

First Baptist Church Sunday Night and Your Children

During the school year you have told me, "We can't bring the children out on Sunday night for Training Union and church service because they have to go to bed early so they can be ready for school on Monday morning." We did not argue with you. However, we noticed many, many parents bringing their children, even the little ones, on Sunday nights, and it didn't interfere with the children's school program. In many instances some of these children walked off with top honors after turning in better work than the rest!

See you - Sunday morning, and Sunday evening.


