To our knowledge there has never been a Ku Klux Klan chapter here, a member of any frentic religious sect, any race hatred groups such as the Citizens Council, any communists or any other organization with appeals to the emotions of hate, greed or lust as a prime source of motivation.

Most people are moderate in their beliefs or think so of themselves. But as someone said, "You have always got that five percent.' We saw an example of the think-

ing of this lunatic fringe last week

in the Sunday issue of the San Antonio Light. It was a half page ad that must have cost many bags of coin and it showed the extremes some people will go to reach a point. The first half of the ad was a scripture lesson in the fire and brimstone fashion of many borderline religious groups. After this came the following message: "Considering the mess we find ourselves in at present, it seems to us that the Lord God Almighty, Creator and Ruler of this Universe, must have permitted this fleeting interlude of nearly 500 years here in this Western Hemisphere so that a carefully selected section of humanity could prove to itself conclusively that man simply does not have the spiritual, moral or mental stability to rule himself successfully, even under the most favorable conditions. Being convinced of this, we feel ready to welcome with open arms a beve-

This same plane of thought is vouchsafed by the John Birch Society, whose founder, Robert Welch, is ready to set up an autocracy to replace the allegedly fail-ing and insufficient democratic but hopes were high that a begin-ning could be made this weekend. form of government we now have. We don't know why these sentiments shouldn't be treated as termed severe and considerable treason. Anything that even suggovernment is just as vicious as an actual counts of greenbug popula-attempt by the communists to overthrow it. This kind of talk is indicative of a sickness that should not be allowed to spread, even mong fanatics.

The John Birch Society has a ceived much publicity lately. Ev devout conservatives are blanchin at some of the tactics employed by members of this "way-out" group of people. An organization whose beginning closely resem-bles the outset of the Bolshevicks in Russia prior to the Revolution, the John Birch Society has established cells in many towns in Texas. Its membership seems to tend oward the well-to-do conservatives in larger cities, however.

As we said before we have een spared these politically fourthdimensional organizations in Dimmitt. We hope a cell never starts here. The American Legion is sponsoring a talk here next week by General William Lee, area coordinator of the John Birch society. He will be remembered by as the man who offered a half dozen columns of "documented proof" in an Amarillo newspaper that the National Council of Churches was communist infiltrated. This so-called proof was nothing but a repitition of a series of opinions and "sworn testimony", that added up to so many cubic feet of hot air.

We are sorry to see this man come into our community. If his appearance here should inspire the organization of a local cell then we can expect trouble. Bringing the national actions down to a community level, we could expect such a cell to use a wispering campaign to label local pastors as communists or communist dupes, to charge communist teaching in our local schools, and to call many local people socialists and communists simply for disagreeing with them.

We are highly enthusiastic about any organization that would en-deavor to lessen the number of ommunists in this country and to expose them. We would be even nore enthusiastic about a governmental program that would call for a complete and thorough investigation into the background of all public servants from the President down to office clerks by the F.B.I. and the subsequent certifying to their unswerving loyalty to this country before they could ever become entrusted with a government job. We cannot be too careful. The communist menace is real and apparent and they are working subversive tactics all the time. We would delight in any logical and sane manner of methodcally removing and deporting all
