## BOBCATS EDGE CALVES 13 TO 12, MEET SILVERTON HERE FRIDAY

Displaying a determination that would not give up along with some good sound football, the Dimmitt Bobcats came from behind to edge the heavier and more experienced Calves of West Texas High School 13-12 Friday afternoon.

The game was only four plays old when Airhart tossed to Stewart for six points to put the Calves ahead. This feat was duplicated some five minutes before the initial period ended. Then the Cats went to work. The accurate passes from Captain Rice to Jowell, the smashes of Howell through the line, and some fancy running by Ziegler and Warren netted 13 points by half time.

The second half was a defensive battle with the local boys running the Canyon boys ragged on the ground and with the West Texas air game a constant threat. Bobby Warren, 121 pound seat back stole the show for the locals with his long gallops through the West Texas line.

Though there were no defensive standouts, the entire team turned in a good game. Theleft side of the line consisting of Jowell, Davis, and Brannan looked very good on the offense.

Friday night the Bobcats will entertain the Silvertown Owls on the local gridiron in one of those unpredictable games. Very little is known of the Silvertown eleven except that it has been winning some pretty tough games.

Wade Thompson and Royce Dowell are still on the ailing list, but they may see some action Friday.

## October 5-12 Is Fire Prevention Week In Nation

The Chamber of Commerce office announced today that the week of October 5-12, 1947 has been proclaimed Fire Prevention Week by President Truman. **FORMER DIMMITT TEACHER KILLED IN CRASH**

Castle Rock, Colo., Sept. 12.—Three men were killed when a C-47 Army transport smashed into a bluff were identified today as Army investigators studied the wreckage 11 miles southeast of Castle Rock.

Investigators from Lowry field at Denver said the twin-engined transport rumbled into Spruce mountain yesterday on a flight from Hobbs, N. M., to Hill field at Ogden, Utah. The plane was based at Kelly Field, San Antonio.

## Local Men Attend Field Day Oct. 1

Twelve Castro County men were among some 400 farmers attending the annual Field Day at the Agricultural Experiment Station at College Station October 1.

The day was spent viewing the work of the experiment station stressing wheat grasses and grain sorghum varieties and cattle feeding.

A barbecue lunch was served at noon by the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce.

At an election to be held on October 18, 1947, land-owners in Castro County will decide on the formation of a new soil conservation district to act in the place of the present Castro County Wind Erosion District. The present district was established as a result of the old Wind Erosion Law. In this setup the Commissioners' Court is the governing body. They, in turn, appoint five farm-owners in different parts of the county to act as supervisors. These supervisors operate the district but must secure the approval of the Commissioners' Court before acting. If a new standard soil conservation district is formed as a result of the election to be held on Saturday, October 18, the supervisors will be the governing body and will be elected by the farm-owners of the different parts of the county. Among the advantages of having a standard soil conservation district are: (1) The supervisors will be the governing body and can operate the district as they see fit; (2) The supervisors will be elected by the farm-owners themselves instead of being appointed by the Commissioners' Court; (3) The supervisors will receive a slight reimbursement for their expenses in attending monthly meetings, whereas under the present system, they are required to meet at their own expense; (4) In case the Texas state legislature passes a bill making appropriations to standard soil conservation districts (and such a bill is before the legislature now), the new district could receive help in obtaining badly needed equipment, whereas under the present system, wind erosion districts would receive no help.

## East-West Road

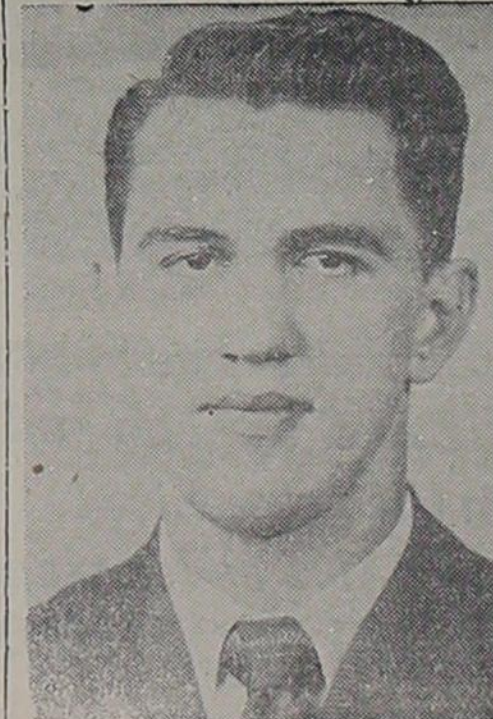
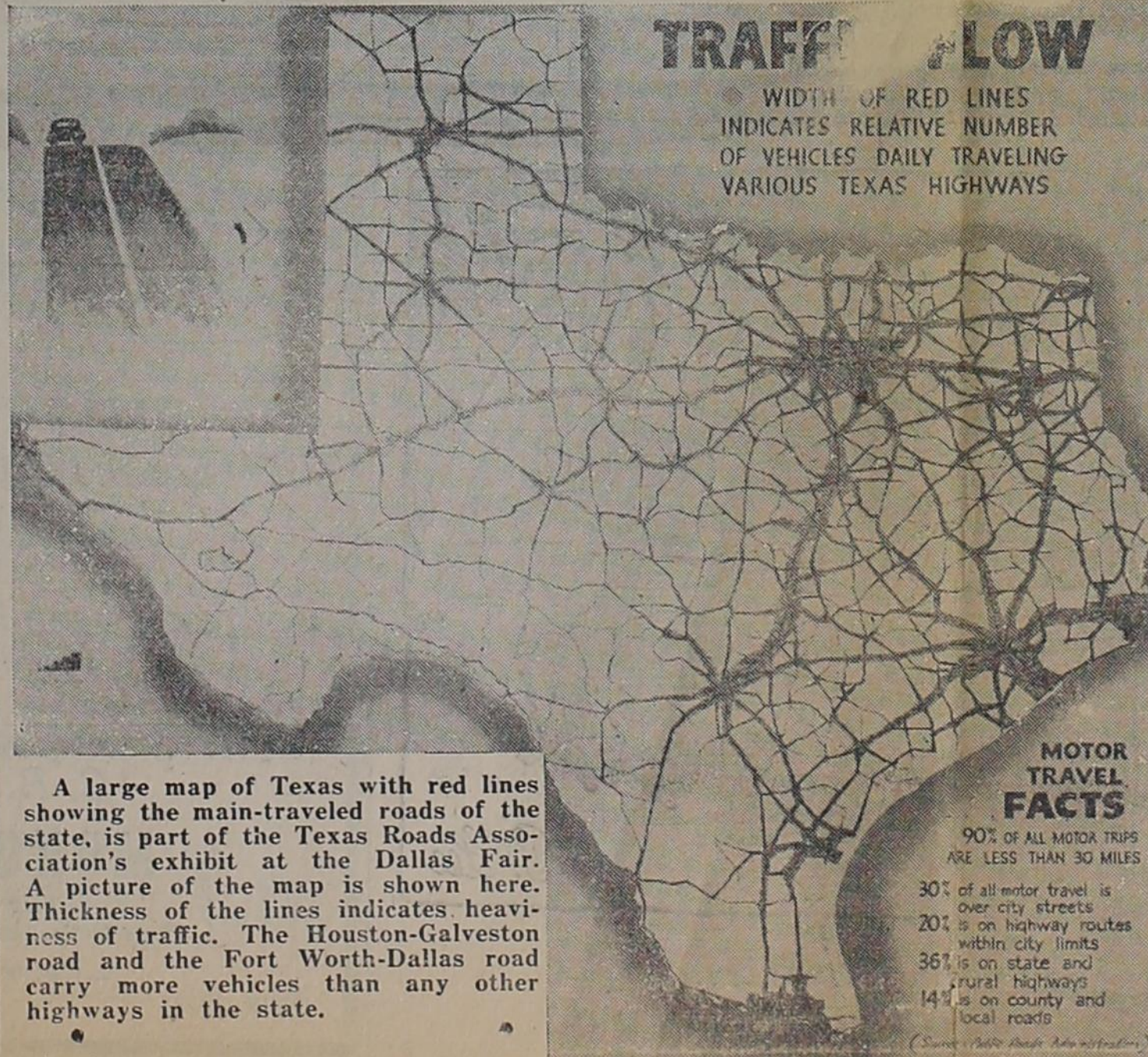

Until recently Castro County was completely isolated in respect to public transportation, and the whole county was the loser thereby. That situation has been remedied slightly by the north-south bus route of the T.N.M. & O Coach line, which now comes through Dimmitt. But the folks to the east and west of Dimmitt are still greatly handicapped by the lack of any such service, and the whole county is still the loser.

We recently traveled west on Highway 86 enroute to Clovis and Carlsbad. The sixteen mile stretch of dirt road in our county is not only a bother, but is also a disgrace to us for it is the only bad road on that whole journey. We used to hear a good deal about the poorness of New Mexico and its very bad roads and we expected to travel on dirt a good many miles in that state; now we had better look to our own roads lest we achieve the same reputation among travelers.

Mr. H. L. McCandless owner of the Childress-Floydada Coach Lines, wishes to secure a franchise from the State for an extension of his line from Estelline west to Clovis as he sees a great need for this service through our area. But he cannot and will not operate through here until we get our unpaid portion of that highway completed. He is but one of many who see vast possibilities in this region and is anxious to come here. But our inducement for such new enterprises must amount to more than mere possibilities. If we want such an improvement we should begin to act toward getting it.

Why don't we urge our Commissioner's Court to begin putting pressure on Austin so that we may get a definite commitment for this improvement in the not too distant future.

## NOTICE OF PROPOSED ASSESSMENT ORDINANCE

The City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, hereby gives notice to the hereinafter listed property owners of proposed Ordinance No. 55, now pending before said Commission. The purpose of such Ordinance is to levy an assessment against said property owners and to secure same by affixing a lien against such property as provided by statute. The need for such ordinance is to provide the necessary additional funds to pay the full costs of constructing curbs and gutters along the west lines of Lots 21, 22, 23 and 24 in Block 74, and the East line of lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, in Block 83 in said City of Dimmitt, Castro County,

and to provide for additional funds to pay 75% of the cost of the Engineering, Improving, excavating, grading and paving S I X T H STREET, between Bedford Avenue and Etter Street in said City of Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas and the property owners assessed in said ordinance who own said property abutting on said street will be benefited thereby.

The contact for such curb and gutter and for such paving has been let to Austin Contracting Co., Dallas, Texas and to O'Neal Construction Company, of Dallas, Texas and the overall cost will be \$6.00 per lineal foot for such paving and \$1.65 per lineal foot for curb and gutter, and the amount to be assessed is figured in proportion to the amount of front footage abutting said street, owned by each property owner.

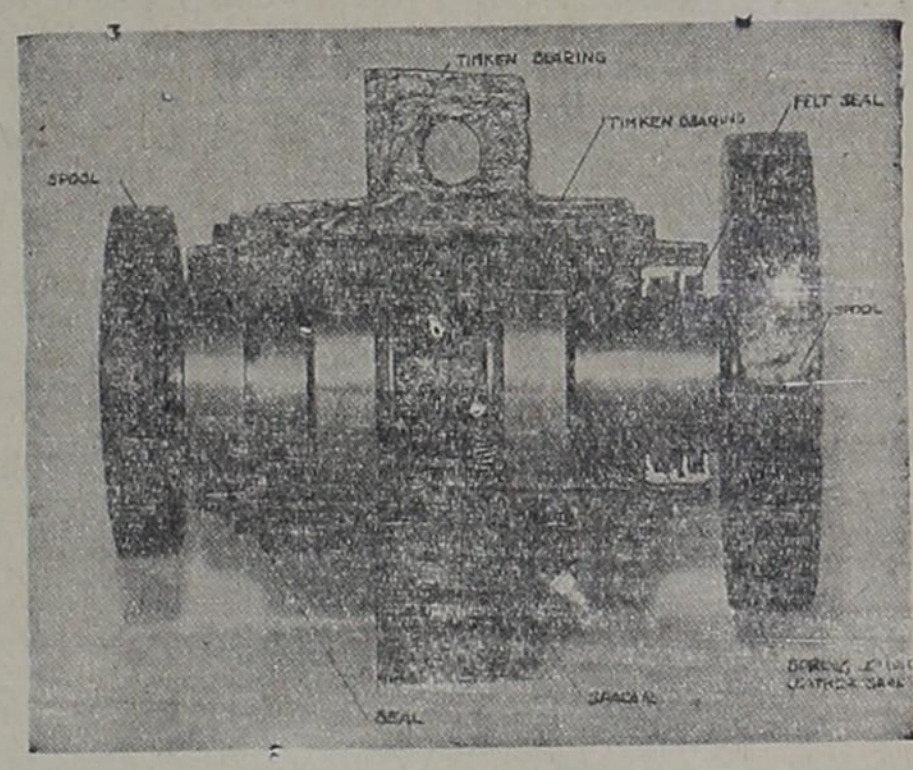

### Texas Highways Overcrowded

Austin, Texas, Color movies and a collection of charts and maps will tell the story of Texas roads at the State Fair of Texas at Dallas.

Col. Ike Ashburn, executive vice president of the Texas Good Roads Association, announced today that the organization would sponsor an exhibit in the fair's Agriculture Building.

"Most engineers say that 3,000 vehicles per day is the maximum efficient volume for a two-lane highway," Ashburn declared. He added:

"Texas now has 400 miles of two-lane highways carrying more than 4,000 vehicles per day. If current trends continue, 1,050 miles of Texas roads will be overcrowded by 1955."

Increased road use will demand continuous expansion in all classes of roads, Ashburn stated.

"Texas people must prepare to meet this problem courageously," he said. "The continuation of a balanced road program to develop all classes of highways must be assured for the future of Texas. The Texas Good Roads Association is unequivocally committed to such a program."

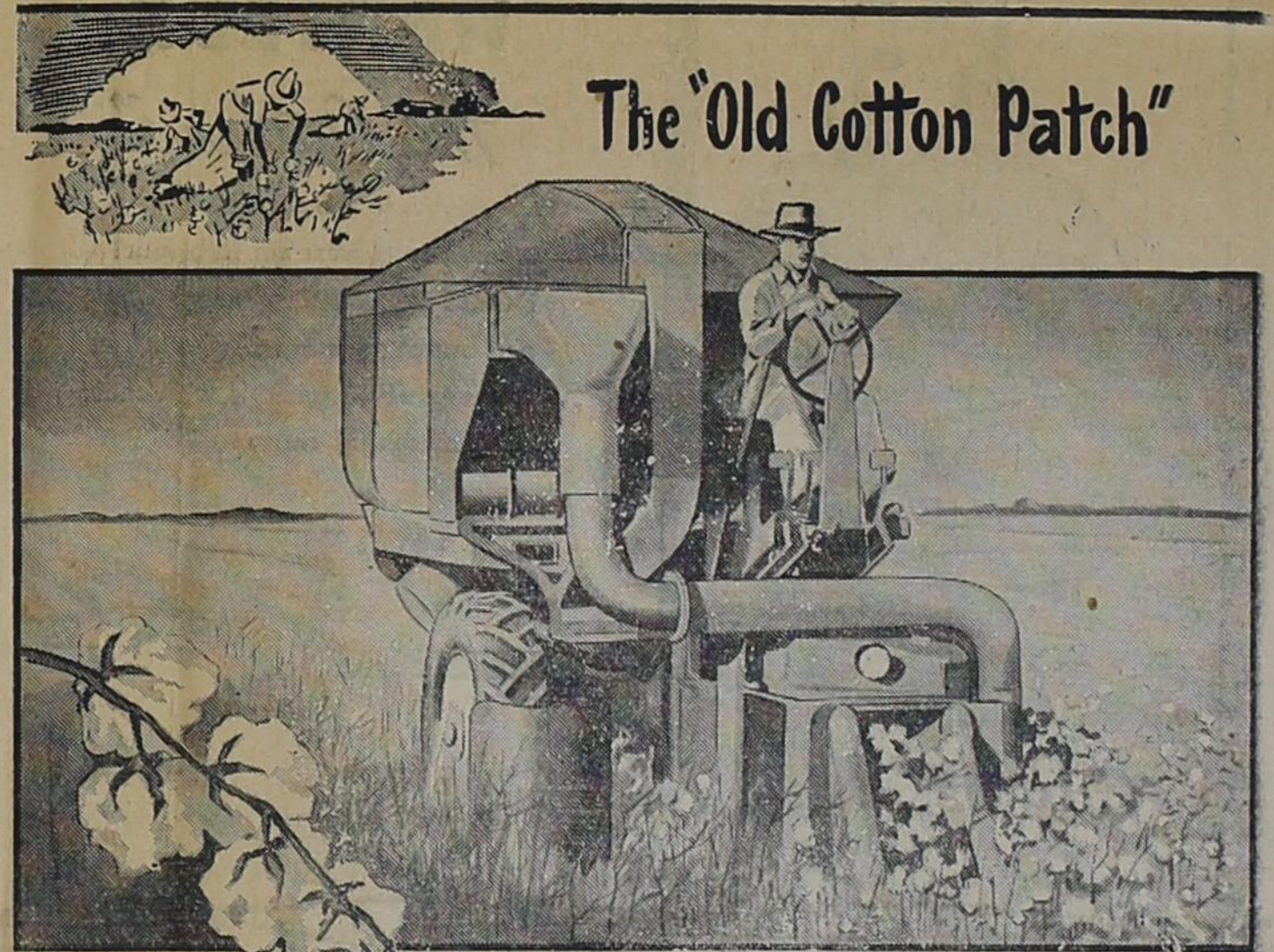

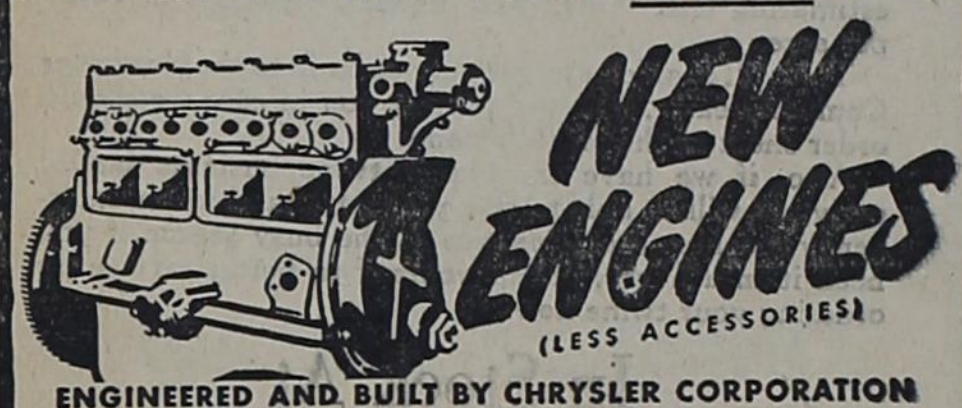

New irrigation well locations were made the past week on farms belonging to the following farmers: Leo Witkowski, two and one-half miles west of Arney school; and Roy Jones, whose farm is six miles north and four miles east of Dimmitt.

The following farmers received assistance in laying out parts of their irrigation systems last week: C. B. Wilhelm, J. C. Williams, W. A. Burdine, R. L. Simmons, Joe Collins, Alfred Scott, Roy Jones, Edwin Holland, and J. G. Youts. All the above farmers are cooperators of the Castro County Wind Erosion District which is receiving assistance from Soil Conservation Service technicians.

Lowery Walker has made application for assistance in conservation work on a farm located one mile north of the Easter School. E. O. Tunnell, whose farm lies two miles west and a mile and one-half south of Dodd Gin, has also made application for such assistance. A soils map will be made of these farms, showing the depth, texture, and permeability of the soil, the of erosion that has taken place in slope of the land, and the degree the past. These farmers will then receive help in working out a complete and coordinated conservation plan and in putting this plan on the land. Such help will be furnished by the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service.

On the general subject of relief for the war-stricken countries:

The war has been over for more than two years. They have soil and sunshine and man-power—the United States has no monopoly on these assets. It seems to me that we should taper off on relief and send them such things as seed and plows, so they can go to work and shift for themselves.

The Book of Books says that man shall eat bread in the sweat of their own brows—and those people should begin to eat their bread in the sweat of their own brows instead of in the sweat of the brows of the American taxpayers. That, in essence, is what we understand the Marshall Plan to be.

Your columnist felt highly flattered when an invitation arrived to speak to a convention of several hundred physicians from 11 states in Galveston. And then I found out that they are psychiatrists—and I don't know now whether they want to hear me or study me.

But that does remind me of the time that I said something rude to a friend and was sorry the next moment and his retort made me sorrier. He had served in the army in World War I and he wrote a letter to a newspaper, complaining at the food in the training camp. The letter was published and the military authorities were going to discipline him. But somebody said, "Maybe he's crazy" so they held a hearing, found him to be sane and then sentenced him to k. p. duty for three weeks.

Well, several years later, he and I were having an argument and, though we were friends, the discussion got a little heated and he implied I was not very intelligent. I said, "At any rate, I never have been tried for lunacy." He said, "Well, I have the advantage of you—I have been tried and was found to be sane."

And I couldn't think of a comeback to that.

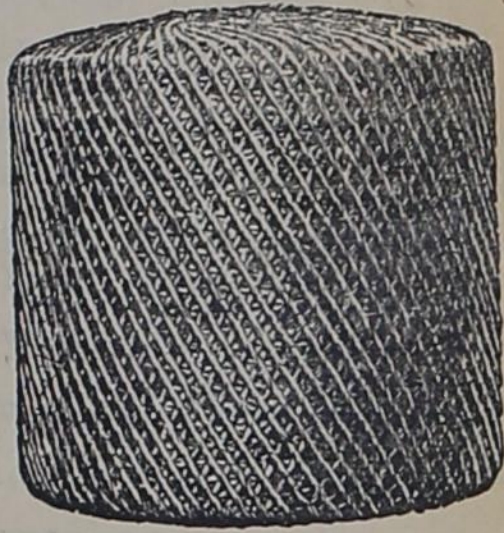

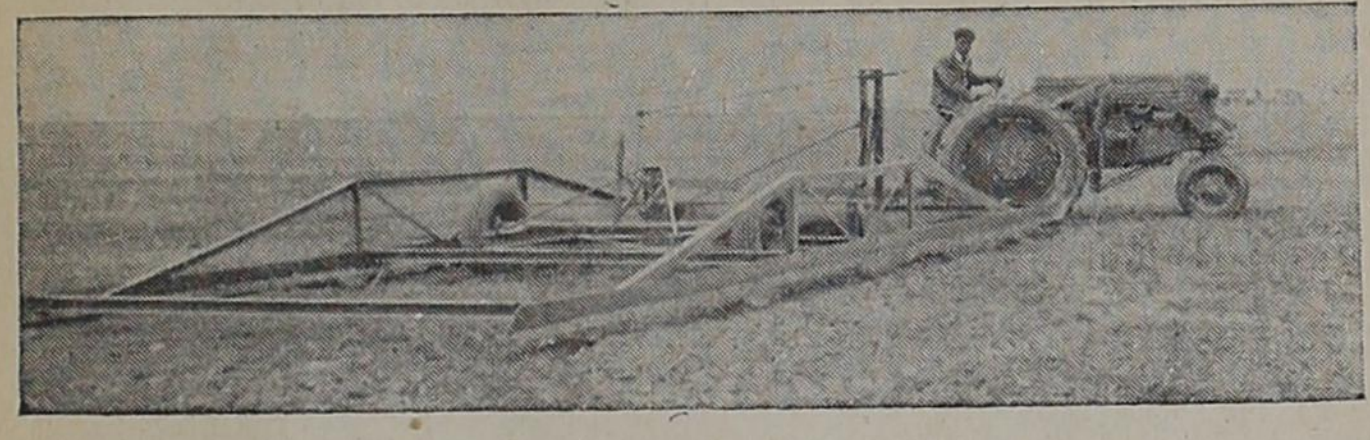

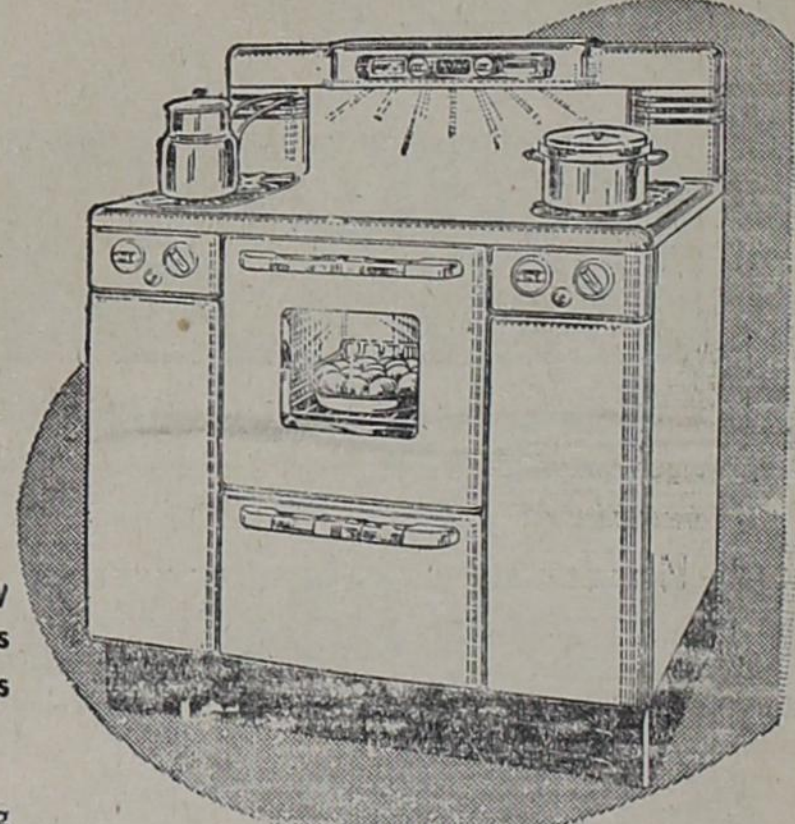

## School Health Program Is recommended

Austin, Texas, Sept. 30—Every school should have a definite school health program. Situations such as, the kind of drinking water, arrangements for the school lunch, the lighting, eating, ventilation and cleanliness of the schoolroom, and the personal practices of the teachers and children are the basis of the school program said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Every school has tremendous opportunities to promote the health of its pupils and of its community. From early childhood to early manhood and womanhood, most children are enrolled in schools and are under the supervision of school staffs for a substantial part of the day for approximately half the days of the year. The conditions under which they live in school, the help which they are given in solving their health problems, the ideals of individual and community health which they are taught and the information and understanding that they acquire of themselves are fac-
