DHS to graduate 90 Friday

Ninety Dimmitt High School seniors will walk across the stage in the Dimmitt High School Auditorium and accept their high school diplomas Friday night.

The 1991 commencement ceremonies are slated to begin at 8 p.m.

Royce Schulte will present the colors and Dwight Joiner and the Methodist Bell Choir under the direction of Jane O'Kelly, will perform the processional.

Sharla Jackson will give the invocation. Ryan Hardee will give the salutatory address, followed by the valedictory address, which will be delivered by his twin sister, Michelle Hardee.

Dimmitt Supt. Robert Ryan will introduce the commencement speaker, Katie Ivey. Then Nicole Klemm, accompanied by Marcia Hoelting, both of Nazareth, will perform the class song, *Show Me the Way*.

After the entertainment, Ryan will present the class for graduation and David Schaeffer, president of the school board, will present the diplomas to seniors.

Shawn Thomas will deliver the benediction and Joiner will perform the recessional.

DHS Valedictorian and Salutatorian

It's all in the family

The valedictorian and salutatorian of Dimmitt High School's Class of 1991 have a lot in common.

They were both reading complicated books in the second grade. They both were in every honors class they could take. They were on the same *Odyssey of the Mind* team

that qualified for World one year. Each gets a lot of encouragement at home—especially from each other.

That's because they're twins.

Michelle Hardee edged out her twin brother, Ryan, to take the valedictory honors of the DHS Class of 1991 with a 97.68 average. Ryan claimed the salutatorian honors with a 96.92 average.

The two are the children of Dr. Gary R. and Cenci Hardee.

It's not a proven fact because school officials say their records only go back to 1961, but having twins earn Dimmitt High School's valedictorian and salutatorian honors is probably a first.

The twins' parents say there is a lot of competition between the two in certain areas, but it's a healthy competition and the support they have for each other is wonderful.

Ryan demonstrated that when he talked about how it felt to be salutatorian to his sister's valedictory honor.

"It's pretty special, because I haven't heard of this happening before. I'm very proud of my sister. She really deserves a lot of credit for her success," Ryan said, adding jokingly that "she probably wouldn't have done it if I wouldn't have been right there behind her, pushing her along."

Michelle said that after she was valedictorian of her eighth grade class, she secretly hoped to become high school valedictorian, and now that her dream has become a reality, she's "glad." And her success is

even more special when her twin brother can share the joy with her as the second-best student in the Class of 1991.

"Through the years, we just thought it would be neat if we could finish as one and two in the class — maybe even be co-valedictorians — but we doubted that it would happen. I think it's extra special because we both achieved success."

The twins parents couldn't be prouder of their children.

"It's a once in a lifetime deal and it's something we never could have expected or planned for," said Gary.

"We're very proud of them and we're proud for them," Cenci added. "They are twins and they've become best friends through the years."

Michelle and Ryan attribute a lot of their academic success to their parents.

Ryan said his parents were like teachers away from school.

"We weren't just another face in the class to them. They usually knew what our reactions would be and they could help guide us in the right directions."

"They're the ones that were always there pushing us saying, 'If a C is all you are capable of getting, that's fine, but we expect you to do more,'" Michelle said. "They understand what we are studying and they are smart enough that they can answer our questions if we need

Two teenagers are charged in Friday shooting

Two Dimmitt men, ages 19 and 17, have been charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in connection with a shooting and stabbing incident reported to police around 11:59 p.m. Friday. The suspects were expected to be arraigned sometime Wednesday, when bond would be set. One of the suspects is on probation from misdemeanor charges of DWI.

The victim in the incident, Antonio Barrera, 22, of Dimmitt, has been released from Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where he had been transferred after being taken to Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt.

Police said the victim suffered a bullet wound through the left thigh and stab wounds on the back and neck. Police reports state that the victim identified his alleged attackers, and their identities were confirmed by other witnesses.

The victim's wife told officers that she heard two gunshots outside her residence on Northeast Seventh Street in Dimmitt and looked out to see the suspects fighting with her husband. She said she called out to her husband to see what was going on, at which time the suspects reportedly backed off, allowing the victim to come into the house. She told officers her husband was bleeding and was taken to the hospital by his sister and brother-in-law.

The weapons used in the attack have not been recovered, according to Dimmitt Police Chief Gary Thurman. Thurman said the gun used was reportedly a bolt-action .22 rifle, and the knife was described by witnesses as having a long silver blade and a black handle.

The case will be brought before the next session of the grand jury.

Nazareth Country Rodeo set Friday through Sunday

Cowboys will battle broncs, bulls and more at the 15th annual Nazareth Country Rodeo and Wild West Show Friday, Saturday and Sunday at Marvin Schulte's Arena, five miles east of Nazareth on Highway 86.

Proceeds from the annual event will go to benefit the Nazareth Fire Department and tickets may be purchased at the gate. Admission prices are \$5 for adults; \$2 for students 12 years and up; and free for children under 12.

The rodeo performances are scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday and Sunday's performance will be a matinee at 3 p.m.

The rodeo is sanctioned by the Texas Cowboys Rodeo Association and trophy buckles will be awarded

in all events.

Rodeo events include bareback riding, saddle bronc, bull riding, bull dogging, girls' break-a-way roping, calf roping, barrel racing, team roping, and single steer roping. Wild west events include the wild horse race, wild cow milking, Saturday night bath race, kids' calf scramble and kids' steer riding.

Bucking stock will be furnished by Maverick Rodeo Co. of Tulia and the timed event stock will be furnished by Nazareth Country Rodeo.

A rodeo dance will be held Friday and Saturday nights from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. at the Nazareth Community Hall. Music will be provided by the Nazareth Rough Riders Band.

City-wide garage sale sign-up deadline nears

Monday is the deadline to sign up for inclusion in the official listing for Dimmitt's annual City-Wide Garage Sale scheduled for June 8.

The fee per listing is \$10. Besides being included on the official sale list, the fee payer will also receive a yard sign. The annual event is sponsored by the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce.

Booths on the courthouse square will be rented for \$15 for private individuals, and \$50 for commercial ventures that are not members of the local chamber.

Chamber executive director Delores Heller said the sale maps with listings will also have room for business-card-size advertisements, which will sell for \$20 each.

The 103 separate sales listed last year generated an estimated \$27,000 in revenue.

Heller said the chamber will operate a sidewalk sale of donated items, but added that no auction is planned.

Also, at 8:30 p.m. on June 8, the Country Caravan from South Plains College in Levelland will be performing. Prior to the performance, a drawing will be held to determine the winner of a blue topaz ring being raffled off by the chamber.

First Baptist Church will hold centennial celebration June 8-9

The First Baptist Church of Dimmitt will celebrate its 100th birthday June 8 with a fellowship supper and program in the church's fellowship hall, and the party will continue June 9, with a worship service.

The church's Centennial Committee also hopes to have a 10:30 a.m. worship service Sunday, June 9. Frank Pollard of Jackson, Miss., who was pastor of the local church from 1964 to 1967, will be the speaker.

Following the morning service, a catered lunch will be served in the Expo Building, followed by a historical program in the afternoon at the same location.

Cattle Call of Amarillo will cater the June 9 lunch and tickets for the meal must be purchased in advance, no later than June 5. Tickets will be \$5 for adults and \$4 for children. For tickets, go by the church's office.

There will be no evening services Sunday, June 9.

The church is hoping for former members to come from far and near to join present members in the special centennial celebration.

The Dimmitt First Baptist Church was chartered on June 7, 1891 and was the first chartered entity in the county—older than the city or county government.

In May 1897, the church petitioned for membership in the Llano Estacado Baptist Association. Later on, in 1908, they joined with the new Tierra Blanco Association and in 1961, as associational boundaries were reset, the church began to cooperate with the Llanos Altos Association.

Baptist Women's Work started in 1909, stating as their purpose Bible study and collecting funds for a church building. In 1921, they officially organized as Women's Missionary Society.

On Sept. 9, 1928, 78 people met to organize a Baptist Sunday School and become a full-time church.

The church was first housed in an old store building. Around the turn of the century, worship services were held in the first red brick school building located where our city park is now located.

In March 1929 ground was broken at 503 W. Bedford for a new church building and it was completed in 1930. A new auditorium was added in 1949 and a new educational unit was built in 1955. These facilities were used until November 1970, and then in 1971 they were old. The two east buildings were torn down and the west building is used by the City of Dimmitt as a fire station today.

On Oct. 2, 1966, the church voted to build new facilities on a 10-acre site located at 1201 Western Circle Drive and that is where the church is located today.

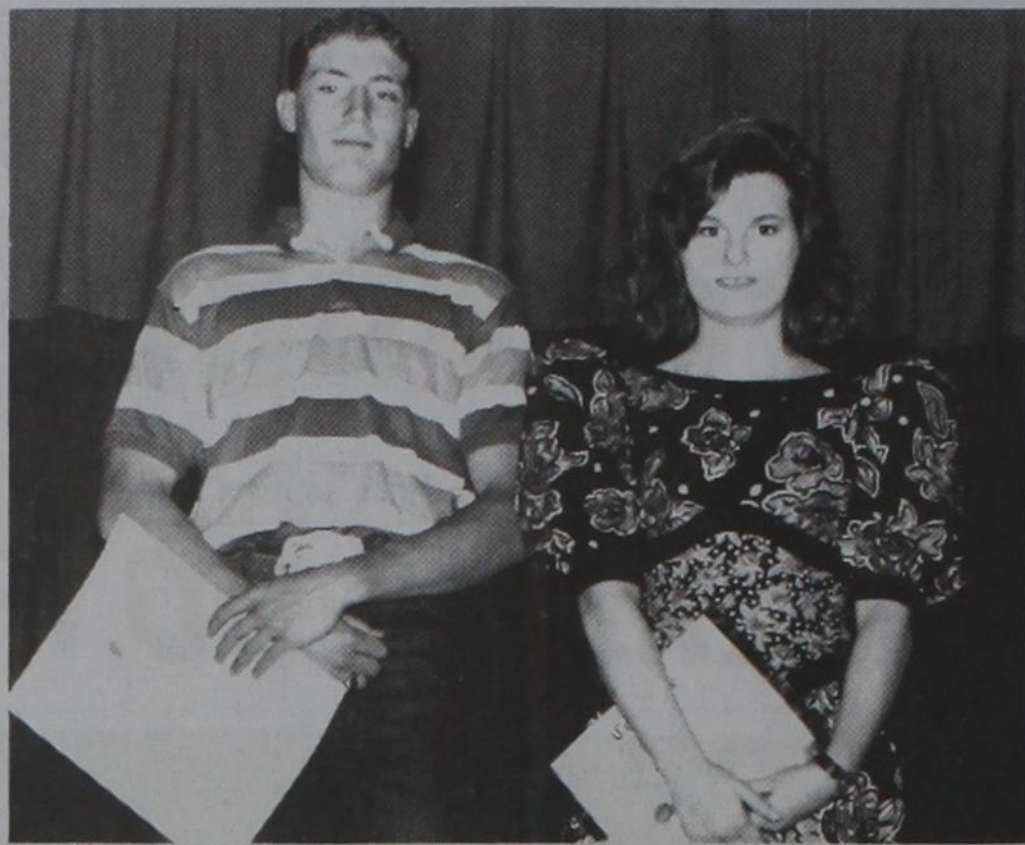

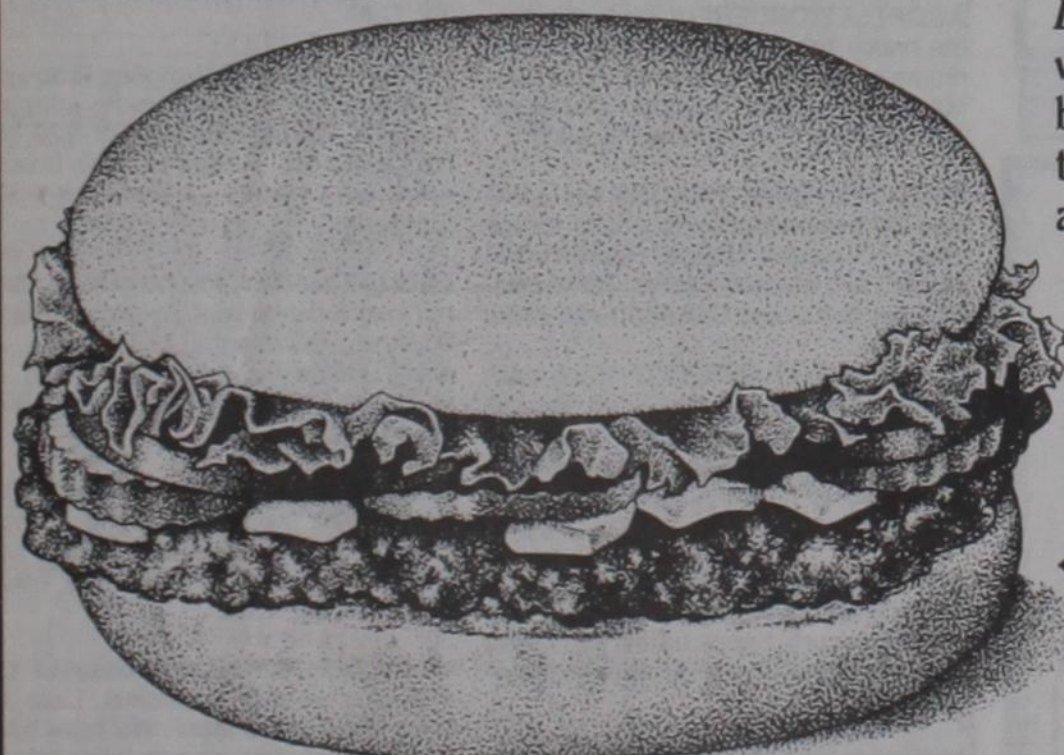

AN ORDINANCE DECLARING THE SALE OF FIREWORKS WITHIN FIVE THOUSAND FEET (5,000') OF THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS A NUISANCE; PROHIBITING THE SALE OF FIREWORKS WITHIN FIVE THOUSAND FEET (5,000') OF THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Dimmitt, Texas has determined that the sale of fireworks within five thousand feet (5,000') of the city limits of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, is a nuisance and is a hazard to the citizens of the City

of Dimmitt, Texas; now, therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: The sale of any squib, rocket, cracker, torpedo, grenade, cap, cartridge or other combustible fireworks of any kind within five thousand feet (5,000') of the city limits of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, is hereby declared to be a nuisance and a hazard to the citizens of the City of Dimmitt, Texas.

SECTION 2: Section 8-31, Subsection (b) of the Dimmitt City Code, 1977, is hereby amended and shall hereforth read as follows:

(b) No person shall exhibit, or have in his possession with intent to give away or sell, or offer for sale within the City of within five thousand feet (5,000') of the city limits any squib, rocket, cracker, torpedo, grenade, cap, cartridge, or other combustible fireworks of any kind.

SECTION 3: Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed quality of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in the amount not to exceed TWO HUNDRED AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$200.00). Each day such a violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such.

SECTION 4: The City Clerk of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, is hereby directed to have this Ordinance published in the local newspaper for two (2) consecutive weeks informing the general public of its nature and penalty. After such publication, this Ordinance shall become effective as of the date of the second publication, as required by law.

SECTION 5: The invalidity of any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, word or words shall not invalidate any other part of this Ordinance. It is the intent of the City Council of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, in enacting this Ordinance, that the provisions are separable, and that no provision hereof shall become inoperable or fail by reason of the invalidity of any other provision.

Photos may be turned in to the Chamber of Commerce office in Dimmitt, Ginger's Photography in Hart or the Post Office in Nazareth.

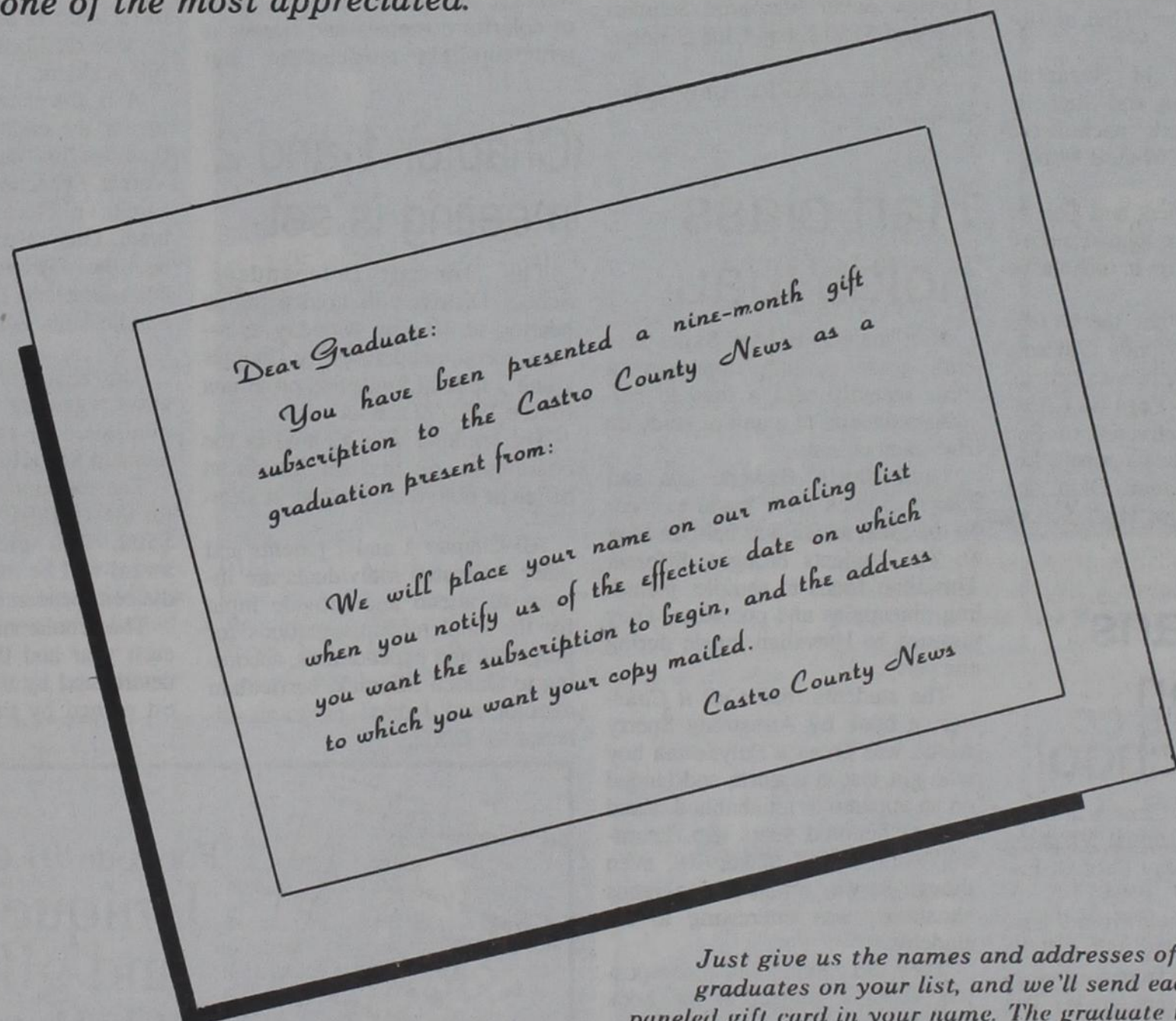
All photos submitted will be turned over to outside judges, who will select those to be used.

Ralph Glenn Smith of Dimmitt has been selected for induction into the Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame.

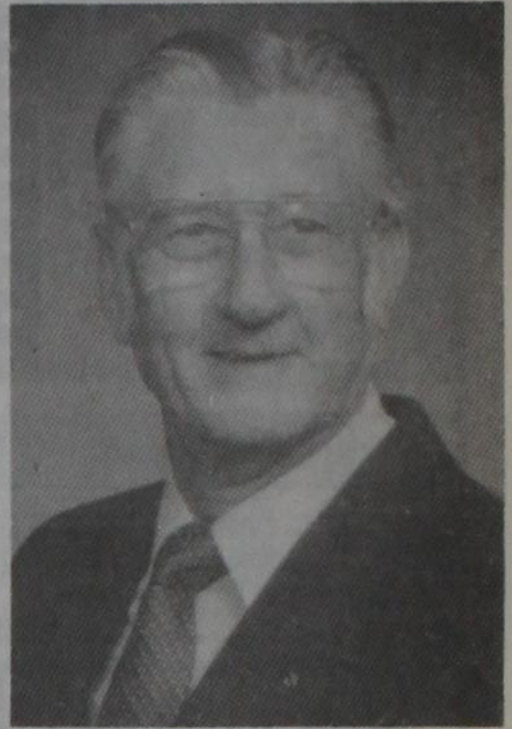
A ceremony honoring inductees will be held July 29 from 3:30 to 6 p.m. in San Antonio at the Marriott Riverwalk Hotel.

The Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame was established by the Phi Beta Mu fraternity to recognize and honor the outstanding band directors in Texas who are responsible for the progress and musical development of the band program in Texas.

Qualifications for selection include: must be known for outstanding ability and accomplishments as a band director; and must be at least 65 years of age or deceased.

Smith was director of the Dimmitt High School Band for 31 years, retiring in 1983. He was named Texas Bandmaster of the Year in 1979, and served in every office of the Texas Bandmasters Association on the state level, including president in 1969. He was president of Phi Beta Mu and also served on its national board.

During Smith's years at Dimmitt, the band garnered 28 sweepstakes trophies, and won many festival and other awards. The band was selected to appear on national

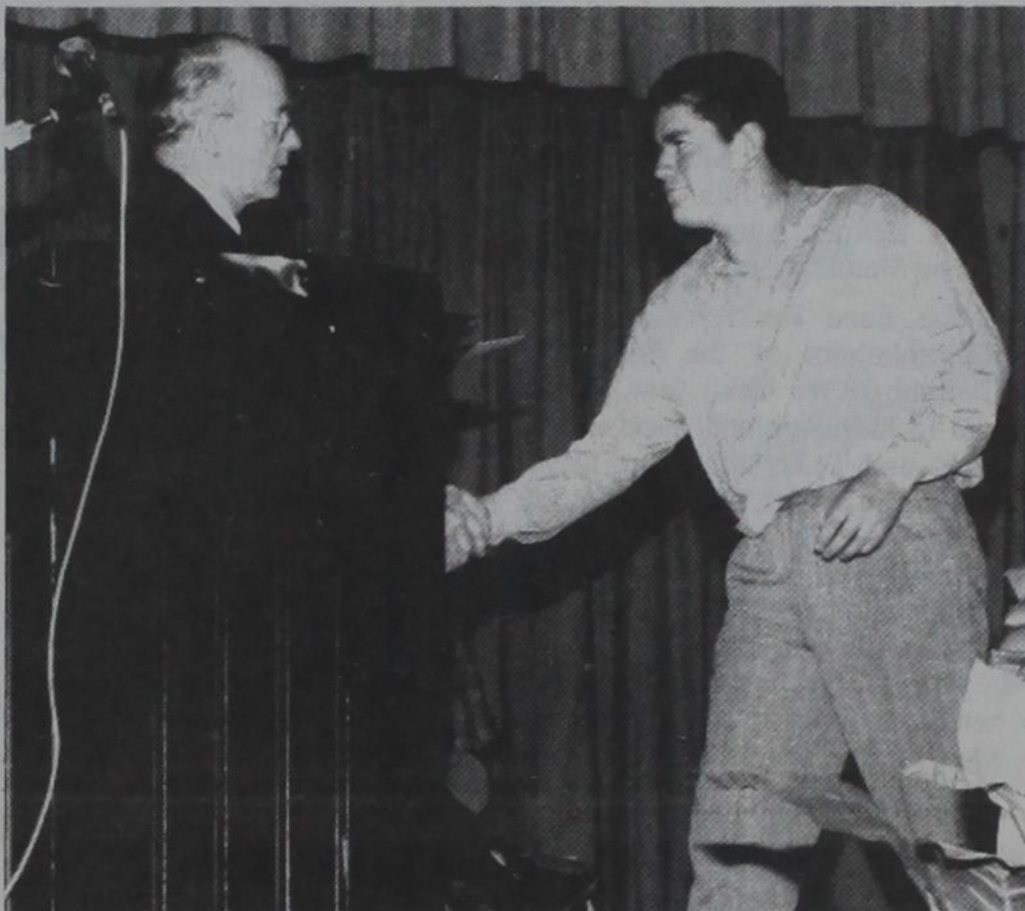

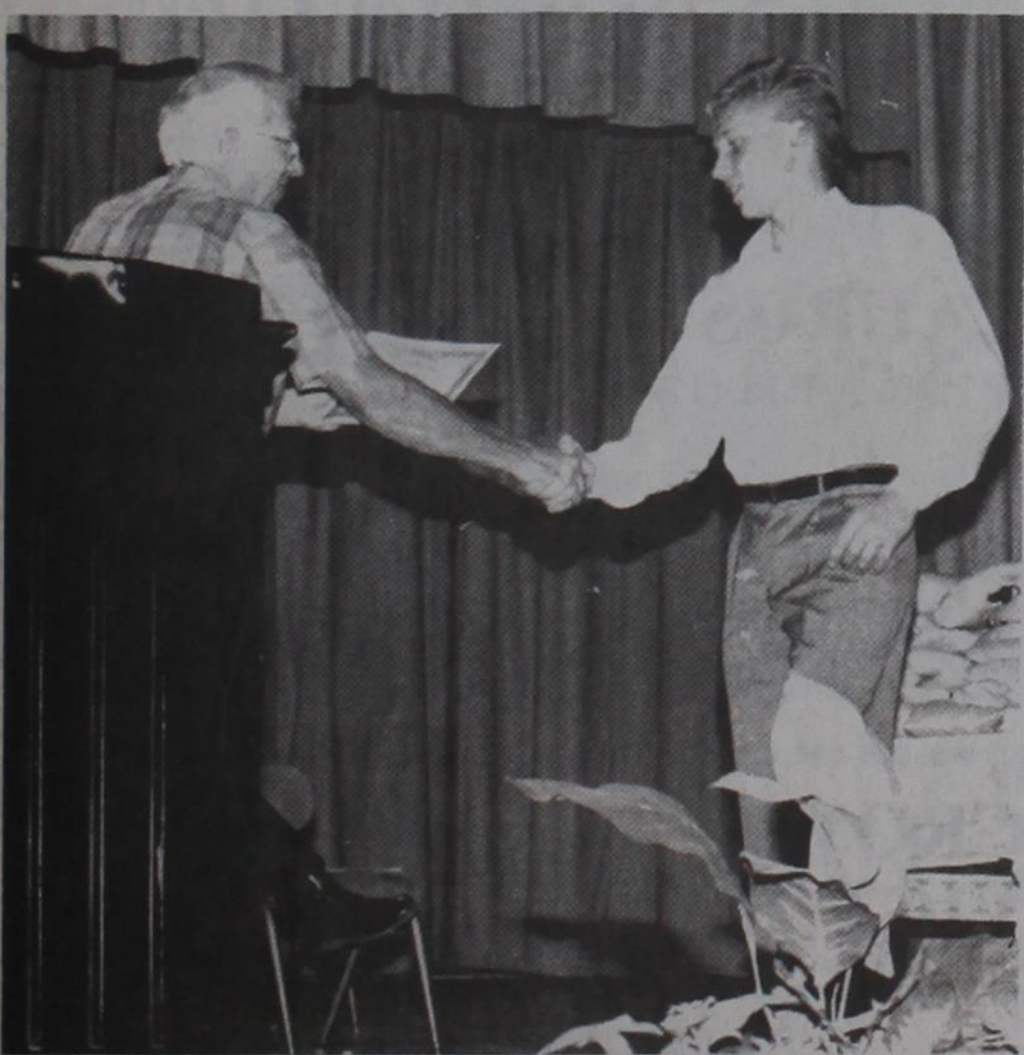

help on something. Mom's good in math and Dad's good in English so we have Dad read our papers and Mom helps us with math."

"That might have been in junior high," Cenci said. "We helped them very little in high school."

"They realize that education is very important," she said.

Survey finds tailwater, playas in area

Castro County ranks near the top in the number of tailwater return pits and modified playa basins used to capture irrigation tailwater and rainfall runoff for reuse within the 5.5 million-acre High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area.

The recent district inventory found approximately 1,444 tailwater return pits and 1,289 modified playa basins in the area.

Deaf Smith County leads the Water District with 451 tailwater return pits, followed by Parmer County with 338 and Castro County with 309.

There are approximately 300 modified playa basins in Floyd County. Castro County follows with 263 modified playas and Parmer County is next with 186.

Excess irrigation water, or "tailwater," running off the end of a field has been a serious concern of High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 since its creation in 1951. The primary cause of tailwater were furrow runs in excess of about one-half mile which required large flow rates to literally "push" the water through the furrows.

In the mid-1960s, the Water

District constructed v-notch weirs and placed them in county bar ditches to measure actual tailwater losses. Flood gauges installed in front of the weirs measured the height of the water flowing through the weir. Signs showing the conversion of the inches of water passing through the weirs into gallons per minute were placed beside each installation.

The district's study concluded that as much as 20% of the volume of water pumped by an irrigator could be lost as irrigation tailwater. In addition, it was discovered that tailwater waste encouraged soil erosion.

Since then, the district has actively promoted the use of tailwater

return systems to stop accumulation of silt in bar ditches, flooding of county roads, damage to neighboring fields and to conserve precious groundwater resources.

The water district designed and constructed several tailwater return demonstration systems in the 1960s. Public tours of these demonstration systems was one method

used by the district to promote the adoption of this water conservation technique. The positive results obtained from these first tailwater return pit installations convinced many irrigators to install and use tailwater return systems on their farms.

Throughout the years, these tailwater recovery systems have proven to be of great benefits to many High Plains producers. The collection and use of irrigation tailwater reduced the quality of water to be pumped from the Ogallala Aquifer, which ultimately reduced pumping costs and helped conserve groundwater.

"Shorter row lengths, changes in irrigation application times, use of earthen borders and improvements in irrigation technology, such as surge valves, have significantly reduced irrigation tailwater waste. However, it was the adoption of the tailwater return pit and modified playa basins, which allowed irrigators to manage their tailwater for the first time. We commend our area irrigators for implementing

this water conservation practice," said A. Wayne Wyatt, High Plains Water District manager.

Wyatt also noted that many tailwater return systems were not included in the district's recent survey.

"The tailwater return systems that were not counted are located on farms where center pivot sprinkler systems have been installed. These return systems have served their initial purpose of recovering irrigation tailwater. Now that the more water-efficient center pivot sprinklers have been installed, these abandoned tailwater return pits are now being used to provide shelter and a source of water for wildlife," he said.

Cotton Talks

Planting is progressing at a fairly steady, albeit slower than usual, pace on the High Plains. Overall dry conditions continue to restrict the number of dryland cotton acres that are able to be planted.

According to Plains Cotton Growers, figures indicate that approximately 15 to 20% of the dryland acreage has been planted while irrigated plantings are 80 to 85% complete. Many area producers are beginning to "dry" plant their non-irrigated acres hoping that enough rain will fall to get the cotton started.

"The lack of adequate rainfall is playing a major part in holding back the 1991 High Plains crop," said Donald Johnson, executive vice president of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

"We're beginning to receive calls from producers wondering what alternatives they have in the event that the current dry conditions prevent them from planting their dryland acres."

In most countries, dryland planting only is averaging in the neighborhood of 20% complete. If a substantial rainfall occurs after the end of the recommended planting period late planting could begin. It is not uncommon for planting to continue up to the last week of June in some portions of the southern High Plains.

Optionwise, producers are going to have several choices should the dry conditions persist throughout the planting season. One is to declare the acreage as prevented, planted and utilize the newly implemented 0/92 option included in the new farm bill.

Under 0/92, a producer will be eligible for deficiency payments based on the yield history of the farm in question. Unfortunately, many of these farms have relatively low yields. The deficiency payment

is guaranteed at 10 cents per pound on up to 92% of the maximum payment acres on the farm. The 10 cent per pound payment rate will be reduced by the four-cent advance payment if the producer already has received it.

Conditions surrounding the 0/92 option could, however, prove unacceptable to many producers. Under 0/92 farm, designated as prevented planting must be placed in a conserving use or left fallow for the remainder of the year.

No cash crops can be grown if a prevented planting designation is allowed by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). A producer deciding to take the 0.92 option who then receives a good rain and wishes to try and plant will be able to go to ASCS and cancel the prevented planting request.

Another option is open to producers who have federal crop insurance. Under this scenario, a producer must plant the crop before the planting deadline set for their county. The producer then could choose to declare the acreage failed if the crop did not come up. A producer would likely be eligible to receive the benefits on the failed acreage and still have the opportunity to plant another crop.

Confusion about the new loan schedule and how premiums and discounts for micronaire and strength will figure into the 1991 crop has been brought to the attention of Plains Cotton Growers.

To help clarify some of the misunderstandings, PCG offers the following description about how these premiums and discounts will apply to cotton placed in the 1991 loan program.

The new premium and discount schedule for strength is applicable

to all grades of loan-eligible cotton. The premium and discount schedule for micronaire, on the other hand, does have some restrictions. The restriction for the micronaire schedule deals with the 15-point premium for mic readings to 3.7 to 4.2. This premium will only be applicable to certain grades. Those grades classified as ineligible for the 15-point premium will simply not receive the premium and the 3.7 to 4.2 readings will be considered a base micronaire reading.

Grades eligible for the 15-point premium for micronaire readings between 3.7 and 4.2 are white grades 11, 21, 30, 31, 40, 41, 50 and 51; light spotted grades 12, 22, 32 and 42; light gray grades 16, 26 and 36; and gray grades 17 and 27.

Grades that are ineligible for the 15-point premium are white grades 60, 61, 70 and 71; light spot grades 52 and 62; all spotted grades (13-63); all tinged grades (24-54); light gray grade 46; and gray grades 37 and 47.

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Field scout training to be held in Plainview

Training of field scouts who survey crops to assess pest population densities in integrated pest management programs in the area will be conducted in Plainview Tuesday by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Kerry Siders of Dimmitt, county Extension agent-pest management for Castro and Lamb counties, will discuss beneficials at the conference.

The workshop will be held at the Ollie Liner Ag Center on South US Highway 87 and it is open to summer scouts of private crop consultants, aerial applicators, pesticide applicators and farmers who scout their own fields. The workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. and end at 4:30 p.m.

This year's workshop has been accredited by the Texas Dept. of Agriculture to award five continuing education units toward state recertification of commercial, non-commercial and private pesticide applicators.

Dr. James E. Leser, Extension Service entomologist and workshop coordinator, said this year's course will cover scouting of cotton and grains, identification of plant disease and nutrient deficiency symptoms, common pests, use of herbicides and safe handling of pesticides.

Integrated pest management is a coordinated approach to management decisions based on pest populations and economic thresholds. It is designed to effectively control weeds, insects and diseases and maximize profits while creating minimal harm to the environment.

Scouts examine fields in a systematic pattern at regular intervals each week. Producer treatments for pests are based on economic threat to the crop, presence of beneficial

insects which are enemies of pests, and proper timing of pesticide use for maximum return with the lowest chemical input.

Topics for the workshop and the instructors, all of whom are Extension Service specialists or agents, are Tony Pardo of Lubbock, a pesticide safety agent, who will discuss CEU training instructions; Leser, who will talk about principles of IPM and sampling; Dr. James R. Supak of Lubock, an agronomist and cotton specialist who will talk on cotton growth and development.

Other speakers include Mark Brown, Crosby and Floyd Counties pest management agent who will discuss thrips, fleahoppers and aphids; Leser, who will speak on bollworms, loopers and army worms; and Siders, who will speak on beneficials.

Major diseases and symptoms will be addressed by Dr. Harold Kaufman of Lubbock, a plant pathologist. Plant and nutrient deficiency symptoms will be talked about by Dr., Michael Hickey of Lubbock, a soil chemist. Herbicide injury and common weeds will be the topic of the speech given by Dr. Brent Bean of Amarillo, agronomist.

Corn and sorghum growth and development will be discussed by Dr. Cloyce Coffman of College Station, agronomist. The problem of sorghum pests will be addressed by Dr. Pat Morrison of Lubbock, an entomologist and problems with corn pests will be the topic of Greg Cronholm's speech (he's a pest management agent from Plainview).

Morrison will discuss sunflowers and soybeans. Brant (cq) Baugh of Farwell, pest management agent, will talk about soybeans and sunflowers.

Pesticide applicators training session is set

Castro County producers will have the opportunity to complete training to meet one of the requirements for obtaining a private applicator license at a program scheduled for today (Thursday) in Hart.

The program will begin at 6 p.m. and will be held in the Hart Golden Group Building.

To become a licensed private applicator, a producer must attend a Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training program, make a passing score on the Texas Dept. of Agriculture's private applicator examination, and submit an application to TDA along with a required \$50 fee. The TDA private applicator license is valid for five years.

Texas Dept. of Agriculture personnel will offer testing at the same location beginning at 9 p.m. on May 30. Persons who plan to attend the training session and take the TDA test are encouraged to obtain a copy of "Using Pesticides —

Private Application Manual" from the county Extension office for review and study prior to attending the training session.

Producers holding a TDA private applicator certificate dated prior to Jan. 10, 1989, may continue to buy and use restricted-use and state-limited-use pesticides. Producers holding TDA private applicator certificates dated Jan. 10, 1989 and after, but prior to Jan. 1, 1990, may also continue to buy and use restricted-use and state-limited-use pesticides; however, persons holding private applicator certificates dated Jan. 10, 1989 and after, but prior to Jan. 1, 1990, will be required to become licensed private applicators within five years.

The private applicator training program is available to those persons not previously certified who will be supervising the application of restricted-use and/or state-limited-use and who wish to obtain a TDA private applicator license.

Pvt. Evans was a cook in her unit and the support battalion met casualties from the front line and provided medical services. She cooked for injured soldiers, Iraqi prisoners of war and soldiers from France and England.

Since the battalion supplied support services to the troops on the front line, the unit was mobile. She drove a truck in the convoy where the unit was moving and the convoy traveled through Iraq at the end of the war. During the fighting, the convoy followed the action, so Pvt. Evans saw the ravages first-hand.

She said they traveled down six-lane highways where cars and trucks had been blown up. The

victims of the attack hadn't even been removed for burial.

Pvt. Evans said the "worst thing about Saudi Arabia were the camel spiders and cobra snakes. The camel spiders were as large as desk tops and were very poisonous," she said. "Cobras were another problem. Everyone had to look where they were stepping or sitting as a spider and snake precaution."

She said there were malls with Safeways, sporting goods stores, Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurants and other stores, just like you would find in an American shopping center.

Many of the products sold were American products with labels printed in the Saudi Arabian language.

The women wore black dresses and the Saudi women wore veils while the Kuwaiti women did not.

"Out of respect for the culture, American men couldn't look Saudi women in the face," Pvt. Evans said.

Pvt. Evans served in Saudi Arabia from Feb. 1 through April 11. She returned to Fort Stewart, Ga. on May 1.

Host families sought for exchange program

Kathryn Moore of Dimmitt, local coordinator for the Academic Year in America high school exchange program, is presently interviewing families in this part of Texas to host a foreign exchange student.

The cross-cultural learning program places teenagers from Europe, Asia and Latin American families for a semester or school year.

"Springtime is the most exciting time of the program year for these students," said Moore. "They love the prom, yearbooks and class rings."

Customs like these, which are part of any American teenager's experience, are new and different for teens from abroad.

The program also gives American families the chance to learn about a foreign culture. Exchange students bring their holiday cus-

oms, their native language and the special dishes of their homelands into American homes.

"It's like a trip abroad without ever leaving home," said Moore. "The interesting young ambassadors soon win the hearts of their hosts. They arrive as strangers and become 'sons' and 'daughters' in their American families.

Next year's participants, chosen from hundreds of applicants, will arrive in Texas in August. They all speak English, are covered by full medical insurance and have their own spending money. Host families receive a travel scholarship, worth up to \$800 off the cost of an AIFS study/travel abroad program.

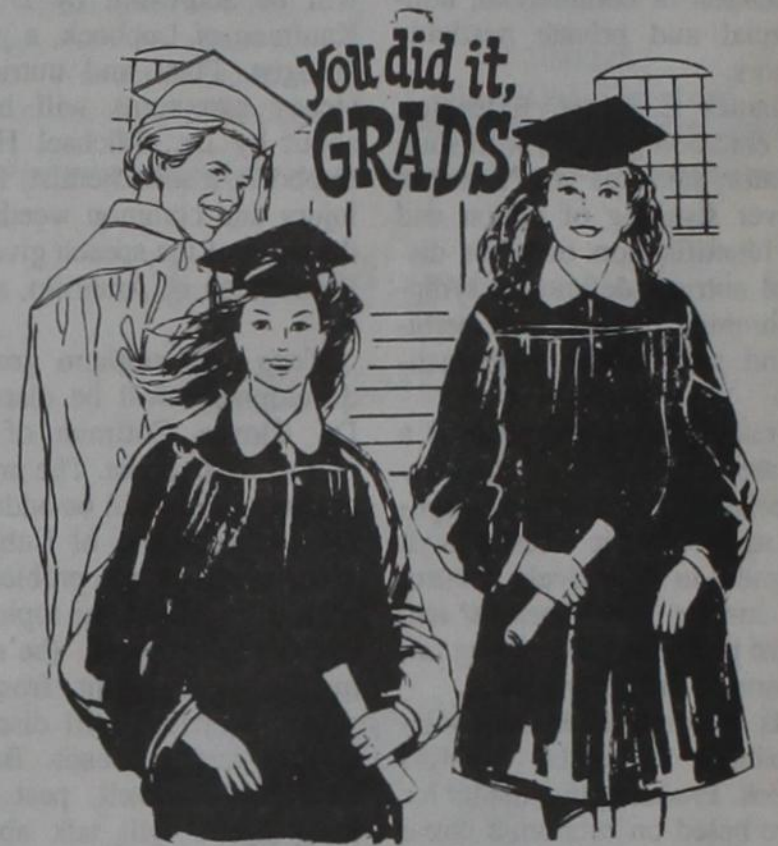

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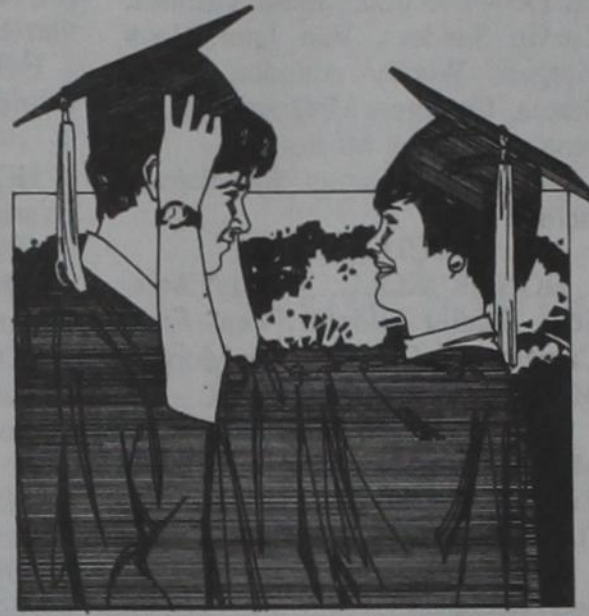

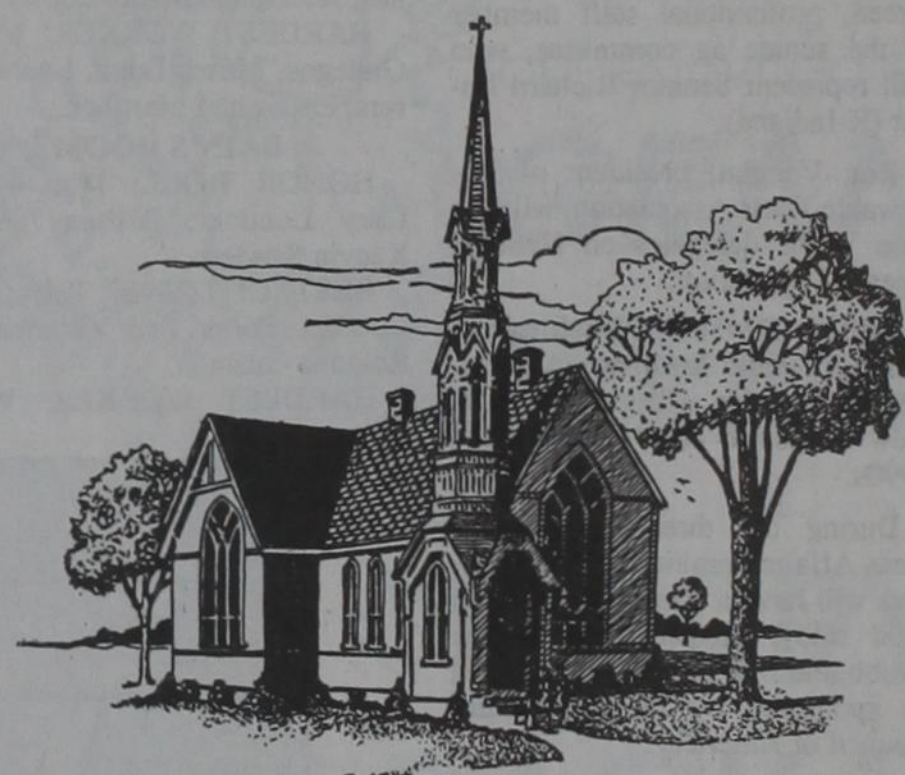

pollutants, acid rain, lead, mercury, pesticides, herbicides or other chemicals.

"A fish is a swimming filter," said Al Mills, environmental director for the Bass Anglers Sportsman's Society. "The concentration (of toxins or harmful chemicals) in the water is 50,000 times more concentrated in the fish."

Most states have issued "health advisories" for those fishing in specific lakes and streams, citing the presence of potentially dangerous levels of organic, chemical or metal toxins that have been proven to cause birth defects or cancer.

If you're wondering whether there's a "health advisory" on the lake or stream you plan to fish, you can call one of these numbers to
