
The two apparently had reached a safe pool downstream when Minnick sud-





BE BRIEF - Get to your point quickly, and say what you think, preferably in the first few lines.

BE RELEVANT - Stick to your point.

USE MODERATION -Don't gush, rage, or whine. EMPHASIZE FACTS -They'll make your opinions more credible



## CCC agrees to hold part of dumped corn

Commodity Credit Corporation will not sell 23 to 25 million bushels of the government owned corn that is now stored in the Texas High Plains. This volume has been designated for use in disaster programs only.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) received this news May 5 after months of negotiations between the two groups. Sorghum area congressmen and Texas Corn Growers Assocation have also expressed concern as to the effects upon High Plains grain prices, if CCC were to sell the entire 52 million bushels that were shipped into the heart of the grain sorghum area. This corn was shipped from the



northern corn belt with the government paying all costs of transportation in relocating the grain.

GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp met with the top USDA officials May 2 in Washington, D.C. He reported that he was assured at that time that USDA would do everything possible to keep its sales from affecting the market. GSPA contends that exporting the grain is the best way to protect the High Plains grain market.

USDA argues that it would be too expensive for it to pay freight into the export markets. GSPA officials believe this disregards the fact that the CCC paid the freight while shipping it into West Texas. No decision has been announced on what the disposition policy will be for the balance of the corn that CCC

has stored in West Texas.

## Insects of interest Army cutworm moths are now common here

By ALLEN KNUTSON

**Extension Entomologist** Many people would enjoy escaping our hot summer months for the cool Rocky Mountain air. An insect called the army cutworm does just

The adult stage of the army cutworm is a moth or miller. These moths are now very common around lights at night. They often become a nuisance as they enter the seventy were published home and fly about lights.

The inch-long moth is dark in 1791 at the age of thirtybrown to black with two gray spots on each forewing. It rests with the wings folded across the back, and often hides during the day in and around the home near lights. Large numbers often appear in May.

Shortly after emergence, the army cutworm moths fly to the Rocky Mountains, probably to escape the hot summer. There, they feed on flowers and shrubs, returning to the Plains in the fall. Eggs are then laid in fields. Emerging larvae feed on grasses, wheat and alfalfa during the winter. Army cutworms may become pests in the spring if large numbers are present in these crops. Larvae transform to adult moths, which emerge

Moths can be kept from homes by keeping doors, garage doors and screens tightly closed, and reducing lights. However, moths often enter through vents and

squeeze through very small cracks. Army cutworm moths do not harm clothing or other goods, and pose no threat to gardens or crops now. They will soon be off on summer vacation.

first made mention of Speaker's Day, a day set aside during each legislative session to honor the man who wields the gavel each day in the Texas House of Represen-

Since that day - April 27, 1895 - when the House suspended business to present Speaker T. S. Smith of Hillsboro with a gold watch, the honoring of the Speaker of the House has become tradition.

On Monday, May 18, Speaker's Day will again be observed, but there have been many changes over the years and a few new wrinkles added since Bill Clayton of Springlake became speaker in 1975.

The idea of giving gifts to the speaker escalated over the years from a "few mementos of their regard and good wishes" given in 1899, to later years, when a former representative observed. "They started backing trucks up to the capitol and unloading gifts early in the

The gift-giving practice which had already been curtailed for the most part came to a stop when Clayton took office. He said there would be no gifts accepted, and furthermore he would

the event.

A new method of honoring the man sprang up after Clayton could not convince some employees, friends and colleagues that he did not want to be honored by gift-

'Many people wanted to honor the office and I had two very deserving charities in my district, so I invited them to make contributions to Boys Ranch near Amarillo and Girlstown at Whiteface. In this way, some deserving youngsters got a chance to become better citizens, my friends got to contribute in my name, and I kept my pledge of not seeking personal gain from the office.

In 1975, \$6,000 was contributed to the two childrens' homes. In 1977, the total was \$11,000, and in 1979, more than \$30,000 went to the charities.

Clayton, in his fourth and final term as speaker, has this session for the first time personally solicited friends and colleagues for contribu-

In fact, due to the cost of living increase in the last year, a 11.2% increase in social security checks will be in the July 3 check for most beneficiaries.

Self-employed workers and others who are eligible for individual retirement accounts usually will have an accountant or banker assist them in planning retirement. These workers need to project their financial needs for retirement into the future. They will also need to review their plans timely as inflation and the cost of living rises.

Another source of assistance for planning retirement is your life insurance agent. Many workers have several sources of retirement income. This is the objective all workers should strive to attain. Social security is a base for retirement; it does not replace a worker's earnings nor was it ever intended to do so. Normally, it replaces from 30% to 55% of pre-retirement in-

Of course, the basic source of information for retirees is the local social security office. We have many pamphlets in addition to the usual counseling and other information we furnish. Our services are also free of charge.
