City may have landfill problems—again

Tax rebates take big jump

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office contacted two local taxing entities to confirm the large amount on tax return checks issued for the month of November.

Castro County and the City of Dimmitt showed 141.49% and 190.80% increases, respectively, over November 1988.

Bullock's office said the increases were attributable to a company expanding its facilities, but would not release the name of the company. Both taxing entities were informed that it would be a onetime occurance.

"They told us not to let it distort our budget figures," said Jo Hamilton, head of the City Administrative Dept. for Dimmitt. "It made a nice Christmas present for the city."

A spokesperson for Bullock's office said the expanding company had purchased building materials tax-free, but did not use the matermust be paid.

Castro County received a payment of \$31,568.56, while in November of 1988, the amount was only \$13,072.36. Dimmitt received \$82,199.16, while the amount for November of 1988 was only \$28,-

The balloon payments also distorted year-to-date figures for the two entities, bringing Dimmitt up to \$306,206.59 this year, 49.52% ahead of the same period last year, which netted \$204,789.21. Castro County has received \$128,764.05 this year, 66.73% more than last year's \$77,230.39 for the same per-

The other taxing entities in the county, Hart and Nazareth, were unaffected.

Hart's November 1989 payment was \$2,071.33, a 17.70% increase over the \$1,759.83 received for November 1988. For the year-to-

November's payment for Nazareth was \$1,939.14, down only 1.84% from the \$1,975.53 received in November 1988. With \$14,-468.45 coming in so far for 1989, it shows a .21% decrease from the \$14,438.73 received for the same period in 1988.

Once the temperatures started cooling down at night, beet diggers returned to the fields in full force and officials at Holly Sugar hope to have harvest completed by the end of the month.



Check new voter cards

Castro County Tax Assessor/-Collector and Voter Registrar Billy Hackleman announced that 4,512 voters' registration cards were mailed out last week.

He stated that voters should immediately examine the salmon and white colored cards to see if there are any mistakes in the voter's name, street address, mailing address or birthdate.

If there are mistakes, the correct information should be noted on the card and it should be returned to Hackleman's office, and a new card will be issued. "If all information on the card is correct, the voter should sign the card and keep it," Hackleman said.


The new cards will be valid from Jan. 1, 1990 through Dec. 31, 1991, replacing the current white card, which expires Dec. 31.

Joining the trio will be Marty Gerber, a 6-0 senior post; and Michael Schmucker, a 6-0 freshman point guard.

Bob Kern, a 6-1 senior post is a returning

Rounding out the varsity squad are Lynn Nelson, a 5-8 sophomore guard; Adrian Farris, a 5-7 freshman guard; Mac Annen, a 6-1 sophomore post; and Rusty Schacher, a 5-9 senior guard.

Offensively the Swifts will operate with a double post, high-low offense and will also run a motion offense "when we have more time to prepare it," Makeever said.

Defensively it's man-to-man.

"I believe in pressure defense and in really working. Eventually we'll run a man-to-man. That's my number one defense. We'll put on a man-to-man run and jump press," Makeever said.

"Our defense is our main strength right now. I think we've got a little bit of quickness to help out with that. Wade's got good speed and Michael's quicker than he appears to be. We've got Adrian and Lynn coming in off the bench and they're pretty quick. They're probably not as quick right now as they can be, but that'll come with time."

Makeever's main concern about his new charges is offense.

"I know people are going to be on Wade and Brian to score. Our offense concerns me right now, but if Scott can dow what I think he can, it's going to open up everything else. I think Michael's also going to come around. As they year goes on I think Adrian's also going to surprise us with outside shooting. Lynn's going to improve through the year and I think Mac's getting better. He's big and he's still growing."

The Swifts will rely on Hoelting from the outside—especially from the three-point range.

"Wade's our most consistent shooter from the outside right night. He's been shooting the ball real well and is accurate on three pointers. Michael has the capabilities of being a good outside shooter.

"We'll have Brian set up on the wing, but he'll do most of his storing inside off of penetrations. We'll play him both at post and wing," Makeever said.

"I'm excited, but tentative about this year. I know we've got good kids, but we're playing tough competition from top to bottom.

Cleveland believes this year's Bobcats will give fans their money's worth.




But as for the rest of it—district, bi-district, area, regional, state—don't bet on it. Just hang in there with 'em and hope.



"I've got four good people coming back. That's not bad, but we lost Junior Washington, Andy Castillo and Steve Lee. Junior was a big kid and that's one advantage we had last year. We used him inside and he really dominated," Abundez said.

"Ricky Ojeda is a good all around player. He's pretty versatile and I can switch him around. He's fairly consistent with three pointers, but I really don't want to use him just as a three point shooter because he's so dominant inside, too. I expect him to penetrate and do all kinds of things inside the paint."

Ramirez will also add to Hart's outside game and Abundez said he "can really count on him."

Skiles didn't start at the beginning of the year last season, but by the time district rolled around he was there for the opening tip-off.

"He's pretty quick," Abundez said. "He plays good offensively and defensively. I'm really counting on him to help us a lot.



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

Nazareth takes pair from Muleshoe

The Mules and Lady Mules kicked, bucked and hee - hawed around Saturday, but still couldn't manage to upend the Nazareth Swifts and Swiftettes, even though it was too close to call a few times.

The Swiftettes defeated the Lady Mules 54-46 after a close, hardfought contest; and the Swifts managed to pull out a 55-52 victory over the Mules in Nazareth.

In their season opener Saturday, Nazareth's boys came ready to play and it's a good thing they did.

The Swifts jumped out to an early lead over the Mules in the first quarter, and that was what it took to win the game.

In the second stanza the Mules outscored the Swifts 13-10.

Hoelting hit his fourth threepointer with 7:20 left in the first half, giving the Swifts a 21-7 lead, and hit another with for a 24-10 lead later. Muleshoe quietly worked away at the Swifts lead, narrowing it to eight points at half time, 28-20.

The Swifts had a battle on their hands in the second half, but managed to hold on for the win.

"The first year I was at Allison the boys made the playoffs. We were 18-9 on the season and got beat by Vega in the area round. The second year we lost quite a bit and





"We anticipate that soil moisture conditions will be so dry that most irrigators in the Water District will need to irrigate to fill their preplant soil moisture profile. Having a full soil moisture profile at planting helps ensure maximum economic yields," says Mike Risinger, soil scientist with the USDA-Soil Conservation Service and coordinator of the Water District's soil moisture monitoring program.

Data collected at the 271 soil moisture monitoring sites will be used to construct soil moisture availability and deficit maps for the 1990 pre-plant season. The maps will be provided to the news media for publication as soon as they are completed. These maps will illustrate the estimated moisture availa-
