Fun and safety to go hand in hand when aquatic center opens this summer, city officials promise

With summer rapidly approaching, many area families are looking forward to fun afternoons at the Russ McEwen Aquatic Center, and city officials want to assure those people that fun and safety will be provided in equal measure.

During their Tuesday meeting, Big Spring City Council members engaged in a lengthy discussion on how to reassure visitors to the aquatic centers that officials are taking all necessary steps to ensure accidents or injuries will be minimized, if not altogether eliminated.

In the course of approving the city's annual contract with the YMCA to provide lifeguards this summer at the aquatic center, council members expressed a desire that the people tasked with watching over young swimmers are as wellversed as possible on proper safety and health procedures.

Lifeguards certified under the YMCA program are trained to deal with a variety of emergency conditions, but city officials expressed a desire for the city to expand that training further.

"A lot of things we do here (in council meetings) might appear to be inconsequential, but this is

vital for the safety of children and patrons (at the center)," District 6 Councilmember Jim DePauw said. "We will have a bunch of teenaged lifeguards out there this summer, and for a lot of them, it'll be their first job, so I propose we have an orientation program for those folks that focuses on safety ... Wouldn't it be a nice feather in our cap if we were able to say at the end of the summer that no one got injured at the aquatic center?"

"I think an orientation is a great way to jump-start this," Mayor Larry McLellan added. "From our

Former governor endorses Arrington

Jody Arrington's campaign can now boast the endorsement of someone all Texans will recognize, former Texas Gov. Rick Perry.

"There is a very important runoff election in the 19th Congressional District to

Arrington is facing Lubbock Mayor Glen Robertson in the May 24 runoff election. Robertson recently received the endorsement of former District 19 candidate Dr. Donald May.

Early voting for the election is the week of May 16-20 with Election Day May 24.

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

Texas news in brief

Texas 'affluenza' teen heads to adult court

DALLAS (AP) — A Texas teenager who used an "affluenza" defense in a fatal drunken-driving wreck will appear Wednesday in adult court for the first time. Ethan Couch, who turned 19 on Monday, will ap-

pear before a Fort Worth judge who could order more jail time as part of the terms of Couch's adult probation. Prosecutors and court officials declined to confirm the nature of the hearing, saying the judge has issued a gag order. Couch got 10 years' probation in juvenile court

for a June 2013 wreck that left four dead and two severely injured. He landed in jail after he fled with his mother, Tonya, to Mexico when a video surfaced online showing Couch apparently at a party where alcohol was being served. Drinking alcohol is a violation of Couch's probation. The two were apprehended in Mexico in December and brought back to Texas in January.

Surgery separates infant conjoined twins

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Surgery at a South Texas hospital has separated two 10-monthold sisters born conjoined below the waist. Driscoll Children's Hospital spokesman Jeff

Salzgeber says the hourslong operation began Tuesday morning. Ximena (huh-MEE-nuh) and Scarlett Hernandez-

Torres shared a colon and bladders that will be reconstructed. Their identical triplet sister, Catalina, was born without serious health issues. The hospital staff has cared for the conjoined girls

since they were transferred to the Corpus Christi facility hours after birth. Dr. Haroon Patel says a team of specialists had

been working for months to prepare for the surgery, which lasted about 15 hours. A hospital statement says doctors have a positive

outlook for the children's recovery. The girls will require additional surgeries as they grow.

died after getting caught in a trash compactor in an accident near San Antonio.

an Rosanne Hughes said that the man, who worked for Metro Waste Systems, became trapped in the back of a garbage collection truck Tuesday.

Hughes identified the victim as 26-year-old Beniamin Garza.

The sheriff's office is investigating the death as an accident.

San Antonio area hit with hail, rain during overnight storms SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Hail as big as grapefruits

has left behind broken windows and other storm damage in parts of South Texas. The National Weather Service says the San Antonio area has a chance for additional thunderstorms

through Wednesday.

Hail fell over much of north Bexar (bayr) County on Tuesday night, with forecasters saying an area near Helotes (hel-OH'-tis) recorded hail the size of grapefruits. San Antonio International Airport received more than an inch of rain.

Authorities had no immediate reports of anyone hurt. Bexar County sheriff's spokesman James Keith says at least nine law enforcement vehicles sustained hail damage.

Scattered street flooding was reported in San Antonio. Forecasters say the Houston area also faced lin-

gering thunderstorms through Wednesday and some high-water road issues following overnight

2 die in Houston-area hit-and-run wreck during street racing HOUSTON (AP) — Investigators are seeking the

driver of a pickup truck blamed for a Houston-area hit-and-run street racing accident that left two people dead.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office says the wreck happened Tuesday night and the male driver ran from the scene.

Authorities say the fugitive's truck slammed into a car that was not involved in the racing between stoplights on a feeder road along a parkway. A man and a woman in the car died at the scene.

Investigators say two men were in another vehicle that allegedly was racing with the truck. Authorities say those two men checked on the victims but then drove away. They're also being sought.

Names of the victims weren't immediately released.



Fracking has reduced greenhouse gases

he U.S. Department of Energy published data last week with some amazing revelations so amazing that most Americans

will find them hard to believe. As a nation, the **United States** reduced its carbon emissions by 2 percent from last year. Over the past 14 years, our carbon emissions are down more than 10 percent. On a perunit-of-GDP basis, U.S. carbon emissions are down by closer to 20 percent.

Even more stunning: We've reduced our carbon emissions more than virtually any other nation in the world, including most of Europe.

How can this be? The answer isn't that the EPA has regulated CO2 out of the economy. With strict emission standards, the EPA surely has started to strangle our domestic industries, such as coal, and our electric utilities. But that's not the big story here. The primary reason carbon

emissions are falling is because of hydraulic fracturing — or fracking. Fracking technology for shale oil and gas drilling is supposed to be evil. Some states have outlawed it. Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders have come out against it in recent weeks. Schoolchildren have been bombarded with green propaganda about all the catastrophic consequences of fracking.

They are mostly lies. Fracking is simply a new way to get at America's vast storehouse of tens of trillions of dollars worth of shale oil and gas that lies beneath us, coast to coast — from California to upstate New York. Fracking produces massive amounts of natural gas, and, as a consequence, natural gas prices have fallen in the past decade from above \$8 per million BTUs to closer to \$2 this year — a 75 percent reduction — due to the spike in domestic supplies.

This free fall in prices means that America is using far more natural gas for heating and electricity and much less coal. Here is how the International Energy Agency put it: "In the United States, (carbon) emissions declined by 2 percent, as a large switch from coal to natural gas use in electricity generation took place."It also observes that the decline "was offset by increasing emissions in most other Asian developing economies and the Middle East, and also a moderate increase in Europe." We are growing faster than they are and reducing emissions more than they are, yet these are the nations that lecture us on polluting. Go figure.

Here at home, this marketdriven transition has caused a pro-natural gas celebration by the green groups, right? Hardly.

Groups like the Sierra Club and their billionaire disciples have bet the farm on wind and solar power. They've launched anti-fracking campaigns and

"beyond natural gas" advertising campaigns. But wind and solar are hopelessly uncompetitive when natural gas is so plentiful and so cheap. So are electric

The media also have gotten this story completely wrong. Last week The New York Times celebrated the DOE's emissions findings as evidence that governmental iron-fist policies are working to stop global warming For the first time "since the star of the Industrial Revolution," the Times argued, "GDP growth and carbon emissions have been decoupled."

The Times pretends that this development is because of green energy, but that's a fantasy. Wind and solar still account for only 3 percent of U.S. energy.

So here is the real story in a flash: Thanks to fracking and horizontal drilling technologies, we are producing more natural gas than ever before. Natural gas is a wonder fuel: It is cheap. It is abundant. America has more of it than anyone else — enough to last several hundred years. And it is clean-burning. Even Nancy Pelosi inadvertently admitted this several years ago before someone had to whisper in her ear that, um, natural gas is a fos-

Meanwhile, the left has declared war on a technology that has done more to reduce carbon emissions and real pollution emissions than all the green programs ever invented. Maybe the reason is that they aren't so much against pollution as they are against progress.

No safe space to shoot up arry Campbell, a former cop and former mayor

of Vancouver, British Columbia, was appalled as he came to San Francisco to advocate a bill that would allow California cities to open safe injection centers like the one in his city for intravenous drug users. He'd

"never seen the number of people sleeping on the street," he told the San Francisco Chronicle editorial board, that he saw as he walked a few blocks from his Market Street hotel. He saw open drug dealing. "There's nobody hiding here."

I asked Campbell whether he thought he should have seen some arrests. "Yes," he responded. "I think you need to get control." Campbell says he saw only two police officers. In Vancouver, you'd see many more police, and they'd direct addicts to Insite, he said.

No other North American city has opened a "supervised injection site" since Insite opened its doors in 2003, but that may be about to change. Ottawa is looking at opening similar facilities. Ditto Ithaca, New York. California Assemblywoman Susan Talamantes Eggman has introduced a bill to allow California cities to open up such facilities, even though drugs such as heroin and other injected controlled sub-

stances will remain illegal under

"I can tell you bluntly, there is no downside," Campbell, now a Canadian senator, told the Chronicle. Crime did not rise in the blocks closest to Insite. Needle litter is down. Users enter the clinic with their own illegally obtained drugs, avail themselves of clean syringes and other paraphernalia, and then shoot up in a safe, clean environment away from the streets. Users have access to a detox center and treatment referrals. There have been 2 million injections since Insite opened, but not a single overdose death.

Why should San Francisco follow suit as Supervisor David Campos proposes? (Mayor Ed Lee is opposed.) Campbell asked rhetorically, "Can it get any worse?" Over the phone, Campos said the same thing.

California Assemblywoman Melissa Melendez opposes the Eggman bill for a host of reasons. She sees the notion as "enabling" and can't believe anyone wants to use tax dollars "to pay medical personnel to watch people shoot up." Surely, there are better uses of tax dollars such as rehabilitation programs.

I worry about how programs keep moving the bar to accommodate increasingly self-destructive behavior.

In 1997, I visited a San Francisco needle exchange center in the Mission and was impressed by what I saw. Users brought carefully bundled used needles 1,615 of them — and thus showed they cared enough to take care of themselves. The mantra of

social workers, which Eggman repeated to me over the phone, is essential: "Every life matters." In exchange for showing up and responsibly disposing of their needles, users received clean syringes and the chance to have a volunteer treat an abscess and give them vitamins and a medical or treatment referral. The San Francisco AIDS Foundation credited the program with helping to prevent pediatric AIDS

cases in the city in 1995 and 1996. Over time, San Francisco's needle exchange program morphed into a needle access program, as users no longer had to produce a dirty syringe to get the first 20 clean needles. With heroin use up across the nation, these days you see dirty needles everywhere. They are a public safety hazard for the non-using public.

Campbell lauded Insite for providing clean paraphernalia and access to treatment and medical care. The needle exchange centers of the 1990s provided all that. Needle exchange became needle access not to improve care but to accommodate users who couldn't get it together enough to return their used needles. The needle, if you will, has kept moving to make dysfunction easier for self-destructive people.

"If it doesn't work, shut her down," Campbell said when questioned about the probable success of a proposed San Francisco injection center. Nice try, but hitting the brakes is not a skill in which City Hall is prac-



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Cruz: Trump 'threatening delegates'

MADISON, Wis. (AP)
— Texas Sen. Ted Cruz
blasted rival Donald
Trump in a radio interview Tuesday, using
some of the harshest
rhetoric of the campaign
to date, accusing the Republican front-runner
of being a bully, inciting
violence and using dirty
tricks to intimidate voters and delegates.

He also said that the billionaire is a bad businessman who has been surrounded by sycophants his entire career.

"Donald's whole pitch is he's a great businessman," Cruz said in the wide-ranging interview on the Glenn Beck radio show, adding that given how he runs his campaign, "it appears he can't run a lemonade stand."

The interview came a day after Cruz hosted a pair of rallies in California before heading back east to Pennsylvania and New York. It also comes as both campaigns work tirelessly behind the scenes to secure delegates who will back them at the Republican Party convention this summer in Cleveland.

Cruz conceded that Trump will do well in

upcoming primaries, including in Trump's home state of New York, which votes next week.

"He ought to win his home state convincingly," Cruz said, setting expectations high for Trump. "If Donald isn't substantially above 50 percent in New York, it will be a big loss for him." Cruz said he will fare better when the race shifts back west to Indiana, Nebraska, South Dakota and Montana, before finishing in California on June 7.

"If and when the people of California vote against Donald Trump, he's going to scream that they're stealing the election," Cruz said. "Apparently when anyone votes against him it's an act of theft."

Cruz predicted a "grassroots tsunami" will send him on to victory at the Republican convention.

Cruz unloaded on Trump over reports that his supporters were publishing the home addresses of delegates in Colorado and threatening to make public the hotel room numbers of delegates at the convention this summer.

"That is the tactic of union thugs," Cruz said. "That is violence. It is oppressive. The idea that Donald is threatening delegates, we're seeing that pattern over and over again."

Cruz even compared Trump to the lead character from the famous Godfather films about organized crime.

"Donald needs to understand he's not Michael Corleone," Cruz said. "Donald needs to stop threatening the voters. He needs to stop threatening the delegates."

Cruz also discounted the seriousness of the Trump candidacy, saying "there was a real chance this was a lark, this was 'let's get some publicity, let's have some fun.' And I think he was surprised as anybody." But he's doing so poorly in securing delegates to the convention, if Trump were on his own reality show 'The Apprentice,' he would have to fire himself, Cruz said.

Cruz even got in a jab at New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie, who has endorsed Trump after dropping out of the race

"Chris Christie right now is trapped in his own private hell," Cruz said. "When Chris was standing behind Donald holding his jacket, the look in his eyes. You could see the screaming."

Poll: GOP not itching for convention fight

— Most Republican voters think the candidate with the most delegates heading into the party's convention in July should ultimately emerge as the GOP's presidential nominee, regardless of whether he holds the majority of all delegates needed to secure the nomination, according to a new Associated Press-GfK poll.

The survey finds Republicans are more likely to think of Donald Trump as a possible general election winner than either of his current GOP rivals.

Here are some things to know about opinions on a contested convention and which Republican candidates could win a general election from the latest AP-GfK poll:

NOT LOOKING FOR ALTERNATIVES

According to the new poll, nearly 6 in 10 Republican voters — 58 percent — think the candidate with the most delegates after all the state contests are finished should be the nominee, even if he doesn't have a clear majority.

Just 40 percent think it would be acceptable

WASHINGTON (AP) for the delegates to pick nearly half think it – Most Republican a different candidate. would be acceptable for

That's true even though slightly fewer have a favorable opinion of Trump, who will likely go into the convention with more delegates than any other candidate. Just 53 percent of Republican voters have a favorable opinion of Trump, while 46 percent have an unfavorable opinion.

DIVIDED OVER TRUMP

Within the Republican Party, opinions of Trump draw a dramatic divide in terms of how the convention should work out.

Eight in 10 Republican voters who have a favorable opinion of Trump think the party should nominate the ultimate delegate leader.

But among Republican voters with an unfavorable opinion of Trump, two-thirds think it would be acceptable for the delegates to choose someone else.

Another third of those who don't like Trump nonetheless think the party should nominate the delegate leader in the end.

AMERICA DIVIDED

Among all Americans,

nearly half think it would be acceptable for the delegates at the GOP convention to choose a different nominee, while about as many think the candidate in the lead should be the nominee.

Democratic voters think by a 63 percent to 35 percent margin that it would be acceptable for the Republican delegates to nominate another candidate if the leader doesn't have a majority of delegates.

PICKING A WINNER?

Although some Republican leaders have expressed concern that a Trump nomination would lead to a loss in November, that's not a concern most Republican voters share. Eighty-one percent think Trump could possibly win a general election, versus those who say so of Texas Sen. Ted Cruz (66 percent) or Ohio Gov. John Kasich (just 41 percent).

But the poll suggests both of the top GOP candidates would in fact be hard sells in a general election, with 63 percent of registered voters saying they would definitely not vote for Trump and 55 percent that they wouldn't consider voting for Cruz. Forty-four percent say they wouldn't consider voting for Kasich.

By contrast, 51 percent say they wouldn't consider voting for former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton in a general election and 38 percent wouldn't consider voting for Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders.

Still, even among Americans as a whole, about 6 in 10 think Trump could potentially win a general election, just under half think Cruz could and only a third think Kasich could. Kasich is still largely unknown to the American people, with 34 percent, including 26 percent of Republican voters, unable to say if they have a favorable or unfavorable opinion of

The AP-GfK Poll of 1,076 adults was conducted online March 31-April 4, using a sample drawn from GfK's probability-based KnowledgePanel, which is designed to be representative of the U.S. population. The margin of sampling error for all respondents is plus or minus 3.3 percentage points.

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Missouri certifies wins for Trump, Clinton

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) — Republican businessman Donald Trump and former Democratic Secretary of State Hillary Clinton were certified Tuesday as the winners of Missouri's presidential primaries, though a re-

count remains a possibility.

The official results of the March 15 primaries show that Trump and Clinton both prevailed over their challengers by a mere fraction of a percent.

Trump led Texas Sen.

Ted Cruz by 1,965 votes out of more than 939,000 cast in the Republican primary — a margin of about one-fifth of a percentage point.

Clinton led Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders by 1,574 votes out of more than 629,000 cast. G&M Auto Care

The real test of Kris Letang's relentless stamina doesn't come in the Pittsburgh Penguins dressing room after a long game. When he logs the kind of ice time that looks like a typo on the stat sheet, the big challenge comes the next morning, when his young son Alex hops into bed ready for dad to get up and play.

Try explaining to a 3-yearold that, sorry, but daddy played 35 minutes against the Sabres. So Letang doesn't even bother

"That doesn't cut it," Letang says with a laugh.

Besides, the truth is Letang's not really that tired. Really. If he's being honest, this is kind of where he always expected to be: playing the best hockey of his career (not to mention the most) for a team that heads into the postseason with its swagger and confidence restored thanks in large part to the smooth skating defenseman that plays with the engine of a Ferrari while getting the mileage of a Tesla.

Barely two years removed from a stroke that threatened to blunt the arc of his blossoming career, Letang is one of several ironmen whose tireless legs serve as part of the building blocks on which Stanley Cup dreams are made. The 28-year-old Letang averaged 26:57 minutes of ice time, fourth in the league and nearly 7 minutes more than teammate Sidney Crosby, the biggest gap between first and second on any club in the

Ryan Suter in Minnesota, Drew Doughty in Los Angeles, Roman Josi and Shea Weber in Nashville and Brent Burns in San Jose also finished in the top 10 in minutes, pillars at the blue line who have grown accustomed to carrying the heaviest burden. It's the same up front for Crosby, Patrick Kane in Chicago and Washington's Alexander Ovechkin. The offensive powerhouses all average more than 20 minutes a

night in a sport that plays as a marathon disguised in a series of sprints.

While their respective coaches monitor their workload, they don't get too caught up in watching the clock.

"Those guys who skate that way, that have those types of engines don't wear down, it's not an issue," San Jose

coach Peter DeBoer said. "And I think (Burns) actually thrives on it."

It's much the same for Letang, whose health scares over the years (including a series of concussions) left him wondering at times if he would ever reach the apex of his immense potential. It finally happened over the last four months, his breathtaking quickness combined with coach Mike Sullivan's arrival in mid-December propelling Letang into the league's elite.

"I mean, it was a way for me to step up and show what I'm capable of," said Letang, who finished with 16 goals and 51 assists in 71 games. "The coaching change was a big way to improve myself and prove what kind of player I'm capable of being."

Unlike some of the more

players defensive-minded around Letang on the timeon-ice rankings, the Penguins defender does more than hover near the blue line on offense, directing traffic and throwing the occasional puck at net. Letang plays a full 200 feet, emboldened by Sullivan to use his creativity to take

responsible chances. "A lot of D-men that play big minutes play an efficient game," Penguins defenseman Ben Lovejoy said. "They're out there not playing a difficult style of hockey. They're being efficient.

Public wants Senate action on court, but interest is modest

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nearly 2 in 3 Americans back Democrats' demands that the Republican-run Senate hold hearings and a vote on President Barack Obama's pick for the Supreme Court. But an Associated Press-GfK poll also suggests that GOP defiance against considering the nominee may not hurt the party much because, to many people, the election-year fight is simply not a big deal.

Just 1 in 5 in the survey released Wednesday said they've been following the battle over Obama's nomination of federal judge Merrick Garland extremely or very closely.

That included just 26 percent of Democrats and 22 percent of Republicans expressing intense interest, along with a scant 8 percent of independents. That aligns with the political reading of the issue by many Republicans that while it motivates each side's most committed partisans, people in the middle consider it a yawner — making the fight essentially a wash.

Another clue that voters not dedicated to either party find the court fight tiresome: While just over half of Democrats and Republicans said the issue is extremely or very important, only around a third of independents — and half of Americans overall — said so

About 8 in 10 said that about the economy and about 7 in 10 took the same stance about health care and the threat posed by the Islamic State group. Immigration and the U.S. role in world affairs both attracted slightly more intensity of interest than the court battle.

Paul Ryan is not running for president — or passing a budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Paul Ryan's national stature is such that he had to call a news conference to deny he wants to be president. Back on Capitol Hill, he's about to blow through a statutory deadline to pass an annual budget, a major embarrassment for him and House Republi-

House is supposed to produce a budget by this Friday, April 15. But a tea party revolt over Ryan's embrace of last year's bipartisan deal with President Barack Obama to increase spending has left him well short of the votes he needs. "It would appear that we're not going to have a

Under the government's arcane budget law, the

budget," the No. 2 House Democrat, Steny Hoyer of Maryland, told reporters Tuesday. "They made it a big deal. Hypocrisy is part of it," he added. "They're in deep disarray."

House Republicans met the budget deadline each of the five years they controlled the House under the leadership of John Boehner, who was ousted as speaker last fall under conservative pressure. Ryan himself, his party's 2012 vice presidential nominee, chaired the House Budget Committee for much of that time and guided the "Ryan Budget" that slashed entitlement spending. But he also cut a deal with Senate Democrats and the White House that enhanced his profile as a charismatic, policyfocused conservative.

The Wisconsin Republican has repeatedly lambasted Democrats when they didn't get budgets done while in congressional control, even backing a law that would have cut off the paychecks of lawmakers if they failed to pass a budget.

Judge rules against couple in China's 1st same-sex case

CHANGSHA, China (AP) — A judge ruled against a gay couple in China's first same-sex marriage case that attracted several hundred supporters to the courthouse Wednesday in a landmark moment for the country's emerging LGBT rights movement.

The court in the central city of Changsha dismissed the suit brought against the local civil affairs bureau for refusing to issue the couple a marriage registration certificate.

The couple's lawyer Shi Fulong said he expected the judge would rule against them but not so soon within just a few hours. "It goes against the spirit of the laws of the people's republic of China," Shi

Plaintiff Sun Wenlin said he would appeal until he exhausts all legal options.

The lawsuit comes amid growing awareness of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender issues in China, where society and the government have generally frowned on non-traditional expressions of gender and sexuality.

Syrians begin voting for new parliament in government areas

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Syrians in government-controlled areas headed to polling stations Wednesday to elect a new 250-member parliament that is expected to serve as a rubber stamp for President Bashar Assad. Voters began turning up shortly after the stations

opened at 7 a.m. (0400 GMT). Around 3,500 government-approved candidates are competing after more than 7,000 others dropped out. Early Wednesday, Assad and his wife, Asma, cast

their ballots at the Assad Library in Damascus. The president did not make any comments.

The country's foreign minister, Walid al-Moallem, told reporters after voting: "We in Syria always say that the Syrian people decide their destiny and today they are proving practically the accuracy of this saying."

Parliamentary elections in Syria are held every four years, and Damascus says the vote is constitutional and separate from the peace talks in Geneva aimed at ending the five-year war.

Lebanon shocked over sex trafficking of young Syrian women

BEIRUT (AP) — Back in Syria, the young women were told they would get well-paid jobs at restaurants and hotels in Lebanon. But when they arrived, their belongings and mobile phones were taken away, and the women were locked up in two hotels north of Beirut and forced into prostitution. What followed was an ordeal of beatings, torture

and abuse — until Lebanese security forces raided the hotels and dismantled the operation in late The discovery of the sex trafficking ring and the

rescue of the women deeply shocked tiny Lebanon, a Mediterranean Arab nation already overwhelmed by the influx of more than a million Syrian refugees who have fled the civil war, and prompted calls for investigation. The case, which involves 75 female victims, is

considered the worst sex trafficking scandal in Lebanon in decades and has raised questions about who might have shielded and enabled such a vast

When they were found in the Chez Maurice and Silver Hotel in the town of Maamelteine, 20 kilometers (12 miles) north of the Lebanese capital, the women were said to have been in miserable condi-

The three-story Chez Maurice looked more like a Associated Press crew, with bars on balconies and

Analysts say the growing attacks are a sign El Salvador's conflict is spiraling out of control and threatening to explode into open warfare.

"The gangs have managed to provoke a psychosis and paranoia within the police," damaging the force's already low morale, said Jeannette Aguilar, an expert on gangs who is director of the University Institute of Public Opinion at Central American University in San Salvador.

Country artists condemn LGBT laws, but labels silent

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Several country music artists and songwriters have condemned proposed laws that critics say discriminate against LGBT people, but anyone looking for reaction from the record labels and production companies on Nashville's Music Row has heard only the sound of

New laws in North Carolina and Mississippi have drawn the ire of businesses and celebrities alike, with Bruce Springsteen and Bryan Adams canceling shows in those states. Legislation dealing with the treatment of gays, lesbians, bisexuals and transgender people was vetoed by Georgia's governor, but bills are still being considered in Tennessee and South Carolina.

Numerous artists with ties to Nashville have denounced the proposals here, which would ban transgender people from using restrooms that don't conform to their sex at birth and would allow counselors to refuse services to LGBT people on religious grounds. Among them: Emmylou Harris, Billy Ray Cyrus and his pop star daughter Miley Cyrus, and actor Chris Carmack of ABC's "Nash-

Gretchen Peters, a singer songwriter who has written hits like Martina McBride's "Independence Day," said the bills being considered in Tennessee are deeply personal to her as the mother of a 31-year-old transgender man.


