Special Nursing Course Offered For Polio Treatment
PLAINVIEW, June 1 (Special)—Women in this area have an opportunity to prepare for a worthy contribution to suffering humanity and make good money at the same time under a plan announced recently by the Plainview Sanitarium.
The Plainview Sanitarium, cooperating with the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Inc., is making extensive preparations for the treatment of the dread disease should it appear in alarming proportions this summer.
An isolated ward with bed, constructed with special footboards and rigid mattresses have been arranged and an adjoining room is equipped with sterilizing machines and facilities for preparing hot packs.
Women are needed to prepare and apply the hot packs which are so valuable in the treatment of paralytic victims. The Sanitarium plans to train from several communities in this area immediately so they will be available in event of a recurrence of infantile paralysis this summer.
The work is hard according to Dr. A. O. Nichols, Jr., of the hospital staff but the women will be paid 75 cents per hour for their services on cases. Two six-hour training periods will be sufficient to permit efficient work in supervision, packs under expert supervision. Women trained in the Kenny method are available to supervise the work. Strong women interested in the work are requested to communicate with Mrs. Carl Brown at the Plainview Sanitarium. It is hoped that women will respond from nearby towns, so they can care for patients in their immediate vicinity.
Through the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, physician Robert Kelly recently trained in the advanced Kelly Method will be available in the territory this year and in emergency cases an iron lung accompanied by a trained technician will be available with expenses born by the National Foundation.

(Continued from page 1) to the Southwest Pacific. Clay reports they look fine and are in high spirits.

When Clay speaks of the Navy and the home boys he sees overseas, his face lights up; but when Japs or the sinking of the Yorktown are mentioned, his face grows quite and his eyes grow determined and clear, thus another football player's fighting determination to win, goes to war—another good service man from the home town.

MARTIN BROCKMAN Pfc. Martin Brockman, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. August Brockman of Nazareth, is home on a thirty day furlough from New Guinea.

Martin is another native son—born, reared and educated at Nazareth. He was engaged in farming when he entered the service in September, 1942, and was stationed at Ft. Sill.

He went overseas in the early summer of 1943—attached to the ground crew of the air division in New Guinea, which he thinks is the home of two-thirds of the world's insect and reptile life, and rainy weather. He believes he could enjoy a good standstom of the native variety.

He wishes and hopes that the Southwest Pacific would get more of everything for fighting—but powdered eggs.

"However," he added, "they are not so bad if you can get them past your nose."

He thought the natives were unusually friendly and helpful—not only as laborers but, "wising them to jungle living." Also he praised the Aussies as fighting comrades.

"Nothing was as important as mail call. I'd miss a meal a day for that." Three weeks was the longest time he was without mail.

Pfc. Brockman regrets losing all his souvenirs when he was hospitalized with a broken leg, received while in New Guinea. He states that he never saw a Jap, but saw too much evidence that they were in that area.

At present he is stationed in a convalescent home in California.
