Pence warns NKorea 'era of strategic patience is over'

PANMUNJOM, South Korea (AP) — U.S. Vice President Mike Pence declared Monday the "era of strategic patience is over" with North Korea, expressing impatience with the speed and willingness of the regime to move toward ridding itself of nuclear weapons and ballistic missiles.

Pence told reporters near the Demilitarized Zone separating North and South Korea that President Donald Trump is hopeful that China will use its "extraordinary levers" to pressure the North to abandon its weapons.

Pence, who has called the North's failed missile test a day earlier "a provocation," said the U.S. and its allies will achieve its objectives through "peaceable means or ultimately by whatever means are necessary" to protect South Korea and stabilize the region.

Pence visited a military base near the DMZ, Camp Bonifas, for a briefing with

NYC Easter: Costume spectacle meets elegant tradition

NEW YORK (AP) — Fifth Avenue came alive on Easter Sunday with outlandish costumes mingling with elegant bonnets fit for St. Patrick's Cathedral and nearby churches.

The secular spectacle was a take-off on a New York tradition from the 1800s, when the city's elite paraded their Sunday best to mark the holiday. New York's Easter parade is now an outdoor free-for-all of participants and spectators from around

the world.

One faithful Christian mixed formality with pushing-the-envelope style: Cynthia Gable, of Easton, Connecticut, attended Mass wearing a shocking pink suit and a hat exploding with matching-colored feathers, while her husband, Scott Doerr, wore a black top hat.

"I think it's exciting," her demurely clad mother, Florence Gable, said of New York's unusual annual rite

celebrating Christians' belief in the resurrection of Christ.

Weeks were spent making costumes, with some even adorning their pets.

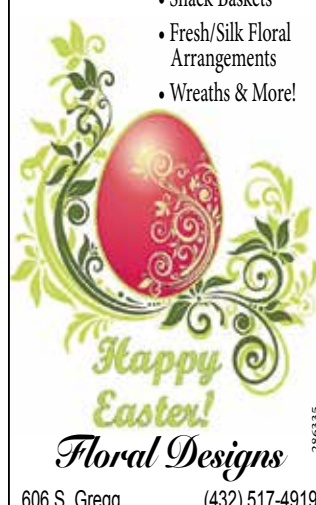

"We will be teaching people about native plants and animals from the area. One of the things we will be teaching is fire starting," said Ivey. "I'm going to be doing some pioneer demonstrations like making wool from raw cotton, possibly beeswax candles, and how to make dye from native plants."

Texas Parks and Wildlife will also be involved in the event and they will be providing camping gear for people who don't have any gear of their own. Anyone who is planning on camping out will need to bring their own food, however there will be plenty of people on site to help teach you how to cook around the fire. The prelate who leads New York's more than 2 million Roman Catholics said that on this day, "We prayed specifically for those who literally risked their lives to worship this morning in certain parts of the world where there's persecution and attacks on people of all faiths."

military leaders and to meet with American troops stationed there. The joint U.S.-South Korean military camp is just outside the 2.5-mile-wide DMZ.

His visit, full of Cold War symbolism, and his remarks to reporters come amid increasing tensions and heated rhetoric on the Korean Peninsula. While the North did not conduct a nuclear test, the specter of a potential escalated U.S. response trailed Pence as he began a 10-day trip to Asia.

Pointing to the quarter-century since North Korea first obtained nuclear weapons, the vice president said a period of patience followed.

"But the era of strategic patience is over," Pence said. "President Trump has made it clear that the patience of the United States and our allies in this region has run out and we want to see change. We want to see North Korea abandon its reckless path of

the development of nuclear weapons, and also its continual use and testing of ballistic missiles is unacceptable."

Trump himself asserted on Sunday that China was working with the United States on "the North Korea problem." His national security adviser, H.R. McMaster, said the U.S. would rely on its allies as well as on Chinese leadership to resolve the issues with North Korea.

McMaster cited Trump's recent decision to order missile strikes in Syria after a chemical attack blamed on the Assad government as a sign that the president "is clearly making tough decisions." But at the same time, McMaster said on "This Week" on ABC, "it's time for us to undertake all actions we can, short of a military option, to try to resolve this peacefully."

The bottom line, McMaster said, is to stop the North's weapons development and make the Korean Peninsula nuclear-free. "It's clear that the president is de-

termined not to allow this kind of capability to threaten the United States. And our president will take action that is in the best interest of the American people," he said.

After a two-month policy review, officials settled on a policy dubbed "maximum pressure and engagement," U.S. officials said Friday. The administration's immediate emphasis, the officials said, will be on increasing pressure on Pyongyang with the help of Beijing.

The officials weren't authorized to speak publicly on the results of the policy review and requested anonymity.

Meanwhile, Japan's Prime Minister Shinzo Abe reiterated his believe that pressure, not only dialogue, is necessary in dealing with North Korea's missile and nuclear threat.

Speaking to a parliamentary session Monday following North Korea's massive military parade and botched missile launch, Abe said: "Needless to say, diplomatic effort is important to maintain peace.

Nearly week-long tire fire in West Texas finally out

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — Authorities say a fire where an estimated 100,000 tires were burning for nearly a week at a West Texas disposal facility finally is out.

West Odessa Volunteer Fire Chief Jimmy Ellis tells the Odessa Americana U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Team covered the flames with dirt at the 3-acre (1.21-hectare) site. He says some flames may be deep inside the rubble but there's no sign of smoke.

No injuries were reported and no structures were affected. A cause for the fire that began April 9 is under investigation.

Ellis says every volunteer fire department in the area responded and firefighters were helped by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality but there weren't enough resources immediately to put it out. The tires have been used for a land reclamation project.

Slight risk of severe storms in southern plains states

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — There is a slight risk of severe storms bringing large hail and strong winds to the

southern Plains states.

The National Weather Service's Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Oklahoma, says the strongest storms are expected Sunday afternoon and night from the Texas Panhandle, across much of the northwestern half of Oklahoma and into southeastern Kansas.

The SPC says hail the size of a quarter and winds approaching 60 miles per hour are the most likely danger, but that there is also a slight risk of tornadoes in western Oklahoma and the eastern Texas Panhandle.

Couple booted from United flight in Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — A couple flying to Costa Rica for their wedding later this week were removed from a United Airlines flight in Houston for not following crew instructions.

Passenger Michael Hohl tells Houston television station KHOU he and his fiancé moved to empty seats because another passenger was asleep Saturday in their ticketed seats. They insisted they complied with a flight attendant to return to their proper seats, but a federal air marshal came aboard the flight and asked they get off. They were rebooked on another flight Sunday.

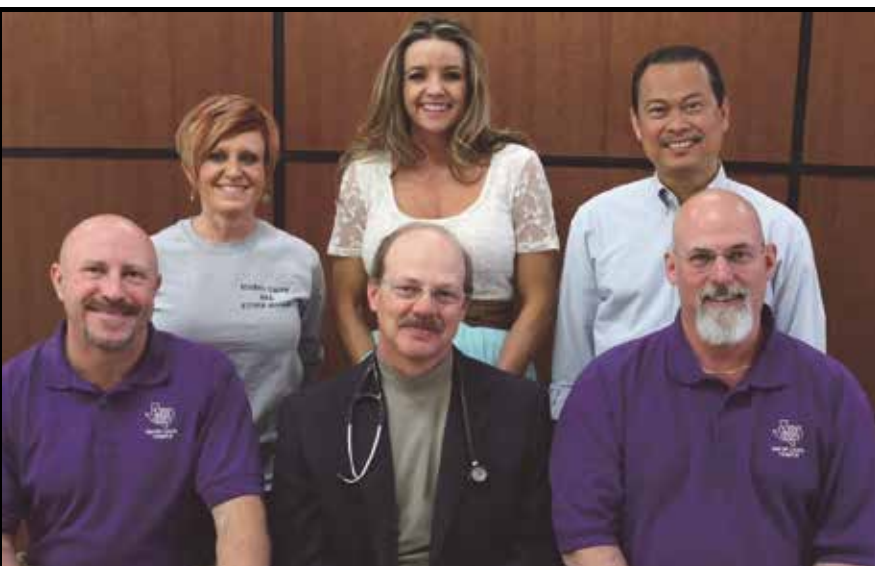

Harden has 37 points; Rockets rout Thunder 118-87

HOUSTON (AP) — Although James Harden is Houston's undisputed star, he can't top Russell Westbrook entirely on his own.

As is so often the case, Patrick Beverley was there for support Sunday night.

Harden scored 37 points to outshine Westbrook, and the Rockets pulled away in the third quarter and coasted to a 118-87 victory over the Oklahoma City Thunder in Game 1 of their first-round playoff series.

Harden had nine assists and seven rebounds, and Beverley, who had the unenviable task of guarding Westbrook, had a playoff career-best 21 points along with 10 rebounds.

Beverley's performance was nothing new to Harden, who has had a front row seat to his work for years.

"That's the reason we're in the position we're in," Harden said. "He brings it every game. Whether his shot is falling or not, he brings that intensity, that resolve. He was just Pat tonight."

The best-of-seven Western Conference series continues Wednesday night in Houston.

The third-seeded Rockets were up by 20 when Harden came off the bench with about seven minutes remaining. He went right to work — mak-

ing two 3-pointers to power a 10-0 run and push the lead to 110-80 with 4 1/2 minutes left. Harden, who along with Westbrook is a front-runner for MVP, went to the bench, and both teams cleared their benches soon after that.

Westbrook had 22 points, 11 rebounds and seven assists, but made just 6 of 23 shots and had nine turnovers for the sixth-seeded Thunder.

"We've got to do a better job starting with myself — got to do a better job of taking care of the basketball and making some shots," Westbrook said.

Beverley refused to take credit for slowing Westbrook down.

"It was a team effort in just trying to show him a lot of bodies," he said. "He's one of the most explosive guards in this league, so we were just trying to make it tough on him."

The Thunder trailed by

The Rockets scored the first five points of the second half to push their lead to 10 early in the third quarter. After a timeout, Oklahoma City

scored the next eight points with 3s from Westbrook and Andre Roberson to cut it to 64-62 with about 8 1/2 minutes left in the quarter.

Steve Johnson wins US Men's Clay Court Championship

HOUSTON (AP) — Steve Johnson fought through late cramps to win the U.S. Men's Clay Court Championship, beating Brazil's Thomaz Bellucci 6-4, 4-6, 7-6 (5) on Sunday at River Oaks Country Club.

The 27-year-old Johnson won his second ATP Tour title, and became the seventh American to win the event since it moved to Houston in 2001.

Johnson was hobbled by cramps serving at the end of the third set, but while coaxing a backhand return error from Bellucci on a serve he barely hit, he was able to get off the court and receive a brisk right-thigh massage from an ATP trainer. Players aren't allowed timeouts for cramps. Johnson appeared injured in the tiebreaker, the first to decide the championship in tournament history.

"I was in deep trouble. 'This stinks.' But sometimes you get lucky," said Johnson, seeded fourth. "My body has physically run out of gas this week. Coming in from Australia (where the U.S. lost a Davis Cup quarterfinal last weekend), dealing with all the ups and downs, I was kind of behind the 8-ball.

"For me today, it was the nerves of trying to close out the title. I haven't been there enough to feel very comfortable."

Johnson beat two former champions, Fernando Verdasco (2014) in the quarterfinals and American Davis Cup teammate Jack Sock (2015) in the semifinals, to reach his third career final.

Johnson won NCAA titles for the University of Southern California in 2011 and 2012.

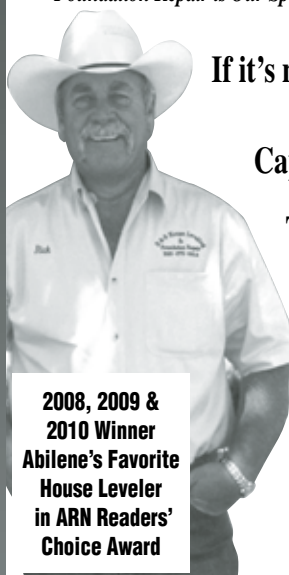

The opening two-club bid was
artificial, and the bidding was natural
thereafter. A trump was led, and
Schenken (playing with Stayman)
drew trumps, cashing the A-K-Q-J of
diamonds, discarding all four clubs
from dummy, and conceded the ace
of spades for a total gain of 1,030
points on the deal.

It is truly astonishing that two of
the then-best teams in the world both
bid a slam missing two aces. Had the
same hand been dealt in the average
home game, it is probable that the
participants — simply by using
Blackwood — would manage to stay
out of the slam!

This Date In History

Today is Monday, April 17, the 107th day of 2017. There are 258 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On April 17, 1937, cartoon character Daffy Duck made his debut in the Warner Bros. animated short "Porky's Duck Hunt," directed by Tex Avery.

On this date:

- In 1492, a contract was signed by Christopher Columbus and a representative of Spain's King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella, giving Columbus a commission to seek a westward ocean passage to Asia.
- In 1861, the Virginia State Convention voted to secede from the Union.
- In 1924, the motion picture studio Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer was founded, the result of a merger of Metro Pictures, Goldwyn Pictures and the Louis B. Mayer Co.
- In 1941, Yugoslavia surrendered to Germany during World War II.
- In 1961, some 1,500 CIA-trained Cuban exiles launched the disastrous Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba in an attempt to topple Fidel Castro, whose forces crushed the incursion by the third day.
- In 1964, Geraldine "Jerrie" Mock became the first woman to complete a solo airplane trip around the world as she returned to Columbus, Ohio, after 29 1/2 days in her Cessna 180. Ford Motor Co. unveiled the Mustang at the New York World's Fair. The first game was played at New York's Shea Stadium; the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the Mets, 4-3.
- In 1970, Apollo 13 astronauts James A. Lovell, Fred W. Haise and Jack Swigert splashed down safely in the Pacific, four days after a ruptured oxygen tank crippled their spacecraft while en route to the moon.
- In 1972, the Boston Marathon allowed women to compete for the first time; Nina Kuscsik was the first officially recognized women's champion, with a time of 3:10:26.
- In 1975, Cambodia's five-year war ended as the capital Phnom Penh fell to the Khmer Rouge, which instituted brutal, radical policies that claimed an estimated 1.7 million lives until the regime was overthrown in 1979.
- In 1984, an 11-day police siege began at Libya's embassy in London when an unidentified shooter inside the building fired on a crowd of protesters, killing police officer Yvonne Fletcher. (The Libyans in the embassy were eventually allowed to leave the country as Britain and Libya severed relations.)
- In 1986, at London's Heathrow Airport, a bomb was discovered in the bag of Anne-Marie Murphy, a pregnant Irishwoman about to board an El Al jetliner to Israel; she'd been tricked into carrying the bomb by her Jordanian fiancé, Nezar Hindawi. The bodies of kidnapped American Peter Kilburn and Britons Philip Padfield and Leigh Douglas were found near Beirut; they had been slain in apparent retaliation for the U.S. raid on Libya.
- In 1997, former Israeli president Chaim Herzog (KHY-ehm HEHRT'-zahg) died in Tel Aviv at age 78.
- Five years ago: Riding on the back of a 747 jet, retired space shuttle Discovery traveled from Cape Canaveral, Florida, to Chantilly, Virginia, to be installed in its new home: the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum annex.

Houston scored the next nine points, capped by consecutive 3-pointers by Beverley to make it 73-64 midway through the period.

Beverley went to the bench soon after that to a huge ovation and a high five from Houston Texans star J.J. Watt, who watched the game from a courtside seat.

Thunder coach Billy Donovan raved about Beverley. "He played a very, very good game," Donovan said. "I thought he impacted the game way, way more with his energy, his effort, his hustle, his loose balls, his offensive rebounding, keeping balls alive. That's where he really did a great job."

Westbrook ended a scoring drought of almost 3 1/2 minutes for the Thunder with a layup, but Houston used an 8-2 spurt — highlighted by a 3 from Eric Gordon — to push the lead to 81-68 with just more than three minutes remaining in the third.

Harden made a pair of free throws to cap the third quarter and leave Houston up 89-74 entering the fourth.

For Houston coach Mike D'Antoni, it's the first postseason win since April 27, 2008, with Phoenix. D'Antoni's teams were swept in the first round in his last two trips to the playoffs in 2011 with the Knicks and 2013 with the Lakers.

Houston's victory comes after the team went 3-1 in the regular season against the Thunder.

The Rockets led 59-54 at halftime.

Thunder: Roberson added 18 points with seven rebounds. ... Oklahoma City, which led the NBA in rebounding in the regular season, was outrebounded 56-41. ... Jerami Grant had 10 points.

Rockets: Capela missed a few minutes in the sec-

ond quarter to receive three stitches in his lip. He had 14 points and seven rebounds. ... Nene had 15 points. ... Houston had 31 second-chance points to just four by the Thunder.

Thunder center Steven Adams on Oklahoma City's performance: "We were just trash on the reads, on the pick-and-rolls. We were just absolutely garbage. We just have to go back to the drawing board and figure it out before Game 2."

PUTTING THE WIN IN PERSPECTIVE

D'Antoni wants to make sure that his team realizes it still has a lot of work to do despite its big win.

"All we did is defend our home court, and that's what we're supposed to do," he said. "It's nice to play well and get the win because you have to, but this is just one little step ... in the big scheme of things. I'm sure they'll bounce back, and we've got to be ready to go."

UP NEXT

Oklahoma City will remain in Houston for two days of practice before Game 2 on Wednesday night at the Toyota Center.
