He noted that such a price goal "would cost the government very little if any monies if administered correctly."

Presenting the TCGA position on other issues related to the 1981 Farm Bill and federal policies toward agriculture, King urged:

-Simplification of the commodity reserve programs to cut administrative costs, confusion and paperwork, and call levels set at not less than the national average price goals, with the government paying storage and interest

my opinion, will be killed and I think it should be." Hance said while discussing legislative issues during his town hall meeting here.

The meeting attracted a standing-room-only crowd of 100 or more to the city hall assembly room.

Hance said his main objection to Reagan's tax-cut proposal is that it "would create an additional \$48 billion deficit.'

"If we pass that proposal, you're going to see high interest rates continue, Hance said. "It's easy to tell people you're going to cut their taxes 10%, but if inflation keeps going up by a higher percentage, you really haven't done them a favor.'

Explaining other provisions of the administration's tax-cut package, Hance predicted that a proposal to allow businesses and industries to accelerate their depreciation rates would pass, but that the proposal to liberalize the estate-tax program would be cut in half.

Hance said he isn't sure just how serious President Reagan is about the tax-cut package.

'The President hasn't even asked us to vote for the tax cut," Hance reported. "He campaigned on it, but what he's pushing and talking with us about is the budget cut."

And on the budget-cutting program, Hance said, "I imagine he'll get 90% of the

cuts he wants.' But Hance emphasized that a budget cut is not a spending

'What the general public doesn't know is that if President Reagan gets every cent of the budget cuts that he wants, we'll still be spending \$50 billion more than last

Hance announced that regional hearings on the proposed Farm Bill will be held April 21 in Lubbock and April 22 in Amarillo.

"There's a tremendous fight going on within the USDA now," he reported. 'Secretary Block wants an increase in loan prices, but others don't. Secretary Haig will have a lot of influence in this. I've never seen a Secretary of State yet that didn't want to run the USDA."

# exemption isn't enough

The Castro County Commissioners' Court was told Monday that the additional \$3,000 tax exemption it granted to elderly property owners two weeks ago wasn't enough

Mable Heard told the commissioners Monday that the \$3,000 exemption would not be of any substantial benefit to property owners who are disabled or who are 65 or older.

The minimum exemption of \$3,000 for next year, as allowed in the Texas Property Tax Code, would amount to according to County Tax The next meeting will be Assessor-Collector Jerry

"What you did was commendable, but . . . it was not commendable enough,' Mrs. Heard said, adding, "Six to nine dollars' tax relief is not very much relief."

She presented a petition with 378 signatures to the county governing board. Mrs. Heard had circulated the petition in Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth asking registered voters to force the city and the county to adopt the optional tax exemption.

The commissioners held that everyone is being taxed and that inflation affects

hit for money, he added. "If 65 is not a time to give a little relief, when is?" Mrs. Heard asked. "Are you going to tack a tax bill to our tombstones?"

Mrs. Heard said that an exemption as high as \$10,000

would be satisfactory. The commissioners decided about \$6.60 per person, to study the proposal further.

Cattlemen have every right to look sour after the debacle last spring which ended with the unceremonious collapse of the market. However, cattlemen may be able to begin trading in those grimaces for at least a partial grin. The cattle market in 1981, according to Oklahoma State University market analyst Dr. John Ikerd may well see a reversal in the offing which could be more dramatic than the recovery of last summer. Dr. Ikerd believes that the only dark cloud presently hovering over the cattle market is the general state of the economy - but even that has bright spots. Beef will not be under as much pressure this year as last, he says, by surpluses of pork and poultry. Also, feedlot placements are down, causing some cowmen to cut herds because of drought and financial reasons, reducing the supply of beef. Dr. Ikerd is even willing to put a number on his predictions: \$80 per hundredweight for feedlot finished cattle by late Spring,

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

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

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

The town of Dimmitt is a very dirty town. The people of Dimmitt need to help clean it up. We also need to stop littering.



the exemption.

A \$3,000 exemption would save each eligible resident \$18.30 at the present tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100, based on 41% assessment ratio. The city tax rate would need to be increased one cent per \$100 valuation to make up the difference, Mrs. Hamilton

If the city tax exemption were \$10,000, each eligible person would save \$61.50 in city taxes. To generate the \$13,837.50 lost in tax dollars the city rate would need to be hiked as much as six cents per \$100 valuation, Mrs. Ethington said.

The Dimmitt Independent School District granted the state mandated over-65 exemption to 265 people who asked for the exemption in was reimbursed about 54% of that money from the state. Mrs. Ethington said.

'The state reimburses the school district, but the state money is our money," Heller

"If they sign up for the exemption, the school freezes their taxes," Mrs. Ethington added. Even though taxes continue to increase, eligible persons won't pay more 'unless they build on to their homes," she said.

For example, one home on Lee Street would have created \$197.69 in taxes last year if the owner was not a senior citizen. The actual tax till, with the exemption, was \$29.01. The new appraisal on that home in 1981 would be \$303, but the owner will still only pay \$29.01.

Any exemption decreases the tax revenue, and the only option open to local governments - which are operating on tight budgets - is to increase the tax rate.
