The official release Monday of Castro county's 1956 cotton allot ment erased any doubt as to whether or not the county-wide cotton quota referendum scheduled for Tuesday, December 13 would be held. The election was scheduled even though at the time no word had been received on the '56 allotment and some speculated that the election night be postponed or cancelled indefinitely on this account.

Under the 1956 program, which was ordered released in a telegram Monday from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Castro county will get a total of 51,189 acres or a seven percent cut compared to the 1955 allotment of 55,042. A breakdown of this figure, as made available by local ASC Office Secretary Doyle Thomas, shows that the county actually earned 45,081 on the basis of history. An additional amount of 5,547 acres, which was taken from the state ASC committee reserve for hardship cases, was added to this figure plus 561 acres taken out of the state committee reserve for small farms.

These three figures added together resulted in the county total of **Barn Dance Show** 51,189 acres.
