
THE SCOUTS will backpack into the canyon from a mesa above the Scout camp, and will set up campsites by patrols to prepare for the camporee.



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



Coolidge wide open spaces and a low mental Protection Agency will soon begin requiring service stations in those eight metroplexes to recover not less than 90% of the gas fumes and vapors escaping from the gasoline hose when a motorist fills his tank with gasoline. Those gasoline vapors are a major contributor to air pollution and they become even more significant as the hydrocarbon

emissions of cars drop.

The EPA has proposed rules requiring every service station in those eight areas pumping more than 30,000 gallons per month to install expensive vacuum systems to recover escaping vapors. The vacuum system uses pumps to suck the vapors back into storage tanks and has been effective up to 90% of the time. The major oil companies are pushing for a 'balance'' system which operates on the pressure of the gasoline flowing from the hose into the automobile gas tank. This pressure forces the fumes back into the storage tanks through a completely separate line attached to or incorporated as part of the gasoline pump

hose. The "balance" system recovers 83% of the fumes at best and does not meet the EPA requirements of 90% effectiveness. So, service stations will have to go for the more expensive vacuum system not later than May 31, 1977. Stations pumping 10,000 to 30,000 gallons per month will have to recover only 80% of the fumes, so they may be able to use the 'balance'' system. Smaller outlets will be exempt from the regulations.

THE COST will be substantial, about \$283 million for the eight metropolitan areas-Baltimore, Boston, Denver, Los Angeles, New York, Washington, D.C. and California's Sacramento and San Joaquin Val-

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

The cows were trained to obey the sound of a horn, following the young men to the grazing land in the morning and returning at night for milking. A young man would receive 10 pounds for tending 100 cattle an entire summer, but had to forfeit threepence each time he failed to bring in all of the cows at night.

As time went on, dairymen became more concerned about the economics of their operations. By the mid-1800's, a top dairy farmer in New York grossed \$62 in butter, cheese and milk a year from each of his 41 cows. This was about three times the earnings of the average dairy farmer at that

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
