# Gins going full blast as harvest winds down

Cotton stripping is about over in Castro County. Some farmers may have as much as two weeks of stripping to do, but L. J. Rice of Hart Producers Co-op Gin said that 90% or more of the cotton is already stripped. Cotton harvest slows down toward the final stages, Randy Clemens of Hart Gin explained, adding that "little patches" of cotton will keep coming in for a while. Most ginneries in the county said that the ginning will be finished in three weeks to a month. Ross Family Gin in Sunnyside hopes to finish by the middle of next week. Clay Davis at Flagg Farm-

ers' Gin said that, depending on the weather, the gin could be busy until Valentine's Day. The Flagg gin is only about 50% finished with its ginning, he added. Apparently, trailers of cotton still outnumber modules in the Hart area. But modules make up about 70 to 85% of all business in other gins in the county. A few modules are making as high as eight bales each. Bennie Ross at Sunnyside said that at the beginning of harvest, modules were making about seven bales each but that the later cotton is of poorer, trashier quality. Such cotton has brought the

average down — closer to five bales per module, she said. The cotton has "more burrs, trash, stalks and stems and not as much lint turnout" compared with last year's cotton, Davis said. "The sticks and stems" in the cotton makes for "slow ginning," Rice said. Farmers are in a dilemma trying to decide whether to sell their cotton on the market, put it into the government loan or to keep it for a while, Mrs. Ross said. Market price is only about 2½ to five cents over government loan now, Clemens said. Many farmers are waiting [See COTTON, Page 12]

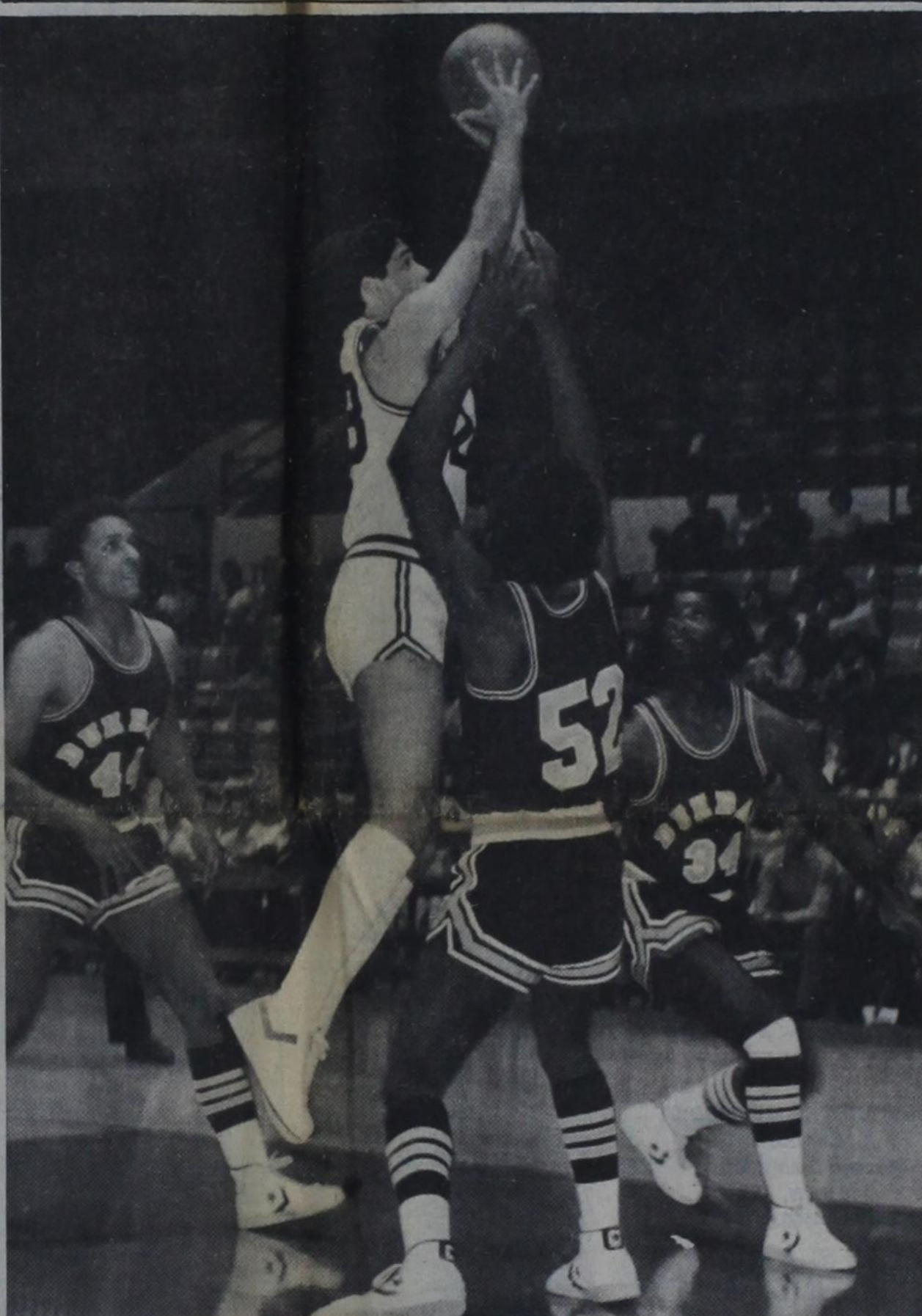

## Judge applicants sought

The Castro County Commissioners are calling for applications for a successor in the office of Castro County Judge. Applications, resumes and letters of intent must be turned in to the County Judge's Office by 5 p.m. Tuesday. The commissioners plan to review the applications next Wednesday and Thursday, and will meet Jan. 8 at 10 a.m. to interview candidates. The commissioners hope to make their decision and to give their endorsement then. The new county judge will take his oath of office Jan. 11 and will serve through 1982. Meanwhile, a judge will be elected in November, following the primary elections in May, to begin a new term Jan. 1, 1983. When County Judge M. L. Simpson died last Thursday after a brief illness, the responsibility for naming a

successor fell to the county commissioners. On Dec. 21, the five practicing attorneys in Castro County elected James R. Horton to serve as special judge for the County Court in the absence of Judge Simpson, who was then too ill to appear or to hold court. Horton took his oath immediately. The capacity of special judge does not allow for Horton to vote on any issue with the county commissioners, and his powers cease when the commissioners appoint a county judge to replace Simpson. The commissioners had the power to appoint a replacement Monday without calling for written applications, but they said they preferred to wait, out of respect for the Simpson family, and to take applications "in fairness to everybody."

With a three-person staff, the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office now collects only the fees on auto registration, car titles and beer and wine licenses, and conducts voter registration, since the duties of appraising all property and the collection of the county ad valorem taxes have been turned over to the new county tax appraisal

# Bobcats and Swiftettes advance in tournaments

Dimmitt's Bobcats fought their way to a large-school championship game and Nazareth's Swiftettes moved into a showdown with undefeated Kirtland, N.M., in tournaments at Lubbock Monday and Tuesday.

Meanwhile, Dimmitt's Bobbies suffered an opening-round loss and moved into the consolation bracket.

The Bobcats won three thrillers against Class AAAA and AAAAA schools Monday and Tuesday in the Caprock Holiday Tournament in Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

Coach Ken Cleveland's crew jumped to an early 14-4 lead over Lubbock Dunbar in their first-round game Monday, then survived a fourth-quarter Dunbar charge for a 59-58 victory.

The Bobcats played two games Tuesday, facing their toughest opposition so far this year, and won both. After downing Dunbar, the Bobcats found San Angelo Central — one of the tourney favorites — waiting with a bye Tuesday morning. Central led Dimmitt most of the way and built a 13-point lead in the third, but the Bobcats

came roaring back to capture a 61-58 thriller. That victory moved the Bobcats into the semifinals against the talented Wichita Falls Coyotes. Again the Bobcats used a gangbusters fourth quarter to open up a close game and take a 65-59 victory.

The Bobcats were to play the Lubbock Estacado Matadors Wednesday night for the championship of the tourney's large-school division.

"We're just glad to be there in the finals," Cleveland said as his Bobcats prepared to battle the big Estacado Matadors Wednesday.

"I believe San Angelo is the best team we've played so far — they really have a fine-looking ball club," Cleveland commented. He said the victory over San Angelo provided a good lesson for his team.

"We were down 13 points in the third quarter, 40-27, but our old kids really played well and came back. It's good to win a close one like that; it should really help our team. We could have folded when we were 13 points down, but the kids just dug in and won it."

Meanwhile, in the Lubbock Invitational Girls' Tournament, Nazareth's Swiftettes took an easy 69-27 victory over Lubbock Coronado in the first round Tuesday.

But the field narrowed quickly, with three defending state champions surviving the first round with a chance for the tourney championship. Defending Class AAAAA state champion Monterey, the tourney's host team, came out

# Sheriff appointee to run for election

Sheriff Lonny Rhynes announced this week that he will seek election in 1982 for the two years remaining in the current term of office. He will be a candidate in the Democratic Party primary in May. Rhynes was appointed to the sheriff's post by the county commissioners' court in 1980 after Sheriff-Elect Joe Ben Mitchell died before assuming office. Rhynes, a former deputy sheriff, had run second in a six-man race in 1980.

One of the main accomplishments during his term of office, Rhynes said, was certification of the county jail by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. Also, six members of the sheriff's staff have been trained and certified as jailers, with two more scheduled to attend the next school conducted by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and Potter County.

Also, five members of the sheriff's staff have attended state law enforcement schools for training in jailing, report writing and civil process, and Rhynes said that continuing education for all members of his department is one of his priorities.

Rhynes, 38, has been a law officer 6½ years in Hale and Castro Counties. He served on the Hale Center Police Dept. and as Hart city marshal before joining the

Castro County Sheriff's Office in 1977.

He and his wife, Paula, have three children, 11, 6 and 2. They live in Hart.

He is a member of the First Baptist Church of Hart, Sheriffs Association of Texas, National Sheriffs Association, Hart Volunteer Fire Dept. and Castro County Peace Officers Association.

"I've enjoyed serving the people in this office during the past year, and hope to continue to serve them in the future," Rhynes said. "We will try to keep our office updated so we can provide the best service that we can. I would appreciate your support in the election."

## Social Security in Castro County

By JANICE ULMER



Here we go again, into a new year. As always, this is a time of many changes, and 1982 will not be an exception for those of you with Medicare protection.

Starting in January 1982, there will be several changes in Medicare. The hospital deductible is increasing. The individual will now have to pay the first \$260 for the first 60 days. For the 61st day through the 90th day, the deductible has increased from \$51 per day to \$65 per day. Another increase will go into effect on the Part B or medical insurance deductible. Since 1972 the annual medical insurance deductible amount has been \$60. This will rise to \$75 beginning January 1, 1981.

We are also entering the general enrollment period for Medicare Jan. 1. Individuals over 65 who have either dropped previous Medicare coverage or who have never had it, may enroll for this coverage from January through March. Protection is then effective July 1, 1982.

This enrollment period only effects the medical insurance portion of Medicare. This coverage helps pay for doctor bills, out-patient hospital services and many other medical items and services not covered under hospital insurance.

It is possible for people who have never worked to apply for Medicare coverage. It is also possible for people who are not retired to apply for Medicare without signing up for monthly social security benefits.

In most cases, hospital insurance with Medicare is free. The doctor's portion of the insurance is financed by premiums paid by those enrolled and the Federal Government from general revenues.

The cost of this premium is currently \$11 per month. In some cases, if a person did not enroll three months before his or her 65th birthday or three months after (the initial enrollment period), the premium may be higher.

If you have any questions about Medicare we have a new pamphlet available that explains the changes in the deductibles as well as changes in the coverage of certain services. ## 'Baby blues'— how to cope?

Are you a new mother suffering from post-partum depression — more commonly known as "baby blues"?

Typical symptoms of "baby blues" include crying for no reason and feeling sad or depressed after giving birth, says Cindy B. Wilson, a family life education specialist.

"Baby blues" can range from mild to severe emotional changes due to physical changes and exhaustion, she explains.

Experiencing "baby blues" is a normal condition for many new mothers, and it can be stabilized to a great extent, the specialist notes.

To control these downward spiraling feelings, new mothers can do a few simple things, Wilson recommends.

— Eat well-balanced meals and rest adequately.

— Share inner feelings with someone else — don't bottle them inside.

— Plan "alone time" to relax, nap, read or participate in a quiet, enjoyable activity.

— Call on family, friends and neighbors to help out with housekeeping, cooking and care for the newborn the first month after giving birth.

Wilson is with the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

## County jail to get Randall's 'extras'

Castro County's commissioners Monday approved the purchase of a truck-tractor rig for the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. and approved helping Randall County with its inmate housing situation.

County Sheriff Lonny Rhynes reported to the commissioners that Randall County wants Castro County to handle some of its prisoners when it has a full house. Its capacity is 29 prisoners.

The state jail commission has stated that Castro County can house extra prisoners for Randall County at a charge of not more than \$35 per day.

Rhynes said that Castro County does not have the facilities or the personnel to handle more than one or two

extra prisoners from Randall County at a time.

The local county jail has been averaging nine to 10 prisoners daily, Rhynes said, adding that the jail standards must comply with the state regulations, and the county jail must not house too many inmates at any one time.

However, Rhynes said that he would like for Castro County to help Randall County whenever possible, because "we may need their help someday, too."

Commissioner Edd Wilson said that helping Randall County whenever it was in a bind would be "a courtesy."

The county governing board approved helping Randall County by housing one inmate at anytime needed, and possibly two inmates when in a bind.

County Attorney Jimmy Davis will formulate a contract with Randall County. Castro will charge Randall no less than \$25 per day for housing of an inmate for up to 90 days, with re-negotiations necessary after that time.

The commissioners approved the purchase of a 1973 Freight Liner tractor rig from Steere/Tank Lines at a cost of \$6,000. The tractor will replace an old tractor for a 2,500-gallon capacity tanker unit that is kept at the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. to take to rural fires.

Fire Chief Randy Griffitt said that the old tractor broke down completely during a recent run out of town.

The commissioners decided to use revenue sharing funds and to amend the budget to allow for the purchase of the tractor.

They also discussed the possibility of asking for bids on the old tractor and using the money to purchase emergency lights, sirens and other needs for the newer tractor.

In other business, the commissioners:

—Approved a 10% salary increase for the 64th and 242nd Judicial Districts' court reporters. The salaries for the court reporters is divided among three counties, with Castro paying 16%, Swisher

19% and Hale 65%.

—Approved a resolution allowing the continuation of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) program in Castro County.

C. O. "Dutch" LaRue was honored at a dinner in Hereford Tuesday night as the first retiree of the Dimmitt Amstar Plant.

LaRue joined Amstar in August 1975 as an A-stores helper.

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

# Public clinics to start providing generic drugs

A new source of low-priced prescription drugs should be available to residents of the area beginning Jan. 15, according to Diana Tavarez, director of clinic operations with the South Plains Health Provider Organization, Inc.'s main office in Plainview. South Plains Health Provider clinics in Dimmitt, Hereford, Plainview, Floydada, Littlefield and Crosbyton will be served under a new agreement in which Blair Pharmacy of Plainview will supply generic prescription drugs to the clinics to be dispensed by clinic doctors to the clinic patients. "People cannot bring a prescription from another doctor and get it filled at the clinic," Tavarez said. "This is to be a service for our clinic patients, and to save each clinic the expense of having its own pharmacist."

sliding fee scale based on family income and number of family members in a household. "We do not deny services to anyone, and they don't have to be migrants, though they are the group our programs are mainly aimed at," she explained. The Plainview pharmacy, which won the contract on a bid basis, will deliver the drugs to each clinic, maintain an inventory of the drugs and fill in additional supplies when needed. Visits for this purpose will be made to each clinic about every two weeks, Tavarez said. The general supply of drugs that each clinic will hold was determined by a physician survey on the drugs most often prescribed, and will include antibiotics, antihistamines, cardio-vasculars, and

anti-hypertensives, but "absolutely no so-called hard drugs will be included," Tavarez said, adding that those type of drugs will be handled on a regular prescription basis through the pharmacy of the patient's choice. Bids on the contract to supply the drugs were opened almost a year ago and the board of directors of the organization originally approved the contract several months ago. Final approval had awaited review by the US Dept. of Health and Human Services, which funds the organization. Tavarez said the delay in actual operation of the program is because of time needed to inspect and prepare the clinics for reception and protection of the drug supplies.

"We've had at least one child in school for 31 years — from the time our oldest started first grade in 1950, until the last one graduated from college two weeks ago," said Oneida Hutto of Dimmitt, wife of S. R. Hutto.

Their five children have earned seven college degrees. Mrs. Hutto herself and two daughters-in-law also are college graduates, with degrees ranging from a bachelor's to a Ph.D. Another daughter-in-law and S. R. also attended college but did not finish.

The last to finish was Karen, who graduated Dec. 18 from Texas Tech with a bachelor of science degree in horticulture.

"She took a little longer, because she changed her major three times," Mrs. Hutto said. "She tried home economics and fashion merchandising before she settled on horticulture. She's really happy with it."

"That's one of the main reasons I set the goal for my children to have good educations — so that they would have the skills and knowledge to follow whatever type of job they could enjoy," she added.

Aaron, the oldest child, graduated from Dimmitt High School in 1962 and went on to Tech and Texas A&M, where he earned his doctorate of veterinary medicine (DVM) in 1969. He is now a veterinarian in Hereford, and "a good one, I might add," Mrs. Hutto said.

In 1967, Rodney graduated from DHS and went to A&M, where he earned his master's degree in animal science in 1974. He also majored in education. He has a brokerage firm in Canadian and is

involved in selling a machine he built that fills and stitches sacks of cottonseed hulls, which are sold to oil drilling firms.

Byron graduated from Dimmitt High in 1971 and also went to A&M, where he received his bachelor of science degree in agricultural economics in 1974, and did some work towards his master's. He is now living in Sherman and working for the Anderson Grain Co.

The twins, Keith and Karen, graduated from DHS in 1975. Keith went to Blinn Junior College in Brenham for two years, while Karen first attended South Plains College at Levelland for a semester, then transferred to Blinn for the next year and a half.

Keith then went to A&M, while Karen entered Tech.

Keith graduated from A&M in 1980 with a bachelor of science degree in agricultural economics. He is now living in Houston and working for Reliable Steel Co.

Karen will begin work at Lambert's Nursery in Dallas after the first of the year.

"We didn't force any of the children to go to college, we just have always talked as though they were going to go, or talked about what they would do after they got out of college — it was just assumed that they would go," Mrs. Hutto said.

When Aaron was little, Mrs. Hutto said, he told her he was going to college for Mama.

"Well, I told him Mama had already been to college for herself, and that wasn't the reason he should be going to college — it should be for himself, because he wanted to," she related.

Mrs. Hutto earned her bachelor of science degree in home economics in 1942 from Tech.

"I think college broadens your vision," Mrs. Hutto said. "Sure, it can help you to get a better job, but it also helps you learn to think and plan and work toward a goal."

Mrs. Hutto says she is a firm believer in the power of positive thinking and in the value of having goals for life.

"You're defeated before you start if you don't have a positive attitude. Sure, we had the usual problems along the way. The kids may have talked about quitting once in a while, but they knew deep down they would start to finish what they had wanted," she said. "We've always encouraged them in every way we could."

Hutto has been heard to quip that his hogs put his children through college.

"It's true!" Mrs. Hutto admitted. "What we brought in on the hogs was often just what we needed for expenses. S. R. always said if something unexpected came up, we could always sell some more hogs."

She said there were times when things got pretty hard,

but that none of the children ever had to quit because of lack of funds.

"All the children worked some along," she added, "but we didn't want them to have to work so much that it would interfere with their studies."

When they were younger, all the children had 4-H projects, and were busy with piano lessons, and four of them were in the band.

"We encouraged them in those early efforts and I think they were good steps in learning to set goals and stick with a project," Mrs. Hutto said.

"I've always felt that if I could see my children educated and well established in their lives, then I would have no regrets," Mrs. Hutto said, "and now that it's here, it's such a light, giddy sort of feeling to realize that we've accomplished it. I'm really proud of my family. The Lord has been awfully good to us."

### Practice common sense with the sun

HOUSTON, TX. — Skin cancer, a type of cancer found most frequently in the Sunbelt, also is the cancer that is easiest to cure.

How can you protect yourself against skin cancer?

"Wear adequate clothing if you are exposed to excessive amounts of sunlight. A good sun screen lotion is a must if you sunbathe," says Dr. Guy R. Newell, director of cancer prevention programs at The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute. "If you work with chemical irritants, make sure you follow prescribed safety precautions."

Dr. Newell also says, "See a physician about removing any questionable skin areas, such as moles, if they are subjected to repeated irritation or injuries. Changes in a mole, wart or sore should be reported immediately to your doctor."

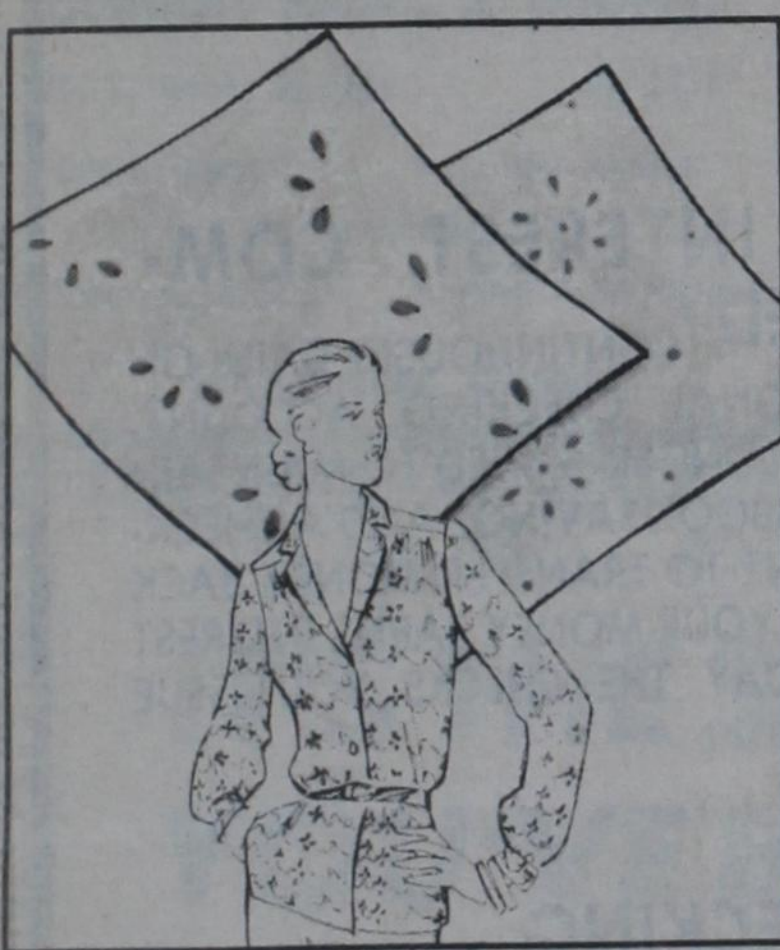
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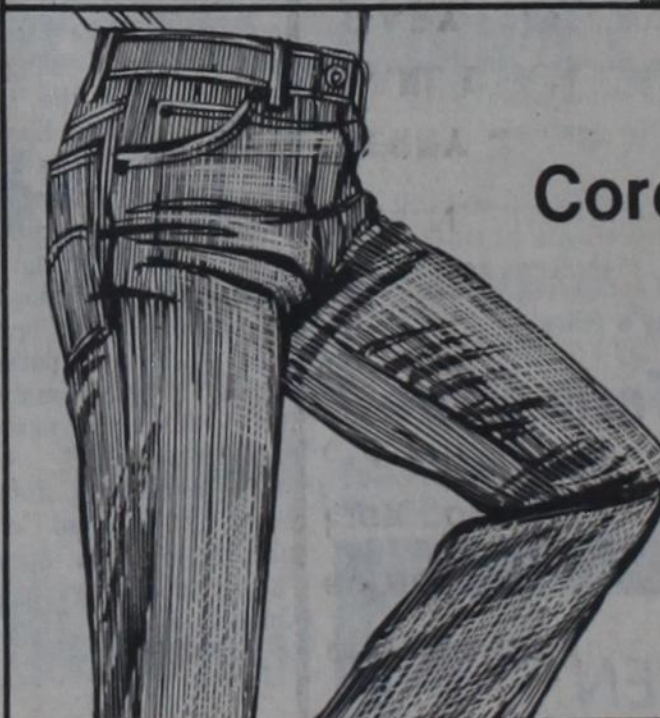

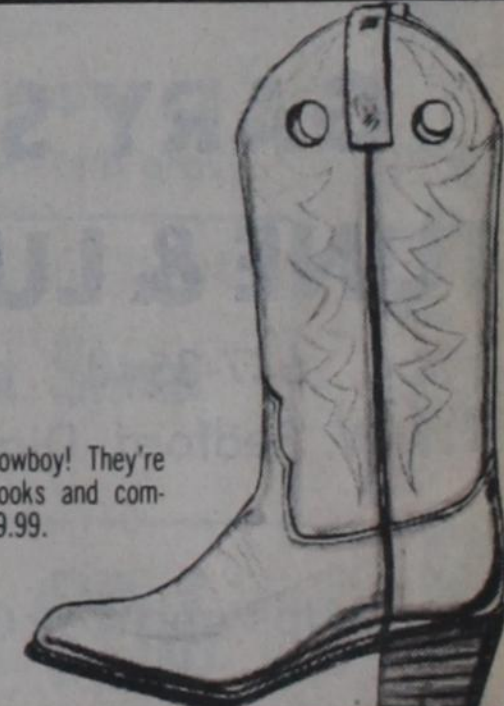
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
