NEW YEAR'S FREEZE CHILLS COKE COUNTY

The New Year of 1979 came in like a lion over Coke County and most all of Texas. Bone-chilling arctic air dropped the mercury almost to zero in this area for some record-breaking temperatures.

Coke County thermometer readings reported varied somewhat, but most of them were announced to be 5 to 7 degrees above zero. The official low Tuesday morning at the San Angelo weather station was 6 degrees.

New Year's Day was a bad one, with extreme cold and freezing temperatures. Falling drizzle and some snow fell Sunday night, adding to the problems of getting around. Hundreds of accidents were reported in West Texas, but Sheriff J. Lee Ensor said Tuesday night that he didn't know of any serious accidents in Coke County because of the treacherous roads.

After the cold and gloomy Jan. 1, the real ice box weather greeted everyone Tuesday morning when the record-breaking lows were recorded.

However, the sun came out brightly Tuesday and things began to thaw out. Wednesday was another pretty day and most of the ice was melted before sundown.

Wednesday afternoon mercury readings were in the 40s, but a low in the middle 20s was forecast for Wednesday night.

Kessler is a certified peace officer with four years of sheriff's experience, Ensor said.

Sheriff Ensor pointed out that the new deputy will live in the city limits of Robert Lee and be available for duty whenever he is needed.

Kessler and his wife have two married children. They lived at Mertzon many years before moving to Robert Lee.

Deputy Childress is well known in Coke County, as he served as sheriff for about 12 years. Ensor said he was glad to have a man with Childress' experience in the office. Mrs. Devoll has served as office deputy for the past three years.

Coke County Livestock Show Set for Monday

The 1979 Coke County Livestock Show will be held at the County Recreation and Show Center in Robert Lee on Monday, Jan. 8. A total of 73 FFA and 4-H Club members will be exhibiting 235 animals in the show in competition for ribbons, trophies and a place in the premium sale.

Judges for the 1979 show will be Fred Igo, vocational agriculture teacher at Eldorado, and Frank Hermesmeyer, vocational agriculture teacher at Wall. Igo will judge sheep and cattle; Hermesmeyer will judge the swine classes.

The 1979 show will contain approximately 90 swine, 130 sheep and 15 head of cattle. A total of 30 club members will exhibit swine, 45 will show sheep and 12 have cattle exhibits for a total of 73 different club members.

The public is encouraged to attend the show and see the animals exhibited. Following

the show a sale will be held in which each exhibitor of a market animal will be allowed to sell one animal.

The show will be under the direction of the County Livestock Show Association board of directors. President of the association and general superintendent of the show is D.J. Walker Jr., Jerry Gibbs, Robert Lee School principal, will serve as records clerk. Edward Cumbie, Farm Bureau Field Representative, of Bronte, will serve as auctioneer for the premium sale. sworn in. He is former sheriff Melvin Childress, who was appointed to replace Mrs. Yvonne Devoll, who has taken a position with Ivey Motor Co.

MATTERS DISCUSSED

Judge Sims said Wednesday morning that in addition to the formal setting up of the official family of the county, a few matters of business were discussed.

Louis Lee of Bronte, who is chairman of a committee to develop a volunteer ambulance service, met with the commissioners and asked for a 60 day delay of any action by the county in setting up an ambulance service. Lee pointed out that more than 50 volunteers in the Bronte area have signed up to take training which would qualify them as ambulance attendants.

Lee asked the court to delay any action on the matter until his committee has time to get personnel trained to operate the service on a volunteers basis. The commissioners agreed to his request.

Sims said a couple of problems were brought up, and the commissioners agreed that action needs to be taken.

The first problem, Judge Sims said, is the matter of allocating office space of offices for the justices of the peace in Precincts 1 and 3. At the present time, Mrs. Jacoby, who is JP for Precinct 1, has her office in the courthouse. Since the courthouse is located in Precinct 3, it is illegal for her to hold court in the office she occupies. Sims said the Texas attorney general ruled June 6, 1978, that a justice of the peace must have his office in the precinct he represents. "We are going to have to take some action comply with the law," Judge Sims said, "and it will be up to the commissioners to decide how to work it out."

Another matter which was discussed was the fact that no public notice was published notifying the public that officials' salaries would be set at a budget hearing held in September. As the matter now stands, the county cannot legally pay its officials and employees.

To remedy the situation, the judge has called a meeting of the county grievance committee, which can legally act in setting salaries. The committee will convene today (Friday).

The new judge said his first day in office was quite eventful and he is looking forward to serving the citizens of Coke County during the next four years.

Sheppard Service At Big Spring

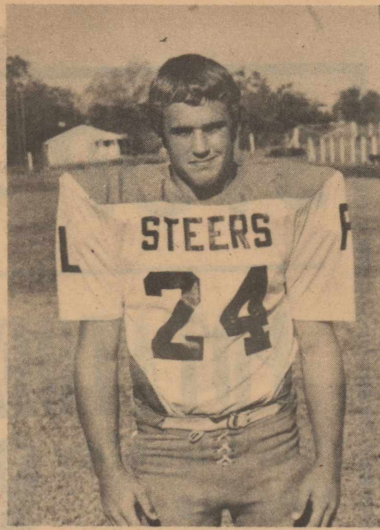

Agriculture Census Now Underway

The 1978 Census of Agriculture gets underway this week with the mailing of report forms to all farms and ranches in the 50 States, the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce, announced today.

Farmers and ranchers are being asked to report on their agricultural operations during 1978. This 1978 census, the Nation's 21st farm census in a series that started in 1840, will update data most recently obtained in 1975 for 1974 operations. Information will be sought on all agricultural operations.

With report forms for the 1978 census drastically reduced from the 22 pages of the last census, most agricultural operators will receive a four-page form in the mail, and about 20 percent will receive a five-page version. The overall time required by farmers to complete the form has been reduced by more than one-third.

The census will continue to monitor trends in domestic ownership and control of land. The last census showed a five-year gain in the number of U.S. corporate farms from 22,000 to 29,000; the amount of acreage they farmed rose from 80 to 97 million acres, and the value of their farm products rose from \$6 billion to \$14 billion.

The census asks whether the farm is operated by a family or individual, a partnership, a family-held corporation, an investor-owned corporation with more than 10 stockholders, or some other legal entity such as cooperative, estate or trust, grazing association, etc.

The apparent increase in foreign ownership of land has raised questions in the Congress and with business and agricultural groups. In 1974 a Department of Commerce survey showed about 5 million acres of the Nation's one billion acres of farm land were owned by foreign interests, or less than one-half of one percent of the total. The new farm census will measure the increase.

Despite careful screening of the mailing lists used, some persons not engaged in agricultural activities will receive report forms. Those persons

should return the form with that fact noted in order to stop additional mailings.

The law which requires farmers to answer the census items also protects the privacy of answers. Since 1900, census report forms have been confidential by law. They may be seen only by sworn Census employees and may be used only for statistical totals. Even other government agencies cannot obtain or use the reports made by any farm operator. Neither can anyone use legal means to obtain a copy of the report retained by the operator in his files.

Farm operators who do not receive a form during the first week of January should request one from the Bureau of the Census, 1201 East 10th Street, Jeffersonville, Indiana 47132.

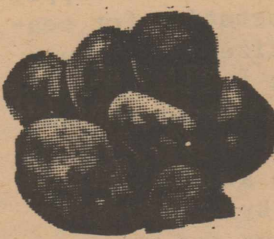
