

# Castro's Best Spellers To Vie For Honors Here February 5th

Castro county's best spellers have either tested their skill at spelling or will be doing so during the remainder of this week and the first part of next week in preparation for the county spelling bee contest to be held in the District Courtroom of the courthouse, Friday, February 5, beginning at 3 p. m.

Elimination contests are currently underway in the county and in Nazareth have already been completed. The winners there are Dolores Warren, seventh grade pupil who will enter the county contest in the senior division and Eugene Gerber, 6th grade pupil who will represent Nazareth in the county junior spelling bee contest.

Coached by her teacher, Sister Gregory, Dolores is also winner of the 1953 American Legion Auxiliary Poppy Poster Contest for junior high school students. She is interested in art and also plays the piano and organ being a student of the Benedictine School of Music. Twelve years old, Dolores is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Warren.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Gerber, Eugene is eleven years old. He was a successful contestant in the Globe News KGNC quizdown in Amarillo recently. His hobby is woodworking.

Representatives from Hart and Dimmitt will also enter the county contest which will be directed by County Judge Robert Estes. Miss Alyce Kirksey of the speech department at West Texas State College will serve as pronouncer. Dimmitt and Hart will certify winners to Judge Estes this week or early next week. Winners of the county contest will compete in the regional spelling bee contest which will be held in Amarillo, February 27. County winners must be certified, February 13 in order to be eligible for that contest.

The final phase of the spelling bee will be conducted in Washington D. C. in May when winners of the various regional contests held over the United States will compete for national honors. Trophies for junior and county champions will be presented at the regional contests. The Amarillo event will be telecasting in Nazareth.

## Castro Farmers Seek Gas Line In Southern Section of County

A group of Castro county farmers, seeking natural gas for irrigation purposes and home use, voted at a called meeting here Monday afternoon to hook on to the main line of the El Paso Natural Gas Company and run a stem or tap line to a point one and a half miles west of the old Cleo Community. The vote carried the stipulation, however, that the agreement would be binding only if all ten farmers participating are able to meet their share of costs for laying the line.

The group was to meet again Thursday afternoon to determine if each farmer will be able to meet his share of the total cost before giving the proposition final approval. The estimated cost for

hooking on to El Paso's main line and laying the stem line would be \$12,500, according to Elmer Youts, who was appointed to serve as chairman for the group. Cost share for each farmer participating would be approximately \$1,250. For each additional person tapping the line later, a fee or share in accordance with the number subscribing to the line would be charged. For example, Youts explained, "If one more person should tap the line then our group would number eleven, making the added person's cost share one-eleventh of the total cost for laying the line."

The proposed stem line would run from the El Paso plant's main line about ten miles south of Dimmitt to a point one and one-half miles west of the old Cleo Community or a distance of six and one-quarter miles. The line would be about two inches in diameter.

Andy Nelson, a leading proponent of the stem line, indicated that should the proposition fail to carry due to lack of finances, he would undertake to pay the total cost. Nelson would receive reimbursement from each farmer who later decided to tap the line by charging him a "tap" fee or a fee for connecting his well or home to the stem line.

The El Paso company has expressed interest in the proposed line and has okayed the tie on.

## Special Polio Fund Drive to Be Held Here Friday Night

A whirlwind campaign is underway in Castro county this week as community drive chairmen and various civic and service organizations intensify their efforts to make Castro county's March of Dimes drive the most successful ever conducted.

Although reports from outlying areas, such as Hart, Nazareth, Jumbo, Frio, Nysyside and East-er, are very encouraging, "we need to exercise our best efforts as we enter the final phase of the county drive in order to exceed last year's total collection," according to Mrs. R. B. Boren, campaign director for the Castro County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Last year a little over \$2,000 was collected in the county. Unofficial returns for the current drive credit the county with \$764.60.

As a final effort to give every resident of Dimmitt an opportunity to contribute to the worthy cause, the "Mothers' March on Polio" will be conducted Friday night (Jan. 29) in the form of a "porchlight campaign." All residents wishing to make contributions are asked to leave their porchlights on and workers will come to their homes to pick up their donations. The campaign will be conducted between 7 p. m.

and 8 p. m. The alarm at the local fire department will be sounded to signify the start of the special campaign. Residents who do not have a porchlight may leave a candle burning in their window so that workers will know that they wish to contribute.

Mrs. Helen McLean is serving as chairman for the special porchlight campaign. She will contact mothers on each street in Dimmitt and make arrangements for a street-to-street drive; the purpose behind this being to appoint one parent on each street to conduct a porchlight campaign for her respective street.

A special drive by the Dimmitt American Legion post Saturday will end the MOD drive in Dimmitt. Similar campaigns will be held in Hart to raise funds there. Dinners, suppers and other special events were held elsewhere in the county to collect monies. Fifty percent of all funds raised in the county will go into a special county polio fund to be used to help defray expenses for county victims. The balance of the amount will go to the National Foundation in New York.

## Castro Teachers Association Meets

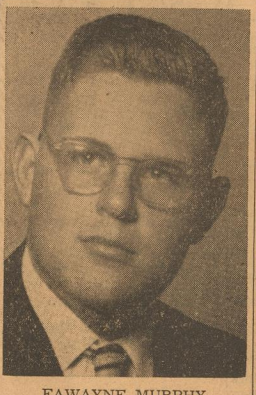

## FB To Send Two Delegates To Athens Meeting

**Favorable Reports On Cotton Allotment Are Also Given**

Castro County Farm Bureau directors voted to send two delegates to the Longhorn Recreational Laboratory at Athens, February 14-21, at a regular monthly meeting held in the Sunnyside Community Building, Friday night.

The delegates are Mrs. Percy Hart of Hart and Mrs. Cecil Curtis of the Sunnyside Community. The group elected Noble Howard to a two-year term as county farm bureau director to the Sunnyside Community.

A lively discussion on the agriculture committee hearing at Waco and the recent cotton meeting in Amarillo was also given at the meeting by P. L. "Posie" Cunningham and Allan Webb. In talking over most recent developments at Amarillo with Bob Lyons, state ASC committeeman from this district, Webb stated that many cotton farmers in Castro county are certain to benefit from the increased acreages to be allotted cotton farmers under the "65-40-50 provision" which has been passed by Congress. Under this provision Castro county stands to receive an increase of 15,000 to 20,000 acres to its original allotment of 35,592 acres.

The same county cotton committee that attended the Waco meeting, in addition to Allan Webb, newly elected committee member, attended the luncheon meeting in Amarillo with the state ASC committeeman, Fridley. They are Gene Ivey, Clint McFarland, P. P. Robb, "Posie" Cunningham and Allan Webb.

## Stalcup Addresses Dimmitt Lions

An interesting talk by Ray Stalcup on the history of our numbers and measurement system constituted the program at Tuesday's luncheon meeting of the Dimmitt Lions Club.

Lion Stalcup briefly traced the history of our numbers and measurement system from its origin to the present, pointing out that essentially all countries of the world have the same system but designations vary in some. He added that numbers and measurements were used long before the birth of Christ; that this was verified when the ancient city of Pompeii was uncovered. "The Hindus invented numbers and measurements and the Arabs devised the number system that we have today," Stalcup exclaimed.

## Hudson Reveals Fertilizer Plan

Castro County Agent Charlie Hudson this week announced a program of co-operation on a fertilizer demonstration between the Phillips Chemical Company, a subsidiary of the Phillips Petroleum Company, and the Extension Service.

Under the terms of the agreement the Phillips Company will make available 50 tons of ammonium sulphate as a relative new source of nitrogen material in the county. It is designed to encourage crop production through the use of fertilizers and improved farming methods.

Farmers participating in the program have agreed to submit soil samples for analysis and recommendations unless the information is already available. They agree to apply sound soil management practices and where reasonable and practical will use some of the material on tame pastures or some other crop being stressed by agricultural authorities.

For each ton purchased by the farmer the Phillips Company will place at his disposal an additional 500 pounds free.

County farmers participating in the program are John W. Jarrot, Abner Roberts, Allar Webb, Fred Bruegel, C. W. Anthony and Robert Duke.

### Farm Program

The President's farm message proposes a number of changes in the present program. Some of these changes, I believe, would result in less protection and less income for the farmer. I cannot support any proposals that would have such an effect.

The recent trend in the farm economy has been downward. It is the duty of Congress to take action designed to halt and reverse that trend. I do not believe a flexible price support system—even if it is called a "modernized" parity concept—is the answer.

### Livestock Industry

The President stated in his farm message that no new laws are needed to deal with problems of the livestock industry. He recommended that "existing conditions with respect to meat animals be continued."

I talked to hundreds of cattlemen between sessions of Congress. I certainly did not find them satisfied with "existing conditions." It is not their feeling that problems affecting the livestock industry are being dealt with adequately.

All the President's recommendations must be studied carefully. They must be changed when changes are necessary to maintain the protections Congress already has accorded to agriculture.

### Rural Telephones

Texas now has seven REA-financed rural telephone systems. Only Minnesota, with eight, has more.

More than half the States now have rural telephone facilities fin-

anced by REA. Telephone loans amounting to \$49,000,000 were approved last year. That was about \$6,000,000 less than the total approved in 1952.

### Oil Depletion

Texas Service Stations, Associated, is a trade association of service station operators with thousands of members in some 200 Texas cities and towns. The organization's board of directors sent me a copy of a resolution they recently passed, vigorously opposing any effort to repeal or reduce the oil depletion allowance.

I had the resolution placed in the Congressional Record. I know it will help to inform members

of Congress about this important matter.

Whittenberg of Amarillo was a welcome visitor. As usual, S. B. was boosting for the Panhandle. My good friend, Mrs. J. Howard Dodge of Midland, was in Washington last week to attend a planning conference for the White House Safety Conference to be held in February. Mrs. Dodge was one of six women from throughout the country invited by the President to come here for the planning conference. Frank McLain of Dallas has been selected to come to Washington and present to President Eisenhower the annual report of Boy Scout activities in Region 9, covering Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. I have invited Frank to come to see me when he is here next month. I hope he can.

**IT'S THE LAW**

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until

the contrary is clearly proved. Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property—cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate—is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and

father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and descendants, the full one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

# Award-winning 4-H Youth Tells of Chicago Experience

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Joe Nelson, Dimmitt 4-H Club member and one of the winners of the coveted Santa Fe Award in Texas, has written an account of his experiences while attending the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago; his reward as a contest winner. The account will be entered in the youth's 4-9 records and will count as a part of his 4-H work in future contests and activities. The News is happy to publish this interesting account; believing that it is representative of the fine 4-H work that has resulted in Castro county being recognized nationally in the 4-H field.)

THE TIME OF MY LIFE

My trip to the National 4-H Club Congress was nine days lived in a new world. I encountered some new experience every day. The day I left for Chicago I rode a train for the first time in my life. I didn't sleep too well that first night on the pullman

but afterward slept very well while riding the "iron horse." I arrived in Fort Worth, Texas, at six o'clock Friday morning, the 28th of November. I was met there by our State 4-H Club leader, Mrs. Floyd Lynch. The Texas delegation gathered at the Western Hills Hotel in Fort Worth for an orientation meeting where we were introduced to our chaperons and fellow delegates. At this meeting we were given instructions for the trip and we also saw a movie that showed us what to do with all the silverware that would be used at meals in Chicago. We also received a silver pin made in the outline of the map of Texas that is presented to all Texas 4-H'ers that make out of state trips. Immediately after our meeting we were given a luncheon by the Sears & Roebuck Foundation. We rode in taxis to the Conrad Hilton Hotel where we stayed during the 4-H Congress. It is the largest hotel in the world. We were free till that evening when we attended the WLS National Barn Dance. The thing that most of the 4-H'ers liked was that we got to see Homer and Jethro in person.

Later that evening we went to the Orchestra Hall where we heard the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. There was a 14 year old 4-H boy and a 17 year old 4-H girl that played solos with the orchestra. It was a very good program. It was sponsored by the Ford Motor Company. The next morning we attended the Central Church in the Grand Ballroom at which time Mrs. Charles R. Walgreen was the main speaker. She showed some colored slides of her tour to the Southern Pacific Islands. That night we attended the Sunday evening Club in the Orchestra Hall where we had a very inspirational service.

The next day, Monday, was one of our busiest days. In the morning we were given a breakfast and excellent entertainment by the Firestone Rubber Company. After breakfast we boarded buses and went to Eitel's Palace Theater for the world Premier of Cinerama. This was a new experience to just about every delegate to the Congress. After this we saw the dress revue of dress revue winners from every state in the union.

After the general assembly, all the boys went to the Morrison Hotel where the National Livestock Producers Association gave us a luncheon and some good entertainment. Following the luncheon we made an afternoon trip to the Museum of Natural History.

Dinner in the French Room of the Blackstone Hotel, courtesy of the Santa Fe Railway Company was next on the agenda. This was the company that sponsored my trip to the National 4-H Club Congress.

Later that night we went to the Union Ballroom for the Friendship Party sponsored by Spool Cotton Company.

Wednesday morning the Sears & Roebuck Foundation gave all the delegates a breakfast. Immediately after breakfast we went to the Exhibition Hall for a general assembly. Dr. Grace Sloan Overton was the main speaker. She spoke on "Growing Up to Modern Family Responsibility."

We had a luncheon that day through the courtesy of the Ford Motor Company.

That afternoon we went to the International Livestock Exposition where we saw a horse show in the arena. Following the horse show the Curtiss Candy Company gave us a box supper. After the supper we visited all the exhibits and that night all the 4-H delegates paraded into the International Arena.

Party in the Exhibition Hall of the Conrad Hilton.

The next morning we left the Windy City and the most exciting week of my life. The Congress was truly the time of my life.
