies, blue bonnets, all kinds. We saw

the gold service in glass cases, the alabaster mantles from Italy, carved figures, the big grand piano with legs carved to represent the American Eagle, tall floor cardelatra, so beautiful. One was almost knocked over, but "nct" broken. We did not shake hands with the Johnsons. We saw them on the East Staircase, trying to say hello to the over 3,000 women. The guards held hands around them, but friendly Johnsons reached past them to shake hands, I watched from a distance.

I thought the Justice Building one of the most impressive places, then decided the pink marble Art Galleries were more beautiful.

The Pentagon is big, big! Mr. Evans told us the Sam Rayburn building cost one hundred twenty million dollars. It is the most expensive house the government ever built. Saw the chimes nearby in memory of Robert Taft. Mrs. John Kennedy had spotlights surround the Jefferson Memorial which can be seen from the White House, it has water around at the back, which is the basin, bordered with cherry trees. We went down the street with all the foreign ambassadors homes, so big and pretty. I believe the French and Japanese were my favorites. The big house of John L. Lewis, the labor leader was near these, also Kate Smith, the singer was born near the Capitol.

The Arlington Cemetery, where the War dead of the Revolution, Civil, and all our wars are buried was a sad, but one of the most interesting places. We watched the changing of the guards tomb of the Unknown Soldier. They look like beautiful toy soldier robots, walk so stiff, never bat an eye. Guy says they can only stand this for one hour at a time. We saw President Kennedy's grave, where many folks still weep for his memory. A big, fine memorial is being built near the present grave with his wife, Jackie supervising it.

Our convention was held at the new Washington Hilton Hotel. We heard many important men. Mr. Humphrey spoke to the 3,600

Democratic delegates at one banquet, with the huge map of the U. S. with Route 66 to Victory - charming man, known in Washington as Capitol Hill Bob Hope. Mrs. Margaret Price, vice chairman of the National Committee presided at all meetings, she introduced Sargent Shriver, who presented the awards to the "Women Doers." A Texas lady, Mrs. Nicci Harrison of San Marcos was honored for her work with retarded children and teaching other workers. Mrs. Harrison sat near me. She sent a letter by us to our own Mrs. Edna Porter, who was in college last year at San Marcos and worked with these people. She teaches the children here in Dimmitt, dozens of V.I.P.'s talked. Mr. Freeman, Agriculture, (also) I didn't get to tell him a word!

The smartest person we heard was Esther Peterson, National Committee Woman of Consumer and Buying, she said for us to check the labels, 5 cents off what, ask why the car people put 2 ply tires on new cars. They blow out and wreck the cars. She talked forcefully and understandably. Many men said words! Words! All good.

We met Senator and Mrs. Walter Rogers and Mrs. John Conally at Mrs. Boyd's party for the Texas folks, hundreds of us. Mrs. Boyd of McKinney is State Chairman. The Oklahoma women wore beaded head bands with red feathers, could see them everywhere. Mr. and Mrs. Boyd, Democratic Chairmen of Texas, sent all of us fresh yellow roses of Texas.

The big group made resolutions one of which endorsed President Johnson's sentiments on the Viet Nam Policy.

There were briefings on the U. S. Policy on health, education, housing and reports of clean-up, food was good. We were treated well. We drove 28 miles through Virginia, the home of Ruth Hackleman, to catch the huge Jet (super) at Dulles. We were high over the storm clouds coming home, went south through Louisiana to miss the turbulence, back up to Dallas, rode a small plane home. I was ready by that time to ride a donkey. Dimmitt looks good. Ethel Womack told me that one of the committee hostesses said the Texas women were the least complaining of any of the fifty states. Aren't you proud of us?? The Hawaii ladies were beautiful and perfect ladies. The Alabama girls were true to their good lady-like training. The Connecticut ladies looked after me, when Texas left me behind on the trip to the Rayburn Building to see

Ralph Yarbrough and Walter Rogers. I saw them later at a party.

GOD'S UNIVERSAL COMMAND

God's universal command is that "all men everywhere are to repent" (Acts 17:30). This command is an all inclusive one. From it no person is excluded. Hence we can see something of its importance.

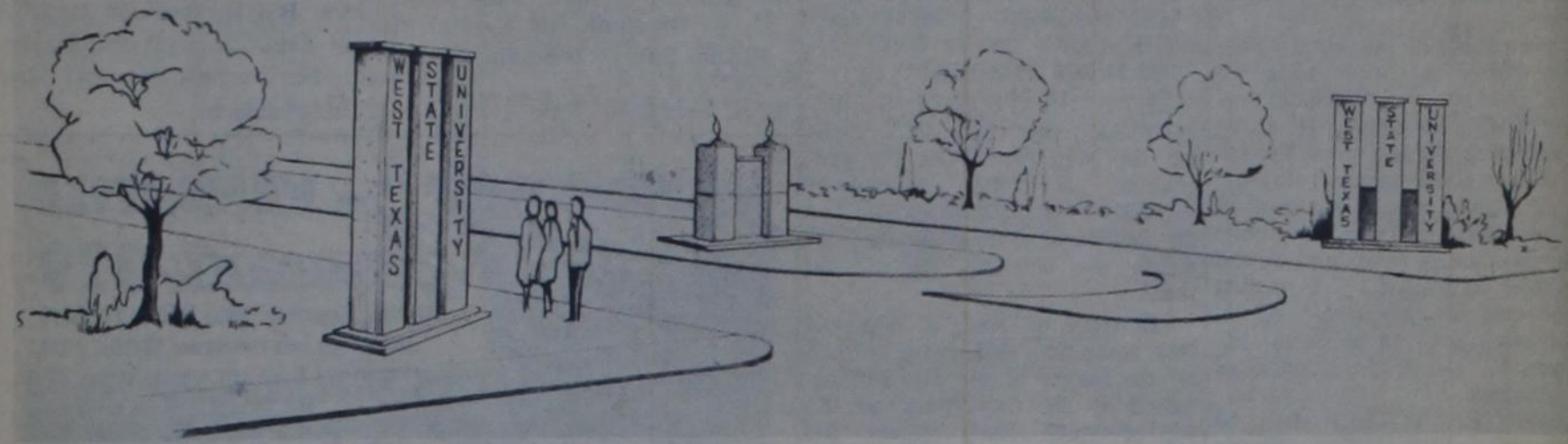

Dear Fellow Texan:
Now is the time for the three million Cold War veterans (nearly 200,000 of them in Texas alone) to be thinking about taking advantage of the educational assistance offered by the Cold War GI Bill which was signed into law this year. The Cold War GI Bill becomes effective June 1st of this year—barely more than a month away. This means that a Cold War veteran with more than 180 days of active duty after January 31, 1955 can apply now for educational assistance under this bill and begin school this summer.

If you yourself are not qualified, be sure to remind your friends, your neighbors, your relatives, or your sons, who are veterans of their rights under this bill so they can begin their schooling as soon as possible. Education has become the most important ingredient for the success of our young men and women, as well as for the future of our Nation. An average grade school graduate earns \$169,000 in a lifetime; the average high school graduate earns \$224,000 in a lifetime; the average college graduate earns \$361,000 in his lifetime. Every person in America should get as much education as he can and this bill gives a chance in life to those men and women who have defended their Nation in this Cold War period.

Under this bill you can go to college, finish high school, go to business school, go to a technical or vocational school, or you can take correspondence courses. All of these methods of education and training qualify you for educational benefits under this Cold War veterans program. If you cannot go full-time, you can go part-time or enter into a program of cooperative education. If you go only 1/2 time to school, you will still get payments of 1/2

of the educational assistance allowance under the bill. This means you can go to night school and still earn money for your family during the daytime.

The educational allowances for full-time training are \$100 a month for a single person; \$125 a month for a married man; and \$150 for a person with two or more dependents. This allowance is the same for all types of full-time training.

Remember, this program begins June 1st and you should start planning now if you are going to school this summer. The application forms for educational

benefits under the Cold War GI Bill are already out and you should get one now. You can get the forms either from the school you plan to attend, or you can get them from the Veterans' Administration offices throughout the state.

You must fill out one of these forms before you will qualify for educational assistance so you should get that form now. It takes time to process the form so don't wait until June 1st to apply. The application requires that you list the courses you intend to take so the Veterans' Administration can

be certain that they are approved courses. Because this takes a little time, begin your planning now so you will not lose this important chance to receive further education.

Service Officer Discusses Cold War GI Bill

Application forms for Educational Benefits under provisions of the Public Law 89-358 known as the Cold War G. I. Bill have now been received and applications should be made as soon as possible in order to enter school by June 1, 1966.

Most any type of training is permitted under this law except on-the-job and institutional on-farm training.

To be eligible for this program, you must have a discharge or release from active duty under conditions other than dishonorable and have active duty of more than

180 days, any part of which occurred after January 31, 1955, or if less than 181 days, the discharge must have been for a service-connected disability.

You will be entitled to 1 month of educational benefits for each month of active duty after January 31, 1955. The maximum entitlement is 36 months, however if you are in training on the termination date of your entitlement you may complete the semester or quarter and receive pay.

Your Educational Assistance allowance will be paid at the rate of \$100 per month for a single man, \$125 per month for a man with one dependent and \$150 per month for a man with two or more dependents.

Marine Corps War Memorial depicting the Raising of the Flag on Iwo Jima, The Pentagon, largest office building in the world, also the Home of the Defense Department finished during World War II, and at its peak employed 35,000 people, The Smithsonian Institution where it is said if you stand before each exhibit one minute it would take 65 years to see them all, also the original Star Spangled Banner in the museum, it was this flag that inspired Francis Scott Key to write The Star Spangled Banner, Department of Agriculture, Department of Commerce, Department of Labor, Bureau of Internal Revenue, Memorial, Congressional Library, the largest library in the world, Sam Rayburn Building, Gasby's Tavern where George Washington gave his first command and where he returned to resign, Ford's Theatre where Lincoln was shot, and also the house across the street where he was taken and later died from the shot, the United States Treasury Building, Longfellow Statue built with money collected by school children over the nation.

Of particular interest was our visit into St. Matthews Cathedral. It was in this church the funeral of President John F. Kennedy was held. It is a beautiful church.

Also went through The Washington Cathedral, the largest Cathedral in North America. It is still under construction, being three-fifths completed. It is built of Indiana limestone and no steel is used in its construction. It has three hundred stained glass windows and seven chapels. It is indeed a beautiful structure inside and out. Chairs in this church are marked with names of famous people such as John F. Kennedy, Adlai Stevenson, and back to George Washington. We also went into the largest Catholic Church in the United States, the National Shrine of Immaculate Conception. In this church is where Luci Johnson plans to be married this summer. Also went into the Mohammed Temple where we removed our shoes before entering. There is much gold here in the decorations. The floors are covered with Persian rugs. A wonderful statue of Sir Winston Churchill, the British Embassy, Naval Observatory Robert E. Lee Home, John L. Lewis Home in Alexandria, Va., where the streets were laid out by George Washington, Site of the Vice President's Home which is in the planning stage. In the Georgetown section we saw the home where Jack and Jacqueline Kennedy lived while he was Senator and was elected President, also the home that Mrs. Kennedy purchased after the death of the President, also the home of Mrs. Auchincloss, mother of Jacqueline Kennedy. Nearby was the home of Ted Kennedy. The group left from Dulles International Airport, Washington's new jet airport 27 miles west of the Nation's Capitol, near Chantilly, Virginia. This airport is on a 10,000 acre site.

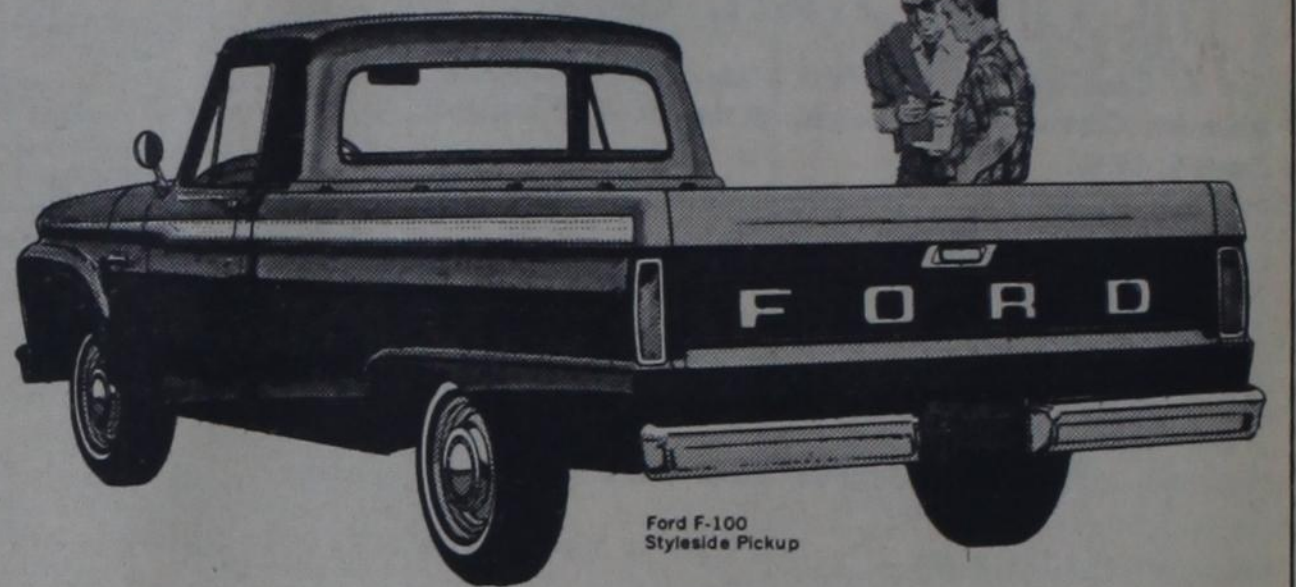
In Southwest Washington 56 acres of ground in the slum area have been reclaimed and business

\$20,000,000 GRAIN MILLING PLANT

Houston Lust, president and chairman of the board, announces after a special called stockholders meeting Monday night, April 25, 1966 that the stockholders of the Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., voted overwhelmingly to recommend to the Board of Directors the construction of a Wet Grain Sorghum Milling Plant.

At 9 a.m. Tuesday, April 26, 1966 Aaron T. Isaacs, secretary and general manager of the Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc. announced at a special called press conference at the association's office at Dimmitt, Texas, that after three years of careful engineering and marketing studies, by Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., that a Wet Grain Sorghum Milling plant would be constructed at Dimmitt, Texas. Total capital investment to exceed \$20,000,000.00.

The plant to be constructed adjacent to the present Dimmitt Wheat Growers Elevators at Dimmitt, Texas.

It is designed to grind 20 thousand bushels per day, approximately 7 million bushels per year, operating around the clock with expandable features.

Union Starch and Refining Company, Inc. of Columbus, Indiana will supervise, construct, oversee construction, manage operation of the plant and market the product.

The plant is divided into two main areas with the railroad siding between them connected with a weatherproof service bridge. The building and area will cover over 2,000,000 square feet over a 30 acre tract.

Mr. Isaacs stated the plant will be the most modern automated Grain Processing Plant in the world today.

It will employ some 100 plus people with an annual payroll in excess of \$1,000,000.00.

Isaacs further stated that the plant is 100% cooperative owned by Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., which is made up of over 700 farmers in the Dimmitt area, whose grain sorghum production capacity exceeds the expected needs of the proposed mill. These farmers operate farms in and around Castro County, Texas, which is acknowledged to be

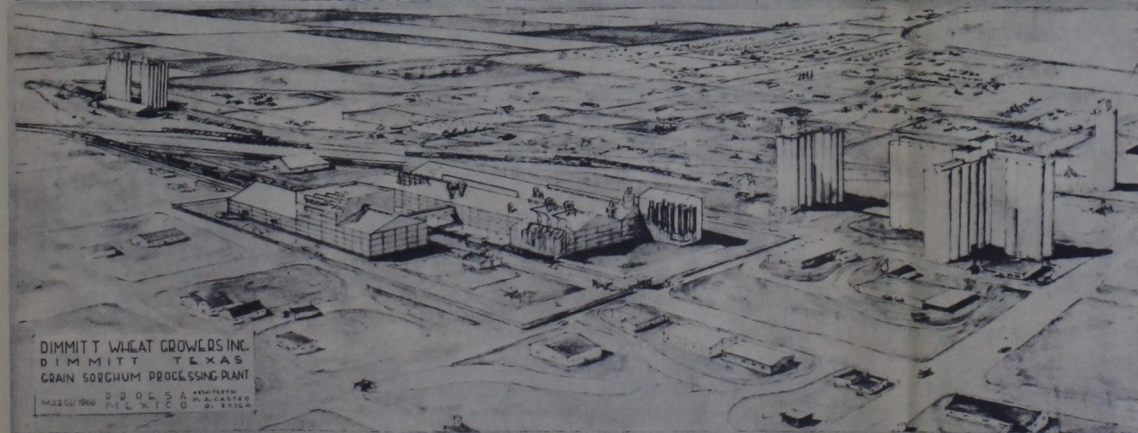

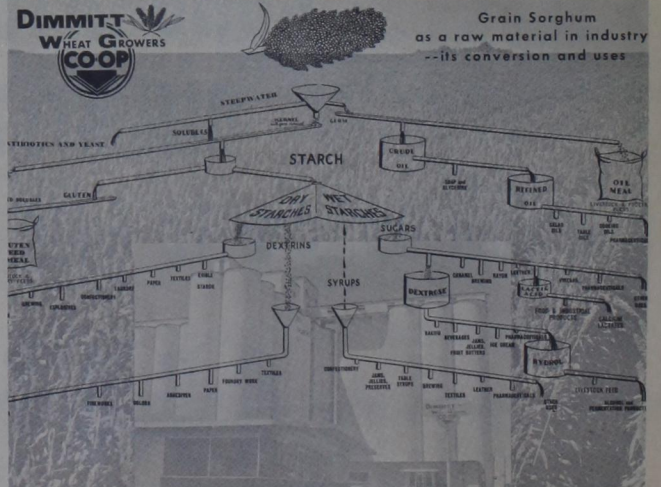

the grain sorghum capital of the world since this area is uniquely suited to the growing of sorghum.

Base products manufactured by the plant are: **STARCH:** a white tasteless, odorless, carbohydrate. Is shipped in 100 or 140 pound bags or in bulk form in special cars. It is used in custards, puddings, groceries, etc. It is also used in textiles, paper, adhesives and chemicals.

GRAIN SORGHUM SUGARS: A result of the further conversion of starch beyond the syrup stage. It is pale amber syrupy liquid grain sorghum sugar until a uniform natural brown coloring agent is created. It is shipped in tank cars, and drums. It is used extensively in the beverage and food manufacturing industries as well as in candy, tobacco, flavoring syrups and extracts.

DEXTROSE: A white sugar.

GLUCOSE: A bright, colorless, thick, syrupy liquid that is sold and shipped in railroad tank cars, and tank trucks. It is used for chewing gum, candy, jams, jellies, preserves, frozen fruits, icings and frostings, etc. It is also used in the manufacturing of glassine, paper, pharmaceuticals, cough syrup, rayon textiles, tobacco, dyes or inks and leather tanning.

GRAIN SORGHUM OIL: A product extracted from the grain sorghum germ and sold in tank cars. It is used in the manufacturing of salad oils, mayonaise, oleo-margarine, leather dressing, pharmaceuticals, soap and cooking oils.

GLUTEN FEED, GLUTEN MEAL AND GRAIN SORGHUM OIL MEAL: These products are obtained during the manufacturing process and are sold to feed mixers as a component in cattle and poultry feeds.

Construction time is estimated at one and one half to two years.

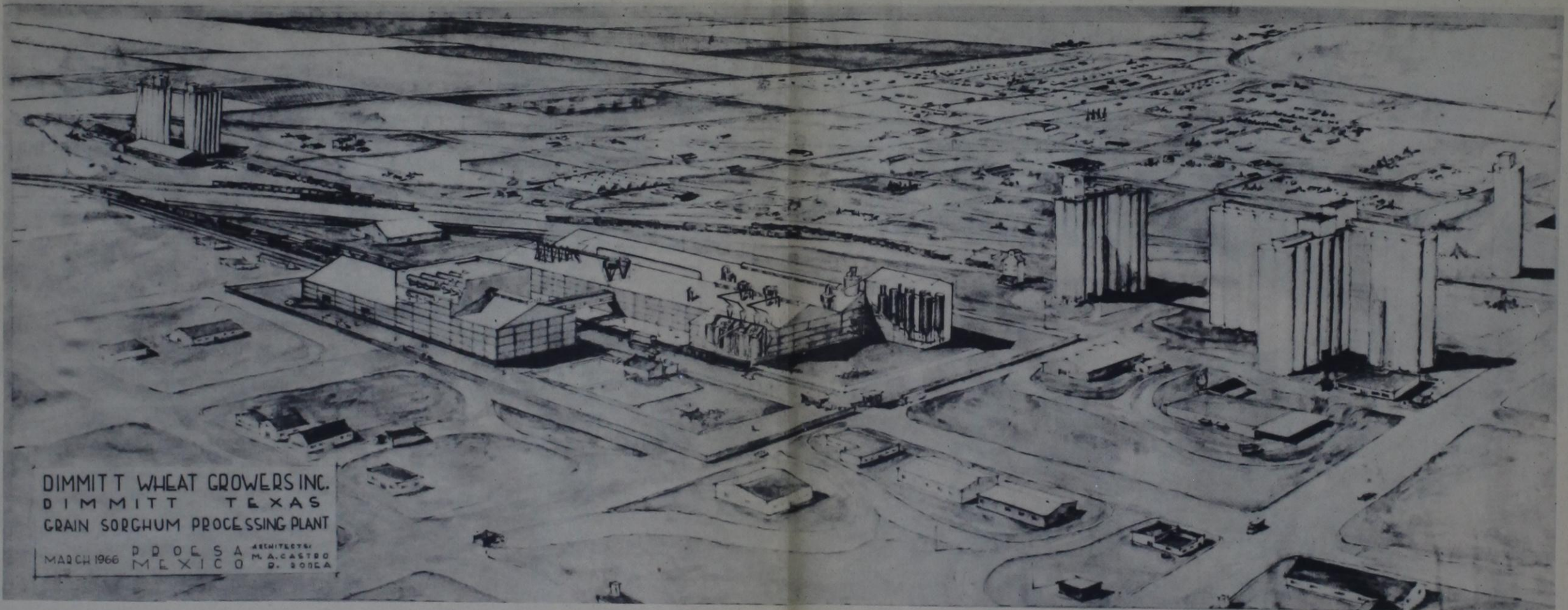

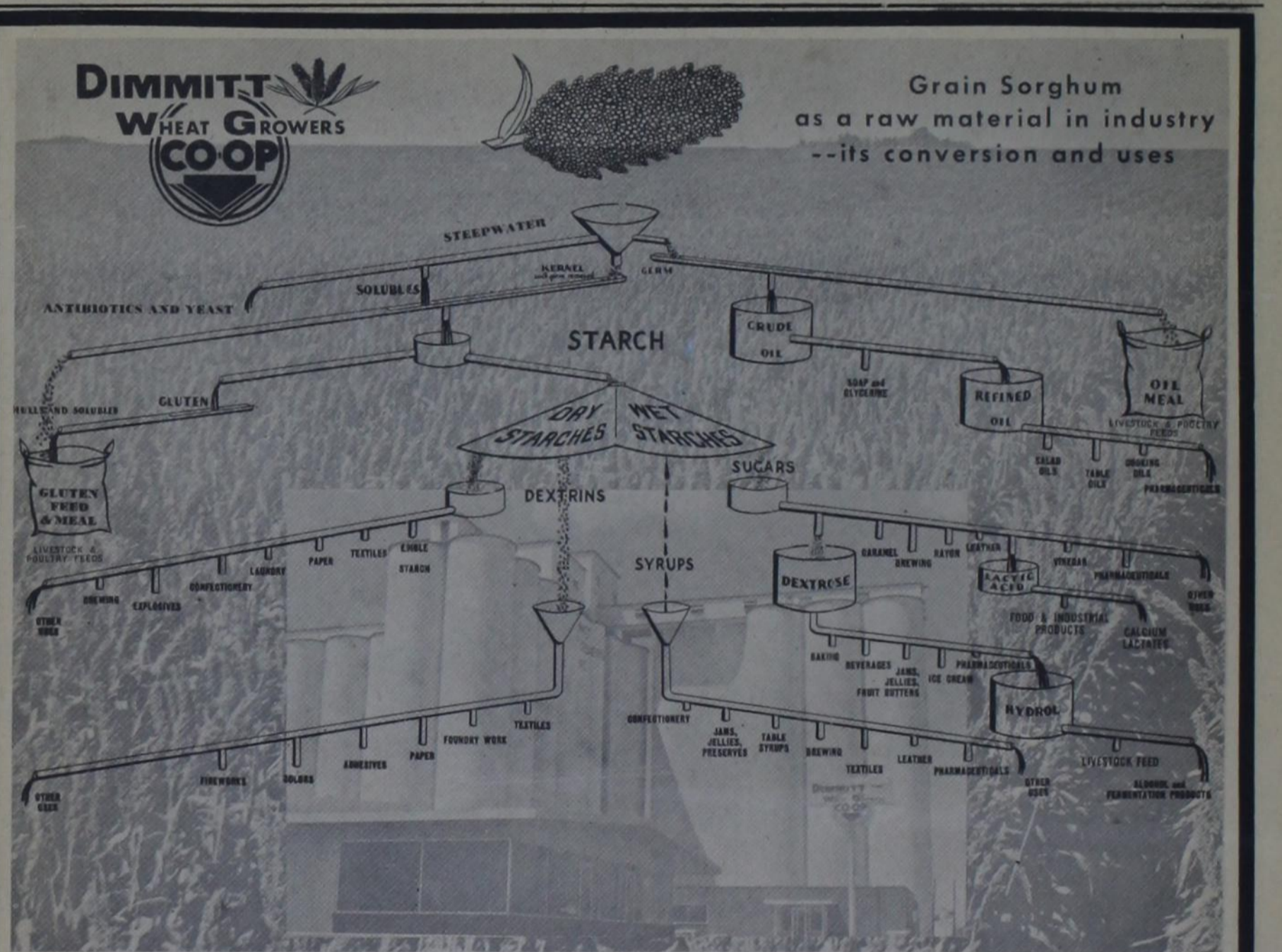

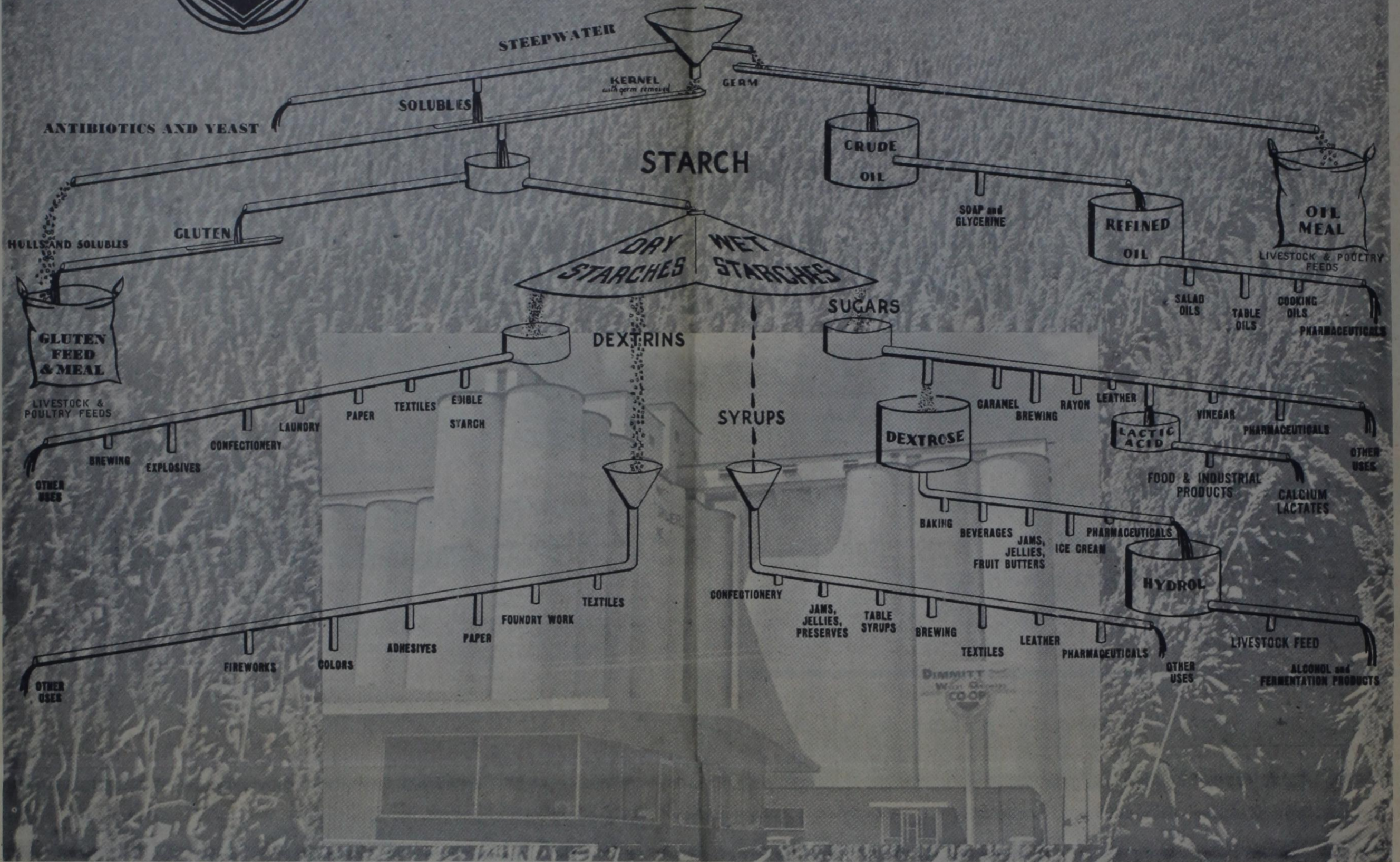
