# Western Container closing its doors

Move will affect 95 jobs locally

The city of Big Spring's largest taxpayer is closing its with Western

Officials Container Corp. announced Wednesday the company is closing its plant in Big Spring, a move that will affect 95 jobs

Western Container, which produces plastic bottles for Coca-Cola products, first began operations in Big Spring in 1980.

Officials say the closure, which will be completed by Oct. 1, was forced by a recent decision by Coca-Cola to produce its own plastic bottles in Texas.

"Every effort will be made to be sensitive to the concerns of employees who will be impacted during the transition

period," Plant Manager Vince Duffney said in a statement.

According to Big Spring Economic Development Corp. statistics, Western Container is the 11<sup>th</sup> largest private

sector employer in Howard County; however, the company is the city of Big Spring's largest taxpayer.

But the loss of tax revenue was not foremost in Big Spring Mayor Larry McLellan's mind this morning.

"Our first concern is with the people and their families who will lose their jobs," McLellan said.

The news was not totally unexpected — McLellan said he had been hearing rumors for months about Western Con-

nary autopsy. Benjamin Moore, Big Spring High School graduate, was arrested last week for a first-degree felony charge of aggravated as-

sault of a date/ family/house member with a deadly weapon and family violence. Police respond to a 911 call from Moore and found his wife, Natasha Morris, who attended Forsan schools, hanging by a curling iron power cord in the closet. She died of

#### German paper says it won't publish all offshore files

BERLIN (AP) — The German newspaper that first obtained the so-called Panama Papers, a vast trove

of documents on offshore companies, said Thursday that it won't publish all the files, arguing that not all are of public interest. Sueddeutsche Zeitung received the documents

from an unidentified source more than a year ago and shared at least parts of them with dozens of other media outlets around the world. Since the first reports were published Sunday, prominent politicians, celebrities and businesspeople have had their offshore business dealings dragged into the spotlight, prompting a flurry of public outrage, official investigations and fierce denials from some of those named. Sueddeutsche Zeitung said the complete set of

11.5 million documents "won't be made available to the public or to law enforcement agencies. That's because the SZ isn't the extended arm of prosecutors or the tax investigators."

Authorities have legal powers to obtain such documents from those suspected of wrongdoing, and in many cases there's no public interest in revealing companies' or individuals' offshore business dealings, the Munich-based paper said.

#### Xi seen as easily surviving revelations in Panama Papers

BEIJING (AP) — For graft-busting Chinese Communist Party leader Xi Jinping, the Panama Papers revelations that show his brother-in-law and relatives of two other members of the party's elite inner circle owned offshore companies, often referred to as tax havens, might have been highly damaging.

Instead, Xi will likely emerge unscathed as a result of his personal hold on political power, controls over free speech and the media, and a sense both among the public and potential rivals that all leading families are tainted to some degree, ana-With the latest reports still just days old, however,

lingering impacts can't be ruled out entirely. Damage to Xi's reputation might show up in unexpected difficulties in putting in place a new team for when he assumes a second five-year term as leader of the ruling Communist Party next year and for setting in place a succession plan for 2022. Challenges to his leadership of a bevy of offices and committees, or to his sweeping anti-corruption campaign, might also be signs of weakness.

The latest report by the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists, known as the ICIJ, says Xi's brother-in-law Deng Jiagui purchased one offshore company through Panama-based law firm Mossack Fonseca in 2004 and two more in 2009. All three had been dissolved or become dormant by the time Xi became party leader in 2012, the ICIJ says citing a stash of 11.5 million leaked Mossack Fonseca documents — dubbed the Panama Papers — that discuss cases involving politicians, celebrities and business people from around the world.

#### Offshore accounts are for more than laundering money Offshore accounts conjure images of bad behav-

ior by the rich and shady, and for good reason: they have been used to dodge taxes, fund organized crime and facilitate corruption. But many people use offshore accounts for more than just hiding bribes and laundering money.

And offshore accounts can be financial tools for more than just the ultra-wealthy, too. Regular people use them to simplify transactions with relatives overseas, or to keep money in places where they travel often — or for more distasteful reasons, like to hide money from a soon-to-be ex-spouse. These accounts and trusts, and the shell compa-

nies sometimes set up to control them, have come under scrutiny this week after a massive leak of confidential documents from a Panamanian law firm has shown how some of the world's richest people hide assets to avoid paying taxes. It is impossible to say how many accounts are for

legitimate purposes rather than illicit ones, according to Mark Matthews, an attorney and former IRS deputy commissioner.

#### Cruz's winning ways have yet to win over fellow GOP senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Ted Cruz is increasingly winning over voters to his presidential bid. He's still not winning over fellow Republican sena-The Texas Republican is notorious for alienat-

ing his colleagues with tactics including pushing a fruitless government shutdown in 2013 and accusing the Senate majority leader of lying. They're now paying it back by refusing to get on board with his presidential bid even as he emerges as the likeliest alternative to businessman Donald Trump following a commanding win Tuesday night in Wis-"I just haven't heard any talk about it," respond-

ed Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, a senior Republican, when asked whether Republican colleagues would be gravitating toward Cruz. "I will tell you that wasn't the chatter," said Sen.

Dean Heller, R-Nev., after emerging from a closeddoor GOP lunch.

#### Obama going back to school on Garland nomination WASHINGTON (AP) — The stalled nomination

of Judge Merrick Garland to the Supreme Court is giving President Barack Obama a chance to do what he says he's missed: go back to school. Obama was returning to the University of Chi-

cago Law School on Thursday to argue his case for why the Senate should give Garland a seat on the nation's most powerful court. Obama taught constitutional law at the univer-

sity for about a decade before entering politics. He was being joined Thursday by a former law school colleague, professor David Strauss, for a conversation with students, faculty and judges from the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 7th Circuit, which has jurisdiction over legal matters from Illinois, and other local judges. Obama chose Garland, a Chicago native and

chief judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit, to fill the seat left empty by the February death of conservative Justice Antonin Scalia. The next step in the process of elevating someone

to the Supreme Court typically has the nominee answering questions during hearings by the Senate Judiciary Committee.




#### MUSIC IN THE WHITE HOUSE

# BSHS's Paredez finishes fourth at state meet



ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The bullpen that was so good for Texas while winning the AL West last season is supposed to be even better.

Sure it's early, but Rangers relievers are off to a rough start this season.

Robinson Cano and the Seattle Mariners rallied late for the second game in less than 24 hours, this time doing most of the damage against closer Shawn Tolleson in a 9-5 win Wednesday to clinch the opening three-game series.

"I'd hope that we wouldn't panic in two games," manager Jeff Banister said.

Tolleson struck out two of the three batters he faced in a perfect ninth of the opener Monday

that Texas won 3-2. In the series

finale, he became the second Rangers reliever in as many days to allow five runs without recording an out.

"It stinks. We never want to go in and give up runs," Tolleson said. "We want to be a dominant bullpen."

Cano's second homer of the game, a two-run shot, capped the five-run outburst against Tolleson (0-1). Pinch-hitter Nori Aoki and No. 9 batter Ketel Marte started the rally with consecutive singles, and Leonys Martin had a tying RBI double before Kyle Seager's two-run single and Cano's fourth homer in the series.

"It was a good series. Not only because the way I ended up swinging the bat but the way we came back," Cano said.

# Mavs beat Rockets 88-86 to keep slim lead over Utah, Houston

DALLAS (AP) — If the Dallas Mavericks have to creep into the playoffs, they will. It's part of a style change, as coach Rick Carlisle likes to call it.

And it worked again for the Mavericks in a crucial, tense victory over their Texas rivals from Houston.

J.J. Barea scored 27 points and Dallas kept a slim cushion over Utah and Houston in the race for the last two Western Conference playoff spots with an 88-86 victory over the Rockets on

Wednesday night. "I like to play fast, too, but slowing it down is working us," said Barea, who had a game-high eight assists. "We've got to stay that way."

The Mavericks' fifth straight victory — one shy of a season best — put Dallas (40-38) a game ahead of Utah and two up on Houston with four games remaining for all three teams.

Dirk Nowitzki was limited to seven points on eight shots, but had a crucial strip of James Harden on a drive in the final seconds with the Mavericks clinging to a onepoint lead.

Harden scored 26 points and Dwight Howard had 14

points and 16 rebounds for

the Rockets, who are in dan-

ger of missing the postsea-



son a year after reaching the West finals.

"We all know how difficult it is, how important this game was," Harden said. "It's not rocket science."

The Mavericks held their fifth straight opponent under 90 points after 19 of the previous 21 scored at least 100. It's part defense and part pace, with the Mavericks slowing things considerably since point guard Deron Williams was sidelined by a left abdominal strain.

Barea has been the most important Dallas player since then, scoring at least 20 points in his fourth straight game and averaging 24.2 points, 3.4 rebounds and 7.0 assists during the five-game

surge.





finesse and makes the contract with an overtrick, scoring four hearts and two tricks in each of the other suits. If East does not take his queen, South still gets home safely. He takes a successful diamond finesse, crosses

returns, declarer takes a second heart

to the ace of hearts and repeats the diamond finesse. Declarer thus scores two spades, two hearts, three diamonds and two clubs. However, South would find it impossible to make nine tricks if

West played the king of hearts on the first heart lead! This would limit South to just one heart trick.

Declarer might duck the king,

hoping West also had the queen, or might take the king and attempt a diamond finesse. Either way, though, South can't make nine tricks

West should surely play the king of hearts when the suit is first led despite the usual practice by a defender of playing second hand low. General rules are always subservient to common sense, and in the present case, West should apply that invalu-able commodity to the situation at hand.

West should reason that if South has the queen of hearts, the king is doomed, come what may. He therefore plays the king on the assumption that East has the queen, and hopes



# McHugh rocked, Astros waste Correa's big night vs Yankees

#### By MIKE **FITZPATRICK**

AP Baseball Writer NEW YORK (AP) -Carlos Correa is off to a prodigious start in his first full major league season. His latest impressive performance went to waste at Yankee Stadium, though.

Collin McHugh got only one out in the shortest start of his career, and the Houston Astros were routed by the New York Yankees 16-6 on Wednesday night.

"It's about as bad as you can draw it up," McHugh said.

It was the most runs the Astros had allowed since giving up 16 to Texas on Aug. 19, 2013.

"Every scoring opportunity had something to do with a walk. We didn't challenge the strike zone enough," manager A.J. Hinch

Correa went 4 for 5

with two home runs and George Springer hit his first career grand slam for Houston, a 5-3 winner Tuesday in the frigid season opener (36 degrees at game time).

This one started with the temperature at 43 degrees and took 3 hours, 45 minutes to complete. "He's an impact play-

er," Hinch said about Correa. "It wasn't a good night to hit and he sort of doesn't care." The 21-year-old Cor-

rea, last season's AL Rookie of the Year, is 5 for 9 (.556) with three home runs and four RBIs.

He became the first Astros player to hit three homers in the first two games of a season and joined Seattle's Russell Branyan (2009) as the only players to hit a home run off the dark glass facing of the sports bar above Monument Park in straight-

Starlin Castro homered and drove in five runs, Mark Teixeira had four RBIs and the Yankees chased McHugh (0-1) in a six-run bottom of the first inning that lasted 36 minutes.

Teixeira and Castro each hit a three-run homer. Carlos Beltran

also went deep and Castro finished with four of New York's 17 hits.

"Starlin Castro is playing T-ball right now," Beltran said.

Brian McCann had a two-run double in the first, Brett Gardner walked a career-high four times and pinchhitter Ronald Torreyes hit a two-run triple in his first at-bat with the Yankees.

Michael Pineda (1-0) benefited from the offensive outburst, taking home a win despite allowing six runs and eight hits — including three homers — in five innings.

Ivan Nova finished with four scoreless innings on a windy night for his first major league save. It was his first relief appearance since June 2013.

LONG RELIEF New York's first-in-

leadoff man Jacoby Ellsbury reached on catcher's interference, followed by two walks. McHugh was pulled after 43 pitches and replaced by rookie righthander Michael Feliz, who gave up six runs in 4 1-3 innings. Feliz threw 107 pitches, most by an Astros reliever since Bob Forsch threw 114 against Cincinnati in 1989, STATS said.

"Anytime you go to get your starter in the first, it's going to be a little dicey the rest of the way," Finch said.

The Astros announced they will hold a short ceremony before their home opener Monday to dedicate the press box at Minute Maid Park to the memory of Hall of Fame broadcaster Milo Hamilton, the team's longtime radio voice. Hamilton died last September.






# Parent's Corner: Don't shortcut the thinking process

ave you ever been accused of putting two and two together and making five? If so, someone


is thinking that you have jumped to the wrong conclusion.

In today's world, we are always under pressure to act now, rather than spend time reasoning things through



can this lead us to a wrong

conclusion, but it can also



In this fast moving environment, we need to make sure our actions and decisions are founded on reality. Similarly, when we accept or challenge other people's conclusions, we need to be confident that their reasoning, and ours, is firmly based on the true facts.

Interestingly enough, there is a thinking process that leads us to these conclu-

Our beliefs have a big effect on how we select from reality, and can lead us to

ignore the true facts altogether. Soon we are literally jumping to conclusions by missing facts and skipping steps in the reasoning process. In the beginning we have reality and facts.

From there, we experience these selectively based on our beliefs and prior experience. Then we interpret what they mean by applying our existing assumptions, sometimes without considering them. We then draw conclusions based on the interpreted facts and our assumptions and develop beliefs based on these conclusions. Then we take actions that seem "right" because they

are based on what we believe.

This is jumping to conclusions.

What we should do is learn the facts and use our beliefs and experiences to positively effect, rather than allowing them to narrow our field of judgment. We should ask ourselves the following questions to judge whether we are making the correct assumption: Is this the "right" conclusion? Why am I making these assumptions? Why do I think this is the "right" thing to do? Is this really based on all the facts? Why does this person believe

If we are challenging someone else's conclusions, it is especially important to be able to explain our reasoning so that we can explain it to that person in a way that helps us reach a shared conclusion and avoid conflict.

In the old television show of Daniel Boone a bit of advice was given. (I don't know if Daniel Boone actual ly said this but he did in the show). Daniel would say, "Be sure you're right, then go ahead!" This is good advice that we should all remember.

# What's behind educational divide in GOP White House race

WASHINGTON (AP) – It was in Nevada, just about month ago, when Donald Trump proclaimed his affection for the uneducated.

"We won with young. We won with old. We won with highly educated. We won with poorly educated. I love the poorly educated," the Republican presifront-runner dential boasted after coasting to a decisive victory in the state's caucuses.

He should love them. Trump overwhelmingly leads his rivals for support among the less educated, and draws more modest backing from college graduates and those with postgraduate study, according to exit polls conducted for The Associated Press and television networks by Edison Research.

In an analysis of voters by education in states where exit or entrance polling is available, nearly half of those with high school diplomas or less schooling said they supported the billionaire. Just over 40 percent of those with some college study favored him. Texas Sen. Ted Cruz captured the next best showing among the two groups, with 27 and

28 percent, respectively. What is it about Trump that he attracts such a strong showing among

those who haven't graduated from college?

"I think it is incorrect to look at the data conclude that those voters are more ignorant," Katherine Cramer, a political science professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, said in an interview. "Instead, there's a strong correlation between having a college degree or not, and your economic situation in life."

Cramer explains, "These are folks who have been feeling a real struggle to make ends meet for decades now and they see a candidate coming along who says to them, 'You're right. You're not getting your fair share. It sucks. And I'm going to stand up for you.' "

"That's really appealing to people," Cramer said before Tuesday's primary in Wisconsin,.

Exit polls from most of the primaries and caucuses held to date show Trump has trailed among voters having a high school degree or less in only one state where data is available so far. Cruz led in his home state of Texas. The high school graduate sample size wasn't large enough in Massachusetts and Vermont for a solid measure.
