

Horns advance to regional

It was a cold night at Bull-dog Stadium in Plainview Saturday as the Hart Longhorns overwhelmed the New Deal Lions, 28-13, for the bi-district championship.

THE LONGHORNS now stand as one of the 16 surviving Class A teams in the Texas playoffs. The bi-district champs will square off with the highly ranked Clarendon Broncos Saturday night at 7:30 in Panhandle for the regional championship. The winner will advance to the state quarter-finals.

The Longhorns are one of the few area teams still undefeated. But Saturday night they will face a tough Clarendon team which has lost only once, that being to the No. 1-ranked Class AA team in the state, the Childress Bobcats.

HART WENT into Saturday night's bi-district game with a 9-0-1 record and the District 3-A championship, while New Deal stood at 7-3 with the District 4-A title. A large crowd of fans from throughout the county followed the Longhorns to the Plainview playoff tilt.

It was not one of Hart's better games. The Longhorns—who had played an almost flawless game the week before to defeat Bovina for the district title—fumbled the ball away seven times to New Deal Saturday, but still won the bout by two touchdowns.

Tailback Jimmy Brown, the most exciting runner this area has seen in a decade, had ridden most of the day to get home from a funeral in time for the game. He had missed the week's workouts. Still, he did his thing by breaking loose on two long-distance touchdowns sprints. And his three capable backfield mates—fullback Stanley Dyer, running back Erasmo Castillo and quarterback Dirk

Rambo—turned in dependable performances behind the fierce blocking of the Hart line to insure the victory.

THE LIONS returned the opening kickoff to their 35, then started their first drive, which ended when the Lions' Bill Bigham failed to connect on a 25-yard field goal attempt. Aiding the Lions' drive were several penalties and a pass interference call against Hart.

After the Hart line stiffened and forced the New Deal field-goal attempt, the Longhorns set up their offensive shop on their own 20. But two plays later they fumbled on their 27 to set up New Deal's first score.

Steve Fortenberry, the big Lion fullback, plunged across from three yards out to put New Deal on the scoreboard first. Bigham kicked the extra point and the Lions led, 7-0, with the game just 2:06 old and Hart having run only two plays.

THE LONGHORNS—not too happy at this turn of events—launched Brown on a 45-yard scoring romp after starting a drive from their 37. Rambo ran a quarterback keeper and arrived in the end zone untouched for a two-point conversion to give the Longhorns an 8-7 lead. That's how the score stood when the first quarter ended.

The second frame was full of action as the Longhorns picked up 14 more points and kept the Lions from scoring. It was Brown again—this time on a 55-yard gallop—who collected Hart's second touchdown. The speedster took a pitchout from Rambo and singled a path goalward as he turned the corner. No one on the New Deal team touched him. Wayne Etheridge kicked the extra point to make it 15-7 in Hart's favor with 9:20 remaining in the first half.

THE HORNS got a break as they forced a Lion fumble at the New Deal 26 on the kick-off. But the turnover was cancelled out two plays later when the Longhorns gave the ball back to the Lions at the 27. The Lions couldn't move, and punted the ball to the New Deal 45.

From there, Rambo hurled a 73-yard pass to Castillo to set up Hart's third touchdown. Dyer—who earned all-state honors as a linebacker last year and is now an all-state candidate as a fullback, top—blasted the last five yards for Hart's third TD. Etheridge kicked the (See HORNS GO, Page 4)

Spotting Brown (who had streaked for two of Hart's four touchdowns), Howell simply handed off the big gold football to the speedy tailback and asked him to carry it for the team.

Teams go into tourneys

If you're a basketball nut, you can go any of three directions today to see Dimmitt teams play. And if you're a basketball parent, you've got a real scheduling problem on your hands.

The Bobcats enter the Plainview Invitational Tournament, the Bobbies go into the Friona Invitational Tournament, and Dimmitt's B-team boys try their luck against varsity teams in the Cooper Tournament at Frenship. All starting today (Thursday).

THE BOBCATS drew a rough opponent in the first round of the always-tough Plainview classic. Coach Kenneth Cleveland's Cats will tip off at 7 o'clock tonight against the Abernathy Antelopes of District 4-AA.

"I think Abernathy is probably the toughest AA team there this year," Cleveland said. But also in the tourney are such perennial powers as Phillips, Ralls, Lockney, Frenship, Tulia and Lorenzo.

THE LARGE School Division of the Plainview Tournament will feature Plainview, Amarillo High, Big Spring, Lubbock High, Midland Lee, Lubbock Dunbar, Clovis and Plainview-B.

Action will begin at 10 a.m. today with Tulia meeting Lorenzo. Other first-round games in the AA Division will pit Lockney vs. Frenship at 1 p.m. and Phillips vs. Ralls at 4 p.m.

In the tournament's AAAA Division first round, Clovis will meet Plainview-B at 11:30 a.m. Midland Lee will take on Lubbock Dunbar at 2:30 p.m., and Big Spring will go against Lubbock High at 5:30 p.m., just before the Dimmitt-Abernathy bout. After the Bobcats' game tonight, the Plainview Bulldogs and Amarillo Sandies will close out the first day with a game at 8:30.

IF THE Bobcats defeat Abernathy, they'll meet the Phillips-Ralls winner at 7 p.m. Friday in the semifinals. The loser of the Bobcat-Antelope bout will meet the Phillips-Ralls loser at 1 p.m. Friday in the consolation bracket.

Saturday's schedule in the AA Division calls for the consolation title game at 1 p.m.,

the third place game at 4 p.m. and the championship bout at 7 p.m.

THE BOBBIES could have been a lot luckier in drawing a first-round opponent, too. Coach Bob Askey's sextet will open the Friona Tournament against the always-powerful Spearman Lynxettes at 4 o'clock today (Thursday).

Other first-round games in the girls' division of the Friona Tourney are Springlake vs. Tulia at 10 a.m., Vega vs. Farwell at 1 p.m. and Friona vs. Bovina at 7 p.m.

The winner of the Dimmitt-Spearman game and the winner of the Springlake-Tulia bout will meet at 4 p.m. Friday in the semifinals. The losers of the same opening round games will play in the consolation semifinals at 1 p.m. Friday.

THE consolation championship will be decided at 12 noon Saturday, followed by the third place game at 3 p.m. and the championship bout at 7 o'clock.

Meanwhile, eight boys' teams will also be competing at Friona. They include defending state champion Morton, Estacado, Springlake, Farwell, Spearman, Vega, Friona and Bovina.

DIMMITT HAS the only boys' B-team entered in the Cooper Invitational Tournament this weekend, but Coach Jim Jefferies is hoping his crop of flashy sophomores can generate some surprises against varsity competition.

The B-Cats will open the tourney at 10 a.m. against Seagraves.

The Cooper Tournament is being held at Frenship because of an unforeseen blessing at Cooper—their football team went into the playoffs.

NAZARETH'S boys' and girls' teams will see tournament action this weekend, too, as they go into the Spade Invitational Friday. The tournament schedule was not available at press time.

30 boxing bouts on tap Saturday

The Dimmitt Athletic Club will host a three-club boxing meet Saturday evening in North Elementary Gym.

TEAMS FROM the Levelland Boxing Club and the Amarillo Lions Boxing Club will be here to compete with Dimmitt boxers from 6 to 20 years of age, with the first bout scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for students, with pre-schoolers free.

Thirty bouts are on the card. Each boy will fight three one-minute rounds, and several may see action in additional bouts.

AVERY THRASHER, Dimmitt Athletic Club boxing coach, is chairman of the meet. He will be assisted by the Dimmitt Jaycees.

Thrasher said 20 boxers from Amarillo, 10 from Levelland and

at least 15 from Dimmitt will take part. The meet will be a warmup for a full two-day, seven-team Golden Gloves qualification tournament to be held here Jan. 5 and 6.

Willis Hawkins Jr. and W. W. Jones will serve as judges, while T. B. Baca and Zeke Clement of the Canyon Police Dept. will alternate as the referee and third judge.

LOCAL SUPPORT for the meet has been outstanding, Thrasher said.

With the Christmas season fast approaching, it's time to sign up for "Operation Christmas Greeting," the local card project to benefit the community while saving your time and money.

DEADLINE for contributing to have your name on the Community Christmas Card is noon Friday, Dec. 15. That's just two weeks off.

Contributions may be made at the First State Bank of Dimmitt, either in person or by

mail. The contribution or check should be specified for "Operation Christmas Greeting." The tellers at the bank will compile the list.

To make your contribution, figure the amount that you would normally spend on cards and mailing costs to local friends, and contribute that amount.

WHEN YOU make your contribution, instruct the teller how you want your family's name on the community Christmas card.

The card will be a multi-color cover page of the Dec. 21 issue of the Castro County News. It will have appropriate artwork and message for your friends in the county.

In the past, Operation Christmas Greeting has netted more than \$11,000 to benefit Plains Memorial Hospital, the Dimmitt Cemetery Association and other community projects.

The 1971 community card brought in \$1,320.50 for the Auxiliary, the Lions Club Eyeglasses Fund, the Cemetery Fund and the Community Chor-us.

ALL contributions will go to the Plains Memorial Hospital Auxiliary this year, unless otherwise specified. If you wish, you may designate your contribution to any other project or organization.

Funds going to the Hospital Auxiliary will be used to purchase a hydra-lift emergency stretcher already on order for Plains Memorial Hospital's emergency room.

The stretcher is tip-proof and can take the patient from em-

ergency room through surgery and into his private room without shifting him from stretcher to stretcher.

TOTAL COST of the stretcher will be \$1,822.50 with additional accessories, including an intravenous rod, side rails, spring-loaded wheel locks, anesthetic screen rod, oxygen tank holder and a two-inch conductive pad. Its construction will allow one nurse to safely move a patient on or off the stretcher. Margaret Wilson, Auxiliary president, said other equipment purchases are being considered by the Pink Ladies and will be decided on in the near future.

Jimmy Wood, minister of the Rock Church of Christ in Dallas, officiated at Monday's rites. Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens, under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

Born Aug. 21, 1897, in Itasca, Mr. Easter came to Dimmitt in 1904 with his parents and later farmed northwest of Dimmitt. He moved from here to Portales in 1941, and later to Dallas.

He was a member of the Baptist Church and the Masonic Lodge.

SURVIVORS include his wife, Leo Elder Easter; three sons, Billy John, Jimmy Lee and Billy Jack, all of Dallas; a daughter, Mrs. J. B. Naylor of Dallas; and two sisters, Mrs. R. W. Dickey of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Walter Stach of London, England.

Pallbearers were his grandsons, Randy Easter, Jimmy Easter, Calvin Naylor, Joe Naylor, Nelson Naylor, Barry Easter, Russell Naylor and Larry Easter.

VETERANS' SERVICES

By BEDFORD SMITH

Thousands of wives and children of veterans and servicemen fail to take advantage of benefits and programs provided by Congress despite Veterans Administration efforts to inform each potential beneficiary, according to Jack Coker, VA Regional Office Director.

EDUCATIONAL benefits for wives, widows and children of veterans whose permanent, total disabilities or deaths were service-connected was cited by VA officials as one example of the many benefits available. Also eligible for educational benefits are wives and children of servicemen missing in action (MIA) or prisoners of war (POW) for more than 90 days.

VA guaranteed home loans are available to wives of POW's and MIA's also and to unmarried widows of veterans and servicemen whose deaths were service-connected.

Widows and minor children may receive two types of monthly payments also, Coker pointed out. Dependency and indemnity (DIC) is paid if the veteran's death was service-connected. Pension is paid if death was non-service-connected. In certain cases parents may be eligible for DIC checks.

STILL another benefit, monthly aid and attendance payments of \$55, is paid to eligible wives, widows and parents who are patients in nursing homes, helpless or blind, or so nearly helpless or blind as to require regular assistance of another person.

Wives and children, or whoever is designated as beneficiary, are entitled to the veteran's or serviceman's life insurance proceeds upon his death.

Most VA benefits for dependents and survivors of veterans and servicemen are based on at least 90 days of military service. For Post Korean and Vietnam Era veterans and servicemen the service requirement for GI home loans and educational benefits is at least 181 days.

FULL DETAILS on these and other benefits for dependents and survivors of veterans and servicemen are available from any VA office, local veterans service organization representative, or your veterans county service officer, Bedford W. Smith.

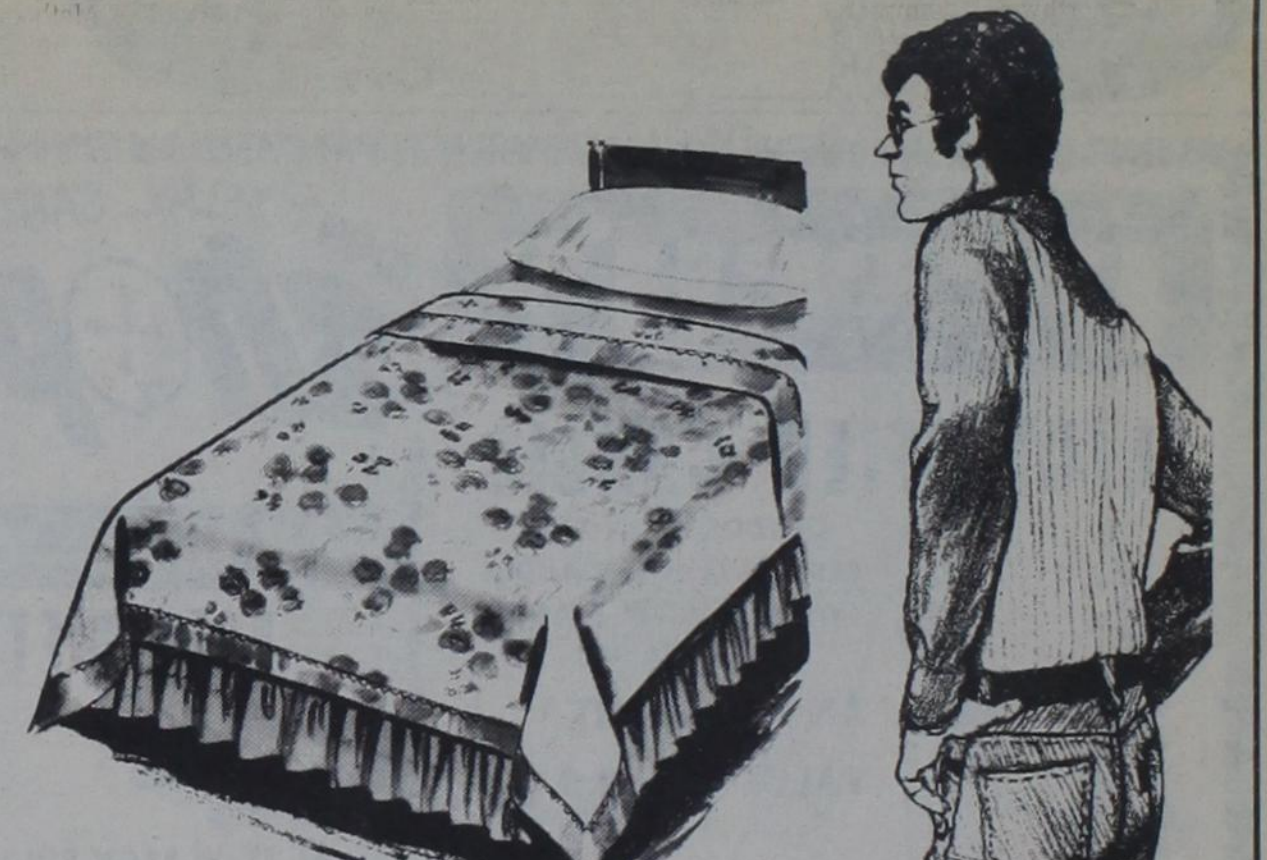

Spend less, enjoy more

Here we are less than a month away from Christmas. Now we need to get to the serious business of holiday baking, decorating shopping.

IF YOU'LL plan not to overspend on gifts you'll enjoy Christmas more. I don't know of anyone who could feel good if they had gone in debt for gifts.

Each year we have requests for many of our holiday recipes. We do have a publication "Christmas Time at Home" available for 35 cents and also I've compiled a recipe set with some of our more popular recipes in it—come by or call for it. Here are some good recipes that will store well and

are easy to make.

DATE NUT FONDANT
two-thirds cup Eagle Brand milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
4 cups sifted confectioners sugar

1 cup chopped nuts
½ cup chopped dates

Combine milk and vanilla. Gradually add confectioners sugar and mix until smooth and creamy. Add chopped nuts and dates. Blend into milk mixture. Press into a square shallow pan, 8x8x2. Chill until firm. Cut into 1 inch squares. This recipe makes about 1½ pounds.

APRICOT COCONUT BALLS
1½ cups dried apricots, ground
2 cups shredded coconut
two-third cup Eagle Brand milk
confectioners sugar

Combine apricots and coconut. Add milk and blend. Shape into small balls and roll in confectioners sugar. Let stand until firm.

MARTHA WASHINGTON CHOCOLATES

Melt ¼ pound oleo, add 1 can Eagle brand milk, 2 pounds powdered sugar, 1 can coconut and 1 quart pecans (chopped fine). Mix together, roll into desired shapes. Dip in chocolate mix.

Chocolate Mix (for dipping)—2 packages semi-sweet chocolate chips (6 oz. pkg.), and 1 bar (¼ lb.) paraffin.

Melt together over hot water. Stick teeth pick in fondant and dip in chocolate mix. Set on waxed paper to cool. (If mixture hardens, heat again).

Littlefield and Friona dominate 3-AA coaches' all-district picks

Dimmitt failed to land a player on the 3-AA all-district football team, although five Bobcats earned honorable mention.

LITTLEFIELD and Friona dominated the 3-AA dream team selections, which were announced jointly Monday by the league's coaches.

Of the 23 berths on the all-district squad (11 offensive, 12 defensive), the champion Wildcats nailed down nine positions and the third-place Chieftains six, with one boy from meach squad making both the offensive and defensive teams.

Four Olton youths made the all-district team, while three members of the district runner-up Morton squad captured four positions.

Sixteen of the all-district positions went to seniors and the remaining seven to juniors.

THE FIVE Dimmitt players gaining honorable mention were sophomore guard Travis Hampton Jr. (offense), senior safety Terry Powell, sophomore line-backer Shannon Truelock, junior guard Roger Underwood (defense) and senior tackle Brent Sanders (defense).

Heading up the all-district squad is Friona's Kevin Wiseman, 185-lb. senior tackle, who won a unanimous vote from the district's coaches as a defensive lineman and also was named to the offensive all-star team.

Two other players also made both the offensive and defensive dream teams. They were Littlefield's Randy Cook, 190-lb. junior, who made the squad both as an offensive tackle and defensive lineman; and Morton's Jimmy Harvey, 150-lb. senior, who was named to the offensive lineup as a running back and to the defensive team as a corner back.

THREE OTHERS besides Wiseman were unanimous choices for all-district honors at singular posts. They were Olton's Steve Lewis, 155-lb. senior, at offensive guard; Olton's Johnny Bandy, 165-lb. senior, at defensive safety; and Littlefield's Bill Hamblin, 170-lb. senior, at linebacker.

Football season ends for 3-AA with Wildcats' bi-district loss

Littlefield's—and District 3-AA's—football season came to an end in Plainview Friday night, and since the Wildcats were playing Floydada, the game fit the pattern of the past: a fierce defensive struggle.

FLOYDADA'S 7-0 victory sent the Whirlwinds into the regional round against the state's No. 1 ranked team, Childress, and the Littlefield Wildcats had to pack their gear until next fall.

Less in bi-district left the Wildcats with a 7-2-1 record, and Coach Jerry Blakely began work for 1973. The cupboard is not bare, either, as five offensive starters and four defensive regulars will return for yet another season.

"We have our quarterback (Terry Bryson) and Pat Henderson (a running back) back, and some size coming back, so chances are we could be strong-

er," said Blakely, who has led the Wildcats to the playoffs two straight years.

FLOYDADA'S victory came in a comeback fashion, as Littlefield was ahead on penetrations (1-0) and first downs (8-7) with eight minutes to play, when Floydada's Erick Jones intercepted a Littlefield pass and returned it 22 yards to the 35. In 12 plays, the Whirlwinds drove in for the winning touchdown.

It was the third time in 13 months the two teams had met. One, last fall, ended in a 0-0 standoff with Littlefield winning on first downs, and Floydada won a non-conference game earlier this season, 3-0.

Blakely looked at Friday's game with realism. "WE HAD a couple of opportunities and didn't take advantage of them. We were inside their 25 three times and failed to get anything on the scoreboard. The interception was the turning point, but the penalty we got before was a big play."

AFTER penetrating to the 16, Wildcat quarterback Bryson circled to his right to the 13 on first down, but a clip ("and it should have been called," said Blakely) shoved the Wildcats back to the 28 and out of field goal range. Three plays later, Floydada intercepted and drove for the winning score.

"Our kids played as well as they are capable," said Blakely in complimenting his Wildcats. "When you play a team as often as we have over the past four or five years, you expect a defensive game."

"We had success with our quarterback sprintout plays. Bryson was throwing well, and so we had good success running since they had to stay back to cover the pass."

Unlike last year when district was realigned, District 3-AA can look ahead to a group the same as opening drills last August. And the Wildcats could again rule as favorites.

Fed beef prices in 'down' cycle

There were more cattle on feed across the nation in October, so downward pressure on fed beef prices should continue for the rest of 1972 due to the larger available supplies.

change little, though, until the first of the year, and there will not be too noticeable a difference until the spring months," said Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University.

"The Oct. 1 cattle on feed report shows 11.8 million head in the 23 major feeding states, a 10 percent increase over last year. At the same time the number of cattle on feed in Texas was 30 percent above a year ago," commented Uvacek. Cattle and calf placements into lots during the July-September quarter dropped to 6.2 million head, a slight drop from the comparable period last year. However, in Texas feedlot placements during the same quarter were 23 percent above last year, noted the specialist.

FED CATTLE marketings in the October-December quarter of this year are estimated at 6.6 million head, seven percent more than were marketed in the last quarter of 1971. Expected marketings from Texas lots are estimated to be 30 percent greater in the October-December quarter of this year. "Texas cattle feeding continues to grow in leaps and bounds," said the specialist.

LIVESTOCK questionnaires have been mailed to livestock producers in the state as a part of the annual livestock survey conducted for Texas. If you receive one of the questionnaires you are requested to fill it out as accurately as possible and return it as soon as possible. This is the basis for estimating the state's livestock numbers and getting a complete picture of the livestock industry as possible.

Disease ratings compiled on 191 varieties of milo

Grain sorghum producers now have at their fingertips information on disease resistance or susceptibility of most commercial grain sorghums in Texas.

THE information is available at the county Extension office and concerns 191 hybrids and their reaction to downy mildew, head smut and maize dwarf mosaic virus (MDMV). The hybrids were contributed by 22 commercial seed companies in Texas and two in Nebraska.

The massive campaign began this spring as a joint effort of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station of Texas A&M University. Support through a \$1,000 grant-in-aid came from the South Texas Cotton and Grain Association.

Leaders in the project were plant pathologist, and Dr. Richard Frederiksen, associate professor of plant pathology with the Experiment Station.

ALL HYBRIDS were planted at three locations-Bay City, Port Lavaca and Iago (near Wharton). Plantings at Bay City were rated for downy mildew, those at Port Lavaca, for head smut, and plots at Iago were checked for MDMV.

"This is the first time a project of this magnitude has been undertaken," said Dr. David Rosberg, head of the Texas A&M Department of Plant Sciences. "Furthermore, it was a joint effort with both Experiment Station and Extension Service personnel working hand-in-hand to compile a pack-

age of invaluable information for grain sorghum producers throughout the state and nation."

According to Horne and Frederiksen, disease is a limiting factor to top grain sorghum yields in many areas of Texas, especially in the south. And genetic resistance is the best means of controlling these diseases.

"IN DESIGNING this disease rating project, we especially selected fields with a high incidence of the particular disease," noted Horne and Frederiksen. "In other words, we attempted to give these hybrids a real 'acid' test."

What followed was a season-long vigil by the two plant pathologists and others to keep a close check on the almost 200 hybrids and to record disease severity, plant height, days to 50 percent bloom and color of the grain.

With regard to downy mildew and head smut, each hybrid was labeled as to the percent of infection. MDMV ratings were given as "very tolerant, tolerant, intermediate, susceptible and very susceptible."

"THE information we have obtained from these tests should be mutually beneficial to both producers and commercial seed companies," pointed out the pathologists. "And it should be valid for all grain sorghum producing areas."

With this information, producers will know the disease reaction of the hybrid they select. Of course, they need to consider only those disease ratings for the diseases that occur in their fields. For example, if downy mildew is a problem, a hybrid should be selected that has a high yield potential and is resistant to that particular disease.

Horne and Frederiksen contend that the disease ratings

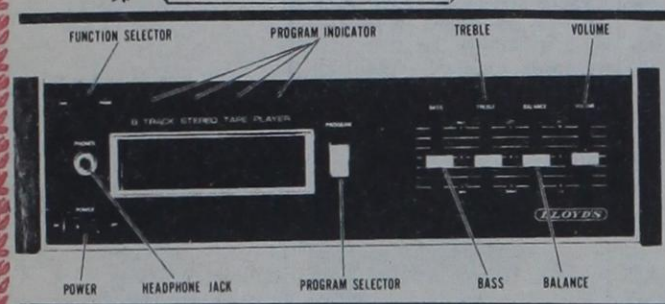

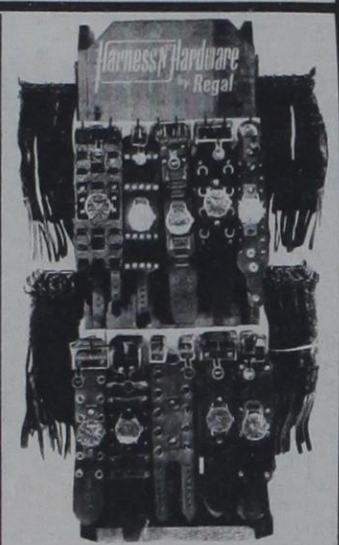

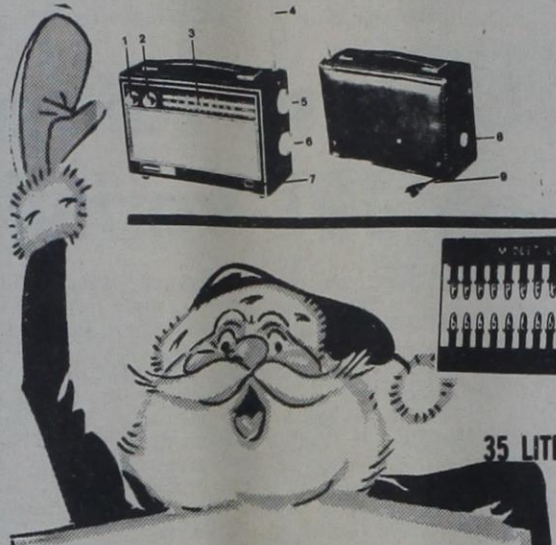
