A S C OFFICE NEWS

We will begin accepting applications under the 1964 Agricultural Conservation Program on January 2, 1964. Any practice signed-up for must be carried out within 90 days or it will be cancelled. To be eligible for cost-share assistance, an application must be filed prior to the beginning of any approved Agricultural Conservation Practice. A cost-share limit of \$500.00 for a farm has been set by the County Committee in Castro County.

The following listed practices are currently included in the 1964 Agricultural Conservation Program:

A-2 Establishment of a permanent vegetative cover for soil protection or as a needed land-use adjustment.

C-1 Establishment of permanent sod waterways to dispose of excess water without causing erosion.

C-4 Constructing terraces to detain or control the flow of water and check soil erosion.

C-5 Constructing diversion terraces to intercept runoff and divert excess water to protected outlets.

C-12 Reorganizing farm irrigation systems to conserve water and prevent erosion.

C-13 Leveling land for more efficient use of irrigation water and to prevent erosion.

E-1 Stubble mulching to improve soil permeability and to protect soil from wind and water erosion.

E-3-b Contour listing, contour chiseling, cross-slope chiseling, or listing or chiseling not on the contour for wind erosion control.

E-3-c Control of bindweed (Convolvulus arvensis) as a necessary step in the control of wind erosion.

1964 Released and Reapportioned Cotton

We are now accepting applications for an increase in allotment by reapportionment of released acreage. We do not know whether or not any reapportioned acreage will be received, but an applica-

tion must be filed in order to be eligible to receive the reapportioned acreage.

Any cotton producer in the County who will not plant all of his cotton allotment in 1964 may release such acreage and maintain full history for future years. If you have any questions concerning the above, please call at the Castro County ASCS Office.

Grain Sorghum Chat

Dr. Haggard, who is a graduate of Kansas State University is now teaching in Indiana, made the following observations in a lecture at Amarillo.

He thinks that fertilization of our grain sorghum makes the stalk more palatable, hence the cattle eat more of it, causing them to do a much better job of gaining.

He also stated that the average consumption of beef in the U.S. was 90 lbs. per person, but in California where much of it is fed, the average is 125 lbs. and that 75 per cent of the beef we eat is ground beef.

He also said that one half the nation's business was from farming and that the investment per

man unit in business is \$13,000 and the average investment per man unit in farming was \$75,000.

Dr. Haggard stated that 10 per cent of beef cattle were fed in three counties: one was located in California, one in Arizona and one in Colorado.

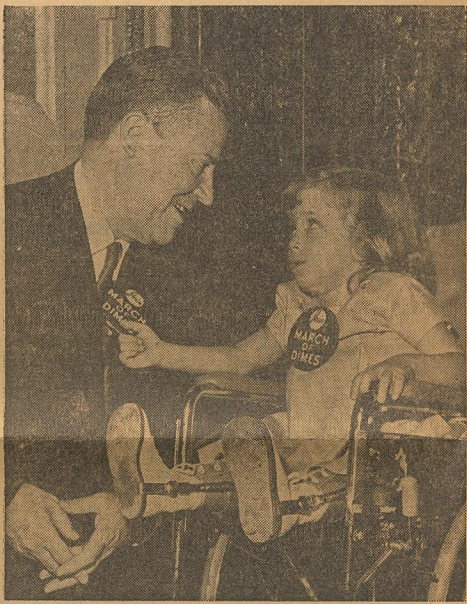

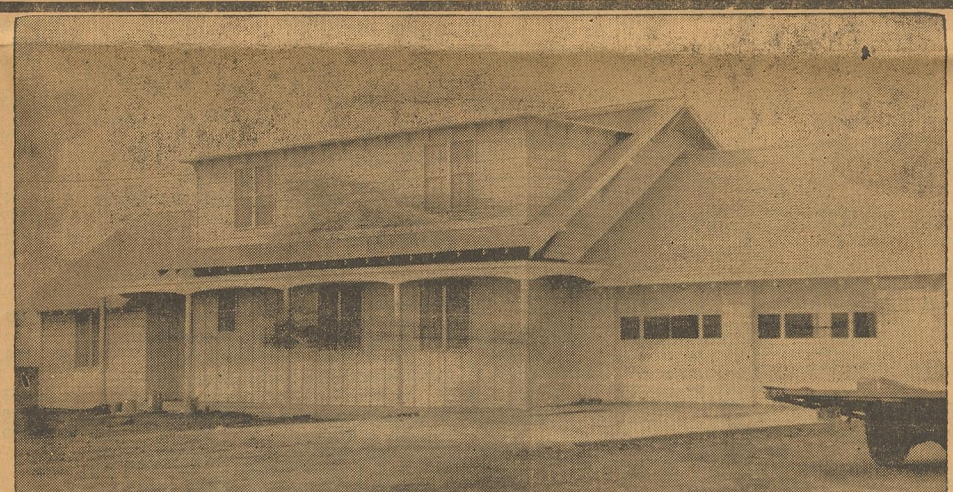
