Old Fashioned City-Wide Revival Set Next Week

A city-wide revival will be held in Robert Lee next week. The special services will begin Sunday and continue through Friday, June 15. Sponsored by Robert Lee Baptist Church, the series of services is billed as a "genuine old-fashioned outdoor revival."

All evening services will begin at 8 p.m. and will be held in the Mountain Creek Amphitheater. Morning services, beginning at 10 a.m., will be held in the Baptist Church auditorium.

Theme for the revival services will be "Alive in Christ."

Evangelist will be Barry Schahn of West Palm Beach, Fla. He is no stranger to this area, having conducted a revival here last year. He is a native Texan, born and reared in Orange. He is a graduate of Howard Payne University, Brownwood, and attended Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth.

Lake Spence Catching Runoff from C-City Rain

Lake Spence is expected to be the main beneficiary of torrential rains which fell Monday in the Colorado City area. More than 9 inches fell in some parts of Mitchell County, swelling creeks and filling the Colorado River which feeds the lake above Robert Lee.

Frank Bates of the Colorado River Municipal Water District said Wednesday afternoon that the river was running 11 feet deep at the Silver bridge. The lake was already rising and an altitude check early Wednesday morning placed the later level at 1856.06 feet, compared to 1856.19 feet about noon. CRMWD officials are expecting the present rise to increase the level of the lake at least 1½ feet.

Bates said officials expect at least 10,000 acre feet of new water will flow into the lake

from the big rains. He said the quality of the new water running into the lake is very good, adding "it's real clean water."

CRMWD personnel took an aerial survey of the situation Tuesday morning and reported the river was running full from Lake Thomas in Borden and Scurry Counties to Colorado City at that time.

Bates said he traveled north onto the watershed early Tuesday and found water running 11 feet deep at a bridge south of Colorado City.

One rain gauge on the watershed checked by CRMWD showed 9.1 inches fell during a 24 hour period. Colorado City measured 8 inches Tuesday morning. Gauges in the area south of Westbrook showed 4 to 4½ inches.

Extensive damage occurred in Colorado City where the city water

supply was cut off when main line was ruptured. Two bridges in the south part of town were washed out and residents of low lying areas had to be evacuated. Water service had been restored Wednesday.

More Rains Make Spring of 1979 Wettest in Years

Rains last weekend continued soaking Robert Lee and Coke County with up to 3½ inches falling in some places, to make the spring of 1979 one of the wettest in years.

Measurements in Robert Lee ranged from 2.55 inches reported by J.E. Quisenberry to more than 3 inches reported by some residents of the city.

Heaviest rainfall reported to the Observer was 3.5 inches received by Fred McCabe Sr. on the Divide southwest of town. Crowley and Finis Harmon, both of the Edith area, reported 3 inches. Sterling Lindsey had 3 inches over the weekend and "a little more" Monday night. Dot Childress, who lives east of town. Also had 3 inches.

Other measurements reported included: Barton Waldrop, Hayrick, 2.4 inches; J.W. Arledge Ranch, north of Sanco, 1.5; Bobby Baker, south of town, 2.9; R.A. Bloodworth, Silver, 2.0; David Key, west of town, 2.5 inches.

Mr. Bird was one of the youngest at the establishment of the community in 1887, moving here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Miller Bird, at the age of 5.

Tennis C. Creighton of Christoval was the oldest man born at Sanco and Mrs. Betha Breedlove King the oldest woman born at Sanco.

Insurance for Home Buyers

Big Sealcoat Job Starts on Hiways

Work is scheduled to begin this week on 160 miles of sealcoat throughout District 7, announced James R. "Bobby" Evans, district maintenance engineer for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT).

Strain Bros. Inc. of San Angelo is the contractor. The crew will be moving to the various sections of highway during the next two to three months.

The 19 sections, in 12 different counties will receive a seal coat to preserve and protect the existing pavement.

Barricades, warning signs, and flagmen will be used to inform the public of the areas where the crews are working. When in a construction area the motorist should slow down and watch for men and equipment.

The department hopes the driving public will have a safe and happy trip.

COUNTY RECEIVES REBATE FROM STATE

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said Texas counties will share more than \$365,407 in state funds under a law designed to encourage voter registration and accurate registration lists. Bullock said the Texas Election Code directs the Comptroller's Ad Valorem Division to make payments to counties for reimbursement of voter registration activities.

The law provides local reimbursement of 40 cents for each new registered voter and 40 cents for each cancellation made to update lists. Coke County received \$115.20. Bullock said total voter registration is put at more than 5.9 million Texas residents.



The department has used Stephens in many capacities--common laborer, semi-skilled laborer, maintenance technician I, II, and III (crew chief and assistant foreman) and when he transferred to the Robert Lee Maintenance Section in 1974 was soon maintenance construction foreman III and has advanced to his present position of maintenance construction supervisor.

The Governor of Texas and the Texas Rehabilitation Commission issued a certificate to Stephens for enhancing skills in the utilization of handicapped employees through successful completion of the Government Supervisors Training Program.

John and Mrs. Stephens (Pat) have two boys, Scott age 14 and Randy age 11. Mrs. Stephens is an artist. She has painted and sold many beautiful pictures. They are all active in the Baptist Church where Stephens sings in the choir. He is on the Robert Lee School board and belongs to the Farm Bureau. The only hobbies he has time for are his interests in farming and ranching in both Concho and Coke Counties.

The presentation made by Assistant District Engineer W.P. Harrington of San Angelo was accompanied by a letter of congratulations for his long and dedicated service and "wishes that his continued service with the department would be pleasant and productive."


