Here is June's garden calendar

Once again it is time to check our gardening for this month.

Garden Calendar for June

1. Take critical look at your landscape while at the height of summer development. How can it be better arranged or planned to fit your family landscape needs? Make notes for fall planting.
 2. Root cuttings of your favorite plants, using mature cuttings from current season growth.
 3. Fertilize bearded iris after blooming.
 4. **SUPPLEMENTAL irrigation** is essential for Hydrangea, Coleus, Caladium, Geranium, Dahlia, Azalea, and Camellia plants during the hot, dry summer days ahead. Water lawn and garden thoroughly, but not too frequently.
 5. Continue to check for summer insects and diseases. Spider mite is especially troublesome during this period.
 6. Pinch new tip growth on mums to encourage branching.
 7. **TIE UP** new canes on climbing roses to prevent wind damage.
 8. All pruning of spring flowering shrubs and climbing roses should be completed by the first week in June.
 9. Container plants and hanging baskets should be watered and fertilized at regular intervals.
 10. Remove spent flowers to keep plants groomed.
- Proper Lawn Watering**
There are three important factors to be considered when you plan your lawn watering schedule. You should consider what method of irrigation to use in watering your lawn. The amount of

water to be supplied at each irrigation is important. The frequency of watering is a third important factor.

Both the water-holding capacity of your soil and the root depth of the grass influence the three factors above.

SOILS vary in their water-holding capacities. In general, sandy soil will hold about one inch of water per foot of depth.

Loamy soils hold about one and one-half inches of water per foot of depth. And, clay or adobe soils hold about two and one-half inches of water.

Grass in lawns which are properly watered and fertilized have a root depth of at least 12 inches. Inadequate watering keeps the top one to two inches wet, while the soil below remains dry. Roots survive only in moist soil. With improper watering, root depth is limited to the top one to two inches.

As a general statement, sandy soil should receive one inch of water every five days. Loam soil should get 1½ inches of water every seven to eight days. And, clay soil should receive 2½ inches of water every 12 to 13 days.

RAINFALL should be considered in a watering schedule. Your schedule should be started over again after a rain.

You can easily determine the amounts of water applied by placing cans at various locations under the sprinklers. When the depth of water indicates the proper amount has been applied, your lawn has been watered properly.

Youth choir to perform folk musical Saturday

Department biologists are asking Texans to be pollution detec-

tives by reporting fish kills. **THE DEPARTMENT** has jurisdiction over water pollution which affects fish and wildlife, but sometimes game management officers and biologists arrive at the scene

of a fish kill too late to determine the source.

Prompt investigation could help chemists and biologists solve this at the nearest Parks and Wildlife problem. Reports should be made regional or district office.

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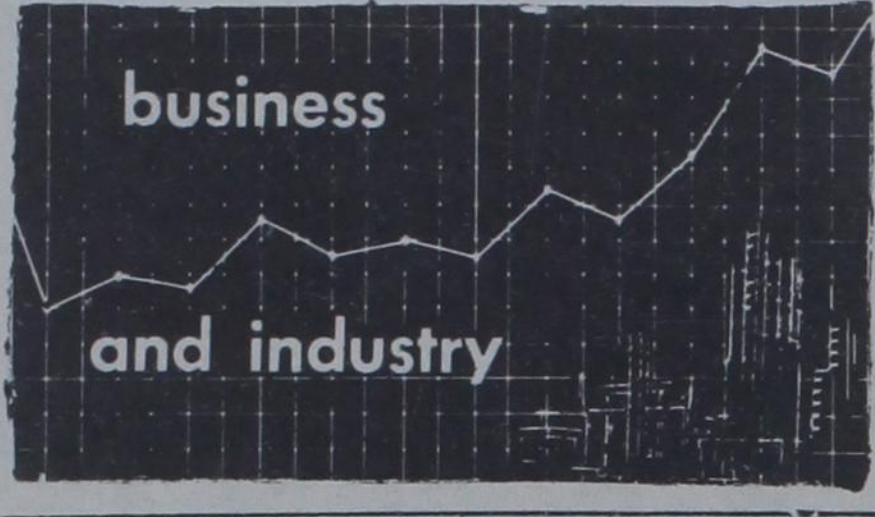
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Storm victims' tax meetings set

As a result of recent tornados and storms in the 10-county High Plains disaster area, a tax assistance clinic will be held in Plainview Tuesday.

PURPOSE of the clinic is to inform taxpayers on what steps to take to claim tax deductions for property damage and losses and how to claim immediate tax benefits for tornado and storm damage.

The meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. in Plainview's City Library Building, and will be conducted by John Sloan, administrative officer of the Lubbock Internal Revenue Service office, and Arlen Ruthart, administrative officer of the Plainview office.

Sloan is coordinating the disaster tax information program throughout the 10-county area. Ruthart is an Internal Revenue agent instructor for the Dallas District, in addition to his duties in Plainview.

A second meeting will be held in Silverton next Thursday at 8 p.m. at the Silverton State Bank.

Both meetings are open to the public.

FROM 1957 to early 1970, the index of prices farmers pay for commodities, interest, taxes and wage rates increased 31 percent. 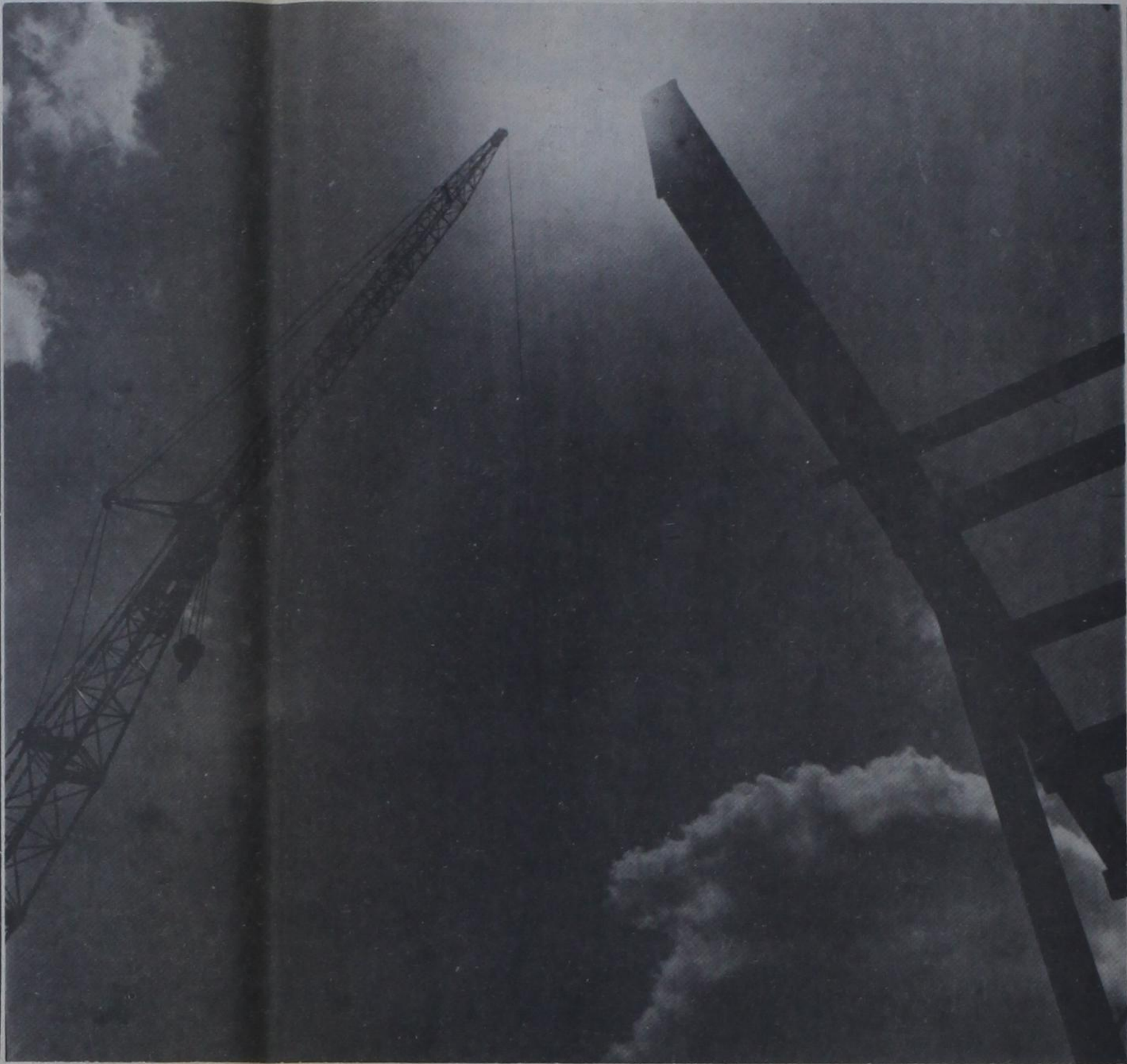

Is your outdoor furniture ready for summer use?

Is your outdoor furniture ready for a busy summer? Bonny Olsen, Extension housing and home furnishings specialist at Texas A&M University, gives these tips for grooming outdoor furniture.

TO CLEAN aluminum furniture, wash with soap and water, then rinse and wipe dry. Apply auto wax or a clear lacquer spray to maintain natural luster of aluminum.

Wash wrought iron and steel furniture. Use steel wool to remove any rust spots, then clean these areas with mineral spirits. Touch up these places with first metal primer, rather than an outdoor enamel for metal.

Redwood and hardwood furniture can also be washed. Give redwood a yearly coating of penetrating sealer, then wax. Painted hardwood may need a coat of matching outdoor enamel.

GIVE RATTAN and wicker furniture frequent dusting, but wash only once yearly. If a strand of rattan or wicker has unraveled, it can be soaked in water, then rewound. Next apply one of the following protective coatings: liquid wax, enamel paint, marine varnish or spray lacquer. Before using lacquer, first remove the old paint.

To clean umbrellas and hammocks, brush them, then soak with mild detergent, hose down and leave them open to dry. A hammock should be dried on its stand to avoid wrinkling.

Use a soapy sponge to clean plastic. Add a little chlorine bleach to the soap and water to clean very soiled plastic. Test colored plastics first for color-fastness by using the solution on an inconspicuous place. Rinse off with a clean sponge and water.

NEXT FALL, give outdoor furniture this care before putting it away. It will then be better protected and, except for dusting, be ready for summer fun.

More than 1,200 persons from throughout Texas are attending the convention.

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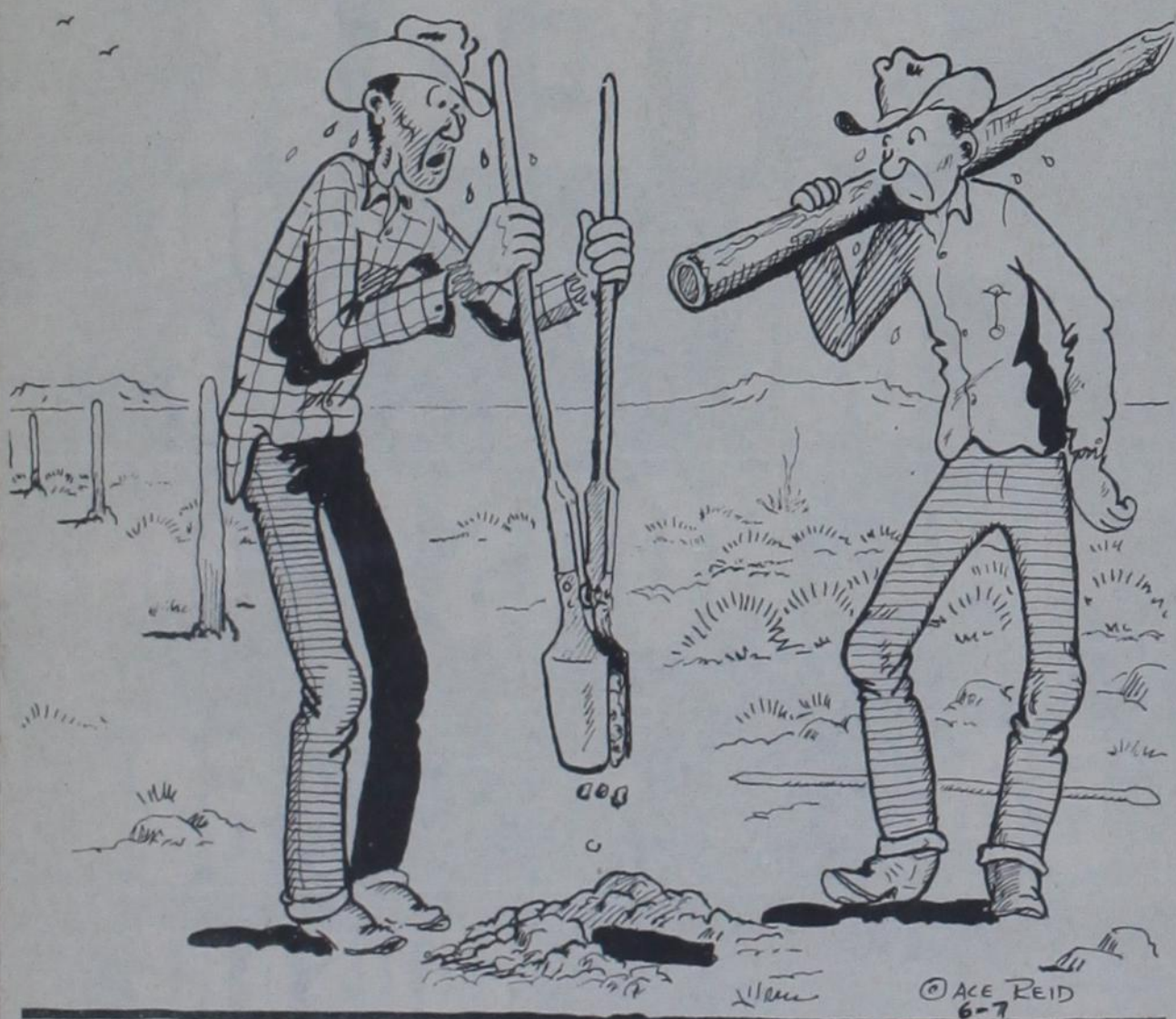

Shortcourse on pasture-forage planned at A&M

The fifth annual Pasture and Forage Crops Shortcourse will be held June 25-26 at Texas A&M University, A. C. Novosad, Extension pasture specialist and J. N. Pratt, Extension agronomist, have announced.

"THE shortcourse will help cattlemen get a better idea of what might be the weak link in their pasture production," Novosad said.

Among the topics to be discussed will be sessions on some of the newer grasses and their management. Mineral requirements and utilization grazing of cattle will also be discussed.

"Those attending will have opportunities to ask questions concerning their own problems and get answers from the researchers and Extension specialists during the question and answer periods after each session," Novosad said.

Deadline is June 20 for replanting grains

May 25 was the final replanting date for cotton in Castro County and June 20 is the replanting deadline for feed grains.

IF WEATHER conditions are such that you cannot plant, or if your crop is destroyed after the replant date and you want to plant some other crop, you must request approval in writing and have the land inspected before planting another crop.

For prevented plantings to be eligible for credit as planted acreage for program payments, price support and history, the area for which credit is requested must not subsequently be planted to feed grains, peanuts, cotton or wheat for harvest in the current year.

This provision is for the benefit of those farmers who suffered a hardship through loss of the crop due to a genuine disaster (such as drought, hail, flood, etc.). This is not intended to be used to provide windfall benefits to producers who are not making a genuine effort to plant, care for and harvest the crop.

REPORTING ACREAGES
Castro County farmers are reminded that early compliance and early certification will mean early payments. Producers should certi-

fy compliance as soon as possible. Remember that acreage certifications are not to be made until you are in compliance with all program regulations.

After you certify to be in compliance, you are subject to be checked at any time and if errors are found, the farm will be determined to have not fully complied and some or all program payments may be lost.

78 more drown; usual mistakes

Boating accidents and wandering children have accounted for many of the 78 drownings in Texas since Jan. 1, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"PEOPLE keep making the same mistakes and paying for them with their lives," said George Cook, director of Water Safety Services for the department.

"They ignore wind warnings on the lakes and on the Gulf. They either don't have life preservers or they don't wear them. They pay no attention to load specifications for their boats, and the result is tragedy," according to Cook.

Apartment swimming pools, private pools and irrigation ditches have claimed the lives of several small children recently.

"WHEREVER there is a body of water, parents should keep a tight rein on their children," said Cook. "Children are naturally attracted to water, and all too often they topple in."

Cook cited two recent instances in which small children toddled off from their families during picnics and drowned in nearby waters.

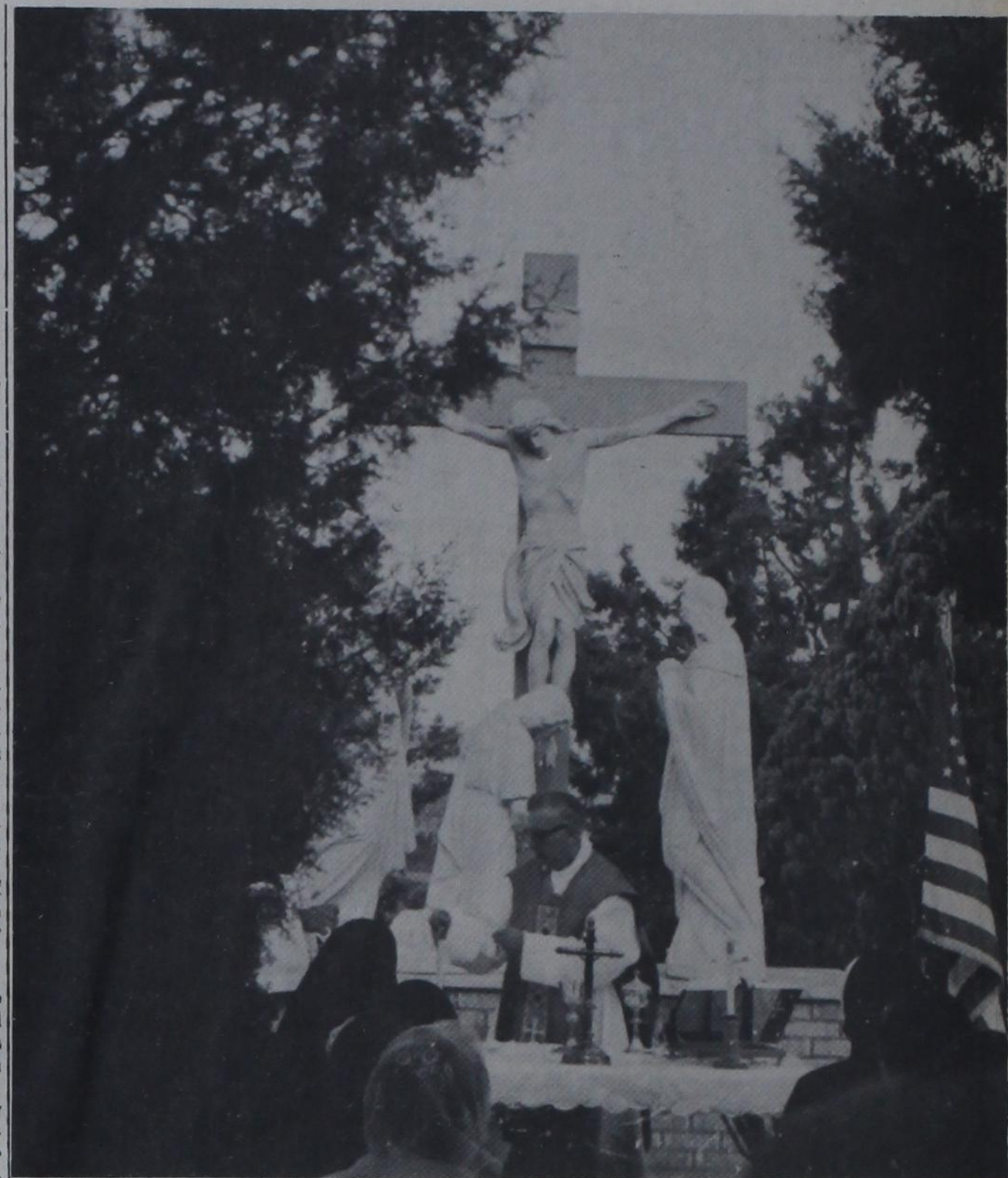
