Flag Farmers Plan Extensive Rabbit Drive Monday

Monday, Feb. 13, will be an unlucky day for the rabbits of the Flag community, according to statements made by Earnest Jones, farmer from that locality. Sponsored by Mr. McGaughey the Flag farmers plan their drive on these pests that are doing so much damage to the small crops and are increasing so rapidly over the county. Plans are complete for a well organized drive beginning at the Flag store at nine o'clock Monday morning transportation being furnished from there to the battlefield that is to be covered in the drive. Lunch will be served to the hunters at the drive and nothing but the most severe weather will stop the hunt. Many farmers have already expressed their desire to participate in this drive and the residents of the Flag community are expecting a very successful clean-up campaign on the rabbits.

For those who do not care to bring ammunition with them, a good brand of shells filled with the correct size of shot, No. 6 to No. 4, will be on hand. Children, rifles and dogs will not be allowed to participate in the drive. The farmers, desiring to make the hunt both enjoyable and successful, will use every precaution for the safety of the hunters and also the livestock of the community.

For a number of years rabbits have been increasing in number in this county as well as adjoining counties. Thiving on the small grains and suffering little from being preyed on by other wild animals, the rabbits have found the plains country well adapted to their habits and have now increased to such a number that the damage they do is very noticeable to the farmers. These pests have been known to cut paths across wheat fields, cut down small trees and plants, and to plant grain over this country. Nothing less than well organized drives would now reduce their number and farmers and sportsmen are all in favor of drives as have been staged in almost every community of the county. Similar hunts are also being staged in many other counties in this area.

Many Attend Great Plains Farm Pond & Terracing Assn.

Holding a meeting in the interest of soil erosion, soil conservation, and windstorms on the plains, approximately 400 people from Kansas, Oklahoma, the Panhandle of Texas, and New Mexico gathered at Amarillo Feb. 9. A number of specialists were heard at this meeting, giving talks on all angles of the drought problems. W. H. McPheters, extension engineer of Oklahoma, brought out the necessity of conserving moisture and soil, stating that ponds placed on the average of every 160 acres would give the drought area a better chance of receiving more moisture as it would enable the atmosphere to carry a greater amount and lessen the effects of hot summer winds. Texas A. & M. college stated that the people of the Panhandle and other drought areas were partially to blame for the plight they were in, since they did not conserve the moisture when they were receiving plenty of rain. The shelterbelt program which has been recently extended to reach Castro county was fully explained by a shelterbelt inspector of Lincoln, Neb., John H. Hatton. Mr. Hatton explained the benefits of the shelterbelt as improving the physical conditions of the vicinity of the shelterbelts, changing the general climate of the region, lessening the effects of the droughts by conserving the moisture received and preventing excessive damage by the high winds. As explained by Mr. Hatton, the pond and terracing program of the Great Plains organization will go hand in hand with the shelterbelt program, which will, according to the statements made by the shelterbelt inspector, begin soon in Oklahoma and Texas.

New Irrigation Plants for County

Boasting three new irrigation plants already for the year 1935, Castro County added two more the past week. R. E. Cade and Peter Peterson, both of the Sunnyside community, have recently purchased new Fairbanks-Morse No. 12 plants for their farms, making a total of five plants to be purchased by Castro County farmers within the short time of about one and one-half months. Though the drought should break to some extent during the balance of the winter months, there has been few years that irrigation could not have been used to an advantage in the dry summer months. Some of the best crops of the county were seen on irrigated farms his past year. W. B. Youngblood, J. E. Andrews, and J. E. Springer are the other three that have purchased irrigation plants in 1935.

Extends Time on Rabbits Scalps To End of the Month

The bounty of two cents per rabbit scalp presented at the Clerk's office in Dimmitt, will continue until the last of February, according to statements made by the commissioners of Castro County and Judge Estes. The resolution passed by the commissioners the latter part of January was supposed to be in effect between Feb. 1 to Feb 15 only, however, it has been decided by the commissioners to continue the bounty in order to induce the killing of the rabbits at this time. The commissioners believe in the old saying that a penny saved is a penny earned and are not just wanting to spend two cents; they want the rabbits killed now. Approximately twelve hundred rabbit scalps have already been left with the County Clerk, but some of them could well have been embalmed. Bring your scalps to the office as soon as possible after the rabbits are killed and the Clerk will be ready to pay the bounty.

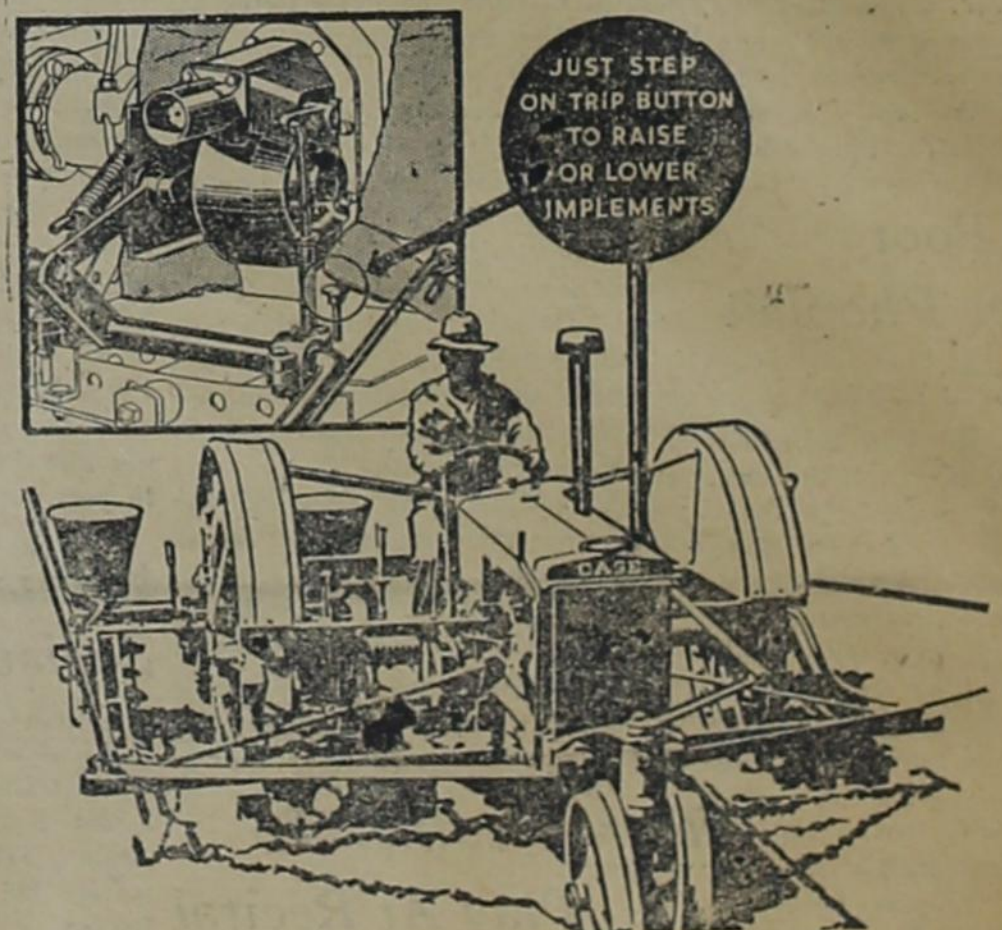

Emergency Feed Loan Limit Raised

In instances where the applicant has no feed on hand and the general weather conditions have been severe, the regional emergency crop and feed loan offices serving the primary drought areas have been authorized to allow up to \$4.50 a head a month to purchase feed for farm cattle, \$6 for farm work stock, and \$2 for range cattle, according to information received by the Extension Service from the Farm Credit Administration. Otherwise maximum base rates now in effect will be continued.

The increased amounts will apply only in exceptional cases where the applicant's feed has been exhausted and weather conditions have been severe." Norman Monaghan of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Division of Farm Credit Administration said. "Each application for increased allowance will be considered on its own merits and must be accompanied by detailed information as to the feed on hand and weather conditions." Applications for loans may be made to the county crop and feed loan committee serving the applicant's county.

are doing what we would call a "dog-gone good job."

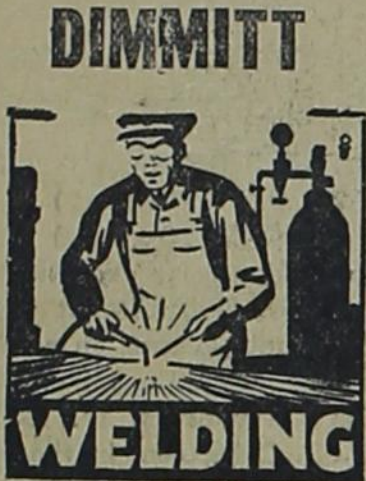

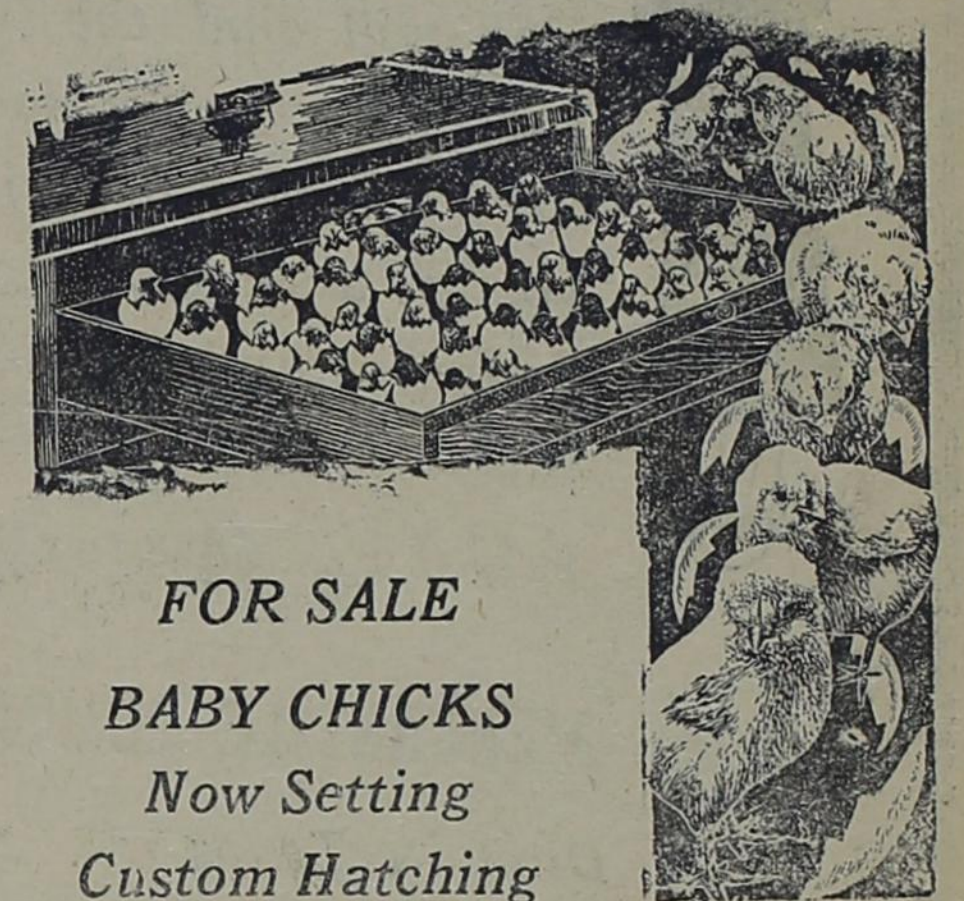

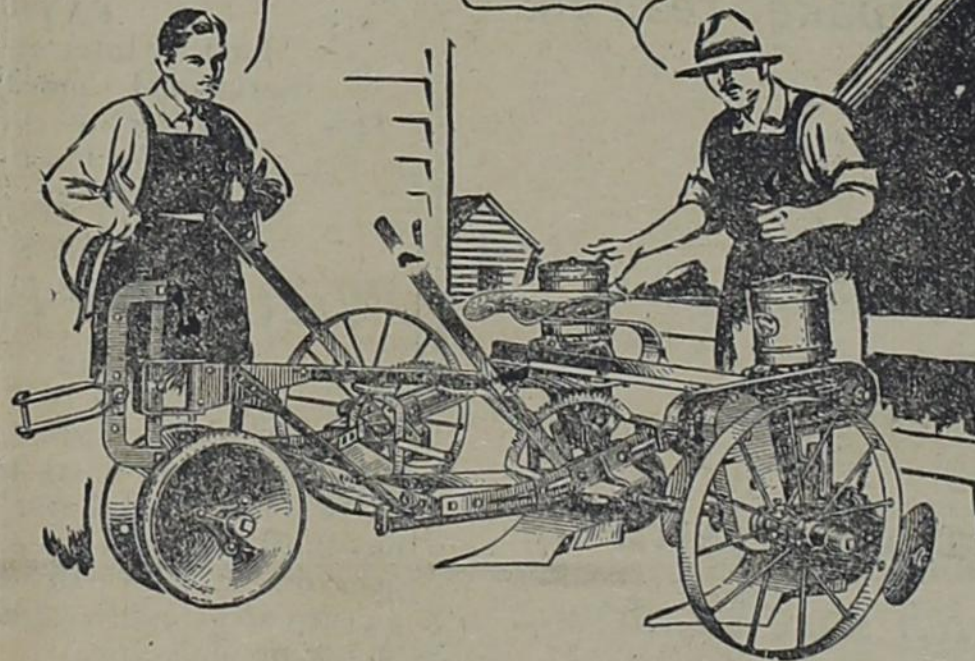
