





Man charged with manslaughter

A 19-year-old Big Spring man has died from a gunshot wound after he was allegedly fired on by his 22-year-old brother, according to the Big Spring Police.

At approximately 5:00 p.m.,

the Big Spring Police Department was contacted in reference to a gunshot wound located at 1607 E. 11th Place which is Fire Station No. 3. After arriving on the scene, the individual with the gunshot wound was identified as 19-vear-old Theron McVae.

"McVae had a single gun-

shot wound to the left abdomen area," stated a Big Spring Police Department media release yesterday. "McVae advised that he was shot by his brother identified as Gregory Leal...22 years of age, while the two were at their residence located at

place at the residence, McVae was transported by his mother to the fire station where the police were contacted. When officers arrived on the scene, McVae was still conscious and was able to give police a description of what had hap-

After the shooting took

'McVae stated that he walked into Leal's room and Leal raised a handgun and shot McVae," read the BSPD press release.

Leal was found at another location and taken into custody by the police where he

Greystone, SMMC hosts open house to tout newly renovated medical plaza and opening of new wound care center

An open house was held Wednesday afternoon to mark the completion of the renovation of the West Texas Medical Plaza and the opening of Scenic Mountain Medical Center's Wound Healing Center.

The \$4.5 million renovation project of what was formerly known as Malone and Hogan Clinic by new owners Greystone Brokerage & Development of Brentwood, Tenn., included extensive renovations to the building, parking area, and landscaping.

According to Matt Wright of Greystone, renovations included replacing the roof with an insulated rubber membrane one, replacing every glass exterior window in the building with more energy efficient ones, gutting and renovating all the common area restrooms, replacing 18,000 square fee of flooring, retexturing and painting the walls, upgrades or replacements

to the air conditioning/heating system and electrical systems, replacing all the finishings in the elevators, extensive work on the parking areas and landscaping, and painting the outside of the building.

"I've been doing this for about a decade now and I've been working with probably 30 or 40 hospitals around the country," Wright said. "The one thing I've noticed is a lot of hospitals can be very complacent and satisfied by obtaining the status quo and I definitely don't see that here and I don't think you have that here.

more counselors." Alexander said volunteers helped to prepare and file electronically 209 federal tax forms and two paper forms which were

submitted by mail. "They saved about \$40,000 in preparation fees," he said.

The program is offered free to seniors and low and moderate income tax payers. Volunteers offered weekly work sessions on Monday beginning in February and held the last season Monday, April 3.

The federal deadline for the 2016 federal tax form is Tuesday, April 18.

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Phones and social media turn consumers into whistleblowers

NEW YORK (AP) — Look out, Corporate America. Customers armed with smartphones and video cameras are watching when you screw up.

The viral video of a ticketed passenger dragged forcefully off a United flight is only the latest example of bad behavior exposed in the age of social

In February, Uber came under fire after a driver posted video of CEO Travis Kalanick berating him. Earlier, a Comcast technician was shown in a video sleeping on a customer's couch, and an audio recording chronicled one man's herculean efforts to drop Comcast service; they are among the embarrassing customer complaints that ultimately forced improvements . FedEx had to respond after video showed a driver carelessly throwing a package with a computer monitor over the front gate. Beyond the corporate sphere, smartphone videos of

50 years after war, settlements blur future borders

JERUSALEM (AP) — For many Israelis, Har Homa is another neighborhood in Jerusalem, served by city bus lines and schools. Its quiet streets are lined with apartment buildings, pizza shops, supermarkets and pharmacies.

But for Palestinians and much of the world, this unassuming neighborhood is far more. It is an illegal settlement in east Jerusalem, and in some ways, the most damaging.

Har Homa lies on one of the last spaces of land linking the Palestinian areas of the West Bank to their hoped-for capital in east Jerusalem. If city planners have their way, Har Homa will soon become one of Jerusalem's largest Jewish neighborhoods, expanding a presence that many believe has already dealt a devastating blow to the Palestinian dream of independence.

2 plead guilty to fraud in \$30M Central Texas oil, gas scam

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Prosecutors say a Central Texas lawyer and his business associate have pleaded guilty in a \$30 million scam involving bogus oil and gas investments.

Robert Allen Helms and Janniece S. Kaelin, both of Austin, each pleaded guilty Tuesday to securities fraud and conspiracy to commit securities fraud and mail fraud.

Helms and Kaelin face up to 10-year federal prison terms and making restitution over what investigators have called a Ponzi scheme. Authorities say clients were defrauded between 2010 and 2013, with funds meant for energy-related investments instead used for personal expenses of Helms and Kaelin.

Prosecutors say Helms and Kaelin operated Austin-based Vendetta Royalty Partners and forged documents to create the appearance of mineral and royalty operations.

Texas: Vehicle found, driver missing in Fort Hood flooding

Ex-Dallas-area educator has plea deal in teacher visa case

DALLAS (AP) — Prosecutors say a former Dallasarea educator who helped recruit teachers from foreign countries through the H-1B visa program has pleaded guilty to hiring abuses.

Victor Leos formerly was human resources director for the Garland Independent School District. Records show Leos, in an April 3 plea deal, pleaded stricted area. guilty to conspiracy to commit false statements related to immigration documents.

The Dallas Morning News reports Leos was approached by recruiters for bilingual teachers in the Philippines and Latin America. Authorities say Leos accepted kickbacks, travel and other benefits to recruit teachers not needed in the Texas district.

He faces up to five years in prison, a \$250,000 fine and repaying \$317,000 to the district.

Travis County DA alters policy on officer-involved shootings

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Travis County district attorney says she's changing longstanding policy on officer-involved shootings and will only forward to a grand jury those cases where a shooting was unlawful or if the facts are in dispute.

District Attorney Margaret Moore tells KVUE-TV and the Austin American-Statesman that she's discussed the change with groups like the Austin police union, which supports the move.

The district attorney's office previously forwarded to the grand jury all cases in which police used appointing a border security colethal force.

Moore says the change makes her office more accountable in determining which cases are forwarded for possible prosecution.

During border visit, Sessions outlines immigration plan

NOGALES, Ariz. (AP) — Attorthe U.S.-Mexico border Tuesday and unveiled what he described as a new get-tough approach to immigration prosecutions under President Donald Trump.

The nation's top law enforcement official outlined a series of changes that he said mark the start of a new push to rid American cities and the border of what he described as "filth" brought on by drug cartels and criminal organizations.

The tour included visiting a port of entry, where Sessions exited an SUV in a white shirt and baseball cap before entering a re-

Sessions has been steadily expanding the Justice Department's role in the anti-immigration agenda of the Trump administration, but the border trip offered the most comprehensive look yet at his plans.

During his visit, he urged federal prosecutors to intensify their focus on immigration crimes such as illegal border crossing or smuggling others into the U.S.

Such prosecutions are already happening on a large scale. They made up more than half of all federal prosecutions in fiscal year 2016, according to the Transactional Records Access Clearinghouse at Syracuse University. But prosecutions were slightly down from fiscal year 2015.

In a three-page memo, Sessions told U.S. attorneys to prioritize immigration prosecutions by ordinator who can oversee investigations, keep statistics and provide legal advice and training to prosecutors. The coordinators

would meet regularly with federal immigration authorities.

In addition, Sessions said federal prosecutors must consider bringing felony charges against those who have illegally entered the country more than once as well as those who marry to evade immigration laws. He also urged prosecutors to consider charging those illegally in the country with felony identity theft and document fraud.

"This is a new era. This is the Trump era," he said. "The lawlessness, the abdication of the duty to enforce our immigration laws, and the catch and release practices of old are over."

Sessions defended Trump's proposed border wall, saying it will be another tool to fight illegal immigration amid efforts within the Justice Department and other branches of government to punish and deter border crossers.

He also returned to a common theme from the Trump campaign by saying drug cartels and criminal gangs are turning American cities into "war zones" by raping and killing innocent people.

"It is here, on this sliver of land, where we first take our stand against this filth," he said.

Critics blasted the initiatives announced by Sessions as fearmongering and anti-immigrant rhetoric not rooted in facts.

"Once again, Attorney General Sessions is scaring the public by linking immigrants to criminals despite studies showing that immigrants commit crimes at lower rates than the native born," said Gregory Z. Chen, director of government relations for the American Immigration Lawyers Asso-

Sessions made the announcement in Nogales, a border city

that has witnessed a dramatic drop in immigrant and drug smuggling in recent years as more people enter the country in Texas, many of them Central Americans fleeing violence in Guatemala, Honduras and El Sal-

The Border Patrol's Tucson sector, which comprises most of Arizona, saw about 65,000 arrests of immigrants last fiscal year, roughly half the number agents made in 2012, according to Border Patrol data. Marijuana seizures have also dropped by about 28 percent from 1 million pounds in 2012 to 728,000 last year.

Following the border tour, Sessions spoke to officials at an International Association of Chiefs of Police conference outside Phoenix.

He discussed crime rates, the border wall, immigration enforcement and sanctuary cities. He chided critics of mass incarceration and the decline in the

prison population. Sessions was also set to speak with service members at Luke

Air Force Base near Phoenix. Sessions' immigration plans have long been foreshadowed. Even as it plans to cut the Justice Department's budget by more than \$1 billion, the Trump administration wants hundreds of millions of dollars to hire 60 federal prosecutors and 40 deputy U.S. marshals to focus on border

The proposal also calls for adding \$1.5 billion to Immigration and Customs Enforcement's budget to find, detain and deport immigrants living in the U.S. illegally, along with more than \$300 million to hire 500 new Border Patrol agents and 1,000 immigration agents.







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Putin meets Tillerson as US, Russia fiercely feud over Syria

Associated Press MOSCOW (AP) — Fiercely feuding over Syria, Russian President Vladimir Putin met the top American diplomat in Moscow on Wednesday to see if they could rescue relations between the world's mightiest military powers. Russia's alleged meddling in the U.S. presidential election also hovered over the first face-to-face encounter between Putin and a Trump administration Cabinet member.

Leaving traveling U.S. reporters across town, Secretary of State Rex Tillerson met Putin in the Kremlin for almost two hours following fraught discussions with Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov.

The chief dispute concerned the Syrian government or opposition's culpability for a chemical weapons attack that killed more than 80 people in Syria last week, though broader disagreements over everything from Ukraine to Russia's support for oncefringe candidates in European elections are among other sore points between the former Cold War foes.

Steeped in geopolitical intrigue, the meeting between Putin and Tillerson wasn't formally confirmed until the last minute, following days of speculation about whether the Russian would refuse to grant the former oil executive an audience. Putin's decision to host Tillerson

signaled Moscow's intent to maintain communication with the U.S. even as they bash each other publicly in louder and louder tones. The men know each other well from

Tillerson's days as Exxon Mobil CEO. Putin had even granted Tillerson with a friendship honor. Unlike he has done with previ-

ous secretaries of state, Putin didn't keep Tillerson waiting for hours on Wednesday. The Russians held to a tentative

schedule that was worked out in advance, U.S. officials said. They weren't authorized to discuss diplomatic conversations publicly and requested anonymity.

The meeting agenda wasn't announced. The U.S. and Russia have sharply disagreed over whether Syrian President Bashar Assad's forces or rebels were responsible for the

chemical weapons attack last week that led to U.S. retaliatory cruise missiles. Washington says it has no doubt about Assad's responsibility. Putin has spoken of having proof that it was a "false flag" operation intended to rally international opposition to

Before meeting Putin, Tillerson received a chilly reception from Lavrov, who told Tillerson that Russia was trying to understand the "real intentions" of the Trump administra-

"We have seen very alarming actions recently with an unlawful attack against Syria," Lavrov said, referring to the 59 Tomahawk missiles Trump launched at a Syrian air base to punish Assad for using chemical weapons. "We consider it of utmost importance to prevent the risks of replay of similar action in the future."

Tillerson conceded the two world powers had "sharp differences" that have obstructed cooperation but voiced optimism they could make

In the U.S., Trump sought to tamp down speculation he'll intervene militarily against Assad, who is being backed by Russian forces. Trump told Fox Business Network that his strikes were solely because Assad used chemical weapons. Turkey has said tests showed sarin gas was used. U.S. intelligence agencies have said

"Are we going to get involved with Syria? No," Trump said. But, he added, "I see them using gas...we have to do something."

Russia, Assad's staunchest ally, has

insisted the Syrian leader is blameless and that rebels disbursed chemical weapons. The palpable tension hanging over

Tillerson's trip spoke to a widening chasm between the two world powers. Only weeks ago, it appeared that Trump, who lavishly praised Putin

throughout the campaign, was poised

for a potentially historic rapprochement with Russia. But any expectations of an easy rapport have crashed into reality as the two countries trade escalating accusations over what happened last week in rebel-held territory in northern Syria.

"Frankly, Putin is backing a person that's truly an evil person," Trump said, referring to Assad. "I think it's very bad for Russia. I think it's very bad for mankind."

Of Assad, Trump added: "This is an

And Putin, who U.S. intelligence agencies say tried to help Trump get elected, insisted that relations with the U.S. had only gone downhill since Trump took office in January.

"The level of trust at the working level, especially at the military level, has not become better but most likely has degraded," Putin said in an interview broadcast Wednesday by state television channel Mir.

Spicer says Hitler comment 'inexcusable and reprehensible'

WASHINGTON (AP) — White House press secretary Sean Spicer said Wednesday that his attempt to compare the Holocaust and Syrian President Bashar Assad's use of chemical weapons was "inexcusable and reprehensible" and was made all the worse by this being a holy week for Christians and

He said the comment, made Tuesday at the White House briefing, was personally and professionally disappointing, and he asked for "folks' forgiveness."

"To make a gaffe and a mistake like this is inexcusable and reprehensible," Spicer said during a previously scheduled appearance at a forum on the presidency and the press sponsored by the Newseum. Christians are preparing for Easter on Sunday, and Jews are celebrating Passover.

"It really is painful to myself to know that I did something like that," Spicer said. "That obviously was not my intention. To know when you screw up that you possibly offended a lot of people ... I would ask obviously for folks' forgiveness to understand that I should not have tried to make a comparison." It was Spicer's second apology in as many days,

following an initial mea culpa Tuesday during an interview with CNN. Earlier Tuesday during the daily White House briefing, Spicer told reporters that Adolf Hitler "didn't even sink to using chemi-

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cal weapons." The comment drew an instant rebuke from critics, who noted the remark ignored Hitler's use of gas chambers to exterminate Jews during the Holocaust.

Reaction to Spicer's initial comment continued Wednesday, with Jerusalem's Yad Vashem Holocaust memorial inviting him to visit its website. In the CNN interview, Spicer said his comments did not reflect Trump's views but "were a distraction from him and frankly were misstated, insensitive and wrong." He added, "Obviously it was my blunder." Spicer reiter-

ated that sentiment at Wednesday's forum. After making the iniin which he tried to differentiate between Hitler's history." actions and the gas attack on Syrian civilians last week. The attack in northern Syria left nearly 90 people dead. Turkey said sarin gas was used.

"I think when you come to sarin gas, there was no, he (Hitler) was not using the gas on his own people the same way that Assad is doing," Spicer said. "There was clearly ... I understand your point, thank you. There was not ... He brought them into the Holocaust center I understand that."

After the briefing, Spicer emailed reporters a statement that said: "In no way was I trying to lessen the horrendous nature of the Holocaust. I was trying to draw a distinction of the tactic of using airplanes to drop chemical weapons on population centers. Any attack on innocent people is reprehensible and inexcusable."

Reaction from around the world continued Wednesday. A spokesman for German Chancellor Angela Merkel said comparing Nazi war crimes to present-day situations "leads to nothing good." Robert Rozett, director of libraries at Yad Vash-

em, said Spicer's comment implied a "profound lack of knowledge of the events of the second World

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



Mavericks end season with 100-93 win over Grizzlies

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Without starters Dirk Nowitzki, Harrison Barnes and Wesley Matthews, the Dallas Mavericks were undermanned Wednesday night against the Memphis Grizzlies.

Forward Nicolas Brussino, making his second start of the season, and reserve guard Devin Harris each scored 15 points and the short-handed Mavericks ended a five-game losing streak with a 100-93 victory.

The Mavericks won despite leaving Nowitzki, Barnes and Matthews at home to rest. Reserve guard J.J. Barea, averaging 10.9 points, also remained in Dallas as coach Rick Carlisle opted to use his younger players in the regular-season finale.

"The group that was out there at the end, everybody did something good," Carlisle said. "All of this stuff really helps these guys get better."

Memphis, the seventh seed in the Western Conference, was led by Mike Conley and Zach Randolph, who scored 15 points each. Marc Gasol added 13 points.

The Grizzlies led by 12 midway through the third quarter following a three-point play by Wade Baldwin, but the Mavericks rallied.

Trailing 74-70 entering the final period, the Mavericks opened with a 17-8 run to take an 87-82 lead with 5:28 to go. A.J. Hammons and Jarrod Uthoff each had six points during the run. The Grizzlies never led again.

"I think it's a morale booster," Uthoff said. "This is the beginning for a lot of us, for our career, and it is always nice to get a win with us playing."

Brussino, completing his rookie season, had a career-high point total and was 4-of-8 from beyond the arc. His 3-pointer with 1:15 to go gave Dallas a 97-90 advantage.

"They were physical with him early," Carlisle said. "He adjusted and he got into more of a leveraged position on offense and defense. He made them foul him a few times, got open for a few shots and hit the big dagger shot at the end."

Dallas made its run after the Griz-

zlies had benched their starters. Conley played the first two quarters (17 minutes) and Gasol played the first three (24 minutes).

No starters played in the fourth quarter and the Grizzlies went 6-for-26 shooting, including an 0-for-6 effort from Andrew Harrison.

"They were all trying to make their mark on the game and I think that leads to a lot of mistakes," Memphis coach David Fizdale said.

"I don't think they really worked to help each other, but that's young guys when you throw them in the end of the game and they're trying to show something. The effort was there, but

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



Behind 15 points from Conley and 47.6 percent shooting, the Grizzlies led 55-46 at the half. Memphis built a 10-point lead in the second quarter, but a Mavericks' lineup missing players averaging more than 70 points trimmed the margin to two points shortly before the half.

Conley said the experience the Memphis reserves received will be invaluable. And their playing time allowed the Grizzlies to be rested with another playoff series against the Spurs looming.

"Obviously, we want to win every game we play," he said. "I think we're just going to chalk it up and get ready for the series."

Mavericks: Forward Dirk Nowitzki, completing his 19th season, did not make the trip. He averaged 14.2 points and 6.5 rebounds in an injury-filled 54game season. ... Dallas failed to finish at .500 or better for the first time since 1999.

Grizzlies: Memphis started its regular lineup of Mike Conley, Tony Allen, Marc Gasol, Vince Carter and JaMychal Green. Allen left the game with 6:10 to go in the first quarter, hobbling off with a lower right leg injury. Allen did not return. ... Carter played in his 1,347th game and passed Kobe Bryant for 13th in regular-season games played.

Randolph got credit for a basket he didn't make in the first quarter. Mavericks center Salah Mejri accidently tipped in a Grizzlies' missed attempt. Randolph moved into 75th place on the NBA's scoring list with his first basket, a field goal that allowed him to pass Magic Johnson (17,707). Randolph, like Johnson, attended Michigan State.


