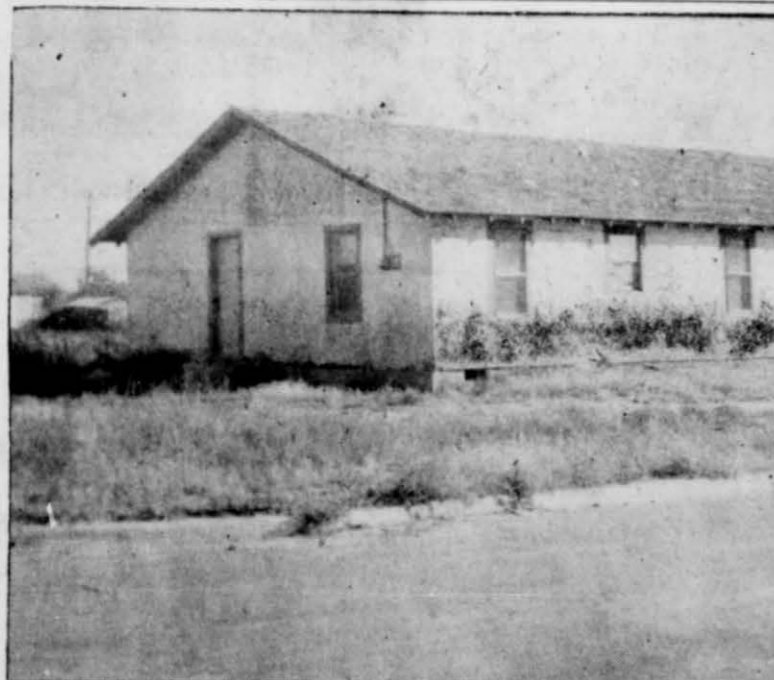
## Dimmitt Ex-Servicemen Form Local Post of Veterans of Foreign Wars

A post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars has been organized in Dimmitt and has obtained a membership of 65.

Commander of the Castro County Memorial Post No. 8056 is Reese Kesler. Other officers are Archie Harris, senior vice-commander; R.E. Catoe, junior vice-commander; Peewee Hodge, quartermaster; Carl King, adjutant; J.B. Farris, judge advocate; Harry Brown, chaplain; and Don Tabor, officer of the day.

The new organization meets in the District Court Room every first and third Tuesday at 8 p.m. State Commander Victor L. Auerbach of Lubbock helped organize the post. All veterans who served overseas during World War II or the Korean War are invited to attend.

Kesler said the post was being organized so local veterans would be able to observe and take part in veterans affairs and to act as a civic organization. One of the veterans programs the VFW is calling attention to the constitutional amendment to be voted upon November 8 which would permit the Veterans Land Board to sell bonds at a higher rate of interest to supply funds for veterans to purchase farmland. At present the rate is set at three percent by law and no one will buy the bonds. However, a 3.5 percent bond could be sold and the rate will be raised if the constitutional amendment is approved. ## West Texas Feeding Tour Next Month

## Bobcat Band Ranks Superior At TIL Meeting

The Dimmitt Bobcat Band, under the direction of Ralph Smith, secured for themselves the top ranking of superior in both overall inspection and marching at the annual Region XI Interscholastic League band contest in Amarillo Tuesday.

The only other class AA school in this area to make a similar rating was Tulia.

The bands were rated superior, excellent, and good in that order in overall inspection and marching.

More than 4,000 high school and junior high school youngsters were entered in the huge Panhandle school band extravaganza.

Some 45 area high school and junior high school bands converged on Dick Bivins Stadium. There were also individual and ensemble baton twirling competitions, which drew about 200 entries.

## Bobcats Face Tulia Hornets Friday Night in Crucial Conference Game

Dimmitt's highly hopeful Bobcat football team managed to dump the Canyon Eagles Friday night, 28-12, to set the stage for their hardest conference assignment of the year: the Tulia Hornets.

Dimmitt will journey to Tulia Friday night, Tulia, like Dimmitt, has one conference victory under its belt. The Hornets smeared the Friar Chiefs 34-0 Friday night.

Other scores which have typified a hard running and passing attack by the Hornets include: Tulia 12, Post 0; Tulia 28, Abernathy 7; Tulia 44, O'Donnell 0; Tulia 6, Lockney 26; Tulia 34, Sunray 12 and Tulia 47, Memphis 0. The only two games the two teams can be compared are their respective battles against Lockney and Abernathy. Dimmitt defeated Lockney 22-6 whereas Lockney upset Tulia 26-6; and Dimmitt dropped Abernathy 18-6 as against Tulia's win of 28-7. Tulia has not played the toughest competition on the plains, but they are still considered one of the top teams in class AA in the Panhandle.

## Local Auto Has Long, Proud History

"It still starts good, it runs good, hasn't had any major repairs since back during the depression, doesn't use any oil, 'course I have it changed every thousand miles—so why should I sell it or buy a new one?" Mrs. Etta Brashears said this week of her Chevrolet automobile which she bought brand new in April of 1934 for \$800.00.

For all of its 26 years, the little car is clean and solid inside and out. Its high top which is of fabric like all other models of its day, is the original fabric that came on it. Like many another gallant lady who is still chipper and active the little car has turned a little gray across the hood. The black paint has worn away, from frequent polishings, it would seem, as much as anything else, and the gray undercoat of paint shows through but there is not a visible rust spot anywhere. The dash, which is painted to resemble mahogany, still has an unblemished mahogany appearance. One instrument on the dash, however, does not work. That is the speedometer which is broken but records 54,987 miles.

Mrs. Brashears said she had some difficulty deciding to buy her car back in 1934 because times were hard and she was trying to pay for her home. At the time she was taking roomers and boarders and one of her roomers was Carl Kemp, owner of the Chevrolet agency, who assured her that if she would buy a car he would see to it that she didn't lose it and she could pay it out at \$10 per month. She bought the car, she made the payments, but there was another difficulty. "I didn't know how to

## Government Extends ACP Program To \$1,000 per Practice in County

The 1960 Agricultural Conservation Practices program has been increased to \$1,000 per farm, effective November 1. Farmers will be unable to sign up for any practice over \$500 before that date.

The Conservation program is made up of certain practices that the government will assist a farmer with to protect his land and build up his soil. Formerly the government assistance limit on these practices was \$500 per farm, but that figure has been doubled. There is still \$22,000 available for use by Castro County farmers. This popular program will have \$132,789 available for the share-the-cost practices next year. Last year 458 Castro County farmers participated in the program. Next year deferred grazing and cotton burr spreading will be added to the list of approved practices.

Deadline for signing up for the following practices is December 31, 1960. Only the producer sharing in the cost of the practice will be eligible to sign the application.

The list of approved practices include chiseling noncrop grazing

land; constructing pits or ponds for livestock water; initial establishment of permanent sod waterway; constructing terraces to detain or control the flow of water and check soil erosion; constructing diversion terraces to intercept runoff and divert excess water to protected outlets; changing farm irrigation systems to conserve water and prevent erosion; leveling land for more efficient use of irrigation water and to prevent erosion; lining irrigation ditches to prevent erosion of water by seepage; stubble mulching to improve soil permeability and to protect soil from wind erosion and water erosion; contour listing, contour chiseling, cross slope chiseling, or listing or chiseling not on the contour for wind erosion control; and control of bindweed as a necessary step in the control of wind erosion.

No practice will be approved for payment if began prior to obtaining county committee approval.

## Sunnyside Store Completed; May Reopen This Weekend

The new Sunnyside Store, replacing the building destroyed in the Sunnyside tornado April 12, was completed last week and is being readied for reopening this week end.

Being stocked this week, the store measures 40 x 60 feet and the modern building is constructed of haydite blocks reinforced with concrete and steel. It has a brick and glass east front. A walk-in refrigerator box and other modern fixtures have been installed. Mr. and Mrs. E.R. Sadler will continue to own and operate the store.

The Sunnyside Store was opened in March, 1930 when Mr. and Mrs. Binkley Drake purchased five acres of land from Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Axtell and built a 20 x 32 foot building with a residence in the

back. This original building, with various additions at different times was the one destroyed by the tornado.

Mr. and Mrs. Norman Waggoner, who had operated a grocery store at Cleo for several years, purchased the store from Mr. and Mrs. Drake in June of 1936. They built a residence near the store and lived in the community until about 1943. Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Boyd, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Hestand, Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. H.L. Duke, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Duke, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Conard and Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Burch are among those who leased or operated the store until it was purchased from Mrs. Willie Waggoner in July, 1949 by Mr. and

Mrs. Alonzo Ferguson. They added a modern residence to the back of the store in 1952. They operated the store until Mrs. Ferguson's death on January 6, 1955. Mr. Ferguson continued to operate it with the help of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Herriage until it was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. E.R. Sadler in March of 1959. The Herriages operated it until January, 1960. Since that time it has been operated by Mr. and Mrs. Sadler.

The vicious tornado which struck the little community leveled homes, the church, store and other buildings and caused three deaths, left many scars. In the short span of just over six months nearly all of these scars have been eradicated.

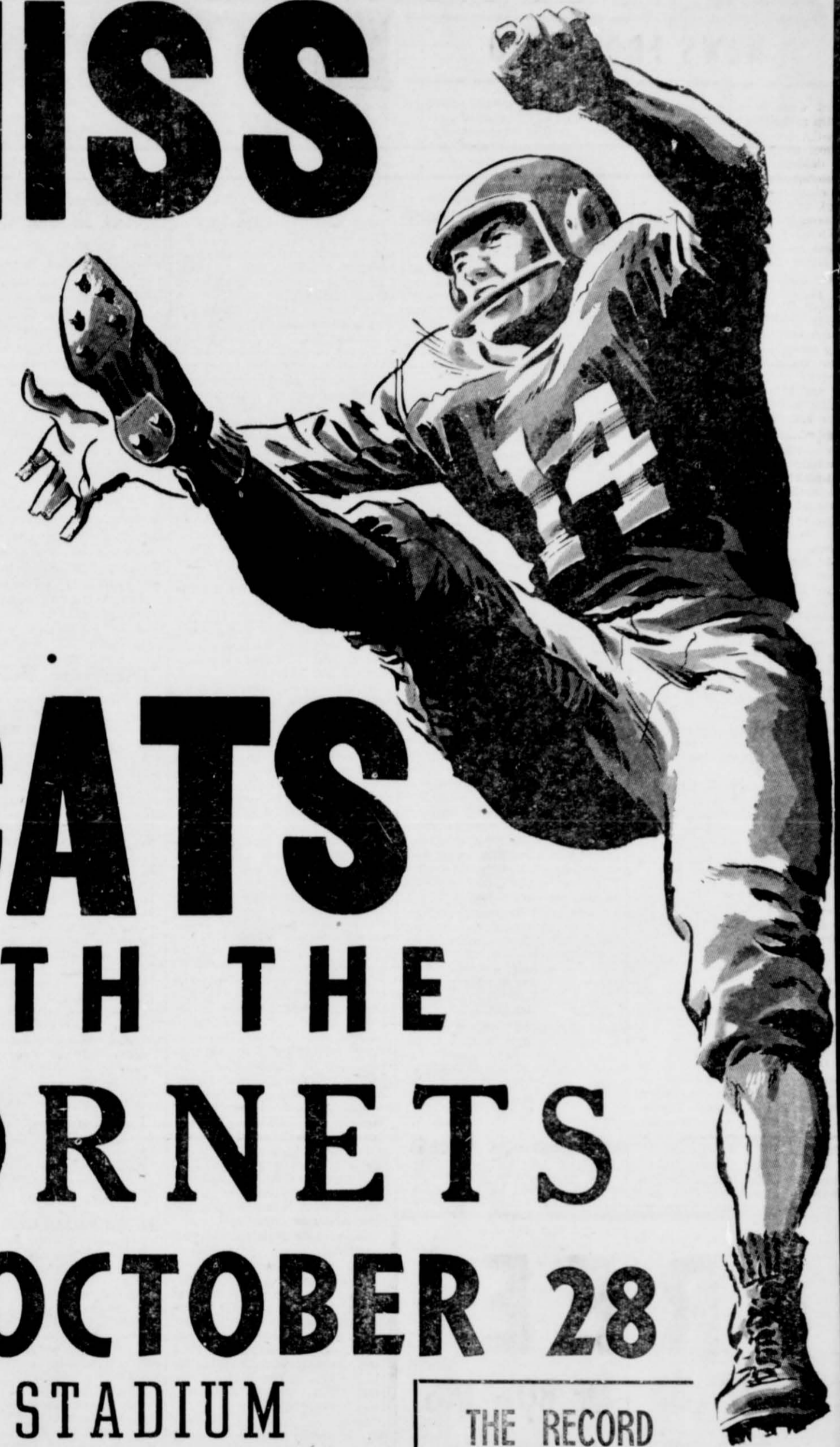

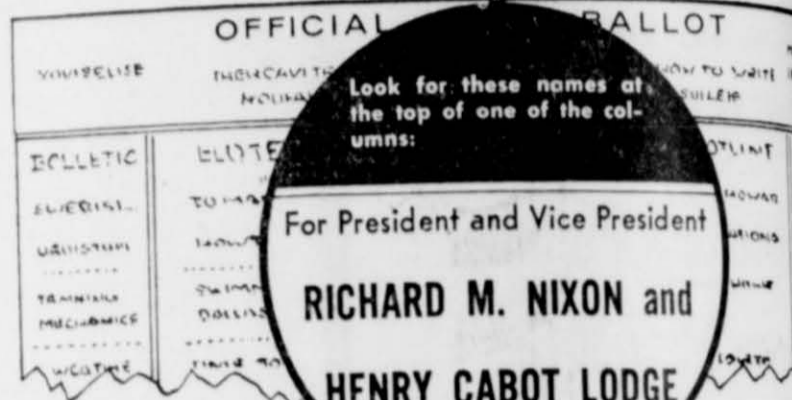

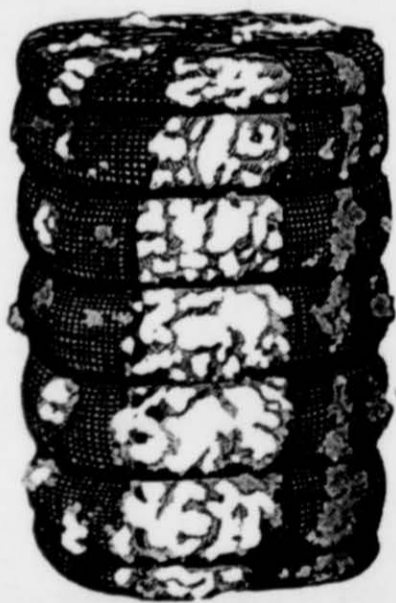
