L. Noble, director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. The activity is under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

4-H girls who have imagination, are handy with a needle, paintbrush-and yes, hammer and saw, too-find the 4-H Home Improvement program a natural for their talents. Supervised and encouraged by their County Extension agent and local 4-H Club leader, the young homemakers plan improvements for beauty, comfort, health and safety. 
