## Rail yard could be possibility

New rail opportunities could be making their way to Big Spring by next year. Big Spring Economic Development Corporation approved a memorandum of understanding Wednesday with Express Midstream Services LLC (EMS) for a potential lease of property east of Sid Richardson's carbon black plant and northeast of Alon refinery.

"They (EMS) want to set up an agreement to where they are securing the land while they have an opportunity to come up with a business plan that they can present back to the EDC for the po-

tential lease of this property," Executive Director Terry Wegman said. "They are wanting to develop a bulk transload rail yard

As Sept. 11 approaches, Mike Tarpley and the local DAV chapter are gearing up for another ceremony. The ceremony — started in 2007 — will be held at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday in the Big Spring Mall.

The first event drew 70 people and has continued to grow ever since. Last year there were 250 people in attendance at the 9-11 ceremony.

"We remember these men and women one day a year, but their families remember them every day," Tarpley said. "That is just one of the many reasons we need to

## Deputy Chief: Planning ahead will save your family from fire

If you awoke in the middle of the night to find a fire had somehow started in your home, would you and your loved ones know where to go and what to do?

That's the question officials with the Big Spring Fire Department are posing this month, as the local organization looks to participate in National Preparedness Month.

According to BSFD Deputy Chief David Armstrong, surviving a house fire comes down to one essential action: Planning ahead.

"Once a fire has started, there is no time to plan how to get out. Sit down with your family today and make a step-by-step plan for escaping a fire," Armstrong said. "Draw a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of every room — especially sleeping areas. Be sure to discuss the escape routes with every member of your household.

"Agree on a meeting place where every member of the household will gather outside your home after escaping a fire to wait for the fire

department. This allows you to count heads and inform the fire department if anyone is missing or trapped inside the burning building."

Armstrong urged families:

- Install smoke detectors and keep them in working order.
- Make an escape plan and practice it.
- Consider installing an automatic fire-sprinkler system.

The plan — referred to as EDITH (exit drills in the home) — is only as good as how well household members can execute it, according to Armstrong.

"Practice your escape plan

at least twice a year," he said. "Have a fire drill in your home. Appoint someone to be the monitor and have everyone participate. Remember, a fire drill is not a race. Get out quickly, but carefully. Also, be sure to make your exit drill realistic. Pretend some exits are blocked by fire and practice alternative escape routes. Also try pretending the lights are out and that some escape routes are filling with smoke.

"Make sure everyone in the household can unlock all doors and windows quickly, even in the dark. Windows or

# State Briefs

## 2 men convicted in KFC killings want new DNA tests

HENDERSON, Texas (AP) — Two Tyler men convicted and serving life prison terms for the notorious East Texas Kentucky Fried Chicken slayings that went unsolved for more than two decades have filed court motions seeking new DNA testing of evidence.

Romeo Pinkerton pleaded guilty in 2007 to five first-degree murder counts. His cousin, Darnell Hartsfield, went to trial the following year and was convicted of similar charges.

The five victims were abducted during a robbery of the Kilgore KFC in 1983, taken to an oilfield outside town and fatally shot.

Advances in DNA testing allowed investigators to tie the cousins to the slayings. Both men last month filed their own motions in their trial court questioning the reliability of the DNA results.

The Rusk County prosecutor said Wednesday he's confident the convictions are solid.

## El Paso reports West Nile death

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — A West Texas city has reported its first West Nile virus death of the year to push the statewide fatality count to at least 44.

The City of El Paso Department of Public Health on Wednesday confirmed a 77-year-old man had died of the West Nile virus. His name and further details on the death were not immediately released.

The agency says it's the worst year ever for West Nile deaths in the state. Texas health officials say the state had 40 West Nile deaths in 2003.

## Operator fired over slaying victim's 911 call

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas 911 operator is fired and another is suspended over the handling of a 911 calls from and about a woman later found dead.

A police statement Wednesday says Police Chief David Brown fired Angelia Herod-Graham after investigators determined she didn't log information from Deanna Cook's family when they reported her missing Aug. 19.

The family then went to Cook's home, forced their way in and found her body.

Brown suspended Tonyita Hopkins for 10 days and ordered her reassigned after investigators determined she didn't log critical information from an Aug. 17 call from Cook, where she reported she was being attacked.

Both can appeal. A number listed for Herod-Gra-

ham was reported as disconnected. Hopkins didn't return a message seeking comment.

## Air Force instructor's sex scandal trial delayed

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A court-martial due to start in the case against a Texas Air Force basic training instructor accused in a sex scandal at a San Antonio air base was delayed without explanation Wednesday.

The trial of Master Sgt. Jamey Crawford had been scheduled to begin Wednesday afternoon at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio. But no attorneys were present as the scheduled start time passed, the San Antonio Express-News (<http://bit.ly/OYk0Nx>) reported.

Finally, trial judge Col. Donald Eller entered the courtroom, picked up a blue binder and left without comment.

Lt. Col. Mark Hoover, a lawyer with the Air Force training command, confirmed what had become apparent.

"To preserve the integrity of the process, the court-martial that was scheduled to convene today is not going to convene today," Hoover said. "We anticipate more information tomorrow, and as soon as we have information we will provide that update."

Crawford is accused of having a wrongful sexual relationship with a trainee, wrongfully providing and consuming alcohol with a trainee, committing adultery with the trainee and making a false official statement.

## North Texas man gets probation in dog abuse case

WEATHERFORD, Texas (AP) — A North Texas man who kept dozens of dogs in filthy conditions has been sentenced to two years of probation and 80 hours of community service.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reports 50-year-old Harry George Weldon of Fort Worth pleaded guilty to misdemeanor cruelty to non-livestock animals.

Weldon's plea deal was reached last month in Parker County where 58 dogs were located in May. At least 31 dogs found in crates, with no food or water, were taken to a shelter. Some of the other animals were dead or had to be euthanized.

Four of his relatives face animal cruelty or child endangerment charges. A toddler was in a crib at the home where animal waste littered the floor.

Weldon was also fined \$500 and must pay court costs.

which will be serviced by Union Pacific."

The agreement would require \$5,000 being put into an escrow account until EMS is able to come back to the EDC with a lease agreement. The deposit would ensure the company has until Dec. 15 to make a decision and present a plan to the board for development of the property.

"This agreement basically stipulates that the EDC will not lease this property to anyone else until EMS has ample time to produce a plan and timeline for the board to consider and approve," Wegman said.

The developed project would be named Big Spring Express Rail Terminal. Upon hearing the major points and considering the proposed agreement the board unanimously agreed to approve the memorandum of understanding with EMS.

The approval comes shortly after the first of two locomotives for the Big Spring Rail System arrived last week. According to Wegman, the location of Transport Handling Specialists was a fortunate addition to the Big Spring and Howard County community.

"This has truly opened a lot of doors for us and now is the time to take advantage of the transportation industry," Wegman said. "The addition of the Big Spring Express Rail Terminal, should it come to fruition, will only further THS's operations."

He continued, "We always talk about being the crossroads and this could be the first step in taking advantage of that."

BSEDC Board Member Jim DePauw added, "Big Spring has a real opportunity to take advantage of being the crossroads of West Texas and it is a great time to be in Big Spring."

keep this going.

"Every soldier who has served in combat knows the fear of 'If I die, will I be forgotten' and this is a way to tell them 'no they won't be forgotten'— as long as I have anything to do with it."

Tarpley, a veteran himself, said he will continue to hold the ceremony to ensure the families and the veterans their sacrifice is not forgotten.

"As a Vietnam vet, I wanted to make sure the young guys weren't treated like we were coming home. When those Gold Star families come up to you and say 'thanks,' we make sure we do it one more year," he said.

"Surviving Ourselves" focuses the spotlight on several individuals Herm met who are doing things to make a difference in their communities. According to him, the book details the relationship humans have with nature and how we are impacted spiritually, physically and emotionally.

"The first book — *Son of a Farmer, Child of the Earth* — was focused around research, facts and statistics. This book is more about bringing a pure message," Herm said.

doors with security bars need to be equipped with quick-release devices and everyone in the household should know how to use them."

Armstrong said it's important to pay attention to the special situations which can arise in an emergency, especially when the building is an apartment or other multi-story structure.

"If you live in an apartment building, use stairways to escape. Never use an elevator during a fire," Armstrong said. "It may stop between floors or take you to a floor where the fire is burning. Some high-rise buildings may have evacuation plans which require you to stay where you are and wait

for the fire department.

"If you live in a multi-story house and you must escape from an upper story window, be sure there is a safe way to reach the ground, such as a fire-resistant fire escape ladder. Make special arrangements for children, older adults and people with disabilities. People who have difficulty moving should have a phone in their sleeping area and, if possible, should sleep on the ground floor."

Unfortunately, no plan is fool-proof, making it necessary for household members to know how to spot a bad situation and avoid it, according to Armstrong.

"Test doors before opening them," he said. "While kneeling or crouching at the door, reach up as high as you can and, with the back of your hand, touch the door, the knob and the

crack between the door and its frame. If you feel any warmth at all, use another escape route. If the door feels cool, open it with caution. Put your shoulder against the door and open it slowly. Be prepared to slam it shut if there is smoke or flames on the other side.

"If you are trapped, close all doors between you and the fire. Stuff the cracks around the doors to keep out smoke. Wait at a window and signal for help with a flashlight or by waving a light colored cloth. If there is a phone in the room, call the fire department and report exactly where you are."

Armstrong said it's important to get out as quickly as possible in the event of a fire.

"Don't stop for anything. Don't try to rescue possessions or pets," Armstrong said

firmly. "Go directly to your meeting place and then call the fire department from a neighbor's phone, a portable phone or an alarm box. Every member of your household should know how to call the fire department.

"Once you are out of your home, don't go back for any reason. If people are trapped, the firefighters have the best chance of rescuing them. The heat and smoke of a fire are overpowering. Firefighters have the training, ex-

perience and protective equipment needed to enter burning buildings."

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# Clinton rallies Demo troops at convention

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — In an impassioned speech that rocked the Democratic National Convention, former President Bill Clinton proclaimed Wednesday night, “I know we’re coming back” from the worst economic mess in generations and appealed to hard-pressed Americans to stick with Barack Obama for a second term in the White House.

Obama strode onstage as Clinton concluded his speech. The 42nd president bowed, and was pulled into an embrace by the 44th as thousands of delegates jammed into the convention hall roared their approval.

Clinton, conceding that many struggling in a slow-recovery economy don’t yet feel improvement, said circumstances are indeed getting better, “and if you’ll renew the president’s contract you will feel it.”

To more cheers, he said of Obama, “I want to nominate a man who is cool on the outside but who burns for America on the inside.”

Not long afterward, the delegates formally awarded Obama their nomination to a second

term in a post-midnight roll call of the states.

Clinton spoke as Obama’s high command worked to control the political fallout from an embarrassing retreat on the party platform, just two months from Election Day in the tight race with Republican challenger Mitt Romney.

Under criticism from Romney, the Obama camp abruptly rewrote the day-old document to insert a reference to God and to declare that Jerusalem “is and will remain the capital of Israel.” Some delegates objected loudly, but Los Angeles Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa, presiding in the largely-empty hall, ruled them outvoted.

White House aides said Obama had personally ordered the changes, but they did not disclose whether he had approved the earlier version.

The convention concludes Thursday with Obama’s acceptance speech before a prime-time national TV audience. Aides announced he would speak in the convention hall rather than a nearby 74,000-seat football stadium as originally planned. They cited weather con-

cerns as the reason for the switch in a city that has been hit by heavy rains in recent days.

Romney, nominated at his own convention last week, spent his second straight day in Vermont preparing for next month’s debates with Obama.

Clinton’s speech was deemed so important by Obama’s campaign aides that they delayed the president’s formal nomination to a second term until it was over. The familiar roll call of the states began well after television prime time in the eastern part of the country, and the hall was emptying out rapidly as it dragged on past midnight.

Obama’s campaign hoped the former president would prove especially persuasive in an era of sluggish economic growth and 8.3 percent unemployment.

Clinton is exceptionally popular 12 years after he left office, particularly among white men, a group among whom Obama polls poorly, statistics show.

The speech was vintage Clinton, overlong for sure, insults delivered with a folksy grin, references to his own time in office and his wife

Hillary, all designed to improve Obama’s shaky re-election prospects.

The convention hall rocked with delegates’ applause and cheers the former president strode onstage to sounds of “Don’t Stop Thinking About Tomorrow,” his 1992 campaign theme song.

He sought to rebut every major criticism Republicans leveled against the president at their own convention last week in Tampa, and said that in fact, since 1961, far more jobs have been created under Democratic presidents than when Republicans sat in the White House, by a margin of 42 mil-

lion to 24 million.

Clinton accused Republicans of proposing “the same old policies that got us into trouble in the first place” and led to a near financial meltdown.

Those, he proclaimed, include efforts to provide “tax cuts for higher-income Americans, more money for defense than the Pentagon wants and ... deep cuts on programs that help the middle class and poor children.”

“As another president once said, ‘There they go again,’” he said, quoting Ronald Reagan, who often uttered the remark as a rebuke to Democrats.

There was another reference to Reagan, whom Democrats routinely accused of advocating “trickle down economics” that favored the rich.

In a tight race for the White House and with control of the Senate at stake, Democrats signaled unmistakable concern about the growing financial disadvantage they confront. Officials said Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel, who was Obama’s first White House chief of staff, was resigning as national co-chair of the president’s campaign to help raise money for a super PAC that supports the his re-election.

## Obama to sketch path forward

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — President Barack Obama goes before the Democratic National Convention and the nation on Thursday for a capstone speech designed not just to persuade undecided voters to swing his way in a tight election but to put fire in the belly of his supporters and get them to come out on Election Day.

Obama senior adviser David Plouffe promised the president would give voters “a very clear sense of where he thinks the country needs to go economically, the path we need to take.” But he also cautioned that no one should expect Obama to slingshot out of his convention with a big boost in polls that have long signaled a close race.

“We’ve always believed that there’s very little elasticity in the election,” said Plouffe, up early to preview the president’s speech on morning talk shows, adding: “You’re not going to see big bounces in this election. For the next 61 days, it’s going to remain tight as a tick.”

Citing a chance of thunderstorms, convention organizers scrapped plans for Obama to speak to an enormous crowd in a 74,000-seat outdoor stadium and decided to shoehorn the event into the convention arena, which accommodates 15,000. That means no reprise of the massive show of support, excitement — and on-scene voter registration — from Obama’s 2008 acceptance speech before 84,000 in Denver. Republicans said Democrats made the switch because they feared the

sight of empty seats.

Obama planned to hold an afternoon conference call with the tens of thousands of supporters bumped from the guest list when the speech was moved indoors, and campaign officials said they would try to arrange for those who had stadium tickets to attend another Obama event before Election Day.

Skies over downtown Charlotte were overcast Thursday morning, and the forecast gave a 40 percent chance of showers in the afternoon, leaving a potential opening for second-guessers.

In an election in which the economy is the top issue to voters, the president got a bit of encouraging news when the Labor Department reported that the number of people seeking unemployment benefits fell by 12,000 last week, a hopeful signal that the job market may be improving.

Among those giving warm-up speeches for the president Thursday night: Vice President Joe Biden and actress Eva Longoria.

Longoria, appearing on NBC’s “Today,” said she’s “been in the trenches” for Obama defending his record, and promised her speech will be very different from Clint Eastwood’s meandering remarks to the Republicans a week earlier.

“No empty chairs,” she promised, a reference to Eastwood’s conversation with an empty chair representing Obama.

Even as the president asks voters to stick with him, Mitt Romney and the Republicans keep nudging Obama’s supporters

to rethink their allegiance to a president seeking re-election in a time of weak economic growth.

The party released a new ad Thursday called “The Breakup,” in which a woman tells the president: “This just isn’t working ... You’re not the person I thought you were. ... I think we should just be friends.”

On Obama’s big day, Romney was in Vermont and had no public schedule. He was preparing for the fall debates and planned to drive back to his home in New Hampshire in the afternoon.

It was no accident the president devoted many stops on a pre-convention tour of battleground states to campus crowds of the sort that lifted him to the Democratic nomination and the presidency last time.

“Barack’s challenge here is to sort of wake up America and make them realize how serious this election is,” Democratic Rep. Sam Farr of California said in an interview at the convention. Judging from his town hall meetings in August, when only 15 or 20 people showed up instead of the usual hundreds, there is a “big apathy about politics right now,” regardless of party.

Farr added: “If we have an apathetic America, I’m terrified.”

Former Philadelphia Mayor Ed Rendell, a past Democratic Party chairman who appeared on “CBS This Morning,” said he’s still worried “about the base turning out to the degree they did” for Obama in 2008. He cited the battleground states of North Carolina and Virginia in particular.

## Campaign keeping fact-checkers busy

WASHINGTON (AP)

Center. — It’s unprecedented, the experts say: The volume and audacity of distortion, deception and truth-stretching in this year’s presidential campaign has political fact-checkers busier than ever in their pursuit of the truth. But whose truth, precisely? And, in the context of a bitter campaign, does the actual truth — and the responsibility of a politician to tell it — really matter?

The question hangs over every modern campaign, and of course lying and truth-stretching have abounded in politics throughout U.S. history.

But there are differences this time around. The convention speech last week by GOP vice-presidential nominee Paul Ryan may have brought the conversation into focus, but his carefully parsed words are hardly the only ones in the political arena that make people wonder if truth is becoming elastic.

Recent changes in campaign-finance regulations have enabled super PACs — outside political action committees bankrolled by wealthy Americans — to spend huge sums on aggressive ads that ostensibly are beyond the control of the candidates’ own campaign operation.

These proliferating third-party ads have been less accurate than candidate-sponsored ads, according to Kathleen Hall Jamieson, director of the University of Pennsylvania’s Annenberg Public Policy

As a result, she said, “the sheer amount of deception is higher.”

Another factor: Political ads are spread across ever-diversifying media, often resulting in highly targeted ads catering to specific interest groups rather than the electorate as a whole.

That can produce many different shades of a statement — and different interpretations of its truthfulness.

“What’s different is that there are more messages and more fact-checkers, and naturally more conflict between them,” said Bill Adair, editor of Politifact.com. “Our goal is not to get politicians to stop lying. ... Our goal is giving voters vital information about what’s true and what’s not.”

Adair’s organization, a project of The Tampa Bay Times, has grown to encompass 36 reporters and editors. Full-fledged fact-checking operations also are conducted by The Associated Press, The Washington Post, FactCheck.org and others.

Yet Republican and Democratic campaign operatives seem un deterred by the fact-checking. They’re eager to trumpet findings that discredit their opponents while dismissing findings that challenge their own ads and rhetoric.

Mitt Romney’s pollster, Neil Newhouse, has indicated to ABC News/Yahoo News that his campaign won’t be swayed by outside complaints of inaccuracy.



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# Dallas downs N.Y. 24-17 in opener

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Jason Witten was supposed to stay home. Kevin Ogletree was supposed to be a bit player.

And the replacement officials were supposed to be a fiasco.

Instead, Witten provided the inspiration by playing weeks after lacerating his spleen, third wideout Ogletree made the big plays, and the officials had a mostly quiet night in the NFL's season opener.

The Cowboys waited all year for another shot at the New York Giants, and when they got it Wednesday night, they were relentless in a 24-17 victory that really wasn't that close.

"We executed on offense and defense when we needed to," Tony Romo said after throwing for three touchdowns and 307 yards. "We put them in a hole. Our job was to keep the pedal down, to not let up because you know what kind of team they have over there."

Not a good enough team this night as the Giants lost for the first time since Game 15 of last season. Part of their six-game winning streak that earned them a fourth Super Bowl title last winter was a win over Dallas on New Year's Day to take the NFC East. New York did everything right back then, and very little right in becoming the first NFL champion to lose the now-traditional midweek kickoff game in its nine-year existence.

"I don't think we played up to our potential at all," defensive end Osi Umeny-

iora said. "Obviously they were prepared and they fought, and all the credit in the world goes to that team. They played a very good game today."

And the field officials did their part. It was feared they would be a big factor with the league's lockout of the regulars. But there were no controversies, no blatant mistakes or rampant confusion.

"No problems, just as we said there wouldn't be," league executive Ray Anderson said at halftime. Nothing changed in the second half.

Many Cowboys credited Witten's presence with lifting their spirits and their performance.

"Sometimes you don't care about yourself, you just play for the guys," DeMarcus Ware said. "It was emotional. We were all behind him when he said he would play."

Witten, who had two catches for 10 yards, didn't think it was such a big deal.

"I think and hope every other player on our team would do the same thing," he said. "At this point in your career, you want that mentality to leave it all out there."

DeMarco Murray rushed for 129 yards and the defense sacked Eli Manning three times.

For Ogletree, the night was a special homecoming.

"Those guys aren't worrying about that," Rangers manager Ron Washington said. "If we take care of our business, it doesn't matter what they do."

Well, the Rangers certainly took care of their business. Adrian Beltre hit a three-run homer, Michael Young also went deep and Texas held on for a 7-6 victory over the Royals to open a five-game lead in the division after the A's lost their matinee.

Ryan Dempster (5-1) gave up RBI doubles to Billy Butler in the first inning and Salvador Perez in the sixth, but was otherwise stingy for the Rangers. He only allowed two other hits in six sharp innings, striking out eight to win his fourth

# Federer, Roddick exit stage left at U.S. Open

NEW YORK (AP) — On an emotion-filled afternoon that morphed into a shocker of an evening, Andy Roddick and Roger Federer both bid farewell to Flushing Meadows.

Roddick is leaving for good, a moment he knew would come this week.

Federer is presumably gone only until next year, though the timing of his 2012 U.S. Open exit was unexpected.

Roddick lost 6-7 (1), 7-6 (4), 6-2, 6-4 to No. 7 seed Juan Martin del Potro to bring the curtain down on his career Wednesday — an ending that came, fittingly, on the court where he won his only Grand Slam title, back in 2003.

Federer fell 7-6 (1), 6-4, 3-6, 6-3 to No. 6 Tomas Berdych,

who improved to 4-3 in his last seven matches against the 17-time Grand Slam champion, ending Federer's string of U.S. Open semifinal appearances at eight, much the way he halted Federer's streak of 23 straight trips to major semifinals back in 2010 at Wimbledon.

The two losers' news conferences were where the postmatch drama was. They couldn't have been any different in tone.

"Maybe it's a good match-up for him," top-seeded Federer said in one of his several short, clipped answers, when asked about Berdych's recent success against him. "I don't see him play every match he plays on tour. That's why I can't really answer that question."

Roddick, however, lingered over his final official session with the reporters. He said it was fun to be in Arthur Ashe Stadium, listening to the fans spur him on with cheers of "Let's go Andy" — and to play tennis simply for tennis' sake.

"It wasn't about ranking points or paychecks or anything else," Roddick said. "This week I felt like I was 12 years old, playing in a park. It was extremely innocent. That was fun. I enjoyed it."

Last week, Roddick used the occasion of his 30th birthday to announce the U.S. Open would be his last tournament as a pro. He did get one bonus day on the grounds, thanks to a rainstorm that delayed his match Tuesday with him

leading 1-0 in the first-set tiebreaker. He hit the ground running, won six of seven points after the restart and won the tiebreaker.

That, however, was as good as things would get. He dropped the second set in a tiebreaker, fell behind by two early breaks in the third, then after getting broken early in the fourth set, he could feel the end was near. He appeared to be trying to avoid crying while serving in the next-to-last game. In the stands, both his mother, Blanche, and his wife, actress-model Brooklyn Decker, were wiping away tears.

After match point, del Potro met Roddick at the net

That proved to be the case again Wednesday night.

Kinsler led off the game with a single, and after Andrus went down swinging, Josh Hamilton walked to put runners on first and second for the hottest hitter in the Texas lineup.

Beltré calmly waited for a 1-2 pitch from Teaford and sent it soaring over the left-field wall for a three-run homer, his 29th of the season. The ball landed just shy of the fountains.

"That's what I'm supposed to be doing," Beltré said demurely.

The slugging third baseman also tripled and scored in the eighth, giving him 10 homers, seven doubles and two triples since Aug. 20. Beltré has scored 15 runs and driven in 20 in that stretch.

"I saw his charts yesterday and the whole chart was like, red against lefties. It's basically a heat map. Red would describe Kansas City in July, that kind of hot," Teaford said. "If you make a bad pitch, he hits it real well. He's tough. You've just got to hope to make good pitches."

The Royals clawed back with runs in the first and sixth, but Texas added three in the seventh, the homer by Young starting things off. Kansas City added two more runs in the bottom half to keep it close, and the teams traded runs in the eighth before Nathan held on through a shaky ninth.

The veteran closer has 28 saves in 29 chances this season.

"We played catch-up all night, and when we'd get close they'd tack on," Royals manager Ned Yost said. "The three-run seventh did us in."

Former Ravens owner Modell dead at age 87

BALTIMORE (AP) — One of the most influential owners in the history of the NFL, Art Modell helped mold the foundation of the league.

The innovative Modell, whose reputation was forever tainted when he moved his franchise from Cleveland to Baltimore, died early Thursday. He was 87.

David Modell said he and his brother, John, were at their father's side when he "died peacefully of natural causes."

"Poppy" was a special man who was loved by his sons, his daughter-in-law Michel, and his six grandchildren," David Modell said. "Moreover, he was adored by the entire Baltimore community for his kindness and generosity. And, he loved Baltimore."

Modell was among the most important figures in the NFL as owner of the Cleveland Browns, who became the Ravens after he took the team to Baltimore in 1996 — a move that hounded him the rest of his life.

The Ravens won their lone Super Bowl in January 2001, less than a year after Modell sold a minority interest of the team to Steve Bisciotti. In April 2004, Bisciotti completed purchase of the franchise but left Modell a 1 percent share.

During his four decades as an NFL owner, Modell helped negotiate the league's lucrative contracts with television networks, served as president of the NFL from 1967 to 1969, and chaired the negotiations for the first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968.

He also was the driving force behind the 1970 contract between the NFL and ABC to televise games on Monday night.

At one time one of Cleveland's biggest civic leaders, Modell became a pariah in Ohio after he moved the team.

The move was also believed to be the main reason why Modell never made it into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He was one of 15 finalists in 2001 and a semifinalist seven times.

NFL pledges \$30m for medical research

NEW YORK (AP) — The NFL has pledged \$30 million for medical research to the Foundation for the National Institutes of Health.

Commissioner Roger Goodell on Wednesday announced the donation to the foundation, which helps raise private funding for the NIH, the nation's leading medical research agency.

The same day the grant was announced, researchers published a study indicating that former NFL players are unusually prone to dying from degenerative brain disease.

The work, presented online in the journal Neurology, drew on a long-running study of more than 3,400 NFL players with at least five playing seasons in the league between 1959 and 1988. Some 334 had died by the end of 2007, the cutoff for the study.

Researchers found that deaths from Alzheimer's, Parkinson's and Lou Gehrig's diseases, when combined, reached about three times the rate one would predict from the general population. The study did not look for chronic traumatic encephalopathy, but researchers said some of the deaths they counted could have been from misdiagnosed CTE.

The research funded by the NFL's grant is designed to benefit athletes and the general population, including members of the military, Goodell said.

Potential areas of research under the grant include the brain, specifically CTE, concussion management and treatment, and the understanding of the relationship between traumatic brain injury and late-life neurodegenerative disorders.



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## News in brief

### U.S. rights group reports evidence of wider CIA use of waterboarding than acknowledged

CAIRO (AP) — Human Rights Watch said it has uncovered evidence of a wider use of waterboarding in American interrogations of detainees than has been acknowledged by the United States, in a report Thursday that details further brutal treatment at secret CIA-run prisons under the Bush administration-era U.S. program of detention and rendition of terror suspects.

The report also paints a more complete picture of Washington's close cooperation with the regime of Libya's former dictator Moammar Gadhafi in the wake of the 9/11 attacks. The U.S. handed over to Libya the Islamist opponents of Gadhafi that it detained abroad with only thin "diplomatic assurances" that they would not be mistreated, and several of them were subsequently tortured in prison, Human Rights Watch said.

The 154-page report features interviews by the New York-based group with 14 Libyan dissident exiles. They describe systematic abuses while they were held in U.S.-led detention centers in Afghanistan — some as long as two years — or in U.S.-led interrogations in Pakistan, Morocco, Thailand, Sudan and elsewhere before the Americans handed them over to Libya.

"Not only did the U.S. deliver (Gadhafi) his enemies on a silver platter, but it seems the CIA tortured many of them first, said Laura Pitter, counterterrorism adviser at Human Rights Watch and author of the report.

### From North Pacific to South China Sea, nationalism stoking bitter Asian island disputes

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP) — They are mere specks on the map. Many are uninhabited, and others sparsely so by fishermen and seasonal residents. Yet the

disputed ownership of these tiny constellations of islands is inflaming nationalist fervor from the cold North Pacific to the tropical South China Sea.

In recent weeks, these long-simmering tensions have returned to a boil, with violent protests in Chinese cities, a provocative island junket by South Korea's lame-duck president, and Japan's government reportedly planning to buy disputed islands from their private owners.

The popular analysis is that the rising tensions are fueled by a regional power shift that has seen China become increasingly assertive with its neighbors in securing claims over potentially resource-rich waters to its south and east. But the growing acrimony may have at least as much to do with domestic political posturing.

"Wrapping yourself up in the national flag gives a very convenient exit for people with other agendas to justify their positions," says political scientist Koichi Nakano of Tokyo's Sophia University.

Nationalism has often been used by China's communist leaders to cover up domestic problems — such as the economic slowdown the country is now facing, not to mention problems with a growing rich-poor divide and official corruption.

### Small-town movie theaters across U.S. face closure as industry switches from film to digital

CRETE, Neb. (AP) — The Isis Theatre hasn't changed much since it opened 86 years ago in southeast Nebraska, a stone's throw from the grain elevator and railroad tracks that cut through town.

But in the past few years, the movie industry has changed dramatically, and unless the Isis' owner comes up with \$85,000 soon to pay for new digital equipment, residents of Crete, Neb., may have to drive 40 miles to Lincoln for a night at the movies.

It's a prospect that owner Thom Reeves doesn't want to ponder, but like thousands of small-theater operators across the country, he hasn't found a way out.

"This is my passion, to give back to the community," Reeves said. "I love this movie theater. I love what it does for the students I have employed there. We love our patrons. It's such a positive experience going on, and we're just a little sad this conversion is hitting us. How do we survive?"

For small-theater owners, the problem is the sudden switch from 35 mm film, an industry standard since about 1910, to digital — a format that's cheaper for both studios and distributors, and doesn't scratch as traditional film will. The switch means theater owners must buy new projection equipment, computers and a sound system.

### Police face legal minefield when they implement most contentious part of Ariz. immigration law

PHOENIX (AP) — More than two years after it was signed into law, the most contentious part of Arizona's landmark immigration legislation is expected to finally go into effect following a federal court ruling issue late Wednesday.

But the U.S. Supreme Court has laid a legal minefield that Arizona now must navigate when the critical provision takes effect. The clause, one of the few significant ones that the high court left standing in a June ruling, requires all Arizona police officers to check the immigration status of people they stop while enforcing other laws and suspect are in the country illegally.

While preserving that requirement, however, the Supreme Court explicitly left the door open to arguments that the law leads to civil rights violations.

Civil rights activists are preparing to scour the state for such victims. Lydia Guzman, who runs Respect/Respeto, a Phoenix group that tracks racial profiling, said volunteers at the organization's call center have already been told to listen for new complaints when the requirement goes into effect.

"We're watching and we're looking for cases," she said.

### Powerful quake rattles Costa Rica, but little damage; experts point to depth, building code

CANGREJAL, Costa Rica (AP) — The bulletins were terrifying: a powerful earthquake had struck off the coast of this Central American country, spawning a tsunami warning and bringing fears of widespread catastrophe.

But Costa Rica suffered remarkably little damage from Wednesday's magnitude-7.6 quake — a few blocked highways, some collapsed houses and one death, of a heart attack caused by fright. Officials credited the relatively deep location of the quake and building codes that Costa Rican officials call as strict as those in California and Japan.

The quake was 25 miles (41 kilometers) below the surface. Tremors that occur deep underground tend to be less damaging, but their shaking can be felt over a wider area.

"If it was a shallower event, it would be a significantly higher hazard," said seismologist Daniel McNamara of the U.S. Geological Survey.

The U.S. Geological Survey said the quake was centered about 38 miles (60 kilometers) from the town of Liberia and 87 miles (140 kilometers) west of the capital, San Jose.

### Judge may order suspect's beard shaved

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) — A judge on Thursday was expected to order the Army psychiatrist charged in the deadly 2009 Fort Hood shooting rampage to have his beard shaved, which could trigger yet another delay in his upcoming murder trial.

Col. Gregory Gross, who said he will issue the order this week, first will preside over a hearing to determine how a

federal religious freedom law applies in Maj. Nidal Hasan's case. Witnesses for Army prosecutors and Hasan's attorneys will testify.

Beards are a violation of Army regulations, and soldiers who disobey orders to can be shaved against their will. Gross has repeatedly said that Hasan's beard, which he started growing in jail this summer, is a disruption to

the court proceedings. Gross has found Hasan in contempt of court at the past six pretrial hearings, then sent him to a nearby trailer to watch the proceedings on a closed-circuit television.

Hasan, 41, is charged with 13 counts of premeditated murder and 32 counts of attempted premeditated murder in the November 2009 attack on the Texas Army post.

Hasan told the judge last week that he grew a beard because his Muslim faith requires it, not as a show of disrespect. Hasan previously appealed after Gross said he would order him to be shaved if he did not get rid of the beard himself before the trial. Gross said he wants Hasan in the courtroom during the court-martial to prevent a possible appeal on the issue if he is convicted.

The Army has specific guidelines on forced shaving. A team of five military police officers restrains the inmate "with the reasonable force necessary," and a medical professional is on hand in case of injuries. The shaving must be done with electric clippers and must be videotaped, according to Army rules.

Last week the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces ruled that Hasan's appeal was premature because Gross has not issued a definitive order. But the court said that if Gross issues that order, Hasan would be able to appeal first to the Army Court of Criminal Appeals.



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


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
