The Wichita ball team will play the Amarillo's here next Friday and Saturday, 3:30. The boys think the citizens ought to go out more generally and chip in more liberally to help out expenses.

Mr. F. S. Crosson is still here, and will be some time, looking into the practicability of making brick for Amarillo. He is hopeful—almost certain a good quality of brick can be made here.

Homer Vivian in a foot race contest at the commencement exercises at Roswell Military Institute, fell fainting from over exertion. He was taken to his uncle, McWilliam's farm, and is but slowly recovering.

Dr. J. Duff Brown, jr, Llano, Texas, who was here last year for family's health, has returned to locate. Says the plains are better than Colorado.

E. O. Fairabend thinks that until the lake near Ong's is drained or bridged a life saving station there would diminish the risk. As for himself he has developed into an expert jumper and swimmer, but that the women and cripples flounder distressingly.

Lightburn & Co have begun placing material for the first new business building on south side of Connally's store. It is to be of brick with rock trimmings, 60x100 feet. When finished Connally will move into it in order that the wooden one may be removed and another large brick and stone building take its place.

It is evident that we are to have the same Panhandle baseball excitement which marked the life of that part of country last year. All the Panhandle is getting itself in shape, and the contest promises to be full of vigor, strenuousness and anger. Baseball in itself is not bad. There cannot be anything really wicked in hitting a ball with a club. It is the incidental result which must be watched out for. It is the wickedness which comes from the game in the shape of anger, jealousy and pride. Last season Miss Harrison, as editress of the Childress Budget, naturally upheld the Childress baseball team against the Amarillo team. The contest between these athletic organizations was furious. That is the only word for it. Every one became excited. There was anger on the field of contest, at the fireside and in the newspapers. Even Miss Harrison called the Amarillo young ladies a lot of "pie-faced damsels." No one can say that this was not wicked. It is doubtful if the asperities of the remarkable contest for the baseball championship of the Panhandle can ever be forgotten.—Dallas News

Now, now, do not run into the extreme. Baseball has never been claimed as a special promotion of morality, but there is no use in making it out worse than it is. It may indeed be bad enough, but the "asperities" mentioned do not exist at all. The Childress and Amarillo teams have recently played several games together since those "asperities" were engendered, and are now on the very best of terms and friendly feelings. Of course young men's time could be more profitably employed, and ought to be, than in baseball, but will it be in every circle? and may their recreation not be worse? To minimize the evils let the participants determine to be fair and generous and polite; and inject as much rational good fellowship and social interest as possible, until it evolves into something better—a public library for instance.

B. B. Hayden and Charley Trollinger returned last night from a cattle delivery trip to South Dakota. The latter reports a pleasant time, and uneventful. On Sunday, near Trinidad, a cattle train was wrecked by the spreading of rails on a trussel, in which the engineer and fireman were killed. 3 cars burned and 100 head of cattle killed and disabled.

Special to the Dallas News

Guthrie, OK, June 4.—There is considerable activity in railway circles in Oklahoma and good prospects for further increase. The Rock Island has the track of its southwestern extension through the Kiowa and Comanche reservation laid to the Greer County line and it is pushing right on toward Texas. The engineer crops of the Chactaw has received orders to begin active work from Weatherford to Amarillo Tex., and a corps of surveyors was stated Saturday to run a line from Amarillo to Albuquerque, N. M. Work began today at Seward on the laying of rails upon the Guthrie and Western, and trains will run from here to Kingfisher by June 15. This line will be operated jointly by the Santa Fe and Rock Island compales.

In Kay City over five miles of the Frisco extension from Blackwell to Enid are graded and the force was increased to day.

The twenty miles of grade constructed by farmers in Woods County will be turned over to the Stilwell, Kansas City and Mexican road.

Preparatory to this application has been made in the District Court and a receiver appointed who will dispose of the grade and right of way to Stilwell for a nominal sum, and some of Stilwell men have already put a force of graders at work on the Kansas line to connect grade with another line at Ant

The Oklahoma Times Journal says the annual meeting of the stock holders and the board of directors of the Choctaw, Oklahoma & Gulf Railway will be held at Philadelphia on June 20th. At that time the reports of the several officers of the road will be heard and the plans of the ensuing year will be adopted and provision for the extension of the line that may be decided upon at the meeting.

"The principal work of the engineer's department of the road under the direction of Chief Engineer, Molitor for the past few months has been the preparation of profiles of the extension that is being considered and that will be built at once. The work of getting ready for the extension to Amarillo is practically complete and the approval of the stockholders is all that is needed for the employment of a large force for this work.

Amazing reports come from the Philippines. Secretary Root has refused to accept the resignations of seven officers and it is stated that Gen. McArthur has 200 more bands, and that the enlisted men are very near mutiny over the work required of them. It is said too that the hundreds of Filipinos reported killed are merely guessed at, as their bodies are almost never found. This is a pretty state of affairs.—Exchange.

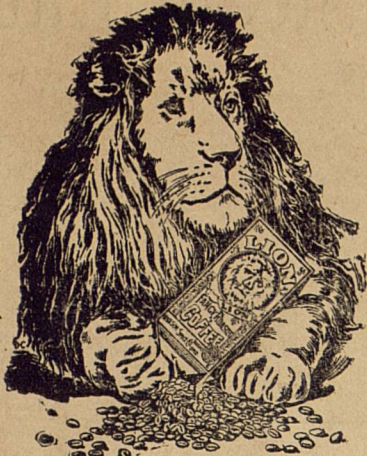
