

Only one of seven homemakers surveyed reported using a meat thermometer as a means of measuring doneness. Mrs. Clyatt says the meat thermometer is almost foolproof.







School tax rate goes up 10 cents; board adopts budget

By MYRT LOMAN The Hart School Board Monday night hiked the school district property tax rate by a dime, from \$1.75 to \$1.85 per \$100 assessed valuation, to cover an adopted budget of \$511,978 for the 1969-70 school year.

Supt. Ted Averitt said the 10cent tax increase was made necessary by the teacher pay raise and higher costs generally for school equipment and supplies.

The board awarded Hart Oil Co. the contract to supply the schools with gasoline this year. Hart Oil Co. was the low bidder at 20.321 cents per gallon.
