

# Sore Necks and Frazzled Nerves Only Local Damage Following Alert

Many Dimmitt residents stood like prairie dogs near their storm-cellars Friday afternoon while others jumped into their cars and streamed westward. Reason for the panic: a three-colored tornado cloud was rumbling toward Dimmitt and tornado warnings had been issued for this area.

Eight thousand eyes strained through low white clouds to search the yellow and black mass for a telltale funnel. To the west was a clear, blue sky. Overhead were fleecy, white cumulus clouds. But to the south the blackness of the turbulent cloud was broken only by angry bursts of violent lightning.

After nearly an hour of tense waiting, however, the US Weather Bureau's radar confirmed what Castro Countians wanted to believe: the cloud was veering eastward. It would miss Dimmitt, the weather bureau reported, but Hart people should continue to watch it.

Parents streamed into local schools, where their children had been crowded into the hallways. According to several Dimmitt teachers, parents caused more confusion than did the children. Traffic was snarled in school areas for almost an hour.

Many "panic" incidents can become humorous during the calm relief after danger is past. Thus it was here. For instance: One man reportedly packed a suitcase hurriedly with various articles of clothing, ran to the storm cellar, then had to go back to his house for his wife and child.

A woman lay on a bed after the tornado warning was lifted, and was beginning to fall asleep when a jet plane passed very low overhead, causing a whistling roar. The lady was in her front yard, barefooted and shaking, when she fully awakened.

One family had to choose between driving from a tornado or fighting a snake in their storm cellar. They chose the car because they could at least see the tornado—they couldn't see the snake. Tuesday morning, three days after the initial warning, local people began looking anew at dark rain clouds forming overhead. About mid-morning, another jet plane put in a low-flying appearance, causing a rumble not unlike that of a tornado. Within 30 seconds, the following scenes occurred:

A man was about to enter a Dimmitt grocery store. When he heard the rumble, he missed the door and ran into the adjoining window.

A checking clerk in the same store was sacking a half-gallon bottle of milk when the jet flew over. He caught himself just in time, while a lady near the counter almost lost her entire sackful of groceries.

Shortly after the scare, a lady who was drinking coffee at a local drug store remarked that St. Peter's whiskers had grown some since she had seen him the last time.

And all over the county, neighbors began storm-cellar digging projects. After the tornado which hit Silverton two weeks ago, and the tornado which came down upon Olton from Friday's cloud, nobody wanted to take a chance.

Members of the IPHA will meet with the commission May 31 at 11 a.m. to seek state designation of a new number for Highway 51, which extends from the Big Bend National Park to the Oklahoma Panhandle.

Harley Rhoades of Burlington, Colorado, secured the hearing on a recent trip to Austin, where they talked with members of the highway commission. This hearing will represent one of the integral stages in the proposed route's 20-year promotion campaign.

The hearing came as a result of a May 13 meeting of Castro County officials with Singer, Rhoades, and IPHA vice-president Glenn Youts. At this meeting, Singer and Rhoades were instructed to petition the state agency for a hearing.

The group also decided to request commissioners in all counties along the route to be present at the hearing.

After the IPHA-Highway Commission meeting in Austin, Singer said, a general meeting of IPHA boosters will be held in Alliance, Neb., June 7, 8, and 9. IPHA officials chose Alliance as the meeting site, Singer explained, because of its proximity to the Black Hills and Mount Rushmore National Park. Those attending the meeting will be able to see two of the more popular vacation areas along the route.

Texas members will report on the State Highway Commission's decision at the Alliance meeting, Singer explained, and further plans will be made to promote the campaign in other states.

The new number to be requested is 851. No state or federal highway is numbered 851 at present; the IPHA hopes to secure the number in all the states from the Big Bend to Saskatchewan, Canada.

If the Texas Highway Commission okays the renumbering of Highway 51, Singer said, it could provide incentive for commissions in Oklahoma, Colorado, Nebraska, South Dakota, and North Dakota to allow renumbering of the entire International Parks route.

Once all the state commissions agree to the designation, it will give the route a common number from Texas to Canada. Singer said. Many state commissions have already approved the renumbering plan, he reported. Ideally, if all state commissions are cooperative to the plan, then the route can become Highway 851—the International Parks Highway—and a complete advertising campaign will be made possible.

Through advertising the route, Singer predicted, more tourist traffic can be drawn to the highway and will benefit all cities and states along the route.

Current advertising plan is to use billboard advertising all along the International Parks Highway, with North Dakota advertising the Colorado foothills, Nebraska advertising the Big Bend of Texas, and so forth. By this means, Singer said, the association could hope to keep traffic on the route from one state to another.

The entire project is voluntary; no state or federal aid will be requested to promote the route. Advertising will be paid for through membership dues in all cities along the route.

Another phase of the advertising campaign will be to give tourists on the route pamphlets and literature about scenic points along the route, while at the same time providing tourists with names of member businesses along the route. Participating members will be pledged to offer extended service, such as check-cashing, to tourists who present membership cards.

The International Parks Highway Association was initiated in Dimmitt in 1937 when Singer met with Littlefield officials to try to secure a highway across the sandhills between the two cities.

When the highway became a reality, a meeting was called in Dimmitt to form the Highway 51 Association, purpose of which was to seek additional paving of the highway a market route in Texas.

As Highway 51 grew to be an all-paved route from the Big Bend through the Panhandle, Singer called a meeting to organize an association which would promote the route through several southwestern states. This organization was named the International Parks Highway Association.

Singer's main purpose in working on the project has been to obtain more tourist traffic and better highways through Dimmitt. With civic-minded men in other cities and states working toward a similar purpose, he proposed, all cities, counties, and states could benefit from the traffic on the route.

The Greer H. Estes American Legion Post of Dimmitt Friday presented awards to two seniors and two eighth-graders of Dimmitt High School.

The American Legion Award for students is presented annually to one boy and one girl of the graduating class, and to a boy and girl who will enter high school the following school year.

This year's awards went to seniors Gene Goodwin and Beverly Mills, and to eighth-graders Stanley Nelson and Mary Helen Behrens. Jack Flynn, local commander, made the presentations.

The awards include a paperweight, a pin, and an engraved certificate. They are awarded for courage, leadership, honor, service, and scholarship.

## Mr. T. A. Singer, City Developer Died Tuesday

T. A. Singer, 67, well-known civic worker and owner of the West Texas Telephone Company, died of a recurring coronary occlusion at 6:25 p.m. Tuesday in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. He had been a resident of Dimmitt 28 years.

Mr. Singer had suffered a similar heart attack in 1953. The second attack occurred at midnight Monday.

Funeral services were conducted Thursday at 3 p.m. in the First Baptist Church. Officiating at the services were Rev. George Ray, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and Rev. Earl R. Landroop of Clovis, former pastor.

Burial was in the Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of the Dennis Funeral Home of Dimmitt.

Mr. Singer would have left Thursday to attend a hearing of the International Parks Highway Association before the Texas Highway Commission. The hearing represents one of the integral stages of a program he initiated 30 years ago. (See story, this page.)

Mr. Singer was primarily responsible for securing Highway 194 from Plainview to Dimmitt, and was the formulator of the Highway 51 Association. He had just begun a promotional campaign for Highway 86 as a route from Arkansas to California and had helped form the Ozark Trail Highway Association.

Except during the gas-ration years of World War II, Mr. Singer drove an estimated 50,000 miles a year to promote Dimmitt's progress. He returned last week from a trip to Austin and was scheduled to make another trip to Austin and one to Alliance, Neb., within the next two weeks.

Mr. Singer, a 32nd Degree Mason, was a charter member of the Amarillo chapter of Shriners, a charter member of the Dimmitt Lions Club and Castro County Chamber of Commerce, a county director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, honorary lifetime secretary of the International Parks Highway Association, and held many civic offices during his career.

## Work Begins On New Building For Vegetable Plant

Dimmitt Produce Company made another step this week toward a vegetable plant when Mr. Tom Davis, contractor, began work on the all-steel building which will house the processing facilities operated by the Pacific Fruit and Produce Company.

Overall dimensions of the new building will be 60 x 160 feet. When completed, the steel work will cost an estimated \$9,500. It will be located just east of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway tracks near the Cash Way Food Store.

The Company plans to install vegetable processing equipment as soon as the building is completed about July 1. According to board of directors president B. M. Nelson, operation of the plant is expected to begin about the middle of July if all goes according to plan.

The entire floor of the building will be constructed at dock level about 45 inches above the ground. It will be made of cement and will taper from both sides to the center for sanitary purposes. The loading dock on the railroad side of the building will be 10 x 180 feet. Work on this part of the plant is expected to begin early next week.

Directors of the Dimmitt Produce Company are in the process of locating and securing some of the equipment to be used in the plant. The meeting will be to complete details of the financial structure of the organization. All stock-buyers are urged to be present at this meeting.

## Don Ira Page, 18, Accident Victim, Buried Saturday

Funeral services were conducted Saturday at 3 p.m. in the Dimmitt Church of Christ for Don Ira Page, 18, adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Page of Dimmitt.

Page died at 8:30 a.m. Friday when the car he was driving went out of control and overturned 4 1/2 miles south of Dimmitt on Highway 51. A farm laborer who witnessed the accident told the Castro County Sheriff's Department that a blow-out preceded the wreck.

Another Dimmitt youth, Jerry Andrews, 17, was in the car with Page. Andrews received severe lacerations, abrasions, and contusions of the face, head, arms and shoulders. He was released from Castro County Hospital Tuesday morning.

The examining physician said Page died instantly of brain concussion.

Page had just completed his junior year in Dimmitt High School. He had spent Thursday night with Andrews; the two boys planned to spend Friday in Palo Duro State Park near Canyon.

Page was a popular student in Dimmitt High School and was well-known in Dimmitt. He had worked after school hours at Gladman Drug in Dimmitt for more than a year, and this year was voted "Most Valuable Boy" in the DHS junior class.

He was a member of the DHS Capella Choir and the junior play cast. Because of an enlarged heart, he was forced to limit his activities.

Don Ira Page was born April 3, 1939, in Ocala, Fla. He was adopted at the age of 9 by Mr. and Mrs. Ira Page, and was baptized into the Church of Christ at the age of 11. He moved with his family from Hereford to Dimmitt three years ago.

Conducting the funeral services were D. C. Lawrence, minister of the Dimmitt Church of Christ, and Bob Wear, minister of the Canyon Church of Christ. Mr. Wear had baptized Page into the church.

The Dimmitt High School Capella Choir, of which Page had been a member, sang "My God and I," "The Lord Bless You and Keep You," and "There Is a Place of Refuge."

Pallbearers included his dramatics teacher, James W. "Rosy" Bates, and classmates Jimmy Tate, Truman Touchstone, Cary Johnson, Coyce Wilkinson, Don Robb, Jerry Cluck, and Zay Gilbreath.

Flower girls were Ann Smith, Joy Walker, Charlotte McElroy, Donna Woodbell, Ormeta Bradley, Ann Gollehon, Jonny Aldredge, Evelyn Cummins, and Hazel Rogers.

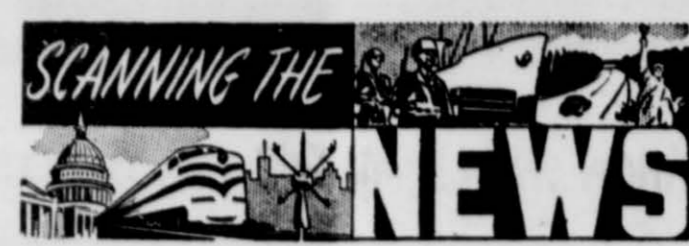

FARMERS over the nation are today either doing their spring plowing or preparing to do it, according to the weather... and faced with this outlook—that is, they put in their 1957 crop. Their costs of operation are 5% above a year ago and the parity price ratio is at the lowest point since the 1930s. The farmer knows before he puts a seed in the ground, that he will either go broke, or depend on a soil bank subsidy to bail him out. In the meantime farm prices dropped another 2 points in February, and his production of food prices at the retail level are at the highest of record, with supplies tonnage reaching new records. The cost of living index, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, also reached a new high at the close of February. And the inflation spiral continues, with wage or salary raises going into effect one day, prices going up the second day, so that by the third day the price-cost spiral is just up another notch. This cost spiral is affecting Government as well as private enterprise and private individuals. Estimates made for government expenditures on various projects, particularly involving construction, are increasing so fast that few firm commitments are being made far in advance. These cost increases range from 10 up to as high as 40%. The interest rate barometer is also still rising. While the Congress has refused to raise the interest rate on welfare housing, the farmer is again held hit for the Federal Land Bank, which has been charging 4% on farm loans from 1953 to 1957.

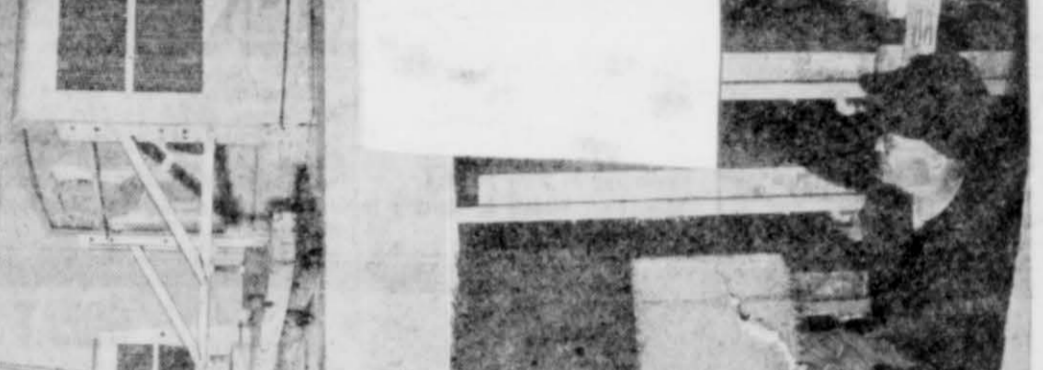

Heat and circulation is controlled by units attached to sides of incubator building. These units have whirled the mold problem which plagued the earlier models of the machine.

The JayCee-Ettes Tuesday night set the time for free chest X-rays and elected Mrs. Mary Lou Smith representative to the county mass-meeting for encephalitis control.

June 26 and 27 are the two days that the chest X-ray unit, sponsored by the JayCee-Ettes with the cooperation of the State Department of Health, will be located at C&S Equipment Company. On the 26th the free X-rays will be given from 1 p.m. until 5:30 p.m. and on the 27th from 8:30 a.m. until 1 p.m.

While the main purpose of free chest X-rays is to find signs of

tuberculosis, technicians also look for signs of lung cancer and heart disease.

State law doesn't allow X-rays for children 15 and under because TB incidence rates are lower among children than adults and state funds would not allow the X-raying of all children in the state.

A person with tuberculosis is endangering not only himself, but all those with whom he comes in contact. The disease can be contracted only from a person who has it, and can be passed from person to person until it endangers the entire community.
