County Newspapers Taking Vacation Week of July 4th

Editions of the Robert Lee Observer and Bronte Enterprise published next week (June 29) will be the last until July 13. It's vacation time for members of the staff of the Coke County newspapers.

Anyone who has any announcement, advertisement or other material which needs to be published before July 13 should get it in time for the June 29 issue, since no papers will be published on July 6.

The Enterprise and Observer, for the past few years, have skipped the issues of the week of July 4 and the week after Christmas.

Up until a law was passed a few years ago by the Texas Legislature, there were no vacations for workers on small newspapers. Skipping an issue caused a newspaper to lose its status as a legal publication, since the law stated that legal publications (those qualified to publish legal notices) must have published at least 52 consecutive issues.

MRS. ANDERSON TO WORK FOR CF

Mrs. Larry Anderson has accepted the chairmanship of the Annual Fall Campaign on behalf of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. She will be recruiting volunteers within the Community to plan a "Breath of Life Campaign" to take place this fall in Robert Lee. The purpose of this fall campaign will be to provide the community with information about cystic fibrosis and to raise funds to support research, education and care programs for children affected by cystic fibrosis, and other lung-damaging diseases like severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, and bronchiectasis.

Cystic fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children. Approximately one in every 20 Americans is a symptomless carrier of the recessive CF gene. Cystic fibrosis inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene. At the present time, no cure for cystic fibrosis is known.

Rebates Show Business Good

Business in Robert Lee continues to be good, according to a report from the office of the state comptroller, who sends out monthly rebates for the one per cent city sales tax. The amount of monthly rebates is considered a good index of the business activities of cities which have levied the tax.

Robert Lee's tax rebates for the year up through the period ending May 31, was \$8,798.44, compared to \$7,135.06 for the same period in 1978. These figures show an increase of 23 per cent.

All Texas cities which levy the one per cent

tax received \$218 million in the first six months of 1979, compared to \$196.4 million for the same period of 1978.

Bronte has received \$5,738.95 for the first six months of this year, compared to \$5,509.81 for 1978, for an increase of four per cent.

Maybe it was just the right time for a million-to-one odds thing to happen or maybe it was Father's Day luck, but two Robert Lee golfers did something Sunday that is unheard of in this part of the world. Two members of a sixsome hit holes in one on the No. 8 hole at the Mountain Creek Golf Course.

Horace Scott was the third member of the group to try for the par three No. 8 which was 144 yards away. Scott swung at the ball with his eight iron and unbelievably the ball sank into the cup.

Scott's basking in the hole-in-one glory was short-lived, however. Clarence Tinkler was the sixth member of the group to strike toward No. 8. Using his seven iron, Tinkler hit the ball and it wound up snuggling up to Scott's ball in the cup after one swing.

The odds of such an occurrence are astronomical, but it was done and witnessed by the four other members of the sixsome: Robert Vaughn, Billy Wayne Roe, John Heck and Lawrence Higgins. The six men were playing a round robin with Scott and Tinkler on different teams.

This was Tinkler's second hole in one at Mountain Creek, as he had aced No. 9 at Mountain Creek in June 1976. It was Scott's third experience as a hole in one master, as he hit his first at the North Oxford Golf Club in England and his second at the Abilene Country Club.

The six men were also playing skins and greenies and there was some lively discussion about the winner. Tinkler claims that Scott lost his when he (Tinkler) put his shot on top of Scott's. But Heck claims he won the greenie because both Scott and Tinkler were touching the pin and Heck's ball stopped about two feet from the hole. SAC Bombers To Fly Nearby

HQ SAC, Offutt AFB, Neb., June 15, -- Strategic Air Command (SAC) bombers will begin flying a new low level training route in Texas during June 1979 in preparation for use of the route during GLOBAL SHIELD 79, the SAC-wide exercise to be conducted later this year. The new route passes over northern Coke County.

The unarmed eight-engine B-52 Stratofortresses and swing-wing FB-III fighter-bombers will fly the training route at subsonic speeds along a center line of an eight mile wide corridor at altitudes ranging from 400 to 2,000 feet above the ground. The route will be used to measure precision bombing, navigation training and electronic countermeasure activity.

During exercise GLOBAL SHIELD 79, which will test SAC units on an unannounced basis, approximately 100 of the SAC bombers will fly the training route

during a three day period. During peak periods, single aircraft may pass along the route every 12 minutes.

Aircraft do not carry bombs on these training flights. All bombing is simulated and radar scored by a ground based scoring site.

Aircrews flying the training route, designated Military Training Route IR-173, will begin descending from high altitude near Ft. Stockton. They will begin the low level route north of Rankin and proceed in an easterly direction. At a point southwest of Cole, the route will turn north, passing to the west of Sterling City. To the north of Sterling City, the aircraft will turn east on a route which takes the aircraft north of Robert Lee and Bronte, between Winters and Ballinger, Coleman and Brownwood. At a point north of Mullin, the aircraft will turn to the east-northeast, proceeding to the end of their route near Atlanta, Texas. Although this is a FAA

established route, pilots of private aircraft are reminded that during the period of the exercise, high speed, camouflaged jet aircraft may be operating at any time, day or night and during Instrument Flight Rules (IFR) and Visual Flight Rules (VFR) conditions. Pilots operating in the vicinity of the low level route are requested to operate rotating beacons and/or strobe lights in order to aid in their detection by other aircraft.

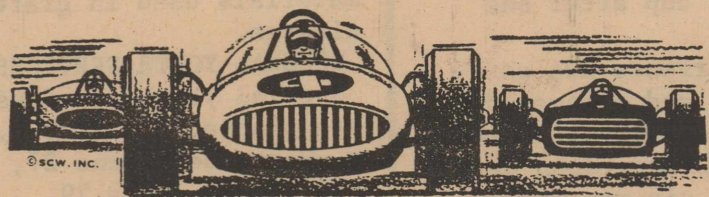

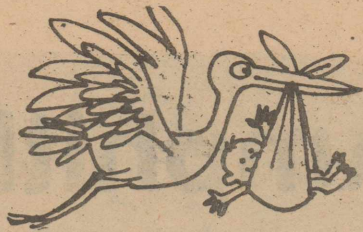

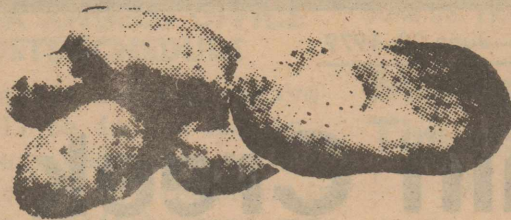

Management of Time Is Possible

A plan and four ideas make "time management" at home a reality.

A plan means setting priorities--deciding which tasks are important.

Any plan will work with the help of four ideas: do major work "piecemeal," leave some for the last minute, delegate some to other people--and use willpower.

Willpower is for sticking to the plan--without feelings of guilt about any free time gained.

PIECEMEAL WORK

Do a major project piecemeal by attacking it in portions.

It makes the task seem lighter, and it avoids waiting for large time blocks for the entire job.

Also, the "piecemeal approach" helps get "dreaded" work started--use the first little time frame just for beginning a task.

Here's how the "piecemeal" idea works--on range and oven cleaning, for example:

First Day--Just to get started, clean the range surface. Spend as little time as possible on it.

Second Day--Clean the broiler pan or start it soaking.

Third Day--Work on the oven interior.

LAST-MINUTE WORK

Work left for the last minute will take less time than "regularly scheduled" work, so plan disliked tasks for "the last minute"--when only a small amount of time exists.

For example, dusting just before company comes will take less time than dusting on a regularly scheduled "cleaning day."

'DELEGATED' WORK

Delegate some of the work to other people--and share the workload.

Since homemaking is non-competitive, perfection is not necessary or required.

For example, let children clean their rooms.

If their work is less-than-"perfect," learn to accept their contributions.

USE WILLPOWER

One real trick to time management is learning not to feel guilty for gaining control of time.

Time management requires willpower--to stick with priorities once they are set.

"Nobody can become perfect by merely ceasing to act," cautions the Bhagavad-Gita.
