## Corn Growers will gather Monday

Gov. Mark White will be the headline speaker, and a new Texas corn-export program will be unveiled when the Texas Corn Growers Association holds its 11th

annual meeting in Dimmitt Monday. The convention, which will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the County Expo Building, is expected to attract growers, agribusinessmen and industrialists from throughout the state, and TCGA President Carl King of Dimmitt predicts it will be the commodity group's "biggest

Gov. White is expected to speak at approximately 1

p.m., following a free barbecue lunch at 12:14... The speakers' line-up also includes Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, Deputy Secretary of Agriculture John Ford, State Sen. Bill Sarpalius, Area Extension Entomologist Pat Morrison and international financier Lee Morse.

King said other state and federal agriculture officials may also be called upon to discuss such fast-breaking farm issues as ASCS cover-crop provisions, the ethylene dibromide (EDB) controversy and disposal of the nation's post-PIK carryover of 4.2 billion bushels of

The day's biggest news may come from Morse's talk, when the financier outlines the details of the new Texas Producers Marketing Association, Inc., an export trading association which the TCGA has just chartered to negotiate export contracts, secure financing for customer nations and handle details of shipping.

### 'Lopes win heart-stopper, 55-54

Wow - what a ball game!

It was Abernathy's tall, talented Antelopes vs. Dimmitt's scrappy, longgun Bobcats Tuesday night before a screaming crowd of 1,500 in the Abernathy High School gym, and it went down to the final second.

Just like their first District 2-AAA set-to, the game ended with Abernathy gaining a one-point victory (55-54) after Dimmitt's game-winning shot rimmed out in the waning seconds.

You could lay down money at a state tournament and not see a more intense, exciting game.

The capacity crowd got its own thing going even before gametime. When the Bobcats were introduced on the PA system, all the fans in the AHS student section whipped out newspapers to read. But their trick of ignoring the Bobcats backfired when the first Dimmitt player to be introduced senior guard Dwight Mc-Donald - trotted onto the floor, turned his back on AHS's "wall of newspapers," and started reading one himself. The Dimmitt stands went hysterical.

Teal fouled out with 7:24 remaining in the game, after being held to only four points in the second

"I thought the fan and third quarters, and Dimmitt's hopes went up. But as it turned out, he only stepped aside to make way for the game's hero, Brian Smith, who came on to score 10 points in the fourth - including the final two free throws that gave Abernathy a 55-54

lead with 18 seconds left. The Bobcats whipped the ball around until Martinez got an open shot from 15 feet out with eight seconds left. His shot rimmed out, but Nathan Nelson picked it up. Nelson lofted a six-footer which went in and then out, but Brad Holcomb was there to get the rebound. Holcomb put it back up. The ball rolled around the rim, teetered, then dropped off the edge.

A scramble for the rebound led to Abernathy getting the ball out-ofbounds with one second left. And that was the ball game.

"I've been to lots of basketball games, but I can't remember one more exciting," Cleveland said. "If any of those last three shots had gone in the hole, then it would REALLY have been something to remember. I was just so proud of the effort. Our kids just gave it everything they had - they did all they could do. It was just one of those situations where the ball didn't fall


when we needed it to." The loss left the Bobcats with their backs to the wall in their battle for a playoff spot. They can't afford to lose another game.




#### 'Waste tax' could raise \$500 million

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has released a survey of fees and taxes levied on hazardous industrial wastes in 28 other states, and claimed that Texas could raise as much as \$500 million annually on the 25 million tons of such waste Texans produce each year.

Last month Bullock proposed a new tax on industrial wastes in Texas to pay for cleaning up past disposals and researching new and better waste disposal methods.

"Texas produces more hazardous waste than any other state," Bullock said. "We've got to start seeing that it's disposed of properly. We've got to clean up our past mistakes. And judging from the revenue figures in this report, it's clear a reasonable tax would produce enough revenue that we

might be able to share some with local governments to help them with their waste problems and maybe even use part of it to educate the youngsters







The soil moisture deficit map is published as a tool to give producers a better picture of soil moisture reserves over the entire area. It can help them to make more informed irrigation decisions and help them avoid both over or under irrigating in the spring. It can also give an indication of potential production.

The map's soil moisture deficit readings are a measure of how much water is still needed to wet the soil in the crop root

sample indicates general trends over the area, but does not predict exact soil moisture conditions on any given farm. Each landowner needs to check his individual farm soil moisture to determine its water



Soil moisture pocket guide is available

A free, handy, pocketsized soil moisture guide for irrigators is available from the High Plains Water District, the Soil Conservation Service or the County Extension Office in each of the 15 counties served by the water district.

From Armstrong to Counties, each county has its own separate guide. Each one identifies the five main soils in that county, lists their dominant textures, their average soil root zone depths and each soil's water-holding capacity for a full profile in the root

That's just half the story. Each plastic card also carries a guide for judging, by using the feel and appearance method, how much moisture is available for crops.

What good does it do to figure out (a) how much moisture you've got in the ground right now, (b) the water-holding capacity of your soil, and (c) the root zone depth of your soil? With this information you can calculate the total amount of water your soil still needs to fill up the soil root zone to field capacity.

These soil moisture guides are another tool to help you make better irrigation decisions and apply water for the most efficient irrigation. They can help you avoid over or under watering where you can control your applica-



#### RULES AND REGULATIONS

#### I. General

1. All entries must be sent to the Young Farmers, Box 99 by 5:00 p.m., February 10, 1984. Any incomplete or unsigned entry will be fined \$25.00.

2. Entry Fee - To be used for bedding, show expense, etc. 

3. All livestock must be in place by 8:00 P.M., Wednesday, February 15, 1984 and weighed by February 16, 1984. Weighing will begin at 8:30 A.M.

4. All animals must be weighed at the time of entry by the official weighers. Only one weigh back will be allowed if the animal does not make the limits set. This weigh back must be within one hour of the first weighing or at the discretion of the Superintendent.

5. All animals will be ear-tagged or numbered by the County Agent or Ag Teacher before they are weighed.

6. Each exhibitor will not be allowed to show more than two calves, two barrows, and two lambs. Exhibitor will be allowed to sell no more than three animals and only two animals in any division. If individual shows more than three animals, he must notify the Superintendent immediately after judging which three animals he will place in the sale.

7. The number of animals that will be sold through the auction will be as follows: 125 Barrows, 125 lambs, 40 steers, or 75% of the total animals that are weighed in. Whichever is the smaller number:

8. The percent of the animals to be sold will be figured on each class; if percent is .5 or greater the next highest member will be sold. If animal eligible to sell is pulled, the next animal in line from that class will sell. This will be at the discretion of the Superintendent.

9. Animals that make the show but do not make the sale will be sold with the floor animals, unless exhibitor pulls the animals by one hour after showing.

10. All livestock will be sifted by weight. Sifted animals will be the responsibility of the owner and must be removed from the barns by 2:00 p.m. on Thursday.

11. A division showmanship trophy will be awarded for Beef, Swine, and Sheep. The animals must have been owned, fitted, and groomed by the exhibitor for the exhibitor to be eligible for a showmanship trophy.

12. No calf will be allowed in the show that has not been owned and fed by the exhibitor for a minimum of 150 consecutive days prior to the show. Barrows and lambs must have been owned and fed by the exhibitor for a minimum of 90 consecutive days prior to the show.

13. Only active 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show. All livestock entered in the show must have been fed under the supervision of the Castro County Agent or a Vocational Agriculture Teacher of Dimmitt, Hart or Nazareth High School and must be so certified by one of the above on the entry card.

14. To be eligible to show, all 4-H club members must be enrolled in a Castro County 4-H club under the supervision of the Castro County Agent. All FFA members must be enrolled in a Castro County school. All Exhibitors must be 9 years old as of Feb. 10 and must be enrolled in public or private Elementary or Secondary schools.

15. Calves, Barrows, and Lambs will be sold at the same weights as the weigh-in.

16. All animals must be reasonably dry and clean before weighing. Any animal not so, may be declared ineligible to show by the committee in charge of the

17. Animals are the responsibility of the exhibitor until they are loaded on the truck. Any animal left in the barn after trucks are loaded are the responsibility of the seller. 18. Health papers will be required on all animals. No animal will be allowed to enter barns without

health papers. 19. The Dimmitt Young Farmers shall reserve the right to disqualify any exhibitor or animal for any reason that is deemed necessary. Also the Young Farmers will not be responsible for any injury, loss, or damage to persons or property arising from the Castro County Junior Livestock

Show and Sale. Sale. 20. Exhibitors and show officials will be the only persons allowed in the show ring.

21. Any dispute on classification will be settled by the main classifier.

Light, Medium and Heavy will be determined by the Superintendent. At least five animals are needed to make a class.





It was 80 years ago today - on Feb. 2, 1904 - that a gangly, 14-year-old boy from the Oklahoma Territory stepped off the Santa Fe train at the Hereford depot and rode a muledrawn wagon with the rest of his family to their new home six miles east of Dimmitt.

Edwin "Goose" Ramey made the train trip back in 1904 with his mother, his twin brother Edgar, three of his older brothers and two sisters. His father had died two years earlier at Madill, Okla.

Bunyon paid \$2.75 per acre for Section 337, Block M-6, midway between Dimmitt and Nazareth. "The deed called for 640 acres, more or less," Ramey recalled. "After

we were here eight or 10 years, the survey showed there was 22 acres more to it, and we had to file and pay for it - and it cost a third as much as we had paid for the whole section."

The Ramey brothers made local history on that land. 


