

The well became necessary when it was found that the present three wells were adequate only to barely meet daily summer water consumption requirements and left none for reserve. City officials said a large fire or failure of one of the older wells could leave Dimmitt in a critical water shortage. Cost of the new well will be in the neighborhood of \$12,000 when tied into the city lines and it is being drilled by C & C Pump Company of Dimmitt. On some summer days a high of 1,000,000 gallons of water have been consumed.
