

Precinct 2 Road Bond Election Sat. Favors Issue

Unofficial returns from the voting in Saturday's road bond election in Precinct 2 revealed that the issue carried by a vote of 137 for to 56 against. The light vote was attributed to the fact that wheat harvest was in full swing, and many voters were too busy to go to the polls. The \$200,000 bond issue, approved by the voters Saturday, will be used for the paving of in Precinct 2. that portion of the 25 Mile Avenue. The vote by boxes in Saturday's election was as follows: Bethel—12 for 3 against Big Square—46 for 3 against Flagg—43 for 21 against Dimmitt—36 for 29 against. According to the unofficial returns the issue received eight and one-third votes above the necessary two-thirds majority. The Commissioners Court will meet Friday to make the official canvass of the election, and to make other necessary arrangements for the road improvement program.

SELL THE CULLS AND ROOSTERS

Buyers of eggs in Texas are reporting considerable losses from fertile eggs. Naturally this loss definitely affects the egg producer, the egg buyer and reduces the volume of eggs that could be dried and sent to the needy in Europe.

A part of this loss is in Castro county according to R. L. King, County Agent. The condition can be corrected but it must have the full cooperation of everyone concerned. Hatching season is over and every cockerel should be sold or eaten at home.

"Fertile eggs will spoil quickly," County Agent King states, and a spoiled egg is a waste. Three reasons for selling off your roosters now are (1) Farmer and egg producers can put a better grade of egg on the market that will keep longer; (2) After hatching season is over, the rooster is a loafer and will eat valuable feed that may be fed to hens for production.

(3) Selling off roosters will put more needed meat into circulation.

All hens that are not laying now that are culls should also be sold as feed is high and scarce and no hen should be kept that are not laying.

Information on culling may be obtained at County Agents office. Griffith Produce and Tates Produce will pay two cents (2c) premium above market price for roosters and cull hens Monday and Tuesday, July 1 and 2 only. All farmers are urged to cull their flocks and remove all roosters these two days and take advantage of the extra premium.

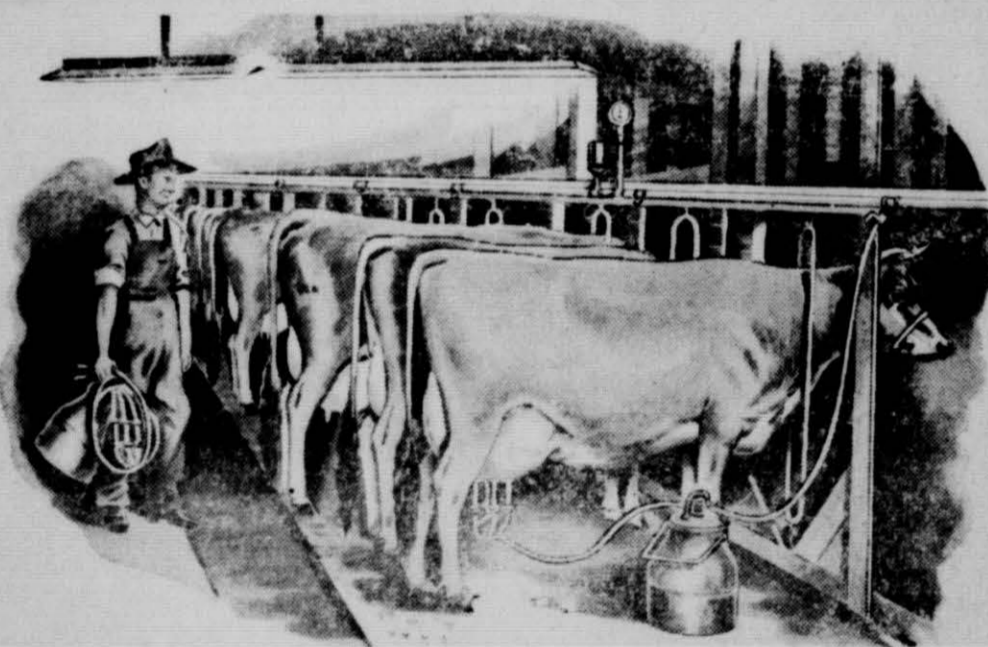

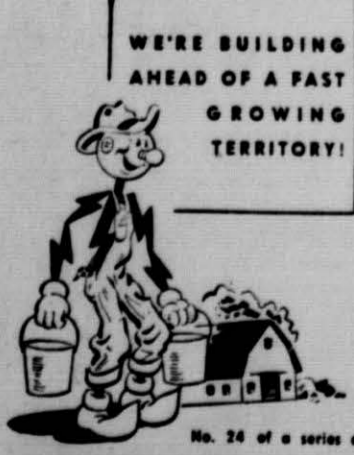
