TESTS recently concluded at Texas A&M University confirmed that the more zinc or galvanized coating on a wire, the longer it will resist rusting. Farmers and ranchmen should keep this in mind when fencing materials are being purchased.

Rainfall and humidity are major factors contributing to rust and heaviest coatings for wire used in such areas are recommended.
