The Elevator . . .

In our humble opinion, the completion of the elevator in Callahan County courthouse on Tuesday, ended one of the greatest needs of Callahan County residents. For years and years, those who had business upstairs, had to climb the stairway to reach offices and court rooms. Many could not make it, and had to call office help down to them.

As the years come on, and they surely will, climbing stairs is a chore that is not relished. Many Callahan County people have never been on the third floor of their courthouse. Many have had to be excused from juries because they could not negotiate the stairs, either due to age or physical condition. Many of our farmer and rancher friends could not visit the Soil Conservation Office, the County Agent, FHA Office, ASC Office, District Clerk's Office and others when they really needed to do so. I have seen two people carried up those stairs who were compelled to be in court. Even as young as we like to think we are, stairways are a problem, and we think, with all the space we have, an evil we can do without.

The Baird Star takes off its hat to the Commissioners who saw this need, and did something

about it. Even after one set-back they bowed their necks to the job, knowing they were doing something that would cause much comment and much criticism; but also knowing the problems caused by the stairway.

Cleo Ivy, who has completed his service in the Air Force, spent the week end with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Manion and Felix.

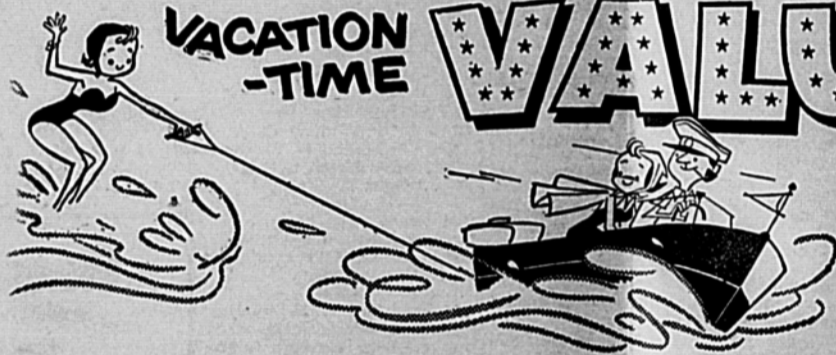
