publican and one Democratic — will Locally, only one polling place will

be open Tuesday. Voters can cast ballots at Dorothy Garrett Coliseum on the Howard College campus between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., officials said. Despite a late surge, early voting in the races was extremely light,

with fewer than 4 percent of regis-

tered voters casting ballots, County

Election Administrator Saundra Bloom said. Bloom said 591 early votes were

cast for the runoff -545 in the Republican contest and 46 in the lone Democratic race. That total accounts for 3.56 percent of the registered voters in the county. The Democratic ballot's lone con-

test is to determine the party's nominee in this fall's U.S. senator election, as voters will decide between Paul Sadler and Grady Yarbrough.

Four Republican nominees will be selected: • In the U.S. Senate race, voters

# Invasion **conviction** appealed

The 2010 case against a Big Spring man convicted of taking part in a home invasion in the 600 block of State has been submitted to a panel of judges with the 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland, Texas, but a reso-

lution to the appeal could be as long as six months away, according to court officials. Clifford Leon Anglin, 26, was

found guilty of charges - including aggravated robbery, a first-degree felony — stemming from the June 5 home invasion of a family in the 600 block of State Street following a trial in 118th District Court in Septem-

Anglin

ber 2010. Anglin was sentenced to 60 years in a Texas Department of Criminal Justice facility.

According to officials with the 11th District Court of Appeals, Anglin filed an appeal in the case shortly after the sentence was handed down. The case was officially taken over by the Court of Appeals Sept. 22, 2010, according to case documents, with a motion for a new trial submitted Oct. 11,

Anglin is represented by Midland attorney Wayne Frost. The case was prosecuted by Howard County District Attorney Hardy Wilkerson and presided over by then 118th District Judge Robert H. Moore III.

The appeal is expected to be handled by a three-judge panel and could take anywhere between two weeks to six months before an opinion is issued, according to court offi-

# Gasoline prices take a slight dip

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 0.9 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.33/g Sunday.

This compares with the national average that has increased 0.4 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.50/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices Sunday were 28.2 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 18.1 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 12.1 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 20.2 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"While motorists in many regions saw gasoline prices stabilize over the last week, it's only a matter of time before last week's rise in wholesale prices translates to a continued march higher on the retail level," said Gas-Buddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "The late week rally in stocks seemed to

also fuel commodities higher, leading me to believe that pump prices will again pick up over the next week," DeHaan said.

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

#### Priceline will sell seating option for American

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — American Airlines said Monday that it will begin selling a preferredseating option on discount travel website Priceline.

The option, called Preferred Seats, lets a traveler reserve a seat near the front of the economy cabin for an extra fee, which starts at \$4 per flight. American said Priceline would be the first major

online travel agency to sell the option, and the airline said it will offer a 25 percent discount on the fee through Sunday. American sells the seating option on its website

and reservations centers. In January 2011, Priceline began using a direct

connection to American for flight and pricing information that is usually provided to travel agents by middlemen called global distribution systems. American said Priceline uses that connection to book more than 2,000 tickets a day.

Federal regulators are considering a rule, backed by consumer groups, that would require airlines to give information about extra fees to distribution systems. Consumer advocates say when airline don't provide that information, it makes comparing prices more difficult.

## 3 die in I-35 wrong-way wreck

SCHERTZ, Texas (AP) — Authorities say a wrongway accident on Interstate 35 in South Texas has left three people dead and five slightly hurt.

The wreck happened early Monday near Schertz, about 15 miles northeast of San Antonio.

Schertz city spokesman Brad Bailey says a woman was southbound in the northbound lanes of I-35 when her car hit an SUV.

Bailey says a tanker truck went around the original accident site and hit two people who stopped to help, plus the wrong-way driver. The wrong-way driver and the two good Samaritans, including a tour bus driver and a nearby rest stop worker, were

## Man gets 30 days in jail in Dallas estate dispute

DALLAS (AP) — A man who befriended an elderly Dallas socialite has been sentenced to 30 days in jail in a dispute over her estate.

A judge in Dallas sentenced Mark McCay, who was convicted last month of attempted theft. Mc-Cay was also sentenced to four years of probation and fined \$1,000. Prosecutors had sought 10 years of prison for Mc-

Cay, who was sentenced Friday. The trial involved the 2005 death of 88-year-old

Mary Ellen Bendtsen and her historic 7,000-squarefoot Swiss Ave. mansion. Officials say McCay had been friends with Bendtsen for about 15 years.

The Dallas Morning News reports McCay was accused of convincing Bendtsen, who suffered a stroke, of leaving him part of her 1917 home. Bendtsen's only child sold the house last year for

\$525,000.

#### Housing tight as UT-Austin preps for fall semester AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Experts say housing is

tight at the University of Texas at Austin because more freshmen than usual are expected. UT officials recently emailed about 1,200 students

on a waiting list for campus housing that it's unclear whether space will be available. The Austin American-Statesman reported Sun-

day that UT is projecting a freshman class of about 8,000, up from about 7,150 last year. Housing official Laurie Mackey says UT has

about 7,500 beds on campus. About 5,000 beds go to freshmen. The rest are for returning students. UT won't know until the end of August how many students who were offered housing will cancel their plans to live on campus. Further details on

why more freshmen are expected than usual were not immediately available. Classes start Aug. 29.

#### Dallas Area Rapid Transit expands service area

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The state's largest municipal rail system just got bigger.

Dallas Area Rapid Transit on Monday expanded its Orange Line into Irving.

DART says it's the first phase of the 14-mile, \$1.3

billion Orange Line construction to Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

The opening involves a 5.4 mile section from Bachman (BAHK'-man) Station in Dallas into Irving. New stations are at the University of Dallas, Las Colinas Urban Center and the Irving Conven-

DART's 700-square-mile light rail and bus service area includes more than a dozen cities in North Texas.

#### **Ex-El Paso principals:** Honesty led to punishment

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Four former principals with the El Paso Independent School District said they were intimidated and retaliated against for refusing to participate in a broad cheating scheme cooked up by top administrators to improve school rankings, a newspaper reported Sunday.

The four former high school principals told the El Paso Times they were forced out by former Superintendent Lorenzo Garcia's administration.

Garcia has pleaded guilty to charges related to a scheme designed to make it appear the district was meeting federal requirements by forcing some students to drop out, preventing some from enrolling, stripping foreign students of credits and sending false data to state and federal agencies.

This is the first time the principals spoke openly about the activities.

Three of the principals spoke out after a fourth retired El Paso High School Principal John Roskosky, wrote an op-ed piece published Sunday in the El Paso Times. The principals described fending off administrators who wanted them to fudge test scores and being reprimanded or forced to retire when they refused. The idea was to make it appear the district was meeting federal accountability standards set under No Child Left Behind.

Former Jefferson High School principal Steven Lane says he reported unethical and illegal practices to the Texas Education Agency and the U.S. Department of Education in 2010 but received no response. He also insists he discussed the issues with a board member, but she denied twice in interviews with the El Paso Times that she had such a conversation.

Roskosky, 67, said he learned after speaking to the FBI that he and four other principals were to be

fired because they "were not playing ball." Another retired Jefferson High School principal,

Sam Villarreal, said he retired in January 2009 so Garcia couldn't fire him. "I think he (Gar-

cia) thought we probably weren't going to do things as easily as a young principal," Villarreal told the Times.

According to a federal indictment, administrators under Garcia identified weak students who could harm a school's ability to meet federal requirements and prevented them from taking sophomore equivalency tests.

#### NY woman sentenced for kidnapping, raising baby

NEW YORK (AP) — A woman who snatched a newborn baby from a New York City hospital more than two decades ago and raised her as her own was being sentenced on Monday.

Ann Pettway will learn her fate from a Manhattan federal court judge.

Pettway, 51, pleaded guilty to a kidnapping charge in February.

During her court appearance then, she offered details of the 1987 kidnapping. She said she took a train from her Connecticut home to Harlem Hospital, where she scooped up 3-weekold Carlina White, who had been brought to the emergency room by her parents.

As part of Pettway's plea bargain, prosecutors recommended between 10 and  $12\frac{1}{2}$  years in prison. The judge was to decide at the sentencing scheduled for 2:30 p.m. Monday.

Carlina's birth mother, Joy White, wept during Pettway's plea in February "I've lost 23 years of being with my daughter," she said, adding that those decades were filled with pain and heartache.

During the proceeding, Pettway told the court: "I went to the hospital. I took a child. It was wrong."

But she offered no explanation for

White said she encountered Pettway at the hospital on the day her daughter disappeared, dressed like a nurse. "She came up to me and said to me, 'Don't cry. Your daughter is going to

The case was solved by Carlina her-

As she grew up in Connecticut under another name, the girl became increasingly suspicious of her own identity. Pettway told her she had been given away by a drug addict.

Carlina White said she browsed the website of the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children for clues to her identity. After matching a photo of herself with one on the site, she tracked down her true mother and they reunited in January of 2011. A DNA test confirmed they were mother and child.

EVERGLADES CITY, Fla. (AP) - A Florida airboat captain whose hand was bitten off by a 9-foot alligator faces charges of feeding of the

Collier County Jail records show 63-year-old Wallace Weatherholt was charged Friday with unlawful feeding of an alligator and later posted \$1,000 bond. His next court date is Aug. 22.

The arrest was first reported by the Fort Myers News-Press (http:// newspr.es/PVBBGP). Weatherholt was attacked

June 12th as he was giving an Indiana family a tour of the Everglades. The family said Weatherholt hung a fish over the side of the boat and had his hand at the water's surface when the alligator attacked.

Wildlife officers tracked and euthanized the gator. Weatherholt's hand was found but could not be reattached.

A criminal investigation followed Feeding alligators is a second-degree misdemeanor.

#### Colorado shooting suspect to be charged

DENVER (AP) — Launching a case that legal analysts expect to be dominated by arguments over the defendant's sanity, Colorado prosecutors are filing formal charges Monday against James Eagan Holmes, the former neuroscience student accused of killing 12 people and wounding 58 others at an Aurora movie theater.

Attorneys also are arguing over a defense motion to find out who leaked information to the news media about

a package the 24-year-old former neuroscience graduate student allegedly sent to his psychiatrist at the University of Colorado Denver.

Authorities seized the package July 23, three days after the shooting, after finding it in the mailroom of the medical campus where Holmes studied. Several media outlets reported that it contained a notebook with descriptions of an attack, but Arapahoe County District Attorney Carol Chambers said in court papers that the parcel hadn't been opened by the time the "inaccurate" news reports appeared

Holmes allegedly began stockpiling gear for his assault four months ago, and authorities say he bought his weapons in May and June, well before the shooting spree just after midnight during a showing of the Batman film ""The Dark Knight Rises." He was arrested by police outside the theater.

Analysts say that means it's likely there's only one main point of legal dispute between prosecutors and the defense.

#### Police: Man charged in 3 slavings says he erred

QUINCY, Pa. (AP) — Hours after authorities began investigating the shooting deaths of three people in a central Pennsylvania home, the man later charged in the case admitted to state police that he'd "messed up."

The suspect, Kevin Cleeves of Waynesboro, said that in retrospect he never should have gone to the home of his estranged wife's boyfriend Friday night, even if he was concerned about the welfare of his 4-year-old

Because there, authorities alleged, he quarreled with his wife and her boyfriend in front of the girl and was told to leave but instead opened fire, shooting to death the two adults as well as the man's mother. He then fled with the girl 250 miles to neighboring Ohio, where he was arrested and his daughter was recovered safely.

Cleeves was charged with three counts of criminal homicide in the deaths of 25-year-old Brandi Cleeves, 28-year-old Vincent Santucci and 55-year-old Rosemary Holma and was awaiting an extradition hearing Monday. Court records listed no attorney for him.

Detectives in Ohio declined to say where his daughter, Leia, was on

Kevin Cleeves, 35, was headed for Michigan in hopes of getting the girl to his aunt's house, according to an affidavit filed in court in Pennsylva-

He called his aunt about an hour after the slayings, and he was "drinking and mad," she told police. He admitted to her that he was behind the shootings and she called police.

#### Illinois authorities pat down guards at 7 prisons SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Illinois

authorities took the unusual step of searching guards and other prison employees for contraband as they left at least seven facilities last week, sparking worker allegations that the checks may have been reprisals for complaints about overcrowding and understaffing and inside information leaked to the news media, workers and union officials told The Associated Press.

Department of Corrections spokeswoman Stacey Solano would not confirm that the searches had intensified, but she said they are a routine security measure to control banned materials from cellphones to weapons. The dustup over the pat downs

comes as Gov. Pat Quinn pushes a cost-cutting plan to shutter several state correctional facilities, including next month's scheduled closure of a "supermax" prison in Tamms. The move has been fiercely resisted by prison workers who fear increased violence if currently isolated gang members are moved elsewhere. The searches began just days after

A report by the Special Inspector General for Iraq Reconstruction, released Monday, found that the American Embassy in Baghdad never got a written commitment from Iraq to participate. Now, facing what the report called Baghdad's "disinterest" in the project, the embassy is gutting what was supposed to be the centerpiece of ongoing U.S. training efforts in Iraq.

According to the report, the embassy plans to turn over the \$108 million Baghdad Police College Annex to Iraqis by the end of the year and will stop training at a \$98 million site at the U.S. consulate in the southern city of Basra. Additionally, the number of advisers has been cut by nearly 90 percent — from 350 to 36.

"A major lesson learned from Iraq is that host country buy-in to proposed programs is essential to the long-term success of relief and reconstruction activities. The PDP experience powerfully underscores that point," auditors wrote in a 41-page summary of their inspection. An advance copy was provided to The Associated Press.

Apple, Samsung face off in federal court over patents to iPhones, iPads

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Two tech titans will square off in federal court Monday in a closely watched trial over control of the U.S. smartphone and computer tablet markets.

Apple Inc. filed a lawsuit against Samsung Electronics Co. last year alleging the world's largest technology company's smartphones and computer tablets are illegal knockoffs of its popular iPhone and iPad products. The Cupertino-based company is demanding \$2.5 billion in damages, an award that would dwarf the largest

patent-related verdict to date. Samsung counters that Apple is doing the stealing and that some of the technology at issue — such as the rounded rectangular designs of smartphones and tablets — has been

industry standards for years. The U.S. trial is just the latest skirmish between the two over product designs. A similar trial began last week, and the two companies have been fighting in courts in the United Kingdom and Germany. The case is one of some 50 lawsuits among myriad telecommunications companies jockeying for position in the burgeoning \$219 billion market for smartphones and computer tablets.

In the United States, U.S. District Judge Lucy Koh in San Jose last month ordered Samsung to pull its Galaxy 10.1 computer tablet from the U.S. market pending the outcome of the trial, though the judge barred Apple attorneys from telling the jurors about the ban.

#### **Massive NYC movie star** collection to be auctioned

NEW YORK (AP) — Movie Star News amassed a staggering amount of film stills, posters and negatives over the past 73 years — nearly 3 million, including 1,500 prints of Bettie Page, known as the queen of pin-ups. But last week, the once-lively store in lower Manhattan was lifeless. The classic movie posters that once covered its narrow 2,000-square-foot space were rolled up or covered in cellophane, its bins and racks empty. Everything was packed up in cardboard boxes that lined the floor. The legendary Manhattan store

credited with creating pin-up art had sold its entire inventory to a Las Vegas collectibles company.

The collection, regarded as one of the largest of its kind, is headed for the auction block. It will be sold in a series of sales slated to begin next year. The bulk of the collection covers the years 1939 to 1979; 11,500 mov-

ies and 5,000 actors are represented. "This is the most important photo archive of Hollywood in existence. There are tens of thousands of negatives that have never been reproduced," said Stuart Scheinman, coowner of Entertainment Collectibles, which bought the collection. "There are images here that have never been seen by the public."

# Loaded field to swim "Race of Century"

LONDON (AP) — It's another of Australian Ian Thorpe, Pieter "Race of the Century" in the Olympic pool, and this time Michael Phelps isn't even in it.

The 200-meter freestyle final on Monday night features a loaded field, including Sun Yang of China, Park Tae-hwan of South Korea, American Ryan Lochte, Yannick Agnel of France and world recordholder Paul Biedermann of Germanv.

Maybe Phelps knew what he was doing when he dropped the event after qualifying in it at the U.S. trials last month. And Lochte figures to be the

longest shot for gold in the race that gives him another shot at Agnel, who chased him down on the final lap to help France win the 4x100 freestyle relay on Sun-It could still be a big night for

the Americans, with teenager Missy Franklin a medal threat in the 100 backstroke, Matt Grevers favored in the men's 100 back, and Rebecca Soni looking to upgrade the silver she won in 2008 to gold this time in the 100 breaststroke.

At the 2004 Athens Games, the 200 free was dubbed the "Race of the Century" due to the presence van den Hoogenband of the Netherlands and Phelps. They finished in that order.

Phelps won the race over Park four years ago in Beijing, one of his record eight golds. Now it's up to Lochte to try and keep the title in the U.S. He failed to do it in a thrilling

4x100 free relay that was the opposite result from Beijing. Four years ago, Jason Lezak ran down Alain Bernard to preserve Phelps' bid to win a record eight gold medals in a single Olympics. This time, the Americans built

a commanding lead over the first three legs. Lochte dove in on the anchor leg with a half-body length lead over the field and was in position to add another gold to his dominating win in the 400 individual medley on Saturday. But Agnel pulled even with

the American couldn't hold off the Frenchman. "I gave everything in the last 50 until he cracked," Agnel said. "In the last 10 meters, I saw that he was really cracking."

Lochte with 25 meters to go, and

Agnel touched in 3 minutes, 9.93 seconds, having gone exactly 1 second faster than Lochte over the last two laps. Lochte and the Americans settled for silver in 3:10.38, while favored Australia didn't even get a medal. Russia took the bronze in 3:11.41, beating the Aussies by 0.22.

"I was just really excited and I think I overswam the first 50 and it hurt me for the last 50," Lochte said. "But we were able to get a medal, so I guess that's good." He had little experience in the

100 free and had never competed on this relay at the Olympics. But coming off his big win on opening night, Lochte had the hot hand. "The 100 free, I don't really

swim it. I haven't swum it in a long time," he said. "You would think doing distance events, I wouldn't get tired. But sprinting takes a lot out of you."

Despite predictions that records set during the high-tech suit era would be hard to break, world records are falling at the Aquatics Centre. American Dana Vollmer lowered the mark in the 100 butterfly, then Cameron van der Burgh of South Africa broke another in the 100 breaststroke denying Japan's Kosuke Kitajima an Olympic threepeat.
