Directors of Plains Memorial Hospital are expected to call a \$135,000 bond election at their Monday noon meeting to finance a 20-bed annex through a federal aid project.

The proposed new wing wou cost approximately \$270,000. Hospital Administrator Don New man said the board will apply for a federal grant to finance onehalf of the cost through provisions of the Hill-Burton Act.

Plans call for the expansion of the modern 30-bed hospital to a 50-bed plant to absorb the expected impact of county growth and

Newman said the hospital's space problem isn't critical yet, but that the directors "want to

IN ADDITION to the extra rooms, Newman said, the expansion would make possible a new classroom for training purposes, a three-bed intensive care unit and recovery room combination, larger laboratory facilities, a formula room and family room. Most of these facilities would be gained through interior changes in the present hospital building, he explained.

The tragedy of war struck close to home on Christmas eve when an American soldier who received his first schooling at Hart was killed in Vietnam.

LIFE ON the farm continues to improve for those who still remain there, though every year the farm and ranch population dwindles as more move to the cities and suburbs.

In 1966, net farm income per farm in the US was \$4,900 — an increase of 66 percent over 1960. But there were 17 percent fewer farms at the end of 1966, so the real per-farm increase was probably closer to 3 percent.

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
