Hackberry Johnson, Cowboy Legend, Dies While Attending Austin Concert

Hugh A. "Hackberry" Johnson, 91, a legend in his own time, is dead. The one-legged rodeo performer and showman died of an apparent heart attack Monday night in Austin.

Johnson was a guest at ident in the nursing a Willie Nelson concert home. He lived at the at Austin Opera House and was called up on the stage by Nelson to do a dance. After he returned to his front row seat he fell to the floor and efforts to revive him were unsuccessful.

Hackberry was known by just about everybody in Coke County for area as a young man this was home to him, even though he had traveled and lived all over the United States during his long career. He had one wish come true last fall when he played a part in an \$8 million Willie Nelson movie which was filmed at Austin.

rator of Bronte Nursing Home, had a letter and some newspaper clippings from him a few weeks ago. He asked Clark to let him know. the first time he had an opening for a reshome for several months a few years ago, and liked it there "better than any place." However, the wanderlust which was so much a part of him came out and he moved on.

Reports of old timers say that Hackberry came to the Buffalo Gap and later worked on the Odom Ranch northeast of Bronte. He was reportedly working for J. Stubblefield when a horse jerked him to the ground and hurt his leg so badly it had to be amputated. Many people have a bumper crop of pecans this year. Some are selling the extra production, others are keeping them to enjoy through the

If you have wondered where you should store pecans, there are several suitable places around the home. They may be stored as shelled kernels or in the shells in a number of locations. The kitchen cabinet, store room, refrigerator, or freezer, But, the various locations have a different storage life.

For best quality without becoming discolored, rancid or stale, use the following guideline: Shelled Kernels In-the-shell

Cabinet (70F.) - 3 months 4 months Refrigerator (50F.) - 6 months 9-18 months Freezer (0 F.) - 2 years 2 years plus

Storage areas should be clean, dry and free of odors, have some air circulation, and be out of contact with ammonia gas. Unshelled nuts will store for about twice as long as shelled nuts. Although shelled pecans weigh less and take less space than unshelled nuts, they abosrb moisture and flavors readily, become "dirty" and stale easier, and, consequently, require good packaging and more careful handling. Pecan kernels will lose quality in storage; therefore, the lower the storage temperature, the longer their quality is retained.

Pecans should be air-dryed after harvesting and before storing. This will help prevent mold on the shell surface as well as inside the shell while in storage.

New Edition of **Texas Almanac** Comes Off Press

The 1980-81 Texas A1manac and State Industrial Guide, now off the presses, marks a major milestone in book publishing. It is the 50th edition of this unique book since the first edition was published in Galveston in

A special article in the new edition, written by Lee Milazzo, director of archives at Southern Methodist University and book reviewer for The Dallas Morning News, traces the history of the Texas Almanac since Willard Richardson, who was the Galveston News publisher at the time, launched the enterprise.

There have been several time gaps in the book's publication, the longest being from 1873 until 1904, when publication was resumed in Dallas by A.H. Belo & Co. The Belo Corporation, publisher of The Dallas News, has been the book's publisher since that time. Throughout most of this century, it has been published every other year, except for a gap of several years during World War I.


