Fire at fracking well causes \$4 million in damages, one injured

The cause of a fire at a oil well site in northern Howard County Tuesday night is still under investigation, according to Howard County Volunteer Fire Department Chief Tommy Sulli-

According to Sullivan, volunteer firefighters received the call around 11:25 p.m. Tuesday of a fire at a fracking well site on Leatherwood Road in northern Howard County. The fire caused an estimated \$4 million in damages and destroyed at least eight oil related vehicles. Around 25 to 30 oil related trucks were at the active fracking site, he

Once on the scene, firefighters used the department's newest vehicle, which is equipped with a deck gun, and pumped foam out on the fire, he said.

Because firefighters were contending with a hydrocarbon fire, the foam was best suited to cool flames and suppressed the vapor to extinguish the blaze, Sulli-

Several different potential explosive material at the well contributed to a firefighters, Sullivan said.

One volunteer firefighter was injured during the fire, Sullivan reported. His injuries have been treated, but he will be off



Grieving Haitians go into lifetime of debt to fund funerals

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Aspasie Tanis lives hand-to-mouth on the edge of eviction in the best of times, scraping out a living selling packets of spaghetti and cookies outside her low-slung concrete shack in Haiti's capital. Now the death of her father by stroke threatens to send her into a lifetime of debt. The distraught single mother is frantically seeking loans from friends and pastors to pay for the cheapest funeral on offer.

Hospital morgue officials say her father's body will be dumped in a pauper's grave unless her struggling family forks over a relative fortune of just over \$1,000.

"I'll never be at peace if he isn't buried properly," Tanis said quietly after transferring her father's corpse to a cut-rate private morgue.

State to appoint managers to oversee failing school district

HEARNE, Texas (AP) — The state education commissioner is moving to replace the superintendent and school board of a rural Texas school district because it lacks "educational leadership" and is in violation of state and agency rules.

Commissioner Mike Morath says in a letter dated Monday that Superintendent Adrain Johnson and board members for the Hearne school district are failing to work together.

Morath also says board members have circumvented the board and taken action on their own, and operated a business office that lacked internal

The state, meanwhile, has lowered the district's accreditation.

A board of managers will be appointed to oversee operations in the district, which is northwest of College Station.

Johnson said in a statement to The Eagle newspaper that the district plans to contest the decision.

Man condemned for family murder plot loses federal appeal.

HOUSTON (AP) — A federal appeals court has rejected an appeal from a suburban Houston man on death row for arranging the killings of his mother and brother in 2003 so he could collect a \$1 million inheritance.

Attorneys for Thomas "Bart" Whitaker argued to the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals that his trial lawyers were deficient and Fort Bend County prosecutors during the guilt-innocence and punishment phases of his trial improperly referred to discussion of a plea deal that never was reached. Whitaker offered to take responsibility for the

killings and accept life sentences but attorneys say prosecutors rejected it because it contained no expressions of remorse. A jury condemned him for the shooting deaths

of his mother, Patricia Whitaker, 51, and brother, Kevin, 19, at the family's Sugar Land home.

Texas Senate endorses campus assault reporting bill

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas Senate has voted to approve tough new requirements for university employees and student leaders to report instances of sexual assault or dating violence. The bill's sponsor, Republican Sen. Joan Huff-

man of Houston, said it' designed to prevent a repeat of the events at Baylor University, where the school was found to have mishandled reports of as-The fallout at Baylor led to the firing of football

coach Art Briles and the demotion and eventual departure of school President Ken Starr.

Baylor is now facing federal lawsuits from several women, as well as criminal and civil rights

Under the bill, school employees and student leaders who don't report assaults could face jail time or expulsion if they are found to have intentionally concealed information.

Texas bill lets officials deny issuing gay marriage licenses

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A bill allowing county judges and other officials to refuse to issue licenses for same-sex marriages because of religious objections is headed to the full Texas Senate.

Sen. Brian Birdwell's proposal only applies in cases where other officials without any objection can step in and issue marriage documents.

If the substituting official is located outside the county where the marriage license is being sought, the bill allows for documents to be sent electroni-

The measure has cleared the Senate State Affairs Committee, but when it will be heard on the chamber floor is unclear.



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
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
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Watch out for Mount Vesuvius!

The volcano has been quiet for some time now, but it wasn't always that way. After days and days of minor tremors, the volcano finally erupted on August 24 in A.D. 79, catching many people off-guard.

The area around the volcano had been active for some time, and although the wells and springs had dried up, people thought little about it. Life went on as normal until the afternoon of August 24 when Mount Vesuvius exploded. The eruption lasted for 19 hours, releasing tons of ash and rock and burying the town of Pompeii and other settlements.

Mount Vesuvius erupted several more times in the years following, and although little has happened since 1944, scientists believe it will erupt again some day. To ensure a fast evacuation, the area around the upper part of the volcano has been turned into a national park and scientists are keeping a close eye on the volcanic activity.



Lindor slam gives AL champ Indians opening sweep of **Rangers**

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Francisco Lindor's go-ahead grand slam in the ninth inning off suddenly shaky Texas closer Sam Dyson triggered a litany of firsts for Cleveland's budding star shortstop.

And that list of milestones was a lot more fun to talk about than his botched defensive play that jeopardized the Indians' bid at a seasonopening sweep.

Lindor atoned for his puzzling miscue with his first career slam and first multi-homer game - along with a careerhigh five RBIs — and the defending AL champions rallied for a 9-6 win over the Rangers on Wednesday night.

The Rangers went ahead 4-3 in the fifth when Lindor misjudged Gallo's couldn't beat the slugger to second base on an attempted two-out force play and allowed two runs to score on an error when his throw to try to salvage an out surprised Edwin Encarnacion and skipped off the first baseman's glove.

"I was saying, 'Please, Lord, let us tie this game," Lindor said of his reaction after the botched play. "I don't want (Danny) Salazar to lose the game and have to talk to you guys about my error. Let us tie the game, and let's see what happens after that."

Dyson (0-2) loaded the bases and walked in

"He's getting ready." Griffin returned Jan. 23 after

missing 20 games while recovering from a procedure on his right knee.

"He's mixing it up and scoring every way," Rivers said. "He's shooting, driving and passing. When he faces up and goes, it is either a bucket or a foul. He feels healthy enough to do that

J.J. Redick added 25 points and DeAndre Jordan had 20 rebounds in the Clippers' fourth straight victory and eighth in 10 games. Chris Paul had 22 points

and 11 assists. Harrison Barnes led the Mavs with 15 points despite five fouls. They've lost six of seven with

four games left in their season. Dirk Nowitzki was held to nine points — under his 14.4 average — a night after the 38-year-old forward sat out the Mavs' loss at Sacramento with a sore Achilles

The Clippers made their first nine shots of the game, with Luc Mbah a Moute narrowly missing a finger roll to end the stretch leading 22-6. They shot 61 percent in the first quarter

and eventually led by 17. "We made some jumpers, but we didn't break their rhythm or anything," Nowitzki said.

SAN ANTONIO (AP) -The Los Angeles Lakers were having a blast in a rather meaningless game, dashing up and down the court and flying to the rim for rebounds and dunks.

And no one was having more fun than Tyler Ennis.

Making his first start of the season, Ennis had 19 points in place of injured starter D'Angelo Russell and the Lakers never trailed in a 102-95 victory over the San Antonio Spurs on Wednesday night.

"Everybody is just playing free and unselfish, just trying to make the right plays," said Lakers forward Julius Randle, one of five players in double figures. "Everybody is aggressive, so, natu-

rally, it's a lot of fun." Los Angeles led by as many as 26 points in snapping an eight-game skid against San Antonio.

"They were physical." Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said. "They got after it, they did a good job, they deserved to win."

San Antonio played its normal starting lineup, with the exception of injured guard Danny Green, despite already clinching the Southwest Division title.

Kawhi Leonard and La-Marcus Aldridge did not play in the second half, however, as Popovich opted to rest his starting forwards. Leonard finished with 11

points in 14 minutes, and Aldridge had eight points and six rebounds in 16 minutes. "I didn't want to overplay anybody just to win a basketball game," Popovich

said. "It doesn't make much

sense in the long run."

The Lakers (23-55) may have the league's third worst record, but outplayed the Spurs and snapped their three-game winning streak.

"They're having fun," Los Angeles coach Luke Walton said. "We're trying to build momentum for this off-season and hopefully we can stay healthy and keep playing a certain way."

San Antonio scored a season-low 14 points in the first quarter for the second consecutive game.

"We were able to move the ball well, but we also got stagnant at some times, just in mud, we had some open looks and didn't make them," Leonard said.

Ennis sparked the early run after learning Russell would miss the game after experiencing soreness in







sedentary and to keep moving. It also instills in me the importance of being able to accept change.



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
