Amateur astronomers and local residents will get a chance to turn their sights toward the heavens Saturday, June 23, as officials with the Big Spring State Park prepare for their annual Stargazing Party atop the local landmark.

"Sunset is approximately 9 p.m. and there will be a program as soon as it gets dark enough to see the projection, which is usually between 9:20 and 9:30 p.m.," said Park Manager Ron Alton. "I'm going to ask the astronomy club members to bone up on their constellations so we can point some of them out."

Slated for 8:30 p.m. until 11 p.m. near the park office at the top of Scenic Mountain, the program will offer something for everyone in the family, according to Alton.

"It's one of the bigger events of the year for us," said Alton. "It's a fun and educational way to spend a Saturday night outdoors with your family. You can take a tour of the night sky with area amateur astronomy clubs."

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Midland... Trinity CO2 buying Sand Ridge Tertiary for \$130M

NEW YORK (AP) — SandRidge Energy Inc. is selling the oil recovery company SandRidge Tertiary LLC for \$130 million in cash to Trinity CO2 Investments LLC, a carbon dioxide pipeline and supply company.

Midland, Texas-based Trinity said Monday that it purchased SandRidge's Wellman pipeline as part of the deal.

SandRidge Tertiary has projects in the Permian Ba-

sin in Texas, with proved reserves of 24 million barrels of oil equivalent as of Dec. 31. SandRidge Energy is an oil exploration and production company based in Oklahoma City.

SandRidge Tertiary's Greg West will become executive vice president, chief operating officer and a board member of Trinity CO2, while John Milam will serve as senior vice president of operations.

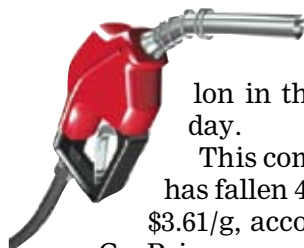
Trinity is part of Morgan Stanley Global Private Equity.

Shares of SandRidge Energy rose 7 cents, or 1.2 percent, to \$6.03 in premarket trading. SandRidge shares have traded in a 52-week range of \$4.55 to \$12.36 per share.



Gasoline prices continue to fall

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 4.8 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.38/g Sunday.

This compares with the national average that has fallen 4.5 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.61/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices Sunday were 19.8 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 26.1 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 18.2 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 16.2 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"An impressive decline in average gasoline prices will now be extended as the West Coast begins to see lower prices in the days ahead," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "With significant downward pressure on oil prices last week, motorists will continue to see prices sliding east of the Rockies, and even the West Coast will start to get in on the action, thanks to a supply situation that appears to be turning around."

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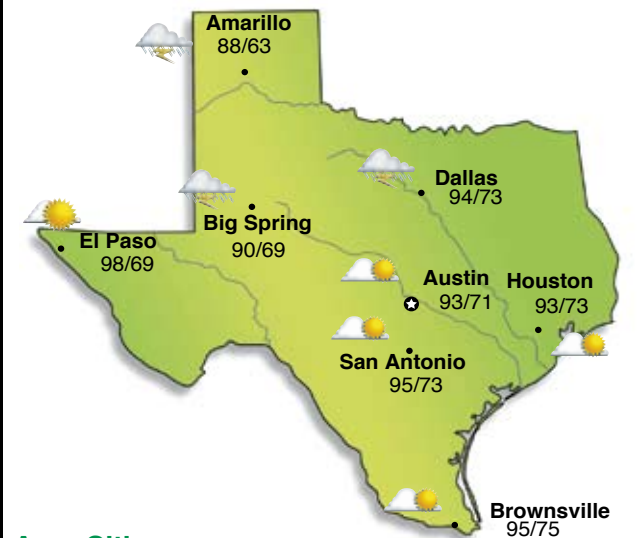

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State briefs

3 hurt in gunfire at San Antonio graduation party

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Investigators say gunfire at a graduation party in South Texas has left three people hurt. San Antonio police say all three victims turned up at different hospitals early Monday. No one has been arrested as police try to determine who opened fire. KSAT-TV reports detectives have linked all three victims to the same party. Two of the injured are women who suffered leg wounds. Police say the victims are in stable condition. Further details on the wounded and the graduation party were not immediately available.

Worker falls from San Antonio highway bridge, dies

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Authorities say a construction worker has died after falling about 50 feet while working on a new highway bridge in South Texas. The accident happened early Monday in San Antonio. The worker was part of the crew at the U.S. 281 and Loop 1604. Investigators say the man apparently was putting corrugated metal into the bridge frame when he fell. Authorities believe the worker had a safety harness but it might not have been attached to a secure location. The name of the victim was not immediately released. Nearby traffic was diverted following the accident.

Woman found in bathtub at Houston home dies

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston police say a woman found in the bathtub of a home has died and an injured man also at the residence has been taken to a hospital. Police say the man called 911 early Monday. Authorities have not released further details on his condition or how he was hurt. Authorities are also trying to find the woman's 7-year-old son. Investigators believe the woman's death was suspicious, but the body had no obvious signs of trauma. Water was in the tub. The woman was declared dead at a Houston hospital. An autopsy has been ordered. Further details were not immediately released.

Dallas Area Rapid Transit exceeds 250M riders

DALLAS (AP) — A longtime Dallas Area Rapid Transit light rail line user has been honored as the 250 millionth rider since the system opened in 1996. Transit officials were on hand Monday to greet commuter Don Johnson of DeSoto, a city south of Dallas. Johnson was surprised at Union Station in downtown Dallas. Johnson, who works north of Dallas in Richardson, says he's been riding DART for 10 years and began due to the cost of gasoline. He was randomly selected by DART staff to represent all riders on the 72-mile system. Johnson was given four DART passes for July, plus tickets for attractions along the rail line, such as the Dallas Zoo and Fair Park. DART, with the state's largest municipal rail system, serves Dallas and a dozen surrounding cities.

Estranged husband surrenders

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Bond has been set at \$1.5 million for a man accused in a West Texas attack that left his estranged wife, her boyfriend and her daughter dead. Investigators say 35-year-old Luis Javier Solis-Gonzalez surrendered at the border a day after the bodies were discovered at a home in El Paso. Solis-Gonzalez is in the El Paso County Jail on a charge of capital murder of multiple persons. Online jail records Monday did not list an attorney for the 35-year-old suspect. The bodies of 34-year-old Marysol Saldivar, 42-year-old Eric DeSantiago and 13-year-old Casandra Holt were discovered Thursday. Autopsy results are pending. Police began looking for Solis-Gonzalez amid concerns he fled to Mexico. He turned himself in Friday to U.S. authorities at the Paso Del Norte port of entry.

Oliver the chimp dies at refuge

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A chimpanzee named Oliver known for his upright stature and humanlike traits has died at a Texas refuge. Officials at Primarily Primates in San Antonio believe Oliver was at least 55 years old. Caretakers found Oliver dead Saturday in his hammock. Sanctuary officials say the former circus performer was mostly blind, had no teeth and suffered from arthritis.

together, as well. It doesn't matter how old you are, seeing the stars and the different heavenly bodies through a telescope is just amazing." Alton said the West Texas Amateur Astronomy Club from Midland will provide several high-powered telescopes for those attending to get a better look at the heavens. "They've been really great in helping us put the stargazing event on each year," said Alton. "They really love doing this. Most people who are into astronomy love to teach others about it, so there will be plenty of knowledgeable people to answer questions during the presentation. "From the look of things right now, we should have a crescent

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moon that night. Saturn and Mars should also be within view, as well as M13, a bright globular, and possibly M31, which is a really nice galaxy to view." Alton said the Stargazing Party is a great chance for area residents to learn about astronomy, but it also serves a very important purpose when the state of Texas begins looking at the park's budget, several of which are currently on the legislature's chopping block. "We invite everyone to come out," said Alton. "These events keep the state park finances going, especially in these times when budgets are under such a tremendous strain. Our state park is already being subsidized by the county and city and without their help, well, we wouldn't even have a state park right now. The state looks at attendance at these types of events when they decide how much to allocate, and those numbers are even more important than ever." Alton said he plans to set up an alternate date, just in case Mother Nature decides not to cooperate June 23. "If the weather doesn't

Rangers top Los Angeles

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — The Angels sent Dan Haren to the mound, looking for a sweep of the Texas Rangers hoping to trim the margin between the top two teams in the AL West. Los Angeles fell short of that goal, yet was encouraged by the way it held its own against baseball's best-hitting team over the weekend.

Haren lasted only five innings on Sunday, taking the loss after two stellar outings, and Nelson Cruz hit a tape-measure two-run homer off Bobby Cassevah in the Rangers' 7-3 victory. It ended four-game skid by the two-time defending AL champs and sent the Angels to just their second loss in 12 games.

"Overall, we won the series," Haren said. "You have to look at the big

picture, and we're playing much better baseball. They've been on top for a while with that start they had. We were winning games, but we needed to beat them."

The clubs play 13 more times during the regular season, so Torii Hunter remains confident that the Angels will give Texas a race to the finish.

"We know us, and it's going to be a battle all year long," the outfielder said. "Two out of three is not bad against a good team like Texas because they're the champs, so you've got to be happy with it. Right now we're getting by. We're playing a lot better baseball than we did the first six weeks, but

Tiger is back: Woods takes first at Memorial

DUBLIN, Ohio (AP) — For those who thought Tiger Woods' run as the world's best golfer as over, the 747-sized roar that emanated from the 16th green at Muirfield Village likely shocked them to their senses.

With one flick of his wrists, Woods reminded everyone of who he was and what he has done.

Woods slid a 60-degree sand wedge under a ball hidden by tall grass behind the 16th green, popped the ball straight up into the air where it seemed to hang for an instant, and then watched as it rolled ever so slowly toward

the cup before dropping in for a 50-foot birdie that tied him for the lead at the Memorial Tournament on Sunday.

If that birdie served notice, then another on a sneaky-fast 10-foot downhill putt at the 18th assured him of his fifth victory at the tournament that Jack Nicklaus built.

So, Tiger was asked, do you think you're back?

"I won," he joked with a wide smile. "I'm sure by Tuesday I'll be retired and done, and then by the time I tee it up at the U.S. Open (at Olympic Club in San Francisco in 11 days) it might be something different. But I'll let you guys

figure that out."

Adding to the weight of the moment, the win tied Woods with Nicklaus — the tournament founder and host who handed him the crystal trophy on the 18th green — with 73 tour wins for second behind Sam Snead's record 82.

Woods said it was "awfully special" to tie Nicklaus at the Golden Bear's own tournament.

"Well, he had to rub it in my face right here, didn't he?" Nicklaus cracked.

He also saved his best for last, birdieing three of the final four holes under pressure conditions.

Astros snap losing streak, down Reds

HOUSTON (AP) — After allowing a combined 14 first-inning runs in their last four losses, the Houston Astros were determined to get out of the opening inning on Sunday without falling behind.

Jordan Lyles let them do just that, keeping the Reds hitless until the third and going seven strong innings to lead the Astros to a 5-3 win over Cincinnati.

Justin Maxwell had a two-run homer to help the Astros snap a season-worst eight-game skid.

"It's not easy (when you) give another major league team a three or four spot in the first inning," Lyles said. "I had to really bear down from the get-go and not try to hold anything back or save anything. My main focus was to get through that first inning."

Zack Cozart hit a two-run homer off Lyles in the third inning, but the Reds couldn't get anything else going against the 21 year old.

He allowed five hits and struck out three in his longest start of the year. It's the first

win of the season for Lyles (1-1) and his first since last Aug. 20.

"What an effort from Jordan Lyles. That was absolutely outstanding," Houston manager Brad Mills said. "He came right out and shut that down and started making pitches right away."

He has made five starts for Houston, but spent most of the season in Triple-A. Brett Myers pitched a 1-2-3 ninth for his 13th save.
