DIMMITT TO GET FIRST BUS SERVICE ON OR BEFORE MAY 20

According to a letter received today by local Chamber of Commerce officials, from the president of the Texas-New Mexico-Oklahoma Bus Company initial bus service for Dimmitt, connecting with points north and south, will get underway May 20. The long awaited and much needed transportation facilities which a bus line will afford, will be a boon to the development of Dimmitt and Castro county. The letter from the bus line official stated that the company's permit for interstate travel had not been received and that only intrastate tickets could be sold until it is issued.

Mr. T. A. Singer, who has tirelessly worked for a bus line through Dimmitt for the past two decades, received a special invitation from the president of the bus company to be his guest for a ride on the first bus to operate through Dimmitt.

More Rains Brighten Crop Outlook Here

Good rains which fell over a large portion of Castro County Tuesday evening has moved the outlook for a bumper crop year closer to a reality. The wholesale purchase of pineapple by individuals is being handled under the same plan as has been used in former years, according to a statement made this week by Mrs. Andy Thompson, chairman of the Marketing Committee. The cost of pineapple is \$4.55 per dozen. All orders must be in by May 17.

'Wish You Wouldn't's' Apply to Parents, Too

SINCE turn about is fair play, any list of "Wish you wouldn't's" for teen agers should be accompanied by a few "Don't's" for parents, too. Holly Miller, points out in nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer.

Discussing the teen agers' viewpoint, she writes:

"Seems as if 'I wish you wouldn't' is the preface to a good many statements by the older generation. 'The way you dress, eat, walk, talk—gadooks—nothing seems to please them."

"But before you get too huffy and cast their admonitions to the breeze, go into a huddle with yourself. Down deep you may find the grace to admit that a lot of so-called characteristic adolescent behaviorisms are not calculated to make the populace love you. And that just because simply everybody acts a certain way is not sufficient reason for anybody as special as you to follow suit."

Among the "Don't's" which Miss Miller says teen-agers might suggest to parents are:

"Don't laugh at us. We're self-conscious enough. Tho our plans may seem a little fantastic and some of our actions silly, it's probably part of being young. Don't you remember?"

"Don't treat us like kids. You can help us grow up by treating us like grown-ups. Trust us a little more."

"Never, never say, 'I told you so.' It's too curdling. And we have to learn the hard way to make it stick."

Local 4-H Boys Profit By Dimmitt Fat Stock Sale

Through the efforts of County Agent R. L. King, and other county workers, local 4-H Club boys profited by selling their calves in Dimmitt following the recent Castro County Fat Stock Show, rather than shipping them to out of state markets.

Comparison of prices paid local club members with those received by 4-H Club members of other counties, who shipped their calves to Kansas City, revealed that 4-H clubbers received 1 cent per pound more by selling their calves here than they would have received at Kansas City. The average price at the Dimmitt sale was 24 cents per pound while 4-H Club members who shipped their calves to Kansas City received an average of 23 cents per pound. Mr. King, and others, who were responsible for the local sales deserve much credit for their untiring efforts in looking after the best interests of the members of the various clubs in the county.

The Castro County Chamber of Commerce has been invited by the Hereford Chamber of Commerce to cooperate with it in securing an extension of the Burlington Railroad to Hereford, thence to Grady and Tucumcari, New Mexico. A meeting has been tentatively set for the latter part of May at Hereford. At that time the several Chambers have been invited to send representatives so that a working plan can be formulated and the matter presented to the railroad company's officials.

Mr. Robert B. Hershey, Secretary of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce points out that such an extension of railroad service would be of great benefit to the farmers, ranchers and marketers of this area. This would not only give us better shipping facilities both north and south but would also call upon the railroad to give increased service and eventually require the regular operation of passenger trains.

Mr. Harrison will receive an honorary subscription to The Reader's Digest for one year and an engraved certificate from the Editors "in recognition of past accomplishment and in anticipation of unusual achievement to come."

Since 1937 The Reader's Digest Association has presented these awards yearly in senior high schools throughout the United States and Canada to the highest honor student of the graduating class. The awards are part of the educational program sponsored by the Association and were a logical outgrowth of the wide use of The Reader's Digest in school work. 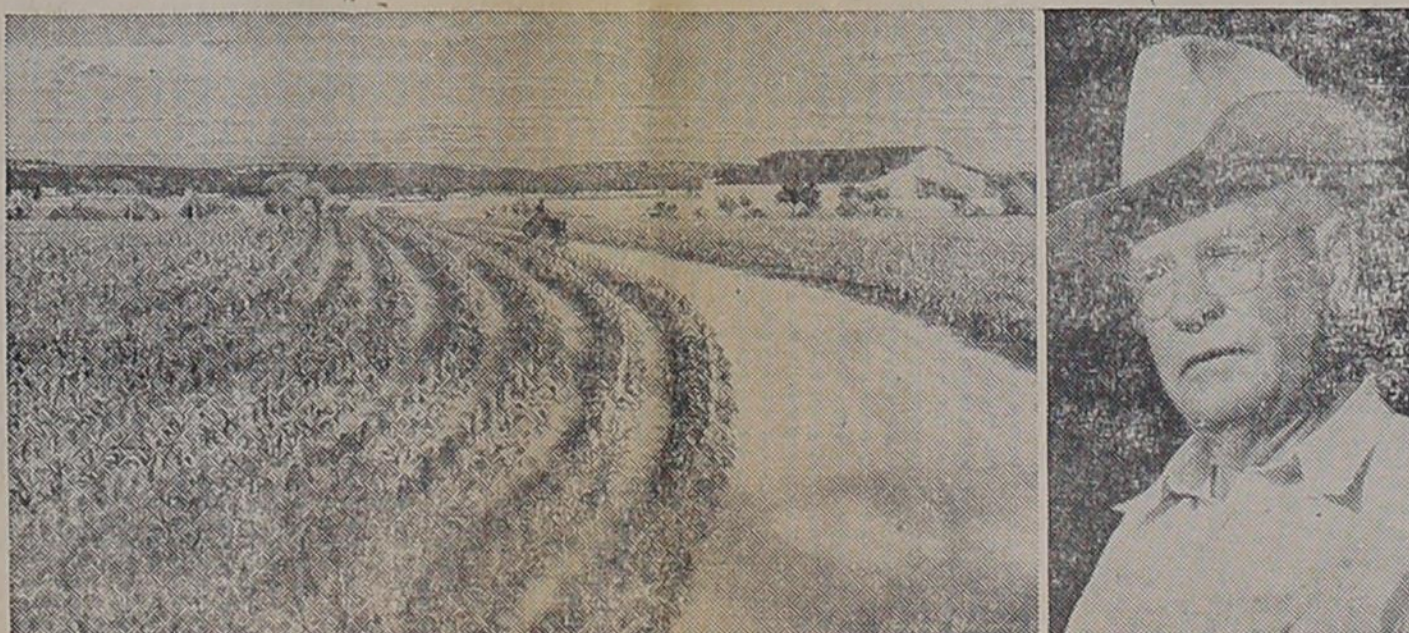

"I WANT A RELIGION THAT GOES BEYOND THE GRAVE"

The train for Memphis was notoriously slow, and it seemed even slower than usual this morning to Father Ed as he sat there in the stifling summer heat. Besides, he simply couldn't get it out of his mind that someone was watching him intently as he tried to concentrate on the reading of his Office. Despite his efforts to appear unconcerned, the feeling that someone's eyes were glued intently on him simply would not down. Finally, he closed his Breviary and sat back, waiting for something to happen.

Almost at once, a charming lady in her early forties stood beside him and said, "Father, could I talk to you please?" And even before she had slipped into the seat alongside the window, she began telling the story that was so close to her heart. "It's about Mother," she said. "We were always very close to each other... closer perhaps than most mothers and daughters, because she was an invalid for so many years, and I had the duty and privilege of caring for her. "And then last week Mother passed on. Ever since, I've been thinking. My friends tell me there's nothing more I can do for her and that I should stop thinking about her. Even my church tells me that I can no longer help her. But Father, I can't believe that. Something inside tells me that I not only can do something for her, but that I should be doing something for her right now. Father, what would you do if you were in my position?"

"I'd pray for her, of course," said Father Ed softly. "Every morning and every night, I'd pray for her. I would have Masses said for the repose of her soul. Each day, I would offer my prayers, works and sufferings for her. I would apply the lesson that the writer of Sacred Scripture relates in II Machabees 12, 43-46..."

"And making a gathering, he sent twelve thousand drachmas of silver to Jerusalem for sacrifice to be offered for the sins of the dead,

thinking well and religiously concerning the resurrection. For if he had not hoped that they who were slain should rise again, it would have seemed vain and superfluous to pray for the dead. And because he considered that they who had fallen asleep with godliness had great grace laid up for them. It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins."

"We Catholics, of course, do not believe that there is nothing we can do for our friends who have left us. 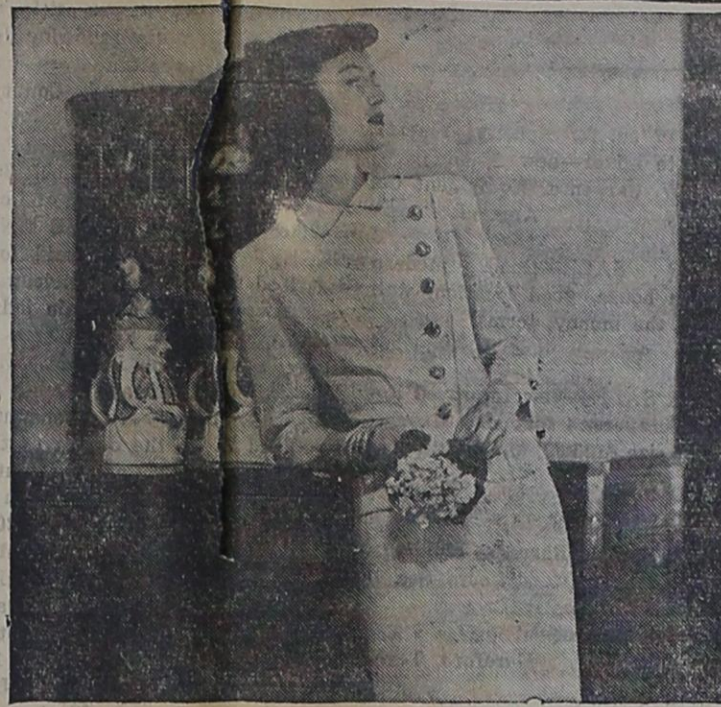

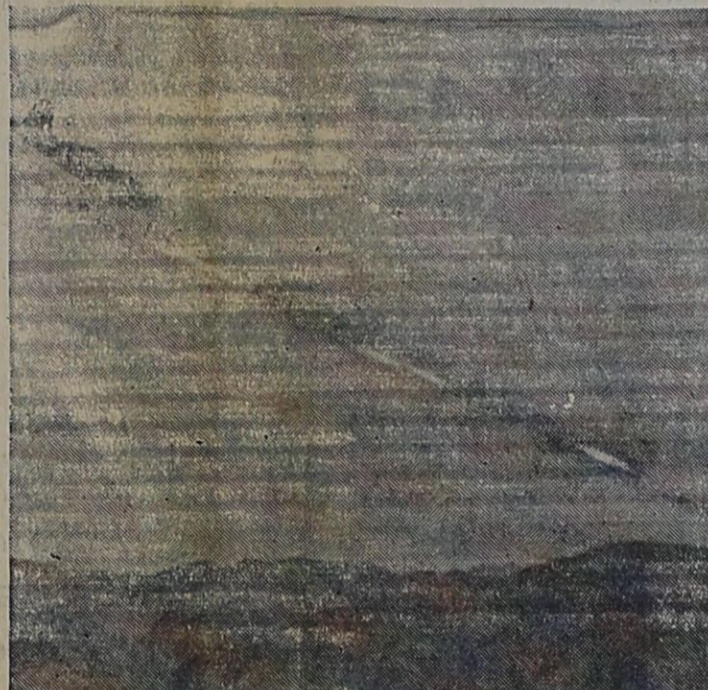
