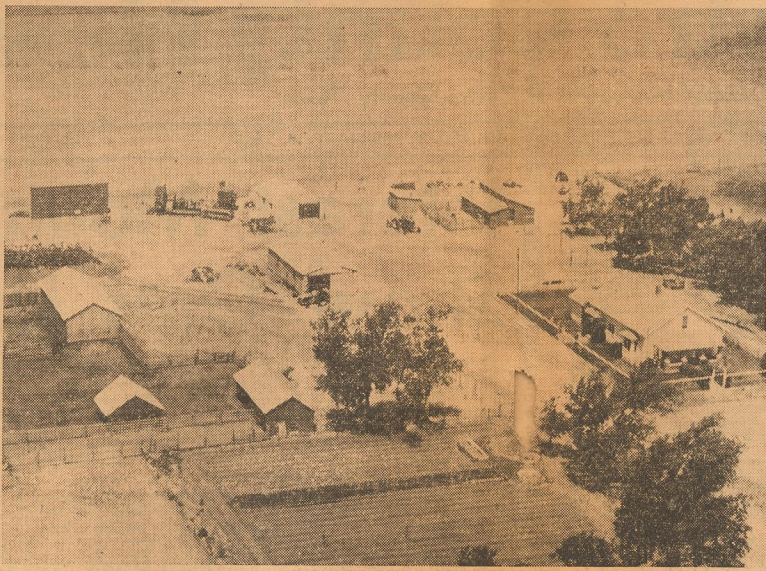

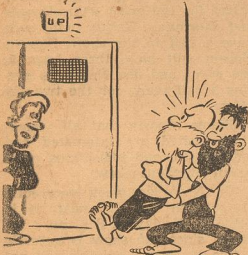

Nazareth Farmer Uses Own Method For Increasing Organic Residue

Carlos Calvert who is a cooperator with the Running Water Soil Conservation District, and rents the Dr. R. E. Cogswell farm 8 miles East of Dimmitt, has come up with an idea that answers his need for an increase in organic residue to be left after he has harvested his grain sorghum.

Plant Ecologists have bred a good portion of the residue out of the stalk of grain sorghum. This has some advantages, but to the conservation farmer who is interested in maintaining or improving the organic content of his soil, it has its drawbacks. To overcome this Calvert has increased

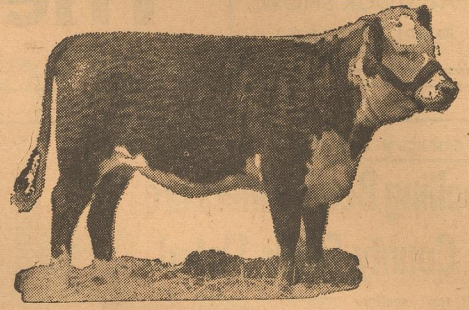
the number of plants per acre, and interseeds cowpeas with a special attachment on his planter. He plants and works his grain sorghum on 28 in. middles, with equipment which he has made to his own specifications.

In addition to his planters and the Ferguson shown in picture, he rigged up another with boxes on a regular planter frame and drag planters behind that, where the grain sorghum and field peas were mixed as they were planted. He made a middle runner which he used while the milo was small. After that he used knives in order to keep from cutting off the little feeder roots which gather

food for the plant. He made the knives by cutting off knives made for a forty inch middle to accommodate a 28 inch middle.

This year Calvert averaged better than 5000 lbs. of grain sorghum per acre over the entire 430 acres, or a total yield of 2,360,000 lbs. of grain. Calvert says he believes that he has learned a lot from his experiences this year and thinks he can better that production.

With the little off time Calvert has he is attending meetings and listening to talks which may give him some idea that would increase his production or improve his soil. Calvert thinks nothing of driving 50 or 60 miles to make a conservation or fertilizer meeting, for he is well aware that the soil he works with is his natural resource, and the better his resources the better will be his yield or finished product.

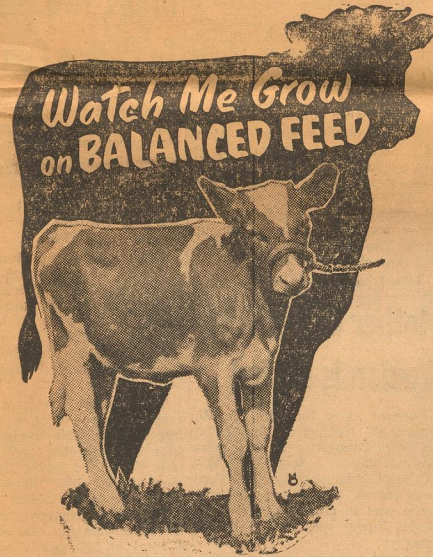

Castro County Woman Held Here in Connection With Husband's Death

Mrs. Essie Lou Townsend, who has made her residence at the headquarters house of the old Flagg Ranch since early January, was arrested at the ranch Saturday night by Castro County Sheriff Jack Cartwright, and jailed here on a charge of murder in connection with the death of her husband, Ward S. Townsend, 48.

Mrs. Townsend, 28, was arrested Saturday at 7 p. m. at the ranch house and will be held here until a decision is reached in her case. Her case will go before the Grand Jury and in the event a true bill is returned, she will face trial in District Court. The defendant's bond has been set at \$2,500.

Services for the victim were held at the Dennis Funeral Home Chapel Monday at 3 p. m. with Rev. George Ray officiating. Burial was in the cemetery here.

Sheriff Cartwright told a News reporter that Mrs. Townsend and her husband had an argument that resulted in a scuffle. Mrs. Townsend's mother was the only other person in the house at the time and she went to summon help. While she was gone, Mrs. Townsend, according to Sheriff Cartwright, managed to get a butcher knife from the kitchen which she used to stab Townsend. The victim was found on the floor in the hall when Cartwright arrived.

Mrs. Townsend was treated in Castro County Hospital for a knife wound in the right leg and several head bruises.

Cartwright said a neighbor telephoned him of the incident. He added that a quantity of whiskey was confiscated which was taken from a car that was parked in front of the ranch house.

No coroner's examination of the body of the victim was made but Cartwright said Townsend apparently died instantly.

Besides his wife, Townsend is survived by three daughters, his mother, Mrs. W. L. Townsend of Dexter, New Mexico; and four sisters.

Townsend came to the Flagg Ranch from Amarillo in early January and was employed as a chore hand. His wife worked as a cook, preparing all meals for the ranch hands. Townsend was a barber by trade.

Harman was enroute to Guyman, Oklahoma, to visit a son when his car skidded on some ice in the road and turned completely over. Although shaken and bruised, Harman was able to drive to Hereford where he underwent a checkup in the Hereford Clinic.

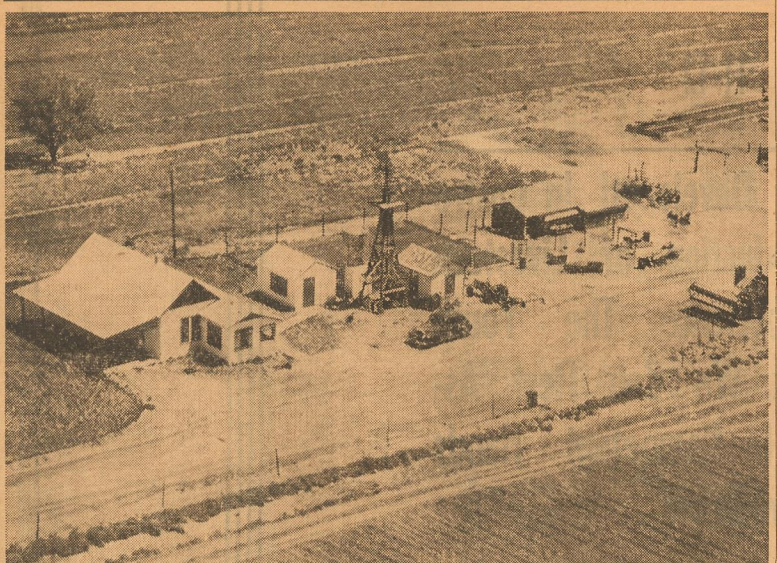

Mrs. G. A. Shwen Identifies Fourth Mystery Farm

Shown above is the H. F. Schilling farm, four miles north of Dimmitt. Schilling, son of H. F. Schilling, is currently renting the farm from his father. He made the identification official Saturday by calling at the News office. Recipient of the free subscription that goes to the winner of the feature each week was Mrs. G. A. Shwen of the Jumbo Community.

Schilling's father bought the farm in July of last year from Floyd Ferguson. Ferguson owned the farm for about four years.

Schilling is in the process of installing concrete pipe on the place now. The home on the farm, shown in the above picture, was remodeled in recent years. The main barn on the farm was destroyed by fire two years ago.

Schilling has 28 acres of land designated for cotton; 115 for wheat and 157 for milo. The balance of the farm or 60 acres are in pasture.

In the way of cattle, Schilling specializes in Black Angus, having at present 21 head. His favorite crop is cotton.

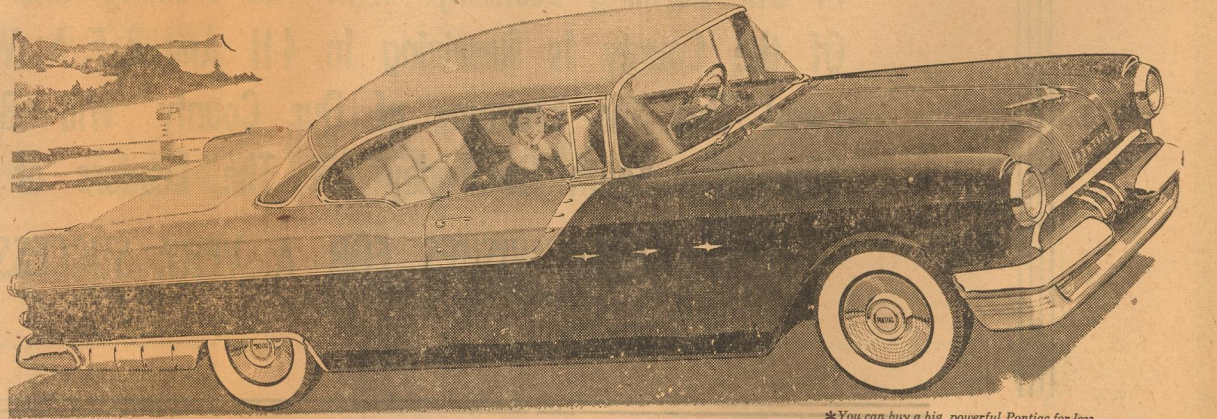
Schilling employs deep breaking as a method of tillage. He grazes his livestock on stalks, then wheat and later switches to pasture land. Schilling also feeds some alfalfa.

During the past season Schilling put 150 pounds of 16-20-0 on his cotton acreage. He used 100 pounds of ammonia sulphate and followed up with anhydrous in the summer.

As for conservation practices, Schilling has done some bench levelling and has also installed some concrete pipe.

Schilling and his wife, Anita, have three sons: Roger, age ten; Danny, age eight; and Randy, age one. The Schillings have been married 11 years. He is a member of the Castro County Farm Bureau.
