FHA Announces 18,348 Farm Families Received Home Loans During Past Year

Farmers and ranchers in Texas obtained loans totaling \$31,818,000 through the Farmers Home Administration during the year ending June 30, Walter T. McKee, the agency's state director, announced this week in Dallas. A total of 18,348 families were served by the agency during this period.

One hundred and seventy-nine farm families in Castro and Hale Counties obtained loans totaling \$33,206, Ralph W. Dent, FHA county supervisor at Plainview, reports.

Credit was advanced to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, equipment, livestock and other farm operating items needed to place farms

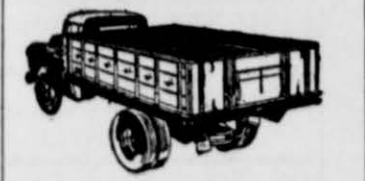

There's Apathy Around Here
We Need Farm Research Now!
IN ANY PUBLIC DRIVE, there are always a few men who must carry the work burden, regardless of the advantages to the public good such a drive might have.

The same holds true for the current emphasis on the Texas Research Foundation's experimental sub-station to be located near here. Response from farmers of this area to the project has been extremely slow.

And why is this? It is the chance of a lifetime for agriculturists on the High Plains to learn more about their own crop, to put farming on a scientific basis. Boiled down it means that, by pure apathy and nothing else, our farmers are passing up the opportunity to make more money and improve their farms.

One farm authority of this area believes there will be nothing but good farmers on the High Plains if trends continue... that farmers who do not get maximum yields will be squeezed out by lowering farm prices and competition of synthetics.

And who can dispute his logic? We have a few farmers in this area to whom 50-bushel wheat is routine and we have many who feel they are going great guns to get 25 on irrigated land. There's just not that much difference in the land, rainfall, and seed varieties.

Business lives on research. During the past 20 years there have been fantastic improvements in the newspaper industry, in textiles, the automotive industry, and wherever else there is room for improvement. Research is the basis for our way of life in these United States. Actually, we have had the word drilled into us as often as something open only to white-coated chemists that we have lost its true meaning. Every one of us has done some research at some time or other. Research means simply this: finding new uses for a product, developing a product, assimilating information, inventing, and improving. When a farmer learns a better way of irrigating his cotton, it is a result of his own research. Even the cave man of ancient times is so-called because of his own research... he learned it was better to live in a cave than out in the open.

Industry would hardly spend millions upon millions on research unless they felt it would pay off in dollars and cents... it is one way of beating competition and opening the road to newer and better things.

We have never claimed to know anything about the technical aspects of farming, but one thing about strikes we as having its merits—that of wondering why there are so many variations in production in the same county, when the soil and conditions are generally similar throughout. If there is no underground water it is readily apparent why production differs but in all other cases it seems we need some kind of educational program that could cause farmers to think and to learn and to get some lengths to learn and someone willing to teach. To do the teaching is the objective of the Texas Research Foundation, but so far there have been only a half dozen farmers set forward to help get the sub-station in this locality.

THE FUROR OVER THE SUPREME COURT
Where did it all start?
The furor over the history of the doctrine which seems to be causing so much trouble today. That is, the doctrine that the Supreme Court has the power to declare an act passed by the duly elected officials of the people, to be null and void, and therefore unconstitutional and of no force and effect.
This vesting in the Supreme Court the final veto power conferred on it by the framers of the Constitution, and laws by which our daily lives are governed.
It all started in 1801 immediately after Thomas Jefferson was sworn in as President of the United States. At that time the political parties were the Federalists on the one side and the Democratic-Republicans on the other side.
The general philosophy of these parties was that the government should be run by the people, and that the government should be a government of laws, not of men. The Federalists were in favor of a strong central government, and the Democratic-Republicans were in favor of a government that was more decentralized and more responsive to the needs of the people.

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Texas Water Law - IV
Riparian Water Rights Defined

(This is the fourth of five articles on Texas Water Law, written by Will Wilson, former associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court, and Dean A. A. White of the University of Houston Law College. Their original article has been condensed by the staff of Texas Water Conservation Association from the Southwestern Law Journal—Ed.)

IT IS IN THE act of 1889 that we find the first legislative consciousness in Texas of riparian rights. The act provided that "The unappropriated waters of every river or natural stream within the arid portions of the state are hereby declared to be the property of the public, and may be acquired by appropriation for the uses and purposes as hereafter provided."
Thus the riparian man's entitlement to his water was established by law. It was not until the act of 1907 that the legislature had in mind any distinction between riparian and non-riparian rights. It then provided that "The waters of every river or natural stream within the arid portions of the state... may be diverted from its natural channel, for irrigation, domestic and other beneficial uses, provided that such diversion shall not be injurious to the claims, owners, or holders a possessory right or title to any land lying along the bank or margin of any river or natural stream."

As recognized by the laws of the state "as constituted by the decisions of our supreme court." Two years later the legislature enacted a statute making it unlawful to divert surface waters by unnatural means onto the land of another, "except that the owner whose land stands on a running stream may use such water therefrom as may be necessary for domestic purposes."
The act of 1913 stated in effect that "nothing in the act shall be construed to impair riparian rights involving a rule of real property vests no interest at all, or that it does not vest one which the legislature cannot take away in early statutehood, the necessity of defining Spanish and Mexican land titles had turned our courts to find the civil law, in which they had little training and skill. The obvious difficulties of translating the reasonable exercise of the police power.
During the Texas Republic and the Spanish and Mexican law into English came not only from the fact that they were written in the Spanish of several different centuries, but also from translating terms from laws and up to the present time the system of governmental and legal system so completely alien to ours that legal concepts common to both had many subtle differences.

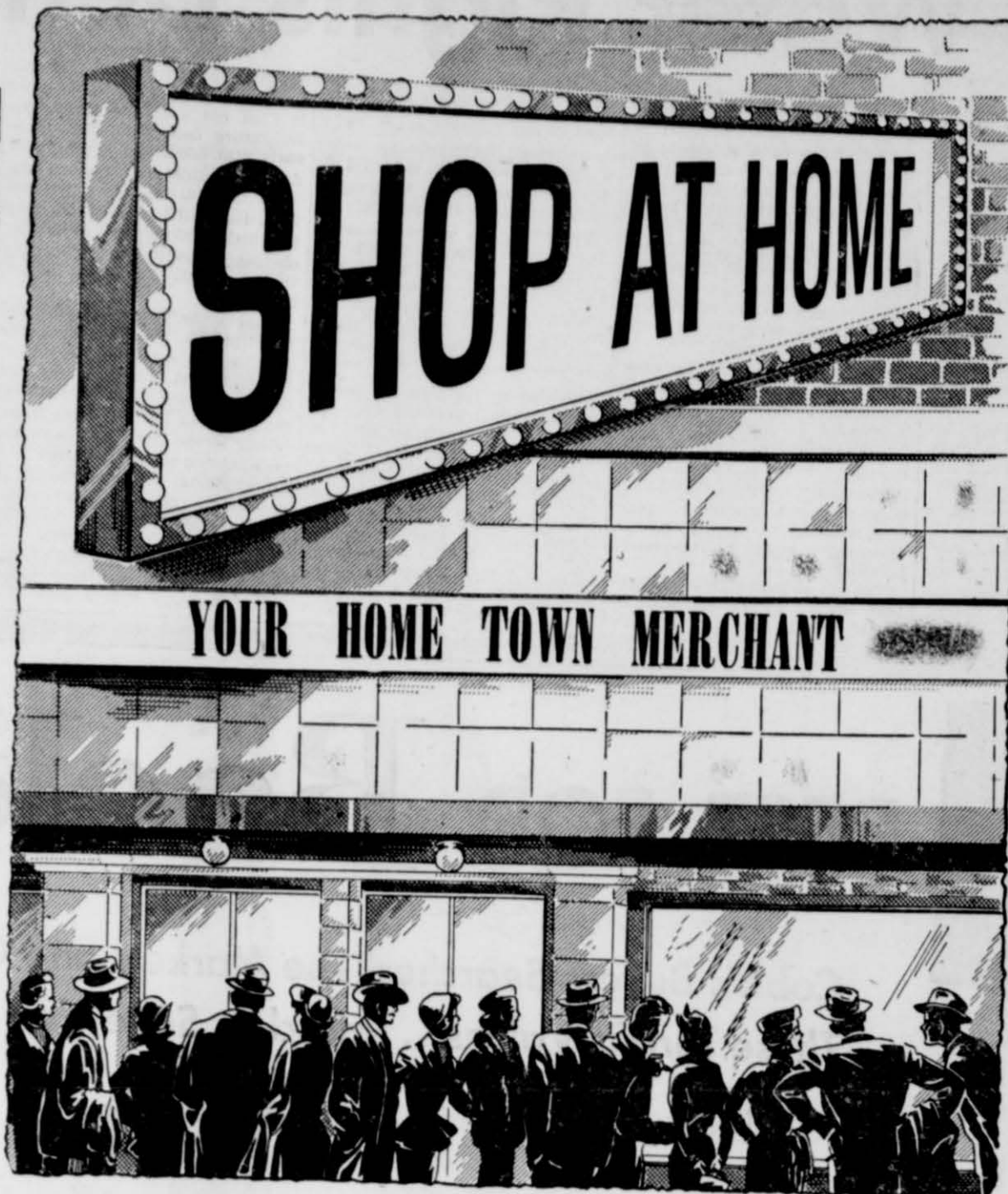

Whether we keep up with political developments; it is our method of arriving at the type of government we are to have for the next two or four years depending on whether it is on the state or national level.

Taking an interest in politics and studying political processes is the only possible way that the citizen can be assured of good government under the democratic system. There are fundamental differences in political party philosophy and those differences are reflected in the administration of existing laws and in new laws that will be passed during the next four years.

Whether we are interested or not, we owe it to ourselves and our country to participate in the political process which charts the course of our state and national government. This business of politics is more than just winning a contest or making a point of order; it is our method of preventing and perpetuating our freedoms and leaving our government in the hands of the people where it belongs.

Don't ever get the idea that politics are too dirty and too nasty a business for you to fool with, because you will be affected in your daily life by the results of those political processes as they are reflected in laws—tax laws, agricultural laws, water conservation laws, security laws, labor laws, and the other one thousand and one laws which affect every segment of our economy.

It is interesting to note that in the 35 years that John Marshall served as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, he never again declared an Act of Congress unconstitutional.

It is also well to remember in this connection that as matters now stand, the laws passed by the duly elected officials of this land are in a strange position. These laws can be knocked down by the Supreme Court of the United States as being unconstitutional. Yet, a treaty between this country and a foreign country, written and entered into by the Executive Branch of the government and duly approved by the Senate, is on a parity with, if not superior to, the Constitution.

But in any event, as the law presently stands, the laws passed by the Congress are subservient to such treaties, as well as the Constitution, so you can imagine how far down this puts the laws of the separate states.

(Continued From Page 8) government. It created the doctrine that the Supreme Court had the power to declare Acts of Congress unconstitutional, power that was bitterly opposed by Jefferson's followers.

Had John Marshall held against Jefferson's followers on the Marbury case and had entered a judgement requiring Madison to issue Marbury a commission, there was a strong chance that Marshall might have been impeached. Many thought that Marshall realized his idea of not endangering his position as Chief Justice, but at the same time, creating a strong weapon in the hands of advocates of centralized government.

This approach left the Jefferson followers in the position of having won the Marbury case for which they could not complain, but of having to accept, as a thorn with the roses so to speak, the establishment of a doctrine that vested the Supreme Court with final veto powers on all legislative actions.

The initial meeting of the organization will be August 21, when an Air Force officer from Amarillo will be in Dimmitt to explain the duties of volunteer air observers and to show a film exemplifying these duties.

Mr. Barnes said that 12 volunteers would suffice in Dimmitt. These volunteer observers, besides spotting aircraft, will also be needed in case of severe weather activity to report storms and tornadoes.

A six-hour course (three two-hour classes) will be conducted to train air observers. Also, a report-in post with a private phone will be set up.

The air observer corps is becoming an integral part of our national and civil defense. Mr. Barnes said, and Dimmitt should join the network of air observers in the United States.

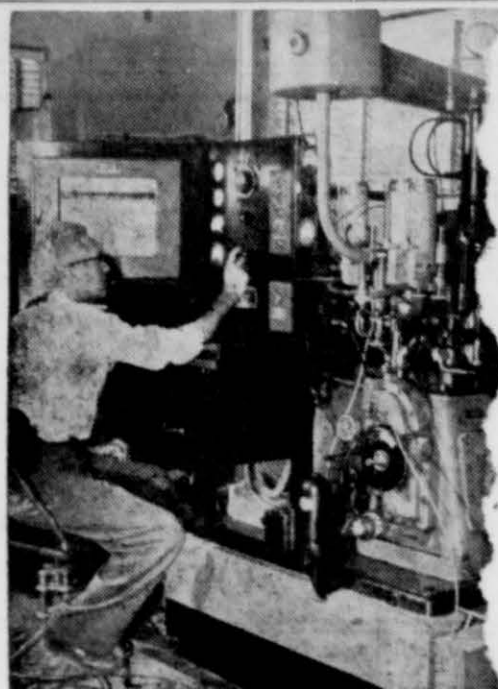

 other delegates there from other states. I really doubt that Stevenson was fully aware just how many votes he had before the balloting. If there was any fixing, railroading, or stacking of the votes none of us delegates heard anything about it. A convention of this type is so big that no one man or minority faction can control it. Of course there was bargaining done, but it was out in the open and was between individual delegations and I believe Stevenson was elected as a result of his popularity and ability instead of convention politics. I came away with a new respect for the Democratic party way of doing things.

Of the general consensus of opinion among delegates about the chances of a democratic victory in the fall, Mr. Cowen indicated everyone thought the chances were good. "Most of us believed then, and still do, that Stevenson and Kefauver were the two strongest men we could have picked. They have both worked hard for the Democratic party during the past four years and have been campaigning a lot. They are known by most everyone in the United States and are both capable men. Stevenson will apparently run a well-ordered campaign with a minimum of name-calling while Kefauver will make a good stump-speaking candidate. All in all, we were all pretty well satisfied with our choice and I believe, from talking to other Texas delegates and my own experience, that the Democrats will easily carry the state this year.

"Let me clarify that a bit. The Dixon-Yates electric power scandal, the present weak farm program, the falling income of farmers and small businesses and the unpopularity of Vice-President Nixon will have gone a long way towards biting into the support of the Republican Party in Texas. Even now, as the Republicans convene in San Francisco, they are making some extravagant claims about their four years in office that cannot hold up. For instance, their speakers are saying they stopped inflation while at the very same time the cost

 son-pledged delegates who would not have gone to Harriman under any circumstances. This meant that Harriman's greatest hope of accomplishment at the Convention was limited to blocking Stevenson's nomination. This, no doubt, would have been accomplished had it not been for the fact that the present leaders in the Democratic Party were almost unanimous in their support for Stevenson.

When I went to Chicago it was my hope that the nomination would not go to those who had been advertised, but would go to a man not burdened with political scars, a new face on the political horizon, who could and would receive the wholehearted and unconditional endorsement of every Democrat throughout this nation. I still believe that would have been the result if the stalemate between Harriman and Stevenson had developed, resulting in the freeing of the delegates and creating a free convention.

The steel is rising to an additional \$10 a ton. Home appliances are rising 1 to 12 1/2 percent, automobile price increases are expected to range from \$10 to as high as \$300 on large models and tires are increasing in price from 2 to 3 1/2 percent. Most of our large producers are raising their prices which in turn decreases our real earnings in this non-industrial area. All this means that I believe that the Republican Party is not capable of making any formidable changes for the better in national government. "Eisenhower's falling down on his promises to agriculture has not helped the Republican cause in this country either. I felt the Democratic convention had a purpose and a cause, probably more so than in past years. The delegates seemed to feel the same way I did. We should have more party harmony than ever before. The Democratic party now is made up of new faces, new ideas, and new concepts. We have had an opportunity during the past four years to take a searching look at our objectives—and I believe we came up with a party that will have more general support from the public than we've seen since the Roosevelt administration."

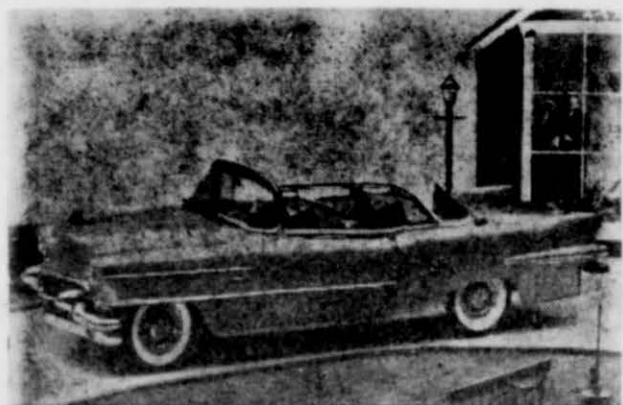
