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Why **Sanders** keeps winning

But may not be the Democratic candidate

WASHINGTON — The standard line in Bernie Sanders' campaign speeches goes like this: "Despite what the corporate media is telling you, there is a path to the nomination."

If such a track exists, it's far from clear what it is. Sanders is far behind

Hillary Clinton in the race for delegates that will decide the nomination. He'll need 68 percent of those remaining to win. Even after his recent run of success, Sanders is nowhere near that pace.

And it's not the corporate media he should be blaming, but the rules of a Demo-

cratic Party he only recently joined after serving decades in public office as an independent.

The party has tailored its nominating process specifically to prevent an upstart candidate such as Sanders from winning its nomination for president. And Sanders' top adviser, by the way,

Code let lottery vendor predict winning numbers, police say

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) - A lottery vendor for years manipulated drawings to enrich himself and associates by installing software code that allowed him to predict winning numbers on specific days of the year, Iowa investigators alleged Wednesday.

Authorities called the newly obtained forensic evidence a breakthrough in the investigation of alleged jackpot-fixing scheme by Eddie Tipton, former security director of the Multi-State Lottery Association. A jury convicted him last year of rigging a \$16.5 million jackpot, and he's awaiting trial on charges linking him to prizes in Colorado, Wisconsin, Oklahoma and Kansas.

Prosecutors filed charges Wednesday against his younger brother, Tommy Tipton, a former justice of the peace and reserve police officer in Texas. He surrendered to authorities and was released on bond. He's charged with ongoing criminal conduct related to his role in securing the Colorado and Oklahoma jackpots, which allegedly netted him \$1.2 million in cash.

The case has rocked the Multi-State Lottery Association, an Iowa-based nonprofit that administers Powerball and other games for states.

Prosecutors had alleged Eddie Tipton tampered with random number generators that were used by the association and state lotteries to pick jackpot winners. But their case had been based on circumstantial evidence because the generators had been erased or destroyed. Tipton's defense has cited the lack of evidence as a reason charges should be dis-

Documents filed Wednesday show Wisconsin authorities recovered the random number generator used for a \$2 million Megabucks jackpot claimed in 2008 by Tipton's friend, Robert Rhodes. He is fighting extradition from Texas to Iowa, where he

A forensic examination found that the generator had code that was installed after the machine had been audited by a security firm that directed the generator not to produce random numbers on three particular days of the year if two other conditions were met. Numbers on those days would be drawn by an algorithm that Tipton could predict, Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation agent Don Smith wrote in an affidavit.

All six prizes linked to Tipton were drawn on either Nov. 23 or Dec. 29 between 2005 and 2011.

Investigators were able to recreate the draws and produce "the very same 'winning numbers' from the program that was supposed to produce random numbers," Smith wrote

Eddie Tipton was charged last year after authorities released surveillance footage of a person buying the winning ticket for a \$16.5 million Hot Lotto jackpot and hot dogs at a Des Moines gas station in 2010. Colleagues identified the buyer as Tipton, a computer whiz who had unparalleled access to lottery software.

Tommy Tipton, 51, testified at his brother's trial, saying the buyer looked nothing like his sibling. Besides, he said, Eddie doesn't like hot dogs. But months later, Tommy Tipton resigned his

elected judicial position in Flatonia, Texas, after his brother was convicted and his name surfaced The complaint filed Wednesday says that Tommy

Tipton came under scrutiny in 2006, when Texas investigators received a tip that the judge had \$500,000 in cash in consecutively marked bills.

He told them he got the money after winning a share of a \$4.5 million Colorado Lotto jackpot, saying he recruited a friend to claim the \$569,000 cash payout because he didn't want his wife to know about it while they were considering divorce.

Investigators didn't know then that Tipton's brother wrote and installed the program that Colorado Lottery officials used to draw the numbers.

In 2011, Tommy Tipton purchased numbers that would win a \$1.2 million Hot Lotto jackpot while traveling in Oklahoma, the complaint said. A relative of one of Tipton's friends claimed the \$644,000

prize, which was returned to him. Tipton's attorney, Randy Schaffer, said he was reviewing the allegations and didn't want to address their merits. But he said he "took the high road" by surrendering rather than fighting extradition.

"This is a guy who, until a few months ago, was a judge," he said. "He's going to hopefully ... be professional and responsible in his dealings."

ValVerde said. "We will stay until around 8:30 p.m. so the public can visit with the candidates following the forum." The Big Spring city council

has two contested races. Big Spring Mayor Larry McLellan is running for his second term. He is being challenged by Shannon Thomas. In the District 5 Race, incumbent Raul Benavides is also vying for a second term against challenger Becky Winters.

The Howard College Board of Trustees race drew an unusual amount of interest from the community this year. In the Precinct 1 race, long-time trustee Michael Flores is running against Steve Escanuelas. Precinct 2 also drew two candidates, Mark Morgan and Greg Moore. Both men are attempting to win their first term on the board. The two at-large positions up for election drew three candidates, Adriel Saldiva and Ryan Williams, who were appointed to the board last fall to fill va-

is a longtime Democratic Party insider who helped write those rules.

HOW IT WORKS

One word: Delegates. Not states won, not debate triumphs, not cash raised. Certainly not what the Sanders campaign calls "momentum."

The nominating contest is about winning 2,383 delegates, and the delegate math says Clinton is decidedly ahead of Sanders. The basics: All Demo-

cratic contests award delegates in proportion to the share of the vote — so even the loser gets some. That makes it hard

for a front-runner to collect delegates and clinch the nomination as quickly as when the winner takes all. But the proportional system also makes it difficult for a trailing candidate to catch up if he or she falls behind by a large number.

Clinton was able to amass a big delegate lead — at one point more than 300 delegates — by winning by large margins in the South, where

there are large minority populations that largely back her over Sanders.

In contrast, Sanders has mostly won smaller states that hold caucuses or won narrowly in larger states such as Wisconsin and Michigan, which has limited the number of delegates he's netted in his effort to catch up to Clinton.

To date, Sanders trails Clinton by close to 2.4 million total votes cast and by more than 200 delegates. In 2008, when Clinton trailed Barack Obama by more than 100 delegates, she was never able to catch up to him.

The current count: Clinton has 1,280 delegates won in primaries and caucuses to Sanders' 1,030.

WHAT ABOUT **SUPERDELEGATES?**

Another factor: 15 percent of the delegates who get a vote at the Democratic National Convention are superdelegates, or elected officials and party leaders who can back any candidate they wish.

They are the party establishment. And they overwhelmingly port Clinton.

The Associated Press surveys those superdelegates and adds them to the tally if they say

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whom they publicly plan to vote for at the convention. The AP doesn't count those who say they've decided, but aren't willing to say so "on the record."

Clinton's strong support among superdelegates widens her lead even more -1,749 to Sanders' 1.061.

HOW IT GOT THIS WAY

For decades, the leaders and activists of the Democratic Party struggled to control its presidential nominating process. The back-and-forth gave birth in 1984 to the superdelegate.

They are insiders and political pros who are not bound to any candidate, and they act as deciders in prolonged nomination fights.

The original idea was to give party elders a voice in the nominating process to avoid a repeat of what some viewed as a mistake in the 1972 election, in which George McGovern won the nomination but proved to be a weak general election candidate. He lost 49 states in the November vote.

In 1984, under the susystem, perdelegate former Vice President Walter Mondale was the choice of the Democratestablishment and won the party's presi-

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dential nomination. He, too, lost 49 states in the general election.

SANDERS' SUPERDELEGATE CONNECTION

Tad Devine, Sanders' top adviser and a Democratic Party veteran of more than three decades, helped craft the superdelegate process.

He's been quoted defending it — "It's pretty hard to win a nomination in a contested race and almost impossible to win without the superdelegates," he observed in a 2008 interview on National Public Radio - and also pointing out that there's a danger of backlash if superdelegates wield too much power or operate in a less-than-transparent

Denying sexual reality in North Carolina woman who undergoes sex

change surgery, takes hormones

and has a penis, a deep voice

Some residents of North Carolina don't like the idea of sharing restrooms with transgender men and women, and they were pleased to learn that, thanks to a new law, they won't have to. I have news for them: They already have. They

just didn't know it. And they will again. In February,

the Charlotte City Council approved an ordinance strengthening protections against discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identification. It included a provision

stipulating that transgender men may use men's restrooms and transgender women may use women's restrooms. That provision brought on a hailstorm of fury and disbelief, and the North Carolina Legislature quickly passed a bill to overrule it. The Charlotte ordinance "defies common sense and basic community norms," said Gov. Pat McCrory on signing the state law.

"We've had these proper etiquette situations for decades in our country," he argued, "and all of a sudden, through political correctness, we're throwing away basic etiquette." Under the new policy, North Carolinians will have to use the restroom corresponding to the sex denoted on their birth certificates.

"No Men in Women's Bathrooms," read one of the signs brandished by opponents of the Charlotte measure. That sounds like a good reason to reject it if you don't think very hard. Under the new state law, a

and facial hair will be required to use the women's restroom. In the name of protecting daughters from unwanted male intruders, the Legislature and governor are exposing them to exactly that. Men, meanwhile, will have to share facilities with people wearing skirts and lipstick. This policy will cause far more

discomfort than it will prevent. What McCrory and others forget is that transgender men generally go unnoticed in men's restrooms, for the simple reason that they appear to be men. In fact, the odds are very good that at one time or another, you have unwittingly done your business alongside someone who is transgender — with no ill effects. Even in North Carolina, that

will keep happening. If someone with breasts and long hair enters a women's restroom, strangers usually won't realize this person was born with a full set of testicles. If a muscular, bearded person in a suit strides up to a urinal, the guys at the others aren't going to ask for proof he is a male. In these cases, ignorance What will generate problems

is transgender people's obeying the North Carolina law. But that may not happen often. It's not as though anyone has a clue how to enforce this mandate. Without a cop stationed at every entrance demanding birth certificates, most transgender people will probably go on doing as they've done, invisibly, in the past. The oft-stated fear is that male

child molesters will dress up as women to find girls to victimize. But what's stopping them from


doing that now?

And where is the epidemic of abuse where transgender people are allowed to choose restrooms? The liberal watchdog group Media Matters for America contacted law enforcement officials and other experts in 12 states and found none who was aware of any such incidents.

McCrory thinks all we need to do is uphold "basic community norms." But the traditional norm for people with gender dysphoria has been to deny, suppress or hide their true nature — so that everyone else could operate in comfortable denial.

The traditional norm these people could expect if they were found out has been hostile and often violent. This week, a Brooklyn man pleaded guilty to manslaughter for killing a 21-year-old transgender woman. He had been flirting with her, and when he found out she was not exactly what he assumed, he flew into a rage and beat her to death. Barring transgender people from the restrooms they prefer exposes them to harm by exposing something they may want to be secret: that they are transgender. In addition, a lawsuit filed against the North Caro lina law noted, "if a transgender woman were to use the men's restroom, she likely would be harassed and might be assaulted by men who believed that she should not be in the men's restroom." Transgender men emerg ing from women's restrooms may incur violence from angry fathers or husbands.

The North Carolina law makes perfect sense if you're willing to pretend that transgender people don't exist. Too bad they won't cooperate.





In scandals, girls do have names

Hogan's successful suit against Gawker or Donald

Trump's rumble with a gossip writer, you may have come across some missing people. Both stories lean on "love" triangles in which one of the sides, the woman, is of so little consequence she's rarely even

named. The men may act with warped motives, but they star in their sordid dramas. By contrast, the women are virtually inanimate objects. We'll take either.

In the Hogan case, Gawker posted a secretly recorded video of the wrestler having sex with the wife of a friend. It was a setup by the friend, a radio personality named Bubba the Love Sponge. A jury awarded Hogan \$115 million in damages for the violation of his privacy.In the course of the reportage, we learn Hulk's real name, Terry Bollea.

'f you've been following Hulk As for Mrs. Love Sponge, much of the commentary leaves her name out altogether. It is Heather Clem, for the record.

It happens that Heather was a real player here, in cahoots with her (now estranged) husband to cash in on Hogan's public humiliation. She wasn't tricked into playing the co-starring role in the racy video. So give her credit — for something.

In Trump world, women get passed around like canapes at a cocktail party. When the woman has an incensed male partner, the coverage of the conflict portrays the men as giant elk locking horns in Rocky Mountain National Park. 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

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
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

Did you ever wonder: Tabernacle furniture

he Ark of the Covenant was to hold the stone tablets that God would later give to Moses. Many times during this section God called them the "testimonial-tablets." Let me point out once again how much dif-

ferent that sounds from "Ten Commandments."

Translation from the original Hebrew turned the gentlesounding name into something fearsome. Ten Commandments makes me think of running a race with high-hurdles for us to jump. Points are taken away every

ing and gentle. He offers these guidelines for my life by which I can show that I choose Him over the world. When I stump my toe and fail Him, I can come to Him with a truly contrite heart and He will forgive, not punish. But I must be truly repen-

There were other pieces of furniture for the Tabernacle. They were to build a table for the 'show-bread. It was built of acacia wood overlaid with gold. As yet they did not know what the 'show-bread' was.

The show-bread was twelve large, flat, loaves of bread... one for each tribe. I believe it was sort of a tithe to show thankfulness for the bread God gave them daily. It was to be replaced every Friday so that the bread would be fresh for each Sabbath.

There was an Altar of the Incense inside the Tabernacle. It was made of acacia wood and overlaid with gold. A specific incense was burned each time the priest entered the Tabernacle. Sages surmised that the cloud of smoke from the incense protected the High Priest when he must come near the Ark on the Day of Atonement each year.

God gave a specific recipe for the spices to be used for the incense. He also gave a strong warning to anyone who tried to duplicate or misuse this incense. It was holy!

The other piece of furniture was the Menorah. It was a large oil-burning lamp with seven branches. It was eight feet tall and it lighted the inside of the Tabernacle.

God's directions for building the Menorah were very specific. It stood on a base with three feet, and a single lampstand rose from the base. At three levels, there were two branches coming out of the main lamp stand, one on the right and one on the left. These branches curved upward and rose to the same height as the central lampstand.

Small cups sat atop each of the seven branches holding the purest of olive oil. A small wick projected from each cup of oil, making it into a lamp. Hence, the cups of oil were referred to as lamps.

God designed each branch of the Menorah to be decorated with almond blossoms, and it was beautiful. But most amazing, God directed that it be hammered from one single talent of pure gold. A talent of gold weighed approximately 150 pounds.

The Arch of Titus in Rome depicts Roman soldiers carrying away the Menorah after they sacked the Tabernacle, ca. A.D. 70.

Bill to make Bible Tennessee's state book heads to governor

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Derided by critics as everything from unconstitutional to sacrilegious, Tennessee lawmakers nevertheless plowed ahead with designating the Holy Bible as the state's official Sponsors argue the

bill seeks to honor the historical significance the Bible Tennessee's history rather than serving as a government endorsement of religion.

But opponents say the measure trivializes the Bible by placing it alongside other Tennessee symbols like the smallmouth bass as the state sport fish, the cave salamander as the state amphibian and the honeybee as the state agricultural insect.

"They know that in order to withstand the bill violates both the likely judicial scrutiny that is to come the legislation must appear to be 'secular,'" state Senate Republican leader Mark Norris said in a written statement Tuesday. "But it is not secular. Secular is the opposite of sacred."

Norris said trying to make the argument that the Bible is a historical symbol rather than a religious one "is the stuff of Satan — not Holy Scripture."

The state Senate's approved the bill on a 19-8 vote on Monday night, sending it to Republican Gov. Bill Haslam, who opposes the bill but hasn't said for its historical and whether he will issue a veto.

"The Bible is the most important book in my life, and I think in the world," Haslam told reporters last week. "But that's very different than being the state's official book.'

Once the bill reaches Haslam's desk, he has days excluding Sundays to either sign or veto the bill, or it becomes law without his signature.

Spokesman David Smith said in an email "the governor has constitutional questions and personal reservations about this legislation," but that he will review the legislation before making a veto decision.

The state's attorney general warned that the U.S. and Tennessee constitutions, the latter of which states that that "no preference shall ever be given, by law, to any religious establishment or mode of worship.'

Democratic Sen. Jeff Yarbro challenged the sponsor, bill's Republican Sen. Steve Southerland, ordained minister, on whether he considers the Bible primarily as a religious or as a historical text.

"It's about a lot of different things," Southerland responded. "But what we're doing here is recognizing it cultural contribution to the state of Tennessee."

Yarbro acknowledges "it's hard to vote against the Bible," but argues the bill is misguided for touting the economic role of Bible publishing in Tennessee or the fact that family histories were often tracked in Bibles before vital statistics were kept by the government. "I don't think that's

why we read the Bible, I don't think that's why we send our kids to vacation Bible school," Yarbro said. "To those of us who grew up in this faith, it is so much more."

In solidly Republican Tennessee, heavy doses of God and guns are considered reliable election-year politics.

The Bible bill came to a vote just days before the candidate filing deadline, giving lawmakers pause about being portrayed by political rivals as being opposed to the Bible if they voted against the bill.

Earlier this session, Legislature the approved a resolution to add the .50-caliber Barrett sniper rifle to the state's official symbols. The Murfreesborobased company run by a prominent Republican supporter, Ronnie Barrett, supplies its firearms to law enforcement agencies, private citizens and more than 70 militaries around the

Hedy Weinberg, the executive director of the ACLU of Tennessee, called on Haslam to veto the Bible bill. She called it a "thinly veiled effort to promote one religion over other religions clearly violates both the United States and Tennessee Constitutions."

Southerland said an outside legal organization has offered to defend any lawsuits challenging the bill for

Coach Steve Kerr, who played on the record-setting Bulls team, acknowledges being uneasy about chasing the record instead of giving the team a break, but the Warriors' young stars are gung-ho to get it.

"Most of the guys in the locker room are saying, 'We're right here, we've put all this effort into it, let's go for it," forward Draymond Green said.

Harrison Barnes scored 21 points and Green added 18 to help the Warriors avoid losing back-to-back games for the first time this season. Golden State has outscored the opposition by



depends on the size and shape of partner's two-heart bid. If you bid hree hearts and he holds a maximum aise such as ♠ Q4 ♥ \(\Lambda\) \(\Delta\) 9643 ► K72, he will gladly accept your

invitation and carry on to four.

But if partner holds something like

★ K95 ♥ Q863 ♦ J82 ♣ 964, he will pass, and you might have trouble making even nine tricks.

Alternatively, you could bid two spades or three clubs (forcing) as a way of inviting game. The point is that you are not in a position to decide unilaterally whether there's a

you'll be a big tayorite to make six, if it's in spades, you might still have a shot at the slam.

Despite the fact that you might not make 12 tricks even if partner has an ace, you should go for the slam because, opposite most of the hands partner could hold, you'd be a partner could hold, you'd be a favorite to make six hearts.

3. Two spades. There is no question about making a game; the question is whether there's a slam. Two

spades (forcing) is the first move in that direction. Partner does not necessarily need a

maximum raise for a slam to be made. If he has no values in clubs, you probably do have a slam. Thus, partner could have only the king of spades and king of diamonds and a slam would be feasible. Or partner could have ♠ 5 ♥ QJ82 ♠ K843 ♣ 9762, and a slam would be virtually unbeatable. In any case, if partner cooperates in any way after your planned cuebids in spades and dia-monds, you should undertake a slam.



the Spurs, who will enter the playoffs next weekend as the second seed in the West. San Antonio has been outscored by


41 points in two losses at Golden State this season and will have to open on the road if these teams meet again in the conference finals.


sive breakdown led to an open 3-pointer for Klay Thompson.
